2005 SEASON REVIEW

NOTING THE 2005 HUSKIES . . .

RECORD BREAKERS: Several major UW career records fell during the 2005 season as several veteran Huskies put their mark on the record book. Senior Kyle Larsen, who started at first base for four years, left the UW having set three Husky records. His 225 career games, 845 career at bats and 169 runs batted in all topped Washington career lists. He also finished his Husky tenure second in hits (260), third in home runs (32), fourth in walks (111), fifth in doubles (44) and ninth in runs (153). Junior Brent Lillibridge needed only three seasons to break the Husky record for career doubles, as he finished with 51. Lillibridge also left the UW ranked No. 9 in career batting average (.342), sixth in runs (163), seventh in hits (219) and third in homers (32). Additionally, junior Zach Clem, who already held the Husky record for most times hit by a pitch in a season, broke the UW career HBP mark, completing the 2005 with 309. Finally, sophomore pitcher Tim Lincecum, who completed his second season only 11 strikeouts short of the career standard, broke the Husky career walks record with 153.

TWO FOR THE PAC: Two Huskies made the All-Pac-10 team at the conclusion of the 2005 season. Sophomore pitcher Tim Lincecum, who was the league's freshman and pitcher of the year in 2004, made the team for a second straight season while junior shortstop Brent Lillibridge was selected for the third time in three seasons. Six Huskies earned honorable mention: junior outfielder Zach Clem, senior pitcher Josh Conover,

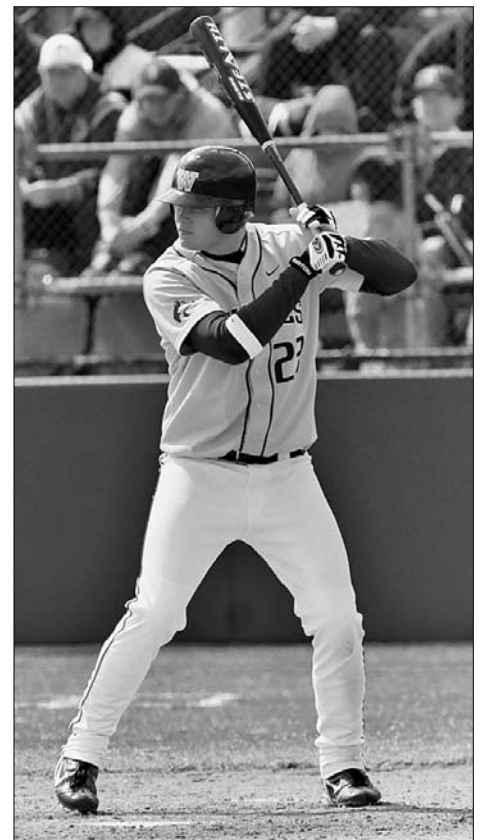
Taylor Johnson saved his best year for last. As a senior in 2005, he batted .307 with a team-high 14 stolen bases and eight homers, tied for the team high.

senior pitcher David Dowling, freshman outfielder Matt Hague, senior outfielder Taylor Johnson and freshman pitcher Brandon McKerney. Additionally, Hague earned second-team Freshman All-America honors from Baseball America.

DRAFTTEES: For the second straight season, five members of the Husky baseball team were selected in the Major League draft following the season. The Huskies' five draftees were: shortstop Brent Lillibridge (Pirates, 4th round), pitcher Keaton Everitt (Yankees, 17th round), pitcher Josh Conover (Padres, 23rd round), outfielder Taylor Johnson (Reds, 25th round) and pitcher Tim Lincecum (Indians, 42nd round). Of those five, only Johnson and Lincecum had previously been drafted. Conover elected not to sign despite having completed his college eligibility while Lincecum turned down contract offers to return to the UW for his junior year. Additionally, Husky senior first baseman Kyle Larsen signed a free agent contract with the New York Yankees while pitcher David Dowling and infielder Nick Batkoski both went on to play in the independent Frontier League.

