No. 14 Washington To Face Tulane at NCAA Oxford Regional at Ole Miss

COMING UP: The 14th-ranked Washington baseball team (37-18-1 overall, 15-9 (second) in the Pac-10) heads to the NCAA tournament for the eighth time ever and the seventh time in the last 13 seasons this weekend. The Huskies will play in the Oxford Regional at Swayze Field in Oxford, Miss. Friday, June 4, at 1 p.m. PDT, the second-seeded Huskies take on third-seeded Tulane (38-19, 21-9 Conference USA) in their opening game. Regional host and top-seeded Mississippi (39-19, 18-12 SEC), ranked No. 15 by Baseball America, hosts fourth-seeded Western Kentucky (34-26, 12-12 Sun Belt Conference) in the other first-round game, which is slated for Friday at 5 p.m. PDT. All of Washington's postseason games will air live on KKNW AM-1150. The winner of the double-elimination regional will play the winner of a regional at Fullerton, Calif. (participants: Cal State Fullerton, Arizona State, Minnesota, Pepperdine) in a best-of-three Super Regional the following weekend (June 11-13), with the winner of that advancing to the College World Series in Omaha, Neb. The Huskies enter the regional as the highest ranked (by Baseball America) of the four teams at the Oxford Regional. The Dawgs are No. 14 in the Baseball America Top 25, No. 11 in the Collegiate Baseball poll and No. 21 in the latest Sports Weekly/ESPN coaches' poll. Mississippi is ranked No. 15 (BA), No. 14 (CB) and No. 13 (coaches) while Tulane is ranked No. 29 by Collegiate Baseball and No. 21 by the coaches. Western Kentucky is unranked in all three major polls. COACH "K" : Now in his 12th season in charge of the Washington baseball team, **Ken Knutson** has compiled an impressive list of accomplishments. Knutson has led the Dawgs to two Pac-10 championships, four Pac-10 Northern Division titles, three other second-place finishes and six NCAA Regional berths. His career overall record now stands at 426-271-2 (.611). With 426 wins, he is the winningest coach in UW history, having passed his former coach, Bob MacDonald (422-322-7). Before becoming the Husky head man in 1993, Knutson served as the Husky pitching coach for eight seasons. In 1985, his UW pitching staff led the nation with a 2.80 ERA. Knutson holds a 210-90-2 (.699) record in home games. He is 182-124 (.595) in Pac-10 games. Knutson has coached 40 first-team All-Pac-10 selections in 11 seasons, and has been named league coach of the year three times. A 1981 All-Pac-10 left-handed pitcher at the UW, he is joined by assistants **Joe Ross**, **Travis Jewett**, and **Gregg Swenson** and undergrad assistant **Scott Robertson**.

WASHINGTON BASEBALL

POSTSEASON GUIDE

NCAA POSTSEASON HISTORY: See pages 7-15 of this guide for a complete rundown of Washington's history in the NCAA, complete with all box scores and individual postseason records.

HISTORY vs. NCAA REGIONAL OPPONENTS: Washington has played Tulane three times (all three at the Riverside Baseball Invitational Tournament in Riverside, Calif., in 1982, 1986 and 1987 ... all were Tulane victories), but the Huskies have never played a game against either Mississippi or Western Kentucky during the 104-year history of Washington baseball. Here's a look at the Huskies' brief history against the Green Wave:

UW vs. TULANE: Washington and Tulane have played one another three times, with all three meetings coming at regular-tournament in Riverside, Calif., during the 1980s. Tulane is 3-0 all-time against the Huskies. In 1982, the Green Wave scored twice in the final inning of a seven-inning game to beat the Huskies, 2-1. Marc Desjardins threw a four-hitter for the win while Sam Manley went the distance in the loss. In 1986, Tulane met the UW again at the RBI, beating the Huskies 5-3. No further information on that game is available. In the 1987 RBI Tournament, the Green Wave beat the Huskies, 6-2. Tulane (17-4 on the year after that win), used three walks and two UW errors to score four runs in the fifth. Tulane first baseman Brian Reaney, who had three hits in the game, had a two-run double during the fifth and Tookie Spann hit his ninth homer of the year. Glen Leaveau got the win for the Green Wave. Brent Shimokawa was 2-for-5 with a triple for the UW and Pete Tjaarda threw a complete game in the loss.

