Seventh Season at Washington

In just six years, Lorenzo Romar has elevated Washington to the elite level of college basketball. The charismatic coach plans to stay at the top after putting together several highly regarded recruiting classes that rated among the nation's best.

Romar begins his seventh season at Washington in 2008-09 after directing the team to 119 wins since 2004, one of the best six-year records in school history. The Huskies are one of the winningest teams in the Pac-10 during that span.

He coached UW to back-to-back Sweet 16 berths (2005 & 2006) for the first time in school history. UW participated in three consecutive NCAA Tournaments, from 2004-06, for just the second time.

Romar already ranks fourth among all-time UW coaches. He posted his 100th UW win on Feb. 12, 2007 against Stanford.

Romar was honored at the 2006 Final Four as the winner of the John Wooden "Keys to Life" Award following a season in which he directed the Huskies to a 26-7 record. UW was 13-5 in Pac-10 play, finishing as the conference

runner-up for the third straight season. UW won two NCAA tournament games before an overtime setback against top-seed Connecticut.

He guided the Huskies to a 29-6 record in 2005, tying the 1938 squad for the highest win total in school history. UW finished second in the Pac-10 standings with a 14-4 mark.

After receiving their first ever No. 1 seed, the Huskies posted two NCAA Tournament victories and advanced to the Sweet 16. Romar, who led UW to its first conference tournament championship, was named the 2005 Pac-10 Coach of the Year and Black Coaches Association National Coach of the Year.

Romar fashioned a spectacular turnaround during his second season when UW posted a 19-12 record in 2004 and participated in the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 1999.

In 2004, Romar guided the Huskies to their first second-place regular-season finish since 1986 and their first Pac-10 Tournament championship game appearance since 1987.

After opening the conference campaign with an 0-5 record, UW reeled off 12 wins in its final 13 Pac-10 outings. Capping the run was a 75-62 triumph over No. 1 and previously undefeated Stanford in the final regular-season game. His Huskies won all three meetings with highly ranked Arizona, sweeping the season series for the first time since 1984.

The remarkable 2004 season was ended by a 102-100 loss to UAB in the first round of the NCAA Tournament.

Romar is in his 13th year as an NCAA head coach after compiling a 212-160 record in his previous 12 seasons. His six-year record at UW entering the 2007-08 season is 118-72.

He was named to head up the program at his alma mater on April 3, 2002. A point guard for the

Huskies' 1978-79 and 1979-80 teams,

Romar is the 18th head coach in Washington's 103-year history.

He is the first African-American coach to lead the Washington basketball program.

His inaugural Washington campaign concluded with a 10-17 record. UW placed ninth in the Pac-10 with a 5-13 mark. The young Husky roster included only one senior and six freshmen.

Romar is well respected among his peers as his selection as the head coach for the U.S. under-18 national team can attest. He led the U.S. juniors, including Husky Spencer Hawes, to a gold medal at the 2006 FIBA Americas championship.

He served as an assistant to head coach Tom Izzo on the 2003 USA Basketball Pan American Games staff.

Washington is Romar's third stint as a head college coach. During three-year tenures at Pepperdine (1997-1999) and Saint Louis (2000-2002), he gained a reputation as a hard-working coach admired for integrity and dedication.

At both Pepperdine and Saint Louis, Romar helped to revive programs to a competitive level. He led the Waves to a pair of second-place finishes in the West Coast Conference and an NIT invitation

in 1999. During his first season at SLU, the Billikens upset No. 1 Cincinnati in the second round of the Conference USA tournament and went on to win the championship and the league's automatic berth into the NCAAs.

During each of his final two seasons at Saint Louis, his teams defeated Washington. The Billikens beat UW 69-61 on Dec. 5, 2000 in Seattle and 71-70 on Dec. 29, 2001 in St. Louis.

Seattle was the site of one of Romar's great coaching moments. As an assistant coach, he helped UCLA to an 89-78 triumph over Arkansas in the Kingdome to win the 1995 NCAA Championship. Cameron Dollar, an assistant coach on Romar's Saint Louis and Washington staffs, was one of the stars for the Bruins during that national title contest.

Romar built a reputation at UCLA (1992-96) as one of the nation's top recruiters and was credited with recruiting much of the talent that formed the core of the Bruins' title team.

In three years at Saint Louis, Romar compiled a 51-44 (.537) record, including wins over nine different conference champions. His 51 wins rank No. 7 among all-time SLU coaches and is the fourth-best three-year total in the school's history.