SUMMER EXPLOITS: Several Huskies posted notable performances during the summer season, both individually and in helping their teams to

various championships. Tim Lincecum, who spent the summer playing for the Harwich (Mass.) Mariners, was a Cape Cod League All-Star and a Summer All-American after leading the prestigious Cape league with a 0.69 earned run average. Lincecum went 2-2 with seven saves and allowed only 14 hits while striking out 68 in 39.1 innings. Opponents batted only .104 off of him. Also on the East Coast, two Huskies – outfielders Nick Burnham and Zach Clem – helped the Newport (R.I.) Gulls to the New England Collegiate Baseball League championship. Clem hit two homers and drove in seven runs during the Gulls six playoff games. Closer to home, catcher Joey Dunn helped the Wenatchee Apple Sox to the West Coast Collegiate Baseball League championship while Matt Hague, Andy Lentz and Brandon McKerney all helped the Aloha (Ore.) Knights to a fourth-place (tied) finish at the National Baseball Congress World Series. Curt Rindal, playing with the Southern California Fire, finished third at the World Series while D.J. Neyens and the Seattle Studs tied for fourth. Finally, Matt Kasser and Matt Lane both played for the Fairbanks Goldpanners team that won the Alaskan League and advanced to the Series.

Note on the conferences: Since the 1915-16 academic year, the University of Washington has been a member of what is now called the Pacific-10 Conference. The Husky baseball team has participated in one form or another of this conference since that time, excluding the 1917, 1918, 1924 and 1944 seasons. In 1916, the conference was known as the Pacific Coast Conference, which included California, Washington, Oregon and Oregon State. Other schools joined in the league's infancy: Washington State (1917), Stanford (1918), USC and Idaho (1922), Montana (1924) and UCLA (1928). Montana dropped out in 1950 and the conference maintained its original name until 1958, when it was dissolved and renamed the Athletic Association of Western Universities, consisting of UW, USC, UCLA, Cal and Stanford. WSU rejoined in 1962 and Oregon and OSU came back in 1964, when the league was renamed the Pacific-8 Conference. Arizona and Arizona State joined in 1978 to make it the Pacific-10.

With regard to baseball, the Huskies competed in the PCC until 1923, when it was split into North and South divisions. This format held (with five teams in the North most years) until 1967, when the Pac-8 began play as a whole, a format that lasted only three seasons. From 1970 until 1981, the Northern Division was made up of only four teams. In 1982, a new configuration was formed with a six-team Southern Division (Arizona, ASU, Cal, Stanford, UCLA, USC) and a seven-team Northern Division (UW, OSU, WSU, Eastern Washington, Gonzaga, Portland and Portland State). The inclusion of the four non-traditional teams was necessitated when Oregon dropped its program after the 1981 season. Eastern Washington dropped its program after the 1990 season and Portland and Gonzaga went to the West Coast Conference following 1995.

After the 1998 season, Portland State dropped baseball and in 1999, the conference competed as a whole without divisions for the first time since 1969.

WASHINGTON'S NCAA HISTORY

In the last decade or so, the Huskies have become a dangerous team when it comes to NCAA play. In six appearances over the last 12 seasons, the Huskies have finished third twice and second four times despite being a sixth, fifth, fourth seed once each and three times a third seed. Prior to the '90's, the Huskies had made only one NCAA appearance. Here's a recap of each of the Huskies' trips to the NCAA postseason:

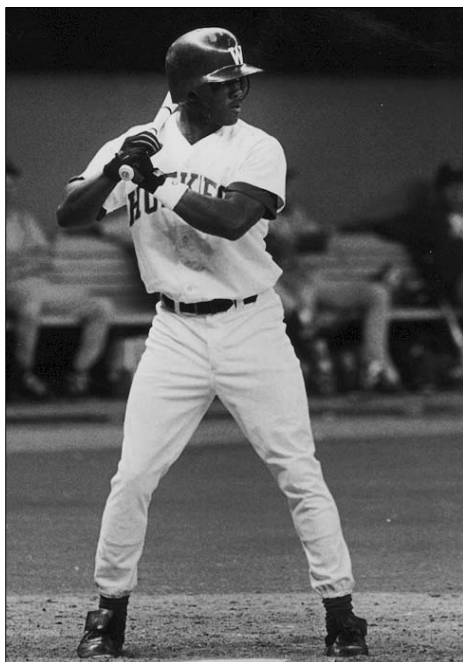
1959

In 1959, the Huskies advanced to the NCAA District 8 championship against Fresno State in a round-about fashion. Washington lost a best-of-three series for the Pacific Coast Conference title to USC, but the Trojans were ineligible for NCAA play that season and Washington got in.

The Huskies and Bulldogs fought for the berth to the College World Series with a three-game set at Seattle's historic Sick's Stadium (since torn down, Sick's Stadium was the home of the Pacific Coast League's Seattle Rainiers as well as the Seattle Pilots). In game one, FSU pinch hitter Jim Gregory got a hit off of UW reliever Bob Johnson with no outs in the bottom of the ninth to drive in the winning run in the 3-2 FSU win. The following afternoon, Earle Irvine, who was borrowed from the basketball team to play that day, pitched the Huskies to a 5-4 victory over the Bulldogs. Centerfielder Jerry Thornton had three hits as the Huskies held off a late FSU challenge. In the second game of the afternoon, the Bulldogs' bats came to life as they scored 10 runs off of five UW pitchers.

1992

Washington would have to wait 33 years to make its next NCAA appearance. This time, Washington was the sixth seed in the six-team 1992 West I Regional field at Tucson, Arizona. In its first game, Washington upset the host and top seed, beating Arizona 6-5. Starter Chris Berg threw 7.2 innings, allowing only four hits and one run. The Wildcats, led by John Tejcek's two homers, scored four in the bottom of the ninth, but UW's Eric Schmidt came in to close the door

on the Wildcats.

Game two matched the Huskies with old foe Fresno State and the Huskies came up with a miraculous finish to tie the series. Trailing 3-2 in the bottom of the ninth, UW got a break when the FSU shortstop made a bad throw to first on a grounder by Derrin Doty. Steve Murphy singled Doty to second and Jeff Weible sent him home with another single. The winning run came when Murphy scored when the FSU pitcher overthrew third base on a bunt by Ryan Rutz. Jim Riley went the distance for his school-record-tying 10th win.

Only two wins away from the College World Series, the Huskies' string ran out with an 11-0 loss to eventual national champion Pepperdine. That was followed by a 9-3 defeat at the hands of Hawaii, a game in which Washington trailed only 4-3 in the eighth inning.

1994

Washington posted another thrilling postseason in 1994 when the Huskies earned an at-large berth to the Midwest II Regional in Wichita. The fifth-seeded Dawgs beat second-seeded Long Beach State in the opener, 10-4. Washington was down 3-0 going into the fourth, but posted six runs in that inning, including three on a home run by Ross Junkin. The following day, Washington was trailing Santa Clara, 7-2, before scoring nine runs in the last three innings, including five in the ninth. Brett Merrick kept the UW in the game, getting out of a bases-loaded, no-outs jam in the bottom of the eighth before the five-run ninth that was capped by Greg Mecca's three-run homer.

In the winners' bracket semi-final against top seed Georgia Tech, the Huskies' bats fell quiet in a 6-2 loss. Tech All-American Nomar Garciaparra accounted for five RBI with a double and a home run. Washington trailed once again in the evening game that would decide who would face the Yellow Jackets on championship Monday. After falling behind 2-0, the Huskies scored five in the fifth, including three on a homer by Sean Linville, and came out with a 6-2 win.