UW vs. MISSISSIPPI: Washington and Ole Miss have never played one another.

UW vs. WESTERN KENTUCKY: Washington and Western Kentucky have never played one another.

HUSKIES EAST OF THE MISSISSIPPI: Washington has only traveled east of the Mississippi River three times in its history, but with a pretty fair amount of success. The Huskies made their first trip east for the 1997 NCAA Mid-east Regional at Starkville, Miss. The Huskies started out 3-0 in the regional, but host Mississippi State came back to win the final two games and advance to the College World Series. In 1998, the UW opened the season with its longest ever road trip, trekking to Viera, Fla., for a three-game tournament at the Florida Marlins' spring training site. The Dawgs won all three on that trip, beating Florida Atlantic (18-4), Central Florida (8-4) and South Florida (15-3). April 16-18 of this season, Washington played Georgia Tech in a three-game series in Atlanta. After falling in the opener, 8-4, the UW beat the Yellowjackets 7-3 and 16-2 to win the series. Tech, incidentally, went on a 20-game win streak after the Huskies left town. So, the UW is 8-3 all-time in games played east of the Mississippi River.

HUSKIES vs. THE CONFERENCES: Washington has had very little interaction with teams from the conferences of the other three teams in the NCAA Oxford Regional. Washington has faced only three of the 12 baseball-playing teams in Conference USA: Tulane (0-3), Houston (1-0), South Florida (1-0), for a combined 2-3 all-time record vs. CUSA teams. The Huskies have played only two of nine current Sun Belt Conference teams: 1-0 vs. Louisiana-Lafayette (at the 1997 regional) and 1-1 vs. New Mexico State, for a total of 2-1 all-time vs. Sun Belt teams. Finally, the UW has played three of the 12 members of the Southeastern Conference. The Dawgs are 1-0 vs. Kentucky, 1-1 vs. Tennessee and 1-4 vs. Mississippi State. All five games vs. MSU came in NCAA regional play (1997 at Starkville and 1998 at Texas A&M).

AGAINST THE NCAA FIELD: The Huskies have played a total of 21 games against teams that made the 64-team NCAA tournament field. The Huskies played three-game series against four Pac-10 teams that made it: Arizona, Arizona State, Stanford and UCLA. The Dawgs also played three-game sets vs. Missouri, Georgia Tech and UC Irvine. Washington swept both Arizona and UC Irvine (both series in Seattle); took two of three from Stanford (home), Georgia Tech (away) and Arizona; lost two of three to UCLA (home); and won one, lost one and tied one against Mizzou (home). Washington has played three of the NCAA's eight national seeds – ASU, Stanford and Georgia Tech – and went a combined 6-3 in those games.

POWER SHOW: Blame it on the new ballpark if you must (Husky Ballpark opened in 1998), but the Huskies have three players with double-figure home runs for the sixth time in the last seven years, and for only the sixth time in history. In fact, prior to 1997, the Huskies had never had more than one player with more than 10 home runs in a season on the same team at the same time. This year, **Zach Clem**, **Brent Lillibridge** and **Kyle Wagner** have all hit 10 or more home runs. Lillibridge reached double digits for the second times in his two seasons at Washington, having hit 13 as a freshman in 2003. As a team, the Huskies' 84 total home runs rank only behind Stanford's 89 in the Pac-10 and are tied for fourth-most in UW lore, ranking behind 1998 (110), 2003 (96) and 1999 (89) and tied with 1997 (84). This season, Washington hit at least one home run in 44 of 56 games and never went more than two straight games without a homer.

ON THE BASES: While Washington's 67 stolen bases might not be enough to put the Huskies among the national leaders, it is the second-highest total in the Pac-10 Conference, only two behind Arizona's total of 69. What's perhaps more impressive is that the Huskies have been caught stealing only 22 times (67-for-89) and that the UW has allowed opponents to steal only 26 bases on 53 attempts on the year. Senior second baseman **Greg Isaacson** leads the charge with 22 steals in 25 attempts. Sophomore center fielder **Brent Lillibridge** is 17-for-19 and had a streak of 16 straight successful steals broke May 23 vs. UCLA. Additionally, junior right fielder **Taylor Johnson** is 10-for-13 on the year. Defensively, junior catcher **Aaron Hathaway** has allowed only 19 steals while throwing out 19 and picking off seven others.

