RED-HOT HUSKIES RETURN TO NCAs; UW vs. MINNESOTA AT LONG BEACH

COMING UP: The No. 23 Washington baseball team (40-16 overall, 15-9 (third) in the Pac-10) heads to the NCAA tournament for the seventh time ever and the sixth time in the last 12 seasons this weekend. The Huskies will play in the Long Beach Regional at Blair Field in Long Beach, Calif. Friday, May 30, at 3:00 p.m., the third-seeded Huskies take on second-seeded Minnesota (39-20, 26-4 Big Ten) in their opening game. Regional host and top-seeded Long Beach State (38-18, 13-5 Big West), ranked No. 8 by Baseball America, hosts fourth-seeded Pepperdine (36-23, 23-7 West Coast Conference) in the other first-round game, which is slated for Friday at 7:00 p.m. All of Washington's postseason games will air live on KKNW AM-1150. The winner of the double-elimination regional will play the winner of a regional at Stanford, Calif. (participants: Stanford, Richmond, UC Riverside and Illinois-Chicago) in a best-of-three Super Regional the following weekend (June 6-8), with the winner of that advancing to the College World Series in Omaha, Neb. The Huskies enter the regional having won seven of their last eight, 18 of their last 22 and 36 of their last 46 after opening the season with a 4-6 record. COACH "K": In 11 seasons as the head coach of his alma mater, **Ken Knutson** has led the Dawgs to two Pac-10 championships, four Pac-10 Northern Division titles, two second-place finishes and, now, five NCAA Regionals. His career overall record stands at 387-251-1 (.606). With those 387 wins, he is the second-winningest coach in UW history, trailing only Bob MacDonald (422). Before becoming the head man in 1993, Knutson served as the Husky pitching coach for eight seasons. In 1985, his UW pitching staff led the nation with a 2.80 ERA. Knutson holds a 190-82-1 (.698) record in home games. He is 167-115 (.592) in Pac-10 games. Knutson has coached 40 first-team All-Pac-10 selections in 11 seasons, and has been named league coach of the year three times. A 1981 All-Pac-10 left-handed pitcher at the UW, he is joined by assistants **Joe Ross**, **Travis Jewett**, and **Gregg Swenson** and undergrad assistant **Jeremiah Porter**.

POSTSEASON GUIDE

NCAA POSTSEASON HISTORY: See pages 8-15 of this guide for a complete rundown of Washington's history in the NCAA, complete with all box scores and individual postseason records.

HISTORY vs. NCAA REGIONAL OPPONENTS: Washington has played each of the three possible NCAA regional opponents in recent years, including this season's opener, when Pepperdine shut Washington out, 1-0, on Feb. 7 in Malibu. The Huskies have played Long Beach State seven times and Minnesota on five occasions in their history and is 0-2 all-time vs. Pepperdine, including a meeting in the 1992 NCAA West I Regional. That year, the Waves went on to win the College World Series. Additionally, both of the Huskies' wins vs. Long Beach State came in the a 1994 NCAA Regional in Wichita. Here's a look at the Huskies' series history against each of the other four teams in this weekend's NCAA Long Beach Regional and game recaps from the 1992 NCAA game vs. Pepperdine and both 1994 NCAA games against the 49ers:

UW vs. MINNESOTA: Washington is 2-3 all-time against the Golden Gophers, with all five meetings coming in regular-season tournaments in the 1990s. In 1998, the Huskies faced Minnesota in a tournament hosted by San Diego State. The game was moved to Yuma, Ariz., due to rain in San Diego, and the Gophers won that one, 15-9, as the UW committed a school-record 12 errors. In 1997, in the Hormel Foods Classic at the Metrodome in Minneapolis, the UW won, 9-1. Ryan Lentz went 4-for-5 and Jake Kringen threw seven innings for the win. In 1990, in a tournament in San Jose, Calif., Minnesota won two of three games, taking the first two, 13-6 and 6-3, before losing the third, 6-3.

