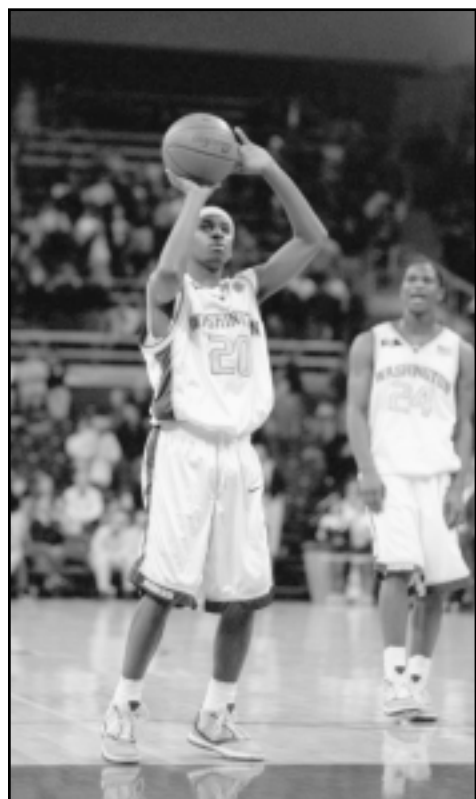

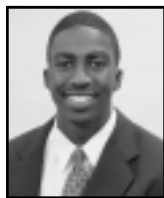

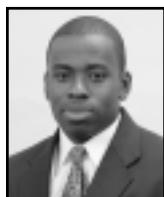

2003 Season Recap

Lorenzo Romar returned to Washington to take the reigns of the struggling basketball program. His inaugural Husky team experienced its share of growing pains, but there were many positive signs for the future from a roster that featured six freshmen. Only one senior was listed on the roster that had only four upperclassmen.

The Huskies faltered early, losing their first three games, including difficult road games at UNLV and Gonzaga.

The arrival of freshman Nate Robinson at the end of football season brought new life to the program and they won six out of the next eight games with Robinson in uniform. The team sputtered down the stretch en route to a 10-17 record. The Huskies placed ninth in the conference standings with a 5-13 record and did not qualify for the Pac-10 Tournament.

Despite the team's struggles there were plenty of memorable moments from last year's team, including upsets over Oregon and Stanford and back-to-back overtime home games against Arizona and Arizona State.

Nate the Great

Robinson immediately became a fan favorite at Bank of America Arena at Hec Edmundson Pavilion. His legacy began during a play that few people saw but many are still talking about. During what could be considered Robinson's break-out game on the road against Santa Clara, scoring 16 second half points. At one point he soared over defenders, narrowly missing a dunk that brought even the opposing crowd to their feet.

Fans flocked to see the diminutive 5-9 guard play and he didn't disappoint, scoring 19 points in a home loss to Eastern Washington.

Robinson's play continued to amaze and on Jan. 31 coach Romar couldn't keep him out of the starting lineup. In his first start Robinson played well dropping in 11 points as the Huskies beat Washington State, 81-67.

For the season Robinson totaled six games of 18 points or more. He started the final 10 games. Robinson led the team with a 13.0-point average that edged backcourt mate Will Conroy who averaged 12.7 points per game.

Robinson added to his remarkable freshman season claiming Pac-10 All-Freshman honors and garnering Freshman All-America acclaim.

Fabulous Freshmen

The 2002-03 season was a learning experience, one that saw five freshmen and two sophomores receive the majority of the minutes.

As the season wore on it was not uncommon for three freshmen (Nate Robinson, Mike Jensen and Bobby Jones), one sophomore (Will Conroy) and one junior (Doug Wrenn) in the starting lineup. Anthony Washington, Brandon Roy and Jeffrey Day also made contributions throughout the year.

Expecting such a young team to play at an elite level against the Pac-10 is asking a lot. However,



despite their record the team was in a lot of games late. Next year with a year of experience under their belt, Brandon Roy in uniform for a full season and Nate Robinson with a full-time commitment to the basketball program, things should be headed in the right direction.

Nate Robinson and Will Conroy led the Huskies in many important categories. Robinson, in points per game 13.0, second in assists with 52 and Will Conroy in second in points per game at 12.7, first in assists with 108, first in steals with 33.

The Non-Conference Schedule

Coming into the 2002-03 season the Huskies had high hopes. A new coach, a star in the making in Doug Wrenn and a bunch of talented youngster primed for breakout seasons. However, things didn't work out as planned.

The Huskies stumbled out of the gate, dropping their first three games to Montana State, UNLV and Gonzaga. The Huskies played Gonzaga tough, falling in overtime 95-89. Will Conroy had what might have been his best game of the season. Scoring 32 points including a 3-pointer to send the game into overtime.