COACH K TAKES OVERTOP SPOT: In the Huskies' 7-2 win over UCLA on May 22, Washington head coach **Ken Knutson** became the winningest coach in Husky baseball history. That win was No. 423 in his 12 seasons in charge of his alma mater and moved him ahead of his former coach and mentor, Bob MacDonald, who won 422 games from 1997 to 1992. Knutson spent one season (1981) as a pitcher under MacDonald, helping the Dawgs to the Pac-10 Northern Division title, and then another eight years as an assistant coach before MacDonald moved to the U.S. Naval Academy following the 1992 season.

TOUGH AT THE REGIONALS: Washington will be making its eighth NCAA tournament appearance this year, seven of which have come in the last 13 seasons (1992, 1994, 1997, 1998, 2002, 2003, 2004). With the exception of the 1959 NCAA District 8 Playoffs (UW lost a best-of-three series to Fresno State, 2-1), the Huskies have never finished a regional with a losing record. The Huskies were 2-2 in 1992 at Tucson, 4-2 in 1994 at Wichita, 3-2 in 1997 at Starkville, 2-2 in 1998 at College Station, 3-2 in 2002 at Houston and 2-2 last year at Long Beach. In all, the Dawgs are 17-14 in NCAA tournament games and 16-12 in actual "regionals" (not counting 1959). The Huskies have not, however, ever won a regional, coming one win away on four occasions (1959, 1994, 1997 and 2002).

WHAT DO COACHES KNOW?: For the third straight season, Washington easily exceeded the expectations set forth in the preseason Pac-10 coaches' poll. The last two years, 2002 and 2003, the nine conference coaches chose Washington to finish seventh in the Pac-10. Both years, the Huskies finished third and made it to a regional. This year, the Huskies were tabbed to finish in fifth place, but finished alone in second place and had a chance to win the title up until the next-to-last day of the season, and, obviously, earned another NCAA tournament berth.

AT HOME ON THE ROAD: While the Huskies posted a solid 20-8-1 record in games played at Husky Ballpark this year, they were also no slouch away from their home field. The Dawgs went 16-9 in true away games, plus 1-1 at neutral sites, for a total of 17-10 in non-home games. And, despite the fact that Husky Ballpark is generally considered to be more friendly to the hitters than the pitcher, the Huskies had a better batting average outside of Seattle than they did at home. In 29 home games, the Dawgs hit .290 with 42 home runs. Away from their home field, the Huskies hit .306 with 41 home runs in two fewer games. Washington scored an average of 6.4 runs per game at home and 9.0 on the road.

RANDOM NCAA NOTES: The Huskies' No. 2 seeding at the regional is its highest ever ... last year, the Dawgs were the No. 3 seed in Long Beach ... the UW was No. 6 in 1992, No. 5 in 1994, No. 4 in 1997, No. 3 in 1998, No. 3 in 2002 (four-team regional) and No. 3 again last year ... Washington has made it to the championship game of a regional three times (not counting 1959), losing to Nomar Garciaparra-led Georgia Tech (after forcing a second championship game with a 14-inning win) at Wichita State in 1994; to Mississippi State in Starkville (4-3 in front of a then-NCAA postseason record crowd of 10,688) in 1997; and to Rice in 2002 after forcing a second title game with a two-out, three-run homer in the ninth in a 7-6 win ... in their six trips to regionals in the last 12 years, the Huskies have gone 4-2 in opening games, winning all four times in games in which they were the lower seed ... the Huskies are the only team from the Pacific Northwest to make it into NCAA postseason play since 1991, when the University of Portland won the old Pac-10 North tournament and made it to a regional ... during that 13-season span (1992-2003), the Huskies have played in seven NCAA tournaments while Oregon State, Washington State, Portland State (now a defunct program), Gonzaga and Portland (the other Division I teams in the Northwest) have not been to any ... only four of Washington's players come from outside the state of Washington (and only two members of the NCAA travel squad): LHP **Trent Baysinger** (Moscow, Idaho), OF **Matt Tucker** (Aurora, Colo.), OF **Devin Warner** (Fort Collins, Colo.) and 1B **James Allan** (Gresham, Ore.) ... Baysinger, one of two non-Washingtonian on the travel roster, grew up about a mile and a half from the Washington border in Moscow ... Tucker's older brother, Michael Done, was the UW's starting third baseman from 2000 to 2002 and his father, Dave, played at the UW with Coach Knutson ... Washington enters the postseason having won 10 of its last 13 and 18 of its last 23 games since breaking a four-game losing streak with two straight wins at Georgia Tech ... incidentally, after the Huskies took that Tech series in Atlanta, the Yellowjackets ran off 20 consecutive wins ... Washington scored in double figures in 15 games this year while allowing double digits to opponents only eight times (two of those were UW wins) ... Washington reached 20 or more runs on three occasions (March 20 at Washington State, 20-8; May 1 at Oregon State, 26-14; May 11 vs. Portland, 20-4) ... the Huskies had a 14-run first inning in that Washington State game and a 13-run ninth inning in that win over Oregon State ... Washington scored in the first inning in exactly half of its games this year — 28 of 56 — and scored more runs in the first (65) than in any other inning ... the UW has four pitchers that have pitched in NCAA regional games — **David Dowling**, **Will Fenton**, **Matt Kasser**, and **Trent Baysinger** ... none of those four has allowed an earned run over a combined total of 17 and one-third innings ... every game the Huskies play this postseason will be their latest ever in a calendar year ... in 2002 at the Houston Regional at Rice, the Huskies played two games on June 2, their latest games ever up to this point ... Washington is the only team in the Pac-10 that has a winning record against every other conference opponent over the last three years (2002-04) ... the Huskies' current ranking of No. 11 in the Collegiate Baseball poll is its highest-ever ranking in any of the three major polls ... freshmen pitchers have started 37 of 56 games this year for the UW.