UW vs. LONG BEACH STATE: The Huskies are only 2-5 all-time against the 49ers, with both wins coming at the 1994 NCAA Midwest II Regional at Wichita State (more on those two games below). The first-ever UW-LBSU game took place in Long Beach in 1969, with the Niners taking a 4-2 win. In 1996, Washington opened the season with a four-game series at Blair Field and Long Beach swept a UW team that started at least five freshmen in each game. LBSU's Rocky Biddle worked six innings and struck out 12 in the opening 5-2 win as two of the Huskies' five hits came from freshman Pete Orgill, who also homered. The UW was held to two hits in a 10-1 loss in the second game, with Orgill doubling and scoring the only Husky run. Long Beach's Marcus Jones allowed two hits and fanned 10 over six innings for the win. In game three, the UW mustered only three hits in a 3-1 loss as Kyle Wilson took a 7.1-inning win. In the series finale, LBSU blanked the Dawgs, 4-0, on five hits. Steve Hueston went five innings for the win.

UW vs. PEPPERDINE: Washington and Pepperdine have met only twice all-time, once in the 1992 NCAA West I Regional in Tucson, Ariz. (more on that below) and once this season, when Washington opened its season with a 1-0 loss at Pepperdine at the Battle at the Beach tournament in Malibu. In that game, Feb. 7 (both teams' opener), the Waves' Brandon Boesch out-dueled Husky starter **Sean White** for the 1-0 win. Boesch allowed only five hits over seven innings while White gave up only three in six frames. Washington had its best scoring chance in the first as singles from **John Otness** and **Kyle Larsen** and a walk to **Steve Ramsey** loaded the bases with two outs, but **Mike Wagner** grounded out to end the threat. In the fifth, with two outs and none on, Waves shortstop Kevin Estrada belted a line-drive homer off the scoreboard in right field for the game's lone tally. Otness had two of the Huskies' five hits on the day.

PEPPERDINE 11, UW 0 • NCAA WEST I REGIONAL • TUCSON • MAY 24, 1992

The Huskies and Pepperdine met in a winners' bracket game at the 1992 West I Regional in Tucson, as both had won their first two games of the tournament. Derek Wallace held sixth-seeded UW to only three hits over seven and two-thirds innings for the win, fanning nine. Second baseman Steve Rodriguez led the Waves' offense with three hits, three runs, a double and two stolen bases in four at bats. Pepperdine scored one in the first and three in the second and held a 4-0 lead through four and half innings before putting the game away with three in the fifth and four in the seventh. Husky starter Chad Hartvigson went the distance in the loss, allowing 11 runs (five earned) on 11 hits over his eight innings. Left fielder Derrin Doty was the only Husky with more than one hit as he went 2-for-4. Pepperdine went on to win the NCAA title.

UW 10, LONG BEACH ST. 4 • NCAA MIDWEST II REGIONAL • WICHITA • MAY 27, 1994

Fifth-seeded Washington and second-seeded Long Beach State met on the first day of regional play at Wichita State, with the UW emerging with a 10-4 win. Long Beach scored three in the third before the UW erupted for six in the fourth, one in the fifth and two in the sixth to cruise to the win. Chad Hartvigson worked seven innings in the victory, beating 49ers ace Mike Fontana (5.2 IP, 9 hits, 9 runs, 3 ERs, 2 BBs, 4 Ks). In the six-run fourth, the UW took advantage of two errors by LBSU shortstop Ryan Miller. A two-run single from Brett Newell and a three-run homer from Ross Junkin were the big blows. Greg Mecca, who went 3-for-5, added a solo homer for the UW. Junkin finished 3-for-4 while leadoff man Joe Trippy was 4-for-6 with two runs scored.

UW 6, LONG BEACH ST. 2 • NCAA MIDWEST II REGIONAL • WICHITA • MAY 29, 1994

Two days after their first meeting at the 1994 regional, the Huskies and Dirtbags hooked up in an elimination game, with the winner moving on to face Nomar Garciaparra and Georgia Tech in the title game(s). LBSU took a 2-0 lead in the third on RBI singles from Ryan Miller and Kirk Pierce, but the Huskies took the lead for good with five runs in the fifth. RBI singles from Joe Trippy and Ryan Rutz got the rally started and a two-run homer from designated hitter Sean Linville finished it. Linville, a rare transfer from cross-state rival Washington State, went 3-for-4 in the game. Husky starter Sean Spencer threw seven innings for the win, allowing two runs on five hits while striking out five. Long Beach State starter Michael Hernandez suffered the loss with five and two-thirds innings. The UW went on to beat Georgia Tech in the first title game, 12-9 in 14 innings on a three-run homer by Brian Loucks, but lost in the second game, 18-7.