In game one, Brian Loucks' three-run homer, his first HR of the season, in the bottom of the 14th inning gave Washington a 12-9 win and forced another game. Freshman Justin Bice, who had thrown only 12 innings all season, allowed only one hit in 4.2 innings for a win. Washington had trailed 4-0 after a half inning in that game and took an 8-4 lead into the eighth. In game two, the Huskies ran out of gas and lost 18-7 despite grinding out 19 hits. Washington fell behind 6-0 in the first and never got closer than five runs. UW right fielder Jon Vander Griend topped a tremendous tournament by hitting for the cycle in the final game of 1994.

1997

The 1997 Mideast Regional was another successful trip for the Huskies as they had two shots to win one game and go to the College World Series, but fell twice to host Mississippi State in front of huge crowds. Jake Kringen won game one for the Dawgs, outlasting SW Louisiana ace Trey Poland for a 5-4 win. In the second game, Washington, playing as the home team, sent 8,364 Mississippi State fans home in shock, scoring four runs in the bottom of the ninth to win, 5-4. Kevin Miller's bases-loaded single tied it and Ryan Soules' double sent home Kyle Woods for the win. Freshman Jeff Heaverlo allowed four in the first, but went the distance for the win.

The Huskies beat top-seeded Georgia Tech in game three, 8-4, with Ryan Lentz and Soules each providing three hits. The win sent the Huskies to the championship round, and Mississippi State needed two wins to make it to Omaha. In

the first game, the Huskies gave up seven runs in the second to fall behind. Despite four hits (including two doubles) from Chris Magruder, the UW fell short, 7-5. Rain postponed the final game until the next day when Kringen, the UW ace, faced MSU ace Eric DuBose in front of 10,688 fans. MSU broke a 2-2 tie in the bottom of the eighth and DuBose went the distance for the win. Magruder, who batted .619 for the five games, was a unanimous selection to the all-tournament team, but DuBose was the regional's MVP.

1998

In 1998, the Huskies were seeded No. 3 at the Central Regional at Texas A&M. Game one matched the Dawgs against a familiar foe in Mississippi State, and the Bulldogs handed the Huskies a 7-6 loss despite the Huskies scoring four runs over the last two innings to close the game. In the next game, the Huskies got seven RBI from Nick Stefanick and were hit by 10 pitches (an NCAA record) as they rolled over No. 1 seed Rice, 20-11. The Owls took a 6-0 lead in the first, but the UW tallied six in the fourth and five in the fifth.

The UW against staved off elimination with a 13-6 win over Oral Roberts as Ed Erickson doubled twice and homered. Ryan Lentz belted his 16th of the season to tie the school record. The Huskies then faced host Texas A&M, with the winner meeting MSU for the regional title. UW's Jeff Heaverlo and TAMU's Casey Fossum, both pitching on two day's rest, battled early until the Huskies scored two in the fourth. A&M tied the score at 2-2, and it was tied at 4-4 before two Aggie runs in the seventh accounted for the winning total and sent the UW home.

2002

After a slow start to the season, the Huskies turned things around in the second half to earn their first berth to the NCAA tournament since the Pac-10 merged its two divisions into one conference following the 1998 season. The UW travelled to Houston, Texas, seeded third the four-team regional (the NCAA changed the regional format prior to the 2000 postseason when the field was expanded to 64 teams).

Washington opened against second-seeded Texas Tech. After falling behind 4-2, the Huskies tied the score at 4-4 on Tyler Davidson's eighth-inning homer. However, the Red Raiders pulled out a win with two outs in the bottom of the ninth as Jon Slack singled to send home Byron Smith for a 5-4 win. On the second day, the Huskies faced fourth-seed Harvard in an elimination game and beat Crimson ace Ben Crockett, an eventual third-round draft choice. Sean White out-duelled Crockett for a 4-2 win, his sixth straight victory in his first career complete game. Washington scored all of its runs with two outs in the fourth inning as Jay Garthwaite, John Otness, Aaron Hathaway, Greg Issacson and Taylor Johnson strung together five straight hits.