WASHINGTON'S NCAA REGIONAL HISTORY

In the last decade or so, the Huskies have become a dangerous team when it comes to NCAA play. In six appearances over the last 12 seasons, the Huskies have finished third twice and second four times despite being a sixth, fifth, fourth seed once each and three times a third seed. Prior to the '90's, the Huskies had made only one NCAA appearance. Here's a recap of each of the Huskies' trips to the NCAA postseason:

1959

In 1959, the Huskies advanced to the NCAA District 8 championship against Fresno State in a round-about fashion. Washington lost a best-of-three series for the Pacific Coast Conference title to USC, but the Trojans were ineligible for NCAA play that season and Washington got in.

The Huskies and Bulldogs fought for the berth to the College World Series with a three-game set at Seattle's historic Sick's Stadium (since torn down, Sick's Stadium was the home of the Pacific Coast League's Seattle Rainiers as well as the Seattle Pilots). In game one, FSU pinch hitter Jim Gregory got a hit off of UW reliever Bob Johnson with no outs in the bottom of the ninth to drive in the winning run in the 3-2 FSU win. The following afternoon, Earle Irvine, who was borrowed from the basketball team to play that day, pitched the Huskies to a 5-4 victory over the Bulldogs. Centerfielder Jerry Thornton had three hits as the Huskies held off a late FSU challenge. In the second game of the afternoon, the Bulldogs' bats came to life as they scored 10 runs off of five UW pitchers.

1992

Washington would have to wait 33 years to make its next NCAA appearance. This time, Washington was the sixth seed in the six-team 1992 West I Regional field at Tucson, Arizona. In its first game, Washington

upset the host and top seed, beating Arizona 6-5. Starter Chris Berg threw 7.2 innings, allowing only four hits and one run. The Wildcats, led by John Tejcck's two homers, scored four in the bottom of the ninth, but UW's Eric Schmidt came in to close the door on the Wildcats.

Game two matched the Huskies with old foe Fresno State and the Huskies came up with a miraculous finish to tie the series. Trailing 3-2 in the bottom of the ninth, UW got a break when the FSU shortstop made a bad throw to first on a grounder by Derrin Doty. Steve Murphy singled Doty to second and Jeff Weible sent him home with another single. The winning run came when Murphy scored when the FSU pitcher overthrew third base on a bunt by Ryan Rutz. Jim Riley went the distance for his school-record-tying 10th win.

Only two wins away from the College World Series, the Huskies' string ran out with an 11-0 loss to eventual national champion Pepperdine. That was followed by a 9-3 defeat at the hands of Hawaii, a game in which Washington trailed only 4-3 in the eighth inning.