HUSKIES IN SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA: In an odd twist, the Huskies' trip to Long Beach State this weekend will mark the UW's sixth trip to Southern California this season. Washington opened the 2003 season by going 2-1 (loss to Pepperdine, wins over UC Santa Barbara and Houston) at the Battle of the Beach tournament at Pepperdine. The

following weekend, the Huskies lost two of three in a series at Loyola Marymount. After a weekend at home, the UW travelled to Lancaster, Calif., for three games in the Clash of the Conferences, hosted by Cal State Northridge. The Dawgs lost to the University of San Diego before beating Northridge and San Diego State. In late March, Washington took on UC Irvine in a three-game series at Anteater Ballpark, winning games one and three. Finally, the Huskies' final road trip of the regular season was to UCLA, where Washington lost the first game before taking the next two. In all, the Huskies played (counting tournaments) five three-game series in the Los Angeles area, winning two of three games in four of them and losing two of three in the other (LMU), good for an overall record of 9-6. For what little it's worth, the Huskies batted only .269 over those 15 games, but pitched for a 3.63 earned run average while fielding .979.

HUSKIES vs. THE CONFERENCES: Washington is 10-9 all-time against the 10 current baseball-playing members of the Big Ten Conference (plus 1-1 vs. Wisconsin). The Huskies have played all Big Ten members except Indiana, Iowa and Purdue. The Huskies are (all-time): 1-2 vs. Illinois, 1-1 vs. Michigan, 1-1 vs. Michigan State, 2-3 vs. Minnesota, 3-1 vs. Northwestern, 1-1 vs. Ohio State, and 1-0 vs. Penn State. The UW has played seven of the nine current Big West teams, all but Pacific and Sacramento State, compiling a 25-31 combined record against Big West teams: 4-4 vs. UC Irvine (2-1 this year), 6-8 vs. UC Riverside, 1-2 vs. Cal Poly, 0-2 vs. CS Fullerton, 9-3 vs. CS Northridge (4-0 this year), 2-5 vs. Long Beach State, and 3-7 vs. UC Santa Barbara (1-0 this year). Washington has played more games against West Conference Conference teams than any other conference beside the Pac-10, thanks largely to the facts that, 1) Gonzaga and Portland are the UW's two closest non-league foes, and that, 2) they're both former Pac-10 Northern Division members. UW is 143-93-2 all-time vs. the WCC, including 6-6 this year: 59-50 vs. Gonzaga (1-2 this year), 1-2 vs. Loyola Marymount (1-2 this year), 0-2 vs. Pepperdine (0-1 this year), 70-39-1 vs. Portland (4-0 this year), 1-0 vs. St. Mary's, 2-2 vs. San Diego (0-1 this year), 5-2-1 vs. San Francisco, and 5-6 vs. Santa Clara.

OUTSTANDING IN THE FIELD: Washington is having its best year ever in terms of its defense. Through 56 games, the Huskies are fielding a Pac-10-leading .979 (second to Long Beach State in NCAA Division I) and have made only 44 errors. Washington's school record for fielding percentage is .964, set in 1980 and tied in 1994. This year, the Huskies have played error-free in 33 of 56 games while opponents have made at least one error in all but 13 games. Washington infielders have committed only 25 errors all season. By way of comparison, South Carolina led the NCAA with a .975 fielding percentage last season. Also, opponents have been very wary when it comes to trying to steal bases vs. the UW. Over the last 46 games, opponents have stolen only 25 bases while being caught 26 times.

POWER SHOW: Blame it on the new ballpark if you must (Husky Ballpark opened in 1998), but the Huskies have three players with double-figure home runs for the fifth time in the last six years, and for only the fifth time in history. In fact, prior to 1997, the Huskies had never had more than one player with more than 10 home runs in a season on the same team at the same time. This year, **Chad Boudon**, **Mike Wagner** and **Brent Lillibridge** have all hit 10 or more home runs, each for their first time ever. Boudon's 21 homers are a UW school record, two better than Dominic Woody's 1999 record of 19. Wagner's 15 round-trippers rank him in a tie for sixth on the UW single-season chart while Lillibridge's 12 clouts are most ever by a Husky freshman. Boudon and Wagner have more homers than any duo in Husky history. As a team, the Huskies' 93 total home runs lead the Pac-10 easily (over ASU's 77) and are the second-most in UW lore, ranking behind 1998 (110) and just ahead of 1999 (89), 1997 (84) and 2002 (73).