The UW advanced to the championship round with a 3-1 elimination game win over Texas Tech. Davidson's two-run homer in the first and a strong outing from starter Clay Johnson lifted the Huskies to the victory.

On the last day, Washington needed two wins over top seed Rice to advance to the Super Regionals. Things looked dire in the opener as the Huskies, playing as the home team, came down to their last strike in the bottom of the ninth, trailing 6-4 with two outs, none on and an 0-2 count. Freshman Kyle Larsen worked the count full and singled before Otness was hit with a 1-2 pitch. Garthwaite took three balls, then a strike and then connected on a towering homer to left field, sending Husky players and fans into a frenzy as the Dawgs

forced a second title game for all the marbles. Washington, however, once again fell short in its pitching depth as the Owls took a 14-2 win to take the regional title.

2003

The Huskies appeared in their second straight regional in 2003, but their task would be difficult as the hard-slugging UW would likely have to beat pitching-heavy host Long Beach State at Blair Field, one of the West Coast's least hitter-friendly parks, to emerge.

That seemed to be the case as the UW offense struggled to score runs while going 2-2 to take second place.

The Huskies, seeded third, opened vs. Big Ten champion Minnesota and came out with a 5-3 win. After surrendering a 3-1 lead in the seventh, the Dawgs got a run-scoring, two-out single from senior Tila Reynolds to break a 3-3 tie in the eighth. Washington never trailed in the game, taking a 1-0 lead in the first and scoring two in the fourth to break a 1-1 tie. Brian Carter, who got the third out in the seventh with the bases loaded and two runs already in, picked up the win. Closer Will Fenton earned his 11th save.

In game two, UW squared off with Long Beach and All-American Jered Weaver, who held the UW to only five hits in a 7-2 win. Husky starter Jeff Petersen (6-6) had held the 49ers to only two runs on three hits before allowing the

tie-breaking run in the seventh and the first three LBSU runs of the eighth. Both UW runs came in on a Brent Lillibridge homer in the third.

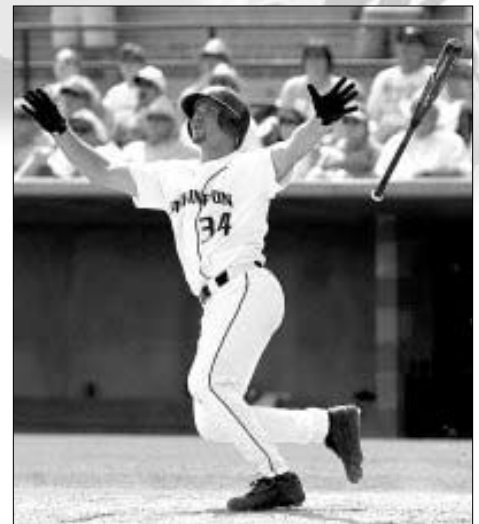
The Huskies then beat Minnesota, 4-1, to advance to the finals. David Dowling allowed only one unearned run on six hits over six and two-thirds innings in his first start of the season. He only got word that he'd start the game about 40 minutes before gametime. The UW scored all the runs it would need in the third. Greg Isaacson singled and scored on a hit-and-run double to the gap from Aaron Hathaway. After a lineout, Chad Boudon added to his UW single-season record with his 22nd homer of the year, giving his team a 3-0 lead.

LBSU needed only one game to win the regional as the 49ers beat the UW 7-2 once again. Freshman Cesar Ramos threw seven shutout innings and Todd Jennings went 3-for-4 with three RBI to lead the home team to the regional title.

2004

Washington traveled to the campus of Ole Miss for the 2004 Oxford Regional and once again made its way into the championship round needing two wins, but as they did in 2003, the Huskies fell in the first game, this time to Tulane.