Romar was named head basketball coach at Saint Louis on March 26, 1999. In his inaugural season at the school, Romar guided the Billikens to a 19-14 record that marked the third best debut season-record in Saint Louis annals.

In directing the Billikens to the Conference USA Tournament title and an automatic invitation to the NCAA Tournament, Romar became the first Saint Louis coach to accomplish either feat in his debut season. The 1999-2000 season marked many other notable firsts as well.

Romar became the first coach in history to lead SLU into the NCAA Tournament in his debut season after winning the school's first conference tournament title. Saint Louis upset a No. 1 team, Cincinnati, for the first time since the 1952.

The 2000-01 SLU squad posted a 17-14 record and became the first team in Conference USA history to defeat perennial power Cincinnati in back-to-back games. The Billikens finished with a 15-16 record in 2001-02 against a difficult schedule that included 14 games against teams that qualified for the postseason.

Prior to coaching at Saint Louis, Romar amassed a three-year record of 42-44 (.488) at Pepperdine, including 36 wins in his final

two seasons with the Waves. He took control of the Waves' program in February 1996 and quickly established himself as a top recruiter, bringing in talent that would guide the Waves to a postseason appearance in 1999.

In his second year, Romar staged a significant 11-game improvement over the previous season to finish with a 17-10 record and earn a second-place finish in the West Coast Conference, just one game behind champion Gonzaga. Pepperdine was the second-most improved NCAA Division I team in 1997-98, trailing only Connecticut.

In his final season at the school, Romar guided Pepperdine to a 19-13 record and a bid to the NIT, the Waves' first postseason appearance in five years.

The season after his departure, Pepperdine earned an NCAA Tournament berth with the majority of players Romar recruited. One of those players was Brandon Armstrong who was the 23rd selection overall in the 2001 NBA Draft.

Prior to his stint at Pepperdine, Romar was the top assistant under Jim Harrick at UCLA from 1992-1996. He recruited such talent as Toby Bailey, Cameron Dollar, J.R. Henderson, Kris Johnson, Jelani McCoy and Charles O'Bannon.

That recruiting bonanza helped lead the Bruins to back-to-back Pac-10 championships in 1995 and 1996. UCLA registered a 31-2 record in 1995 and won the NCAA crown.

UCLA's record during Romar's four-year assistant coaching tenure was a stunning 97-28 (.776).

A native of Compton, Calif., Romar graduated from Pius X High School. He earned his associate degree from Cerritos (Calif.) Community College in 1978 before studying at UW from 1978-80. He completed his coursework at Cincinnati, receiving his bachelor's degree in criminal justice in 1992.

During his sophomore year at Cerritos, Romar led the Falcons to a 23-8 record, averaged 14.1 points per game, set the school record for single-season assists and earned first-team all-league honors. Romar was inducted into the California Community College Hall of Fame in 1992.

He transferred to Washington in 1978 and played two seasons for legendary Husky head coach Marv Harshman. Romar was a two-year starter for the Huskies on the 1978-79 and 1979-80 teams.

Romar played all 27 games, starting seven times for the 1978-79 UW squad that finished with an 11-16 record and a 6-12 mark in Pac-10 play. He averaged 6.0 points and 1.4 rebounds during his junior season while posting team-leading totals of 80 assists and 35 steals. He shot 51 percent from the field and 72 percent from the free throw line.

As a senior in 1979-80, Romar played all 28 games for the Huskies who posted an 18-10 record, including a 9-9 conference mark. Washington participated in the National Invitation Tournament. He led all UW playmakers with 99 assists while averaging 9.3 points and 1.9 rebounds per game.

Romar served as team captain his senior year. He was the recipient of the Most Inspirational Award both years, an honor voted on by his teammates.

The Golden State Warriors selected Romar in the seventh round of the 1980 NBA Draft with the 141st pick overall. He totaled 1,731 points (5.9 average) and distributed 1,022 assists (3.5 average) during 291 career regular-season NBA games. His five-year NBA career included stints with Golden State (1981-84), Milwaukee (1984) and Detroit (1984-85).

After the 1984-85 season, Romar joined Athletes in Action (AIA), the athletic division of Campus Crusade for Christ, a non-denominational ministry that began in 1951 at UCLA.

Romar started 224 of 233 games during his seven years as a player for AIA.

In 1991-92, he averaged 24.4 points, 5.9 assists and 1.8 steals while shooting 54.5 percent from the field, including 49.5 percent from beyond the 3-point arc and 83.7 percent from the free throw line.