1994

Washington posted another thrilling postseason in 1994 when the Huskies earned an at-large berth to the Midwest II Regional in Wichita. The fifth-seeded Dawgs beat second-seeded Long Beach State in the opener, 10-4. Washington was down 3-0 going into the fourth, but posted six runs in that inning, including three on a home run by Ross Junkin. The following day, Washington was trailing Santa Clara, 7-2, before scoring nine runs in the last three innings, including five in the ninth. Brett Merrick kept the UW in the game, getting out of a bases-loaded, no-outs jam in the bottom of the eighth before the five-run ninth that was capped by Greg Mecca's three-run homer.

In the winners' bracket semi-final against top seed Georgia Tech, the Huskies' bats fell quiet in a 6-2 loss. Tech All-American Nomar Garciaparra accounted for five RBI with a double and a home run. Washington trailed once again in the evening game that would decide who would face the Yellow Jackets on championship Monday. After falling behind 2-0, the Huskies scored five in the fifth, including three on a homer by Sean Linville, and came out with a 6-2 win.

In game one, Brian Loucks' three-run homer, his first HR of the season, in the bottom of the 14th inning gave Washington a 12-9 win and forced another game. Freshman Justin Bice, who had thrown only 12 innings all season, allowed only one hit in 4.2 innings for a win. Washington had trailed 4-0 after a half inning in that game and took an 8-4 lead into the eighth. In game two, the Huskies ran out of gas and lost 18-7 despite grinding out 19 hits. Washington fell behind 6-0 in the first and never got closer than five runs. UW right fielder Jon Vander Griend topped a tremendous tournament by hitting for the cycle in the final game of 1994.

1997

The 1997 Mideast Regional was another successful trip for the Huskies as they had two shots to win one

game and go to the College World Series, but fell twice to host Mississippi State in front of huge crowds. Jake Kringen won game one for the Dawgs, outlasting SW Louisiana ace Trey Poland for a 5-4 win. In the second game, Washington, playing as the home team, sent 8,364 Mississippi State fans home in shock, scoring four runs in the bottom of the ninth to win, 5-4. Kevin Miller's bases-loaded single tied it and Ryan Soules' double sent home Kyle Woods for the win. Freshman Jeff Heaverlo allowed four in the first, but went the distance for the win.

The Huskies beat top-seeded Georgia Tech in game three, 8-4, with Ryan Lentz and Soules each providing three hits. The win sent the Huskies to the championship round, and Mississippi State needed two wins to make it to Omaha. In the first game, the Huskies gave up seven runs in the second to fall behind. Despite four hits (including two doubles) from Chris Magruder, the UW fell short, 7-5. Rain postponed the final game until the next day when Kringen, the UW ace, faced MSU ace Eric DuBose in front of 10,688 fans. MSU broke a 2-2 tie in the bottom of the eighth and DuBose went the distance for the win. Magruder, who batted .619 for the five games, was a unanimous selection to the all-tournament team, but DuBose was the regional's MVP.

1998

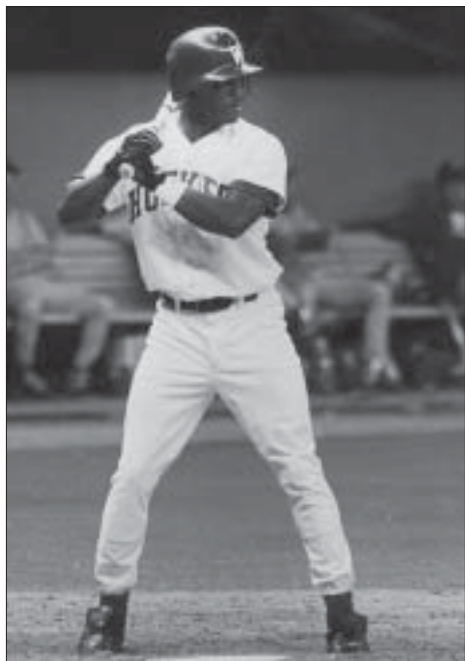
In 1998, the Huskies were seeded No. 3 at the Central Regional at Texas A&M. Game one matched the Dawgs against a familiar foe in Mississippi State, and the Bulldogs handed the Huskies a 7-6 loss despite the Huskies scoring four runs over the last two innings to close the game. In the next game, the Huskies got seven RBI from Nick Stefonick and were hit by 10 pitches (an NCAA record) as they rolled over No. 1 seed Rice, 20-11. The Owls took a 6-0 lead in the first, but the UW tallied six in the fourth and five in the fifth.