OH, WHAT A RELIEF: A big part of the Huskies' success this year has been the strength of its bullpen. Washington's relief corps has made a total of 115 appearances this year, combining for a 13-4 won-lost record, 23 saves and a 3.64 earned run average. Husky relievers have allowed only 196 hits in 215 and one-third innings, walking 99 and striking out 223. Opponents have batted only .245 against UW relievers. Last year, the Huskies were last in the Pac-10 with only nine saves on the year. This season, they lead the conference with 23, five more than second-place Stanford. Washington has four pitchers that rank in the top 10 in the conference in saves: **Will Fenton** (1st with 10), **Brian Carter** (6th with 5), **Scott Robertson** (9th with 3) and **Trent Baysinger** (also 9th with 3). Fenton has posted nearly impossible numbers in 2003, as he didn't allow a single run in his 30 innings of work, while giving up only 14 hits and fanning 48. Baysinger made 21 relief appearances, posting a 2.14 ERA and a 4-1 record. Carter allowed only 28 hits in 32 relief innings while **David Dowling** threw 49.2 relief frames, fanning 53 and compiling a 6-2 record.

RANDOM NCAA NOTES: In its five modern trips to the NCAA regionals, the Huskies have yet to fail to win at least two games, despite being a No. 6 seed in 1992, No. 5 in 1994, No. 4 in 1997, No. 3 in 1998 and No. 3 again last season ... Washington has made it to the championship game of a regional three times, losing to Nomar Garciaparra-led Georgia Tech (after forcing a second championship game with a 14-inning win) at Wichita State in 1994; to Mississippi State in Starkville (4-3 in front of a then-NCAA postseason record crowd of 10,688) in 1997; and to Rice last season after forcing a second title game with a two-out, three-run homer in the ninth in a 7-6 win ... in their five trips to regionals in the last 12 years, the Huskies have gone 3-2 in opening games, winning three times in games in which they were the lower seed ... the Huskies are the only team from the Pacific Northwest to make it into NCAA postseason play since 1991, when the University of Portland won the old Pac-10 North tournament and made it to a regional ... during that 12-season span (1992-2003), the Huskies have played in six NCAA tournaments while Oregon State, Washington State, Portland State (now a defunct program), Gonzaga and Portland (the other Division I teams in the Northwest) have not been to any ... only four of Washington's players come from outside the state of Washington (and only one member of the NCAA travel squad): LHP **Trent Baysinger** (Moscow, Idaho), P/OF **Grant Gerrard** (Castle Rock, Colo.), IF **Matt Tucker** (Aurora, Colo.) and OF **Devin Warner** (Fort Collins, Colo.) ... Baysinger, the only non-Washingtonian on the travel roster, grew up about a mile and a half from the Washington border in Moscow ... Tucker and Warner sat out their first season at UW with injuries and Gerrard, a true freshman, had only five at bats ... UW's 11-game winning streak earlier this tied for the longest in school history and was the longest ever against Division-I-only competition ... the Huskies' team ERA of 4.35 is the best the UW has had since a 3.89 mark in 1994.

WASHINGTON'S NCAA REGIONAL HISTORY

In the last decade or so, the Huskies have become a dangerous team when it comes to NCAA play. In five appearances over the last 11 seasons, the Huskies have finished third twice and second three times despite being a sixth, fifth, fourth seed once each and twice a third seed. Prior to the '90's, the Huskies had made only one NCAA appearance. Here's a recap of each of the Huskies' trips to the NCAA postseason:

1959

In 1959, the Huskies advanced to the NCAA District 8 championship against Fresno State in a round-about fashion. Washington lost a best-of-three series for the Pacific Coast Conference title to USC, but the Trojans were ineligible for NCAA play that season and Washington got in.

The Huskies and Bulldogs fought for the berth to the College World Series with a three-game set at Seattle's historic Sick's Stadium (since torn down, Sick's Stadium was the home of the Pacific Coast League's Seattle Rainiers as well as the Seattle Pilots). In game one, FSU pinch hitter Jim Gregory got a hit off of UW reliever Bob Johnson with no outs in the bottom of the ninth to drive in the winning run in the 3-2 FSU win. The following afternoon, Earle Irvine, who was borrowed from the basketball team to play that day, pitched the Huskies to a 5-4 victory over the Bulldogs. Centerfielder Jerry Thornton had three hits as the Huskies held off a late FSU challenge. In the second game of the afternoon, the Bulldogs' bats came to life as they scored 10 runs off of five UW pitchers.