Romar set single-game records while an AIA player for most points (54) and assists (21). He remains the team's all-time assists leader (1,689) and ranks No. 2 in all-time scoring (4,244). In 1992, the then 34-year-old Romar scored 45 points against Michigan's "Fab Five" freshmen, who went on to reach the NCAA championship game.

In 1989, Romar took on co-head coaching duties for AIA, in addition to his continued responsibilities as a player. The year prior to Romar's assuming the coaching position, AIA went 12-25, the worst record in franchise history. Just three years later, Romar directed the 1991-92 AIA team to 21 wins, including a victory over NCAA Final Four participant Florida.

Romar served during the summer of 1997 as an assistant under Rick Majerus for the United States' 22 & Under Team that competed at the World Championships in Melbourne, Australia.

At Washington, he replaced Bob Bender who resigned on Mar. 13, 2002. Romar is the second former Husky player to return as the head coach. He joins Lynn Nance, who played at UW from 1964-65 and was the Huskies' head coach for four seasons from 1989-93.

Romar and his wife, Leona, have three daughters — Terra, Tavia and Taylor.

119 wins since 2004, one of the best five-year spans in UW history.

He played a major role in the spectacular 2005 and 2006 seasons that were among the finest in UW history. Dollar's contributions come both on the court, where he provides a wealth of coaching knowledge and experience, and on the recruiting trail. He helped recruit back-to-back classes that were ranked among the best in the nation.

In 2006, Dollar helped guide Washington to a 26-7 record. The Huskies made back-to-back Sweet 16 appearances for the first time ever. He was pivotal in the Huskies' run to their first Pac-10 Tournament championship in 2005 and first ever No. 1 seed into the NCAA Tournament. UW finished with a 29-6 record, tying the school record for wins in a season.

In 2004, the Huskies advanced to the championship game of the Pac-10 Tournament and competed in the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 1999. UW swept all

three meetings with highly ranked Arizona and capped the regular season with a win over No. 1 and undefeated Stanford.

Prior to his arrival at UW, Dollar served three years as an assistant coach on Romar's Saint Louis University staff. He helped the Billikens to a three-year record of 51-44 (.537), including a 2000 Conference USA Tournament championship that secured the league's automatic NCAA berth.

Dollar began his coaching career as an assistant on the staff of head coach Pat Douglass at UC Irvine in 1997.

He became the nation's youngest head coach in 1998 when, at age 22, he took the reins of the Southern California College program in Costa Mesa, Calif. The Vandards, who returned just six players from the previous season, posted an 11-22 record in Dollar's only season, but recorded wins over NAIA Top 25 teams Westmont and Azusa Pacific.

After a three-month stay as a part-time assistant at the University of Georgia in 1999, Dollar left to join the Saint Louis coaching staff on a full-time basis.

As a player, Dollar lettered four seasons at UCLA before graduating in 1997. He now returns to Seattle, the site of the Bruins' 1995 NCAA Championship victory. UCLA defeated Arkansas 89-78 at the Kingdome.

Dollar played against the Huskies eight times between 1994-97 and UCLA won all eight games. His most memorable moment against Washington was a half-court shot from the left sideline at the overtime buzzer that lifted the Bruins to a 91-88 victory on Mar. 7, 1996 at Pauley Pavilion. That was Dollar's only basket.

A four-year letterman at UCLA from 1994-97, Dollar achieved national recognition in 1995 as a pivotal player in UCLA's NCAA championship season when he took over for injured starter Tyus Edney in the title game. In Dollar's final three collegiate seasons, the Bruins won the NCAA title and reached the Sweet 16 and Elite Eight of the NCAA Tournament. Dollar averaged 5.0 points and 3.7 assists per game during his four-year career.

He was recruited to UCLA by then-Bruins assistant Lorenzo Romar and was reunited with his coach in 2001 when Romar added Dollar to his staff at Saint Louis University.

Dollar is a native of Atlanta, where his father, Don, was the long-time coach at Clarkston High School and is now coaching at Morehouse College.

Cameron and his wife, Maureen, live in Seattle. They have a son, Jalen, born on April 26, 2005 and a daughter, Giselle, who was born Feb. 12, 2007.

Paul Fortier, an All-Pac-10 forward with the Huskies in 1986, is in his fourth season as an assistant coach on the Washington staff.

In 2007, he tutored center Spencer Hawes, the

10th pick in the 2007 NBA Draft by Sacramento.