Washington opened regional play against the Green Wave. Tulane ace Brian Bogusevic out-duelled Husky starter Tim Lincecum to lead his team to a 3-2 win. An RBI single from

Kyle Larsen in the first gave the UW a 1-0 lead, but Lincecum walked two with the bases loaded to give the Green Wave a 2-1 edge. The two teams traded runs in the seventh and the Huskies got two aboard in the ninth, but closer Daniel Latham relieved Bogusevic to record the final out.

Washington won a pair of elimination games the following day, beating host Ole Miss, 7-2, and Western Kentucky, 4-1. In the first of those games, UW freshman Kyle Parker threw the Huskies' only complete game of the season, holding the Rebels to two runs on seven hits. Aaron Hathaway drove in three with a 3-for-5 game. In the second game, Larsen and Hathaway homered while Matt Kasser went seven and two-thirds for the win over the Hilltoppers.

On championship Sunday, the UW got off to a good start when Hathaway belted a three-run homer in the first inning, but the Huskies went scoreless the rest of the way while the Green Wave scored 12 runs off of six Husky pitchers to win, 12-3. Bogusevic, the tournament MVP, was again the star. Starting in right field, he went 2-for-3 with three RBI and made a spectacular catch in the second inning that saved his team three runs and swung the momentum to his team.

HUSKY HALL OF FAMERS

BASEBALL PLAYERS & COACHES IN THE HUSKY HALL OF FAME

The Husky Hall of Fame, with nearly 250 members, was established in 1979 to honor and preserve the memory of those athletes, teams, coaches and members of the athletic department staff who have contributed in an outstanding and positive way to the distinction of the UW athletic program.

CHUCK CARROLL (1928-29)

A member of the National Football Foundation's Hall of Fame (1964), Carroll was a charter member of the Husky Hall. An All-American halfback (1928), Carroll played two seasons of baseball. He led the football teams in scoring in 1927 and 1928, the team was 24-8 during his career and he still ranks ninth in career scoring and fourth in single-season scoring. UW's second consensus All-American, his football uniform number (2) is retired.

WILLIAM "WEE" COYLE (1908-11)

Inducted in 1980, this Husky Hall of Famer played baseball and football while also running track while at Washington. He is probably best known as the quarterback of four undefeated football teams from 1908-11. His Huskies went 26-0-1 during his career, starting a 61-game unbeaten streak, still the longest in NCAA history. Coyle played right field for the baseball team and ran hurdles in track.

J. WILSON GAW (1928-30)

The 1983 inductee was the Huskies' leading hitter from 1928 to 1930, playing first base and outfield while batting cleanup. Gaw led the Huskies to Northern Division titles in 1929 and 1930 and was captain of the 1930 varsity. Tubby Graves named Gaw as his first baseman on the All-Husky team. The Huskies' annual top hitter award is named after Gaw.

DORSETT "TUBBY" GRAVES (1923-46)

Inducted in 1980, Dorsett V. "Tubby" Graves is considered a founding father of Husky athletics. Graves coached the Husky baseball team for 24 seasons while concurrently serving as assistant football coach, assistant basketball coach and trainer. Graves, who compiled 209 wins and seven division championships as the baseball coach, went on to become athletic director at the UW. The athletics administration building is named for him.

BILL HUTCHINSON (1929-31)

A powerful third baseman in his playing days, Dr. William Hutchinson, a 1995 Hall of Fame inductee, made his name after his playing days were over. "Hutch" captained the 1931 Huskies to their third straight Northern Division title and was the third baseman on Tubby Graves' All-Husky team. He went on to medical school, became a surgeon and founded the Northwest Research Foundation and the Fred Hutchinson Cancer Research Center. Hutchinson received the UW's Alumnus Summa Laude Dignatus Award in 1983. The Husky baseball team MVP award is named after him.