1992

Washington would have to wait 33 years to make its next NCAA appearance. This time, Washington was the sixth seed in the six-team 1992 West I Regional field at Tucson, Arizona. In its first game, Washington upset the host and top seed, beating Arizona 6-5. Starter Chris Berg threw 7.2 innings, allowing only four hits and one run. The Wildcats, led by John Tejcek's two homers, scored four in the bottom of the ninth, but UW's Eric Schmidt came in to close the door on the Wildcats.

Game two matched the Huskies with old foe Fresno State and the Huskies came up with a miraculous finish to tie the series. Trailing 3-2 in the bottom of the ninth, UW got a break when the FSU shortstop made a bad throw to first on a grounder by Derrin Doty. Steve Murphy singled Doty to second and Jeff Weible sent him home with another single. The winning run came when Murphy scored when the FSU pitcher overthrew third base on a bunt by Ryan Rutz. Jim Riley went the distance for his school-record-tying 10th win.

Only two wins away from the College World Series, the Huskies' string ran out with an 11-0 loss to eventual national champion Pepperdine. That was followed by a 9-3 defeat at the hands of Hawaii, a game in which Washington trailed only 4-3 in the eighth inning.

1994

Washington posted another thrilling postseason in 1994 when the Huskies earned an at-large berth to the Midwest II Regional in Wichita. The fifth-seeded Dawgs beat second-seeded Long Beach State in the opener, 10-4. Washington was down 3-0 going into the fourth, but posted six runs in that inning, including three on a home run by Ross Junkin. The following day, Washington was trailing Santa Clara, 7-2, before scoring nine runs in the last three innings, including five in the ninth. Brett Merrick kept the UW in the game, getting out of a bases-loaded, no-outs jam in the bottom of the eighth before the five-run ninth that was capped by Greg Mecca's three-run homer.

In the winners' bracket semi-final against top seed Georgia Tech, the Huskies' bats fell quiet in a 6-2 loss. Tech All-American Nomar Garciaparra accounted for five RBI with a double and a home run. Washington trailed once again in the evening game that would decide who would face the Yellow Jackets on championship Monday. After falling behind 2-0, the Huskies scored five in the fifth, including three on a homer by Sean Linville, and came out with a 6-2 win.

In game one, Brian Loucks' three-run homer,

his first HR of the season, in the bottom of the 14th inning gave Washington a 12-9 win and forced another game. Freshman Justin Bice, who had thrown only 12 innings all season, allowed only one hit in 4.2 innings for a win. Washington had trailed 4-0 after a half inning in that game and took an 8-4 lead into the eighth. In game two, the Huskies ran out of gas and lost 18-7 despite grinding out 19 hits. Washington fell behind 6-0 in the first and never got closer than five runs. UW right fielder Jon Vander Griend topped a tremendous tournament by hitting for the cycle in the final game of 1994.

1997

The 1997 Mideast Regional was another successful trip for the Huskies as they had two shots to win one game and go to the College World Series, but fell twice to host Mississippi State in front of huge crowds. Jake Kringen won game one for the Dawgs, outlasting SW Louisiana ace Trey Poland for a 5-4 win. In the second game, Washington, playing as the home team, sent 8,364 Mississippi State fans home in shock, scoring four runs in the bottom of the ninth to win, 5-4. Kevin Miller's bases-loaded single tied it and Ryan Soules' double sent home Kyle Woods for the win. Freshman Jeff Heaverlo allowed four in the first, but went the distance for the win.

The Huskies beat top-seeded Georgia Tech in game three, 8-4, with Ryan Lentz and Soules each providing three hits. The win sent the Huskies to the championship round, and Mississippi State needed two wins to make it to Omaha. In the first game, the Huskies gave up seven runs in the second to fall behind. Despite four hits (including two doubles) from Chris Magruder, the UW fell short, 7-5. Rain postponed the final game until the next day when Kringen, the UW ace, faced MSU ace Eric DuBose in front of 10,688 fans. MSU broke a 2-2 tie in the bottom of the eighth and DuBose went the distance for the win. Magruder, who batted .619 for the five games, was a unanimous selection to the all-tournament team, but DuBose was the regional's MVP.