The arrival of Nate Robinson for the team's next game against Wyoming sparked the Huskies to five wins in six games. The highlight of the streak was a 72-55 victory over Santa Clara in Nate Robinson's breakout game. As well as an 83-48 drubbing of Florida International, where the Huskies used an all around effort in the victory.

After finishing their non-league schedule 5-4 the Huskies had built some momentum going into league play. Then they hit a snag.

Prolific Pac-10

The Pac-10 Conference had another strong year in 2002-03 and limited the Huskies to only five wins, though they pulled off exciting home upsets against Stanford and Oregon. Five Pac-10 teams received NCAA Tournament bids.

After losing four out of their first five home games the Huskies squared off against Stanford at Bank of America Arena at Hec Edmundson Pavilion.

Washington upset the Cardinal 73-68, snapping a 10-game losing streak in their series.

The Huskies were led by the trio of Doug Wrenn, Will Conroy and Nate Robinson who combined for 48 of the team's 73 points. Wrenn had 16, Conroy 19 and Robinson 13 in the victory. Robinson scored five of the Huskies last eight points to seal the victory.

UW lost seven of the next eight games before their match-up with Oregon on Feb. 22. The Huskies were out for revenge after a 91-66 loss in Eugene.

It took an all-around team effort to get the 78-66 victory, with five players scoring in double figures. Curtis Allen led the way with 17 points including 3-of-5 accuracy from long distance.

Back-to-Back Bonus Panels

The season's most exciting games came near the end of the season when the Arizona schools came to town. The first game of the weekend had the Huskies matched up with second ranked Arizona.

The Huskies came out strong in the first half as they did against Oregon taking a 41-39 lead into the half. The game was close in the second half and it came down to the wire in overtime. Bobby Jones hit two freethrows with 1:35 remaining to give the Huskies an 84-82 lead. Salim Stoudamire came right back and hit a three pointer that put the Wildcats ahead 85-84 with 1:18 and the Wildcats would hold on from there.

In their next game the Huskies took on Arizona State and again the game went to overtime. Early in overtime Arizona State jumped on the Huskies with Sean Redhage scoring the first five points. Will Conroy answered right back with a couple of three-pointers and the Huskies retook the lead on an 8-0 run.

The Huskies held a 77-76 lead but Curtis Millage hit a 15-foot baseline jumper with 24 seconds remaining to seal the victory for Arizona State.

Even after those two heartbreaking losses the Huskies still had a chance to sneak into the Pac-10 Tournament. After a 95-89 victory at USC the Huskies had a chance to get in if they beat UCLA.

They lost to the Bruins and did not qualify for the conference tournament field.

The 2002-03 season had its ups-and-downs and with a more mature group next season the Huskies should be a greatly-improved team capable of scaling the Pac-10 standings.

SEATTLE -- Will Conroy scored 15 points and sank three free throws inside the final 27 seconds to secure Washington's 68-60 victory over NCAA Division II competitor Central Washington in an exhibition at Bank of America Arena. The game marked the UW coaching debut of Lorenzo Romar, a former player. Conroy tallied 10 points in the first half as the Huskies built a 39-22 halftime advantage. The margin might have been wider, but UW was held scoreless over the final 4:30 after freshman Bobby Jones converted two free throws. Central claimed its last lead of the game four minutes into the contest when Scotty Freymond hit one of two free throws to put his team ahead 11-9. The Huskies scored the next 20 points, surging out to a 29-11 lead with 8:57 left until intermission. Reserve guard Curtis Allen sparked the UW run, scoring seven of his nine points during that span. The Wildcats started the second half with a 14-2 run and trimmed the deficit to 60-58 with 4:11 remaining. UW outscored the Wildcats 8-2 the rest of the way, tallying all of its points from the free throw line. UW hit 10-of-14 free throws inside the final 2:31 to seal the victory. CWU's Terry Thompson led all scorers with 21 points. Jeffrey Day contributed 11 points and seven rebounds for UW which also got 10 boards from Marlon Shelton.

The Huskies (4-4) improved their all-time record against Houston (2-6) to 4-1, winning all four Seattle meetings. UW shot 13-for-27 beyond the 3-point arc (48%), but only 13-for-41 inside (32%). The Cougars outshot UW from the field (43% to 38%), but had 14 fewer attempts due to 24 turnovers that UW converted into 23 points. The Huskies' 15 steals were their most since equaling the school record of 20 on Nov. 26, 1996 against BYU. Will Conroy contributed 14 points and seven assists for UW which had a 20-9 assist-turnover ratio. Louis Truscott tallied 21 points for UH while Andre Owens added 13. Washington jumped out to an 11-2 lead its way to a 44-28 halftime advantage. Houston turned the ball over three times before scoring in the second half and the Huskies led by at least 17 points from that point.