ART LANGLIE (1920-26)

This 1984 inductee, who would make his name in politics, was a baseball and tennis player at Washington. He played second base and shortstop for the Huskies from 1924 to 1926 and also won the Pacific Coast Conference doubles title in 1923, when he was team captain. He received his law degree from Washington in 1925 and became a city councilman in 1935. From there, he went on to become mayor of Seattle in 1938 and then served as governor from 1941 to 45 and again from 1949 to 1957.

HAL LEE (1932-34)

A 1987 Hall inductee, Lee was an outstanding baseball and basketball player at Washington. He earned three baseball letters, batting over .400 his senior year and played professionally in the Western International and Texas Leagues. He was also an All-American guard on the Huskies' 1934 basketball team, which won the PCC championship with a 20-5 record.

NED NELSON (1929-32)

A second baseman on three division champion baseball teams, Nelson, inducted in 1989, was also a star basketball player. He was named to the All-America baseball team in 1931 and earned honorable mention in 1932 before playing pro. He helped the basketball team to the PCC title in 1931.

ELMER TESREAU (1923-26)

Better known for football, this 1985 inductee was also undefeated as a Husky pitcher. Tesreau played on two Rose Bowl teams, playing most of the '24 Rose Bowl with a broken leg. Named All-Coast second-team, Tesreau blocked for All-American George Wilson. It's said that in a game against Stanford, Tesreau and legendary back Ernie Nevers both had to be carried from the field after tangling with each other all day and that Tesreau's injuries kept him from a career with the New York Yankees. Tesreau was named the top fullback of the first 50 years of Husky football.

TORCHY TORRANCE (1920-22)

Better known for his post-playing career, Torrance, a 1980 inductee, earned three baseball letters. He went on to become the freshman coach under Tubby Graves and was president of the Big "W" Alumni Club. The Husky baseball team's alumni award is named after Torrance.

SAMMY WHITE (1947-49)

One of the most successful former Huskies in terms of his pro baseball exploits, White, a 1984 inductee, was also a fine basketball player at the UW. On the basketball court, he was a three-time all-Northern Division pick and was All-Coast in 1948 and All-Far West in 1949. After playing for the 1948 and 1949 Husky baseball teams, he signed a contract with the Pacific Coast League's Seattle Rainiers. He played PCL ball before being called up to the Red Sox, where he spent nine seasons as the starting catcher. He went on to play in Milwaukee and Philadelphia before retiring.

1959 TEAM

The Dale Parker-coached 1959 team was the first Husky squad to qualify for the NCAA Baseball Regionals, falling one win short of earning a trip to the College World Series. The Huskies finished that year with a 21-12 overall record and a 9-3 conference mark. Members: Coach Dale Parker, Daryl Burke, Donald Daniels, George Grant, Peter Hanson, Floyd Harlington, Robert Hofeditz, Bob Houbregs (assistant coach), Earle Irvine, Ken Jacobson, Bob Johnson, Carlton Olson, John Pariseau, George Pitt, Richard Reiten, Donald Rhodes, Gary Snyder, Jim Stjerne, John Swinehart, Jerry Thornton (captain), Jack Walters, Ernie Wheeler, Robert Wyman.

PAC-10 BASEBALL HISTORY

Throughout most of the Pac-10's history (as the PCC, AAUW, Pac-8 and the Pac-10), the conference's teams have been split into two divisions for baseball. In fact, since 1923, the league had operated as a whole for only three seasons, 1967-69 before the 1999 reunification. From 1970 to 1978, when Arizona and Arizona joined to make the Pac-8 into the Pac-10, the league had two four-team baseball divisions.

In 1982, the four-team Northern Division increased to seven when Oregon dropped baseball and four schools were added on a baseball-only basis (Eastern Washington, Gonzaga, Portland and Portland State).

In 1991, Eastern Washington dropped its program, giving the Pac-10 Conference two six-team divisions. The North then consisted of Gonzaga, Oregon State, Portland, Portland State, Washington and Washington State.

After 1995, the Northern Division went back to four teams as Gonzaga and Portland left to join the West Coast Conference.