The UW against staved off elimination with a 13-6 win over Oral Roberts as Ed Erickson doubled twice and homered. Ryan Lentz belted his 16th of the season to tie the school record. The Huskies then faced host Texas A&M, with the winner meeting MSU for the regional title. UW's Jeff Heaverlo and TAMU's Casey Fossum, both pitching on two day's rest, battled early until the Huskies scored two in the fourth. A&M tied the score at 2-2, and it was tied at 4-4 before two Aggie runs in the seventh accounted for the winning total and sent the UW home.

2002

After a slow start to the season, the Huskies turned things around in the second half to earn their first berth to the NCAA tournament since the Pac-10 merged its two divisions into one conference following the 1998 season. The UW travelled to Houston, Texas, seeded third the four-team regional (the NCAA changed the regional format prior to the 2000 postseason when the field was expanded to 64 teams).

Washington opened against second-seeded Texas Tech. After falling behind 4-2, the Huskies tied the score at 4-4 on Tyler Davidson's eighth-inning homer. However, the Red Raiders pulled out a win with two outs in the bottom of the ninth as Jon Slack singled to

send home Byron Smith for a 5-4 win. On the second day, the Huskies faced fourth-seed Harvard in an elimination game and beat Crimson ace Ben Crockett, an eventual third-round draft choice. Sean White outdueled Crockett for a 4-2 win, his sixth straight victory in his first career complete game. Washington scored all of its runs with two outs in the fourth inning as Jay Garthwaite, John Otness, Aaron Hathaway, Greg Issacson and Taylor Johnson strung together five straight hits.

The UW advanced to the championship round with a 3-1 elimination game win over Texas Tech. Davidson's two-run homer in the first and a strong outing from starter Clay Johnson lifted the Huskies to the victory.

On the last day, Washington needed two wins over top seed Rice to advance to the Super Regionals. Things looked dire in the opener as the Huskies, playing as the home team, came down to their last strike in the bottom of the ninth, trailing 6-4 with two outs, none on and an 0-2 count. Freshman Kyle Larsen worked the count full and singled before Otness was hit with a 1-2 pitch. Garthwaite took three balls, then a strike and then connected on a towering homer to left field, sending Husky players and fans into a frenzy as the

Dawgs forced a second title game for all the marbles. Washington, however, once again fell short in its pitching depth as the Owls took a 14-2 win to take the regional title.

2003

The Huskies appeared in their second straight regional in 2003, but their task would be difficult as the hard-slugging UW would likely have to beat pitching-heavy host Long Beach State at Blair Field, one of the West Coast's least hitter-friendly parks, to emerge.

That seemed to be the case as the UW offense struggled to score runs while going 2-2 to secure a second-place finish in the regional.

The Huskies, seeded third, opened vs. Big Ten champion Minnesota and came out with a 5-3 win. After surrendering a 3-1 lead in the seventh, the Dawgs got a run-scoring, two-out single from senior Tila Reynolds to break a 3-3 tie in the eighth. Washington never trailed in the game, taking a 1-0 lead in the first and scoring two in the fourth to break a 1-1 tie. Brian Carter, who got the third out in the seventh with the bases loaded and two runs already in, picked up the win. Closer Will Fenton earned his 11th save.

In game two, UW squared off with Long Beach and All-American Jered Weaver, who held the UW to only five hits in a 7-2 win. Husky starter Jeff Petersen (6-6) had held the 49ers to only two runs on three hits before allowing the tie-breaking run in the seventh and the first three LBSU runs of the eighth. Both UW runs came in on a Brent Lillibridge homer in the third.

The Huskies then beat Minnesota, 4-1, to advance to the finals. David Dowling allowed only one unearned run on six hits over six and two-thirds innings in his first start of the season. He only got word that he'd start the game about 40 minutes before gametime. The UW scored all the runs it would need in the third. Greg Isaacson singled and scored on a hit-and-run double to the gap from Aaron Hathaway. After a lineout, Chad Boudon added to his UW single-season record with his 22nd homer of the year, giving his team a 3-0 lead.

LBSU needed only one game to win the regional as the 49ers beat the UW 7-2 once again. Freshman lefty Cesar Ramos threw seven shutout innings and Todd Jennings went 3-for-4 with three RBI to lead the home team to the regional title.