Fortier helped the Huskies post a 26-7 record in 2006 and advance to the Sweet 16 for the second straight season.

He worked as a UW team manager during the 2003 season while completing his psychology degree.

Fortier served the two years as an assistant at Cornell on Coach Steve Donahue's staff. The Big Red improved their record in both of Fortier's seasons.

Cornell posted an 11-16 record and a 6-8 Ivy League mark during 2004 in Fortier's first season. He tutored the post players, helping Cornell lead the league in rebounding and improve from a minus-3.0 to plus-2.3 margin.

In 2004-05, the Big Red registered a 13-14 overall record. Cornell was 8-6 in conference play, earning its highest Ivy finish in 17 years with a second-place effort. The Big Red swept Princeton for the first time in 20 years.

Fortier brings extensive playing and teaching experience to his new UW post.

After a tremendous collegiate career at UW, Fortier was selected by the Washington Bullets in the fifth round of the 1986 NBA Draft, the 104th pick overall. He was a standout in the European professional ranks, including stints in the top leagues of Italy, France, Spain and Greece. Fortier participated in the French All-Star Game in both 1997 and 1998 and was a member of the French Cup-winning Cholet squad in 1998 and 1999.

In 17 years playing in Europe, Fortier averaged better than 15 points per game 13 times. His top statistical season was 1995-96 with Le Mans (France) when he recorded averages of 21.5 points and 10.2 rebounds.

Just as important as his work on the court was his leadership off the court. Fortier served as a mentor to young American players overseas. He also worked at various camps, sharing his professional experiences.

Fortier lettered four years at Washington, from 1983-86. He started his final three seasons, helping the Huskies earn NCAA Tournament berths each time. Fortier served as team captain his final year during which he averaged 14.8 points and 7.2 rebounds. He still ranks 14th among all-time Huskies with 1,326 career points.

A product of St. Ignatius (Calif.) College Prep in San Francisco, Fortier averaged 20 points and 11.5 rebounds in 1982 during his senior season of high school. He garnered All-Northern California honors as well as honorable mention prep All-America acclaim.

Fortier and his wife, Elizabeth, have two daughters, Kassia and Marissa.

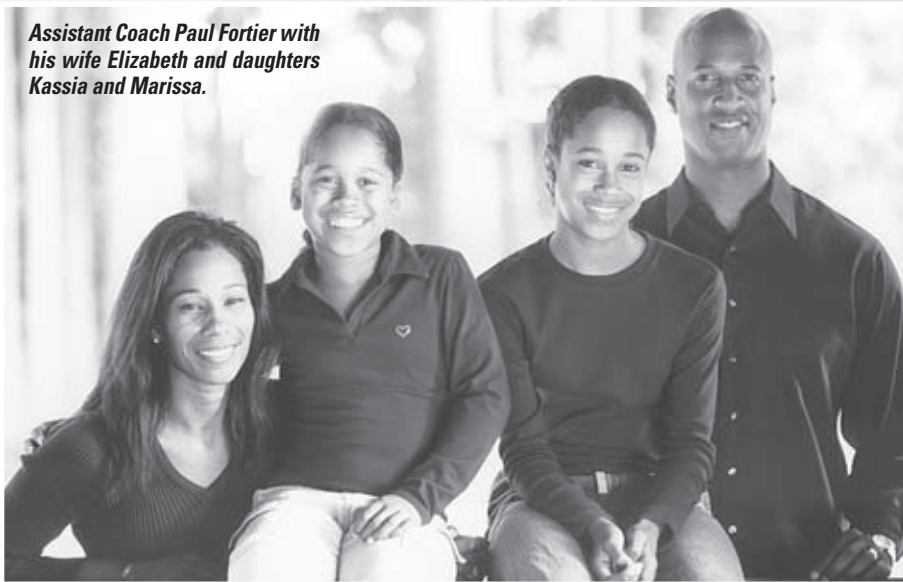

In his fifth year on the Washington coaching staff is assistant coach Jim Shaw. He re-joined head coach Lorenzo Romar on May 10, 2004, after they worked together for half a season in 1999 at Saint

Louis.

Shaw helped direct the Huskies to a Pac-10 leading 93 wins since 2004, the second-best four-year span in UW history.

He played a major role in the spectacular 2005 and 2006 seasons that were among the finest in UW history. Shaw's contributions come both on the court, where he provides a wealth of coaching knowledge and experience, and on the recruiting trail. He helped sign UW recruiting classes that were ranked among the best in the nation.