1998

In 1998, the Huskies were seeded No. 3 at the Central Regional at Texas A&M. Game one matched the Dawgs against a familiar foe in Mississippi State, and the Bulldogs handed the Huskies a 7-6 loss despite the Huskies scoring four runs over the last two innings to close the game. In the next game, the Huskies got seven RBI from Nick Stefonick and were hit by 10 pitches (an NCAA record) as they rolled over No. 1 seed Rice, 20-11. The Owls took a 6-0 lead in the

first, but the UW tallied six in the fourth and five in the fifth.

The UW against staved off elimination with a 13-6 win over Oral Roberts as Ed Erickson doubled twice and homered. Ryan Lentz belted his 16th of the season to tie the school record. The Huskies then faced host Texas A&M, with the winner meeting MSU for the regional title. UW's Jeff Heaverlo and TAMU's Casey Fossum, both pitching on two day's rest, battled early until the Huskies scored two in the fourth. A&M tied the score at 2-2, and it was tied at 4-4 before two Aggie runs in the seventh accounted for the winning total and sent the UW home.

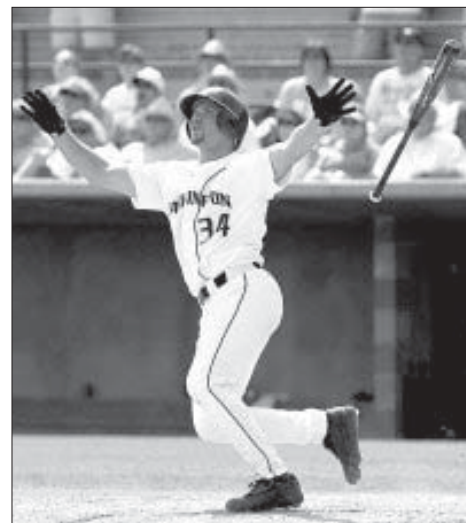
2002

After a slow start to the season, the Huskies turned things around in the second half to earn their first berth to the NCAA tournament since the Pac-10 merged its two divisions into one conference following the 1998 season. The UW travelled to Houston, Texas, seeded third the

four-team regional (the NCAA changed the regional format prior to the 2000 postseason when the field was expanded to 64 teams).

Washington opened against second-seeded Texas Tech. After falling behind 4-2, the Huskies tied the score at 4-4 on Tyler Davidson's eighth-inning homer. However, the Red Raiders pulled out a win with two outs in the bottom of the ninth as Jon Slack singled to send home Byron Smith for a 5-4 win. On the second day, the Huskies faced fourth-seed Harvard in an elimination game and beat Crimson ace Ben Crockett, an eventual third-round draft choice. Sean White out-dueled Crockett for a 4-2 win, his sixth straight victory in his first career complete game. Washington scored all of its runs with two outs in the fourth inning as Jay Garthwaite, John Otness, Aaron Hathaway, Greg Issacson and Taylor Johnson strung together five straight hits.

The UW advanced to the championship round with a 3-1 elimination game win over Texas Tech. Davidson's two-run homer in the first and a

strong outing from starter Clay Johnson lifted the Huskies to the victory.

On the last day, Washington needed two wins over top seed Rice to advance to the Super Regionals. Things looked dire in the opener as the Huskies, playing as the home team, came down to their last strike in the bottom of the ninth, trailing 6-4 with two outs, none on and an 0-2 count. Freshman Kyle Larsen worked the count full and singled before Otness was hit with a 1-2 pitch. Garthwaite took three balls, then a strike and then connected on a towering homer to left field, sending Husky players and fans into a frenzy as the Dawgs forced a second title game for all the marbles. Washington, however, once again fell short in its pitching depth as the Owls took a 14-2 win to take the regional title.

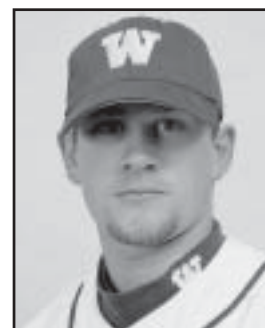

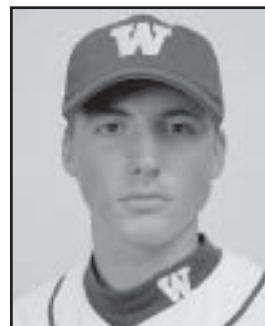