From 1995 to 1998, the champs of the Northern Division and Southern Division played a three-game series for the Pac-10 Championship. Washington played in the the 1996, 1997 and 1998 series, winning the last two.

In 1999, the Pac-10 returned to playing as a unified conference with no divisions for the first season since 1969. Since the '99 season, there have been no changes, with each team playing the other eight teams three times each.

BASEBALL FACILITIES

HUSKY BALLPARK

Washington, which had played at Graves Field since the 1960s, opened Husky Ballpark in 1998. In eight years, the UW has already played 225 home games — more than 28 per season. Additionally, hundreds of games involving youth, semi-pro and recreational teams are played at Husky Ballpark each summer.

The Huskies will continue to play at the new park, consistently improving the existing temporary setting in anticipation of a new stadium being constructed in the future. Even without the stadium completed, Husky Ballpark is a step up for the program. Here's a rundown of what's been completed:

The Infield

The infield consists of a new (installed in 2005), state-of-the-art FieldTurf surface. The new turf replaced the original AstroTurf last season and, while improving the quality of play, has also greatly increased the aesthetic look of the park with the more natural-looking material.

The Outfield

The outfield is a natural grass surface with a complete in-ground irrigation and state of the art drainage system. The grass is a mixture of bluegrass, rye and fescue, which will make the facility playable in any weather.

The Warning Track

The entire field is surrounded by a 12-foot wide synthetic warning track. This modern-style warning track, made out of FieldTurf like the infield, helps make the facility relatively maintenance free.

The Dugouts

Both dugouts are level with the playing surface and are eight feet deep and 65 feet long. The Huskies are located

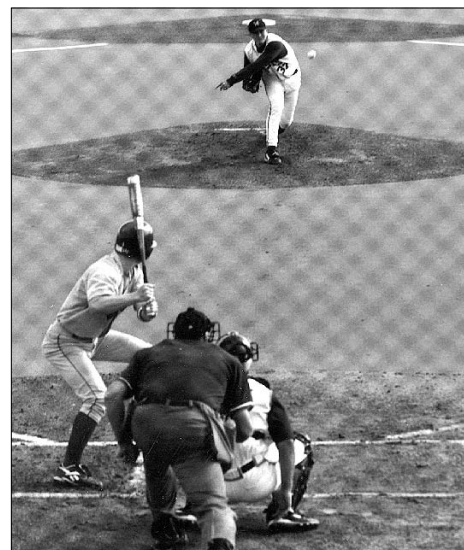


Husky Ballpark sits on the eastern edge of the UW campus on the shores of Union Bay and Lake Washington

in the first base dugout and the visitors at third base. Both are equipped with a storage area at the outfield end and both dugouts will be replaced with new dugouts when the stadium is built.

The Bullpens

The home bullpen is located in foul territory on the right field side while the visitors pen is located behind the left field fence. Both bullpens are fenced off from fair territory, but have direct access to the field. The home bullpen has four mounds, mainly for practice use. With artificial turf and tarps, both areas will be available in most weather conditions.

BASEBALL PRACTICE FACILITIES



Washington's indoor hitting facility (left) opened in summer, 2002. The building, located down the left-field line at Husky Ballpark, includes two full-length batting cages and two other half-sized cages. Additionally, state-of-the-art pitching machines provide Husky baseball players with the ability to practice their hitting with teammates or on their own year-round. The new building was constructed thanks to generous gifts from Paul Morris (RTS Inc.) and Herb Chaffey.

The Dempsey Indoor Practice Facility (right), built at a cost of \$28 million, opened in September, 2001, to rave reviews from coaches, student-athletes and fans. The massive building houses a full-size football field, plus a five-lane running track. The Dempsey Indoor includes two full-size batting cages (darker netting in background of photo at right) that extend from the ceiling of the building, offering a unique venue for hitters and pitcher alike to get work.