Shaw has recently been a part of several successful coaching staffs, helping direct teams deep into the NCAA Tournament five times during a recent six-year stretch.

In 2007, Shaw helped guide Washington to a 26-7 record. The Huskies made back-to-back Sweet 16 appearances for the first time ever. He was pivotal in the Huskies' run to their first Pac-10 Tournament championship in 2005 and first ever No. 1 seed into the

NCAA Tournament. UW finished with a 29-6 record, tying the school record for wins in a season.

Shaw served the previous five seasons at Oklahoma on Kelvin Sampson's staff. He helped the Sooners to a 131-37 record, three Big 12 Tournament titles, a Final Four appearance in 2002 and an Elite Eight berth in 2003.

"We are extremely fortunate to have Jim Shaw join our staff. He is one of the hardest working coaches in America and his track record reflects that," Romar says. "He was part of a staff that recruited a Final Four team at Oklahoma. He has been an NCAA participant at most of his jobs. His history in the Northwest, growing up here and having success coaching at Portland and other schools, should help us continue to build our program."

Shaw, 44, was an assistant at Saint Louis under head coach Lorenzo Romar for a half year. Prior to that brief stint, he served as assistant coach at Portland for five seasons, from 1994-95 through 1998-99. He helped the Pilots to a pair of 20-win campaigns and a 1996 NCAA Tournament berth, the school's first since 1959.

Prior to arriving at Portland, Shaw worked two years as an assistant at Montana State under head coach Mick Durham. He helped the 1993-94 Bobcats to a 16-11 record and fourth-place Big Sky Conference finish, their best in seven years. Three of Shaw's recruits went on to earn All-Big Sky accolades.

As an assistant at Southern Utah for a season (1991-92) under head coach Neil Roberts, Shaw was instrumental in leading the team to a 20-8 record, the school's best mark in its history as a Division I program.

Washington is not the first Pacific-10 Conference job for Shaw who coached at Oregon State during the 1990 and 1991 seasons. The nationally-ranked 1990 Beaver team, featuring point guard Gary Payton, won the Pac-10 championship and advanced to the NCAA Tournament.

Shaw's first assistant coaching assignment came in 1986-87 at Idaho State. He helped lead the Bengals to an impressive run to the Big Sky Tournament championship and the league's automatic NCAA Tournament berth. That was ISU's first NCAA appearance in 10 years.

A 1985 graduate of Western Oregon State College, Shaw was an NAIA honorable mention All-American and district MVP runner-up as a senior. He earned his master's degree in athletic administration from Idaho State in 1986.

A native of Chimacum, Wash., Shaw attended Chimacum High School where he was an all-state performer in both basketball and football.

He has two children, daughter Brittany and son Bradley.

mark a. EMMERT



Mark A. Emmert became the 30th president of the University of Washington, his alma mater, in June 2004. As the leader of the nation's top public university in terms of research funding, he is committed to building on the UW standard of excellence to produce a transformative learning experience for students and improve the lives of the citizens of the state of Washington and beyond.

Since taking office, Emmert has led an array of efforts ranging from revitalizing undergraduate education to improving workplace culture. He has championed accessibility and diversity, and has strengthened the University's commitment to sustainability and environmental stewardship. He has developed and overseen a comprehensive strategic plan to put the UW on a more competitive financial footing with its peers.

Under Emmert's leadership, the University has achieved a number of notable milestones, including the creation and launch of the Husky Promise, a guarantee to Washington's deserving low-income students that they will not have to pay for tuition and fees at the UW. Also during Emmert's tenure, the University has moved boldly to help position the state of Washington as an epicenter for global health, establishing a new interdisciplinary Department of Global Health and creating the Institute for Health Metrics and Evaluation. The University recorded the largest private gift in its history—a \$105 million grant from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation—to found the Institute. Further, the University's private fundraising effort, Campaign UW: Creating Futures, raised its goal by \$500 million in January 2007 after reaching its original \$2 billion goal 17 months ahead of schedule.

Emmert is a seasoned academic leader. Prior to assuming the presidency at the University of Washington, he was chancellor at Louisiana State University. He also served as chancellor of the University of Connecticut and held administrative and academic positions at the University of Colorado and Montana State University. He was a J. W. Fulbright Administrative Fellow in Germany and an American Council on Education Fellow.

Active in numerous professional and service organizations, Emmert serves as co-chair of the Prosperity Partnership and is a member of the National Security Higher Education Advisory Board and a charter member of the Association of Pacific Rim Universities. He also is involved in the Association of American Universities, the Association of Governing Boards of Universities and Colleges, and the National Association of State Universities and Land Grant Colleges. In addition, he served on the NCAA Presidential Task on the Future of Division I Intercollegiate Athletics and its fiscal responsibility subcommittee and was a member of the Puget Sound Partnership and the Governor's Global Competitiveness Council.

A native of Fife, Emmert attended Green River Community College before he transferred to the University of Washington. He graduated from the UW in 1975 with a degree in political science. He received his master's degree in 1976 and his doctorate in 1983, both in public administration from the Maxwell School of Syracuse University.

Emmert and his wife, DeLaine, have been married for over 30 years. They have two children, Steve and Jennifer.

scott WOODWARD

Director of Athletics

University of Washington President Mark A. Emmert announced on Sept. 17, 2008 the appointment of Scott Woodward as the school's 16th director of intercollegiate athletics. Woodward, the UW's Vice President for External Relations since 2004, served as interim athletic director for the previous seven months.



"The search committee and I looked all over the country for an athletic director," said Emmert. "I concluded that we had the best person for the job already in place. Scott is a talented administrator who knows higher education and understands the place of intercollegiate athletics at a university like this. He is student-oriented and as his background in politics suggests, is highly competitive and puts a premium on winning. I have great confidence in his abilities and know he will provide excellent leadership for the department."

Woodward worked with Emmert at Louisiana State University as director of external affairs in the Office of the Chancellor from 2000 to 2004. In that position, he acted as the liaison between the university and government and corporate officials and advised the chancellor on the implications of potential policy changes external to the university. He also served as the liaison from the Chancellor's office to the LSU athletic department and helped Emmert oversee it.

While Emmert and Woodward were at LSU, the institution's intercollegiate athletic teams won 10 NCAA national championships, including one in football in 2003. Woodward also experienced first-hand national championship caliber teams in baseball, basketball, and track and field. In addition, during that span the athletics program ranked among the top 11 in the nation three times in the annual NACDA Director's Cup - a measurement of broad-based competitive athletics success - and claimed 11 CoSIDA Academic All-America selections.

"Scott has seen what it takes to compete at the highest levels and to do it the right way," said Emmert. "He knows the kind of support coaches need and has the right values to provide the kind of leadership our athletic program requires."

Woodward holds a bachelor's degree in political science from LSU. In Louisiana, he served as a political consultant, a legislative liaison in the office of the governor, a lobbyist, and for eight years as a principal in his own government and public relations firm.

stephanie REMPE

Senior Associate Athletic Director

Stephanie Rempe enters her first year in 2008-09 at UW as senior associate director of athletics and senior woman administrator.



Rempe (pronounced REMP) is a key senior member of the athletic department's management team and serves as the department's liaison to the Pacific-10 Conference and NCAA committees related to women's athletics. She oversees the day-to-day operations for men's and

women's basketball, as well as several Olympic sports, and has additional responsibilities in the day-to-day operation of the Husky athletics department.

Formerly a senior member of the University of Oklahoma athletics staff, Rempe served OU in a number of capacities - most notably serving as the sport administrator for men's basketball, volleyball, men's and women's gymnastics, wrestling and softball. During her tenure, she also had oversight responsibilities for women's basketball, soccer, men's and women's cross country, indoor and outdoor track, the sports medicine program and the department's strength and conditioning program.

A 1993 graduate of the University of Arizona, where she was a four-year letterwinner on the Wildcat volleyball team, Rempe began her career in athletics at her alma mater while earning her master's degree in sports administration. She spent three years in the UA athletic department's Wildcat Club and coordinated the Arizona Alumni Letterwinner's Association.

In 1998, Rempe began a five-year stint as associate athletic director and senior woman administrator at the University of Texas at El Paso. While with the Miner athletics program, she oversaw 13 sports, football internal operations, the department's lifeskills program, sports medicine and the strength and conditioning program.

A native of Santa Barbara, Calif., Rempe is an avid runner who has twice competed in the Boston Marathon and completed an Ironman Triathlon. She is a member of the Santa Barbara Athletic Round Table Hall of Fame and the Santa Barbara High School Ye le Gang Hall of Fame.

Paul King is in his 14th year overseeing the business and financial affairs of the athletic department. He is responsible for the overall financial management of all athletic programs, involving policy making, strategic planning, financial management, staff and organizational development.
