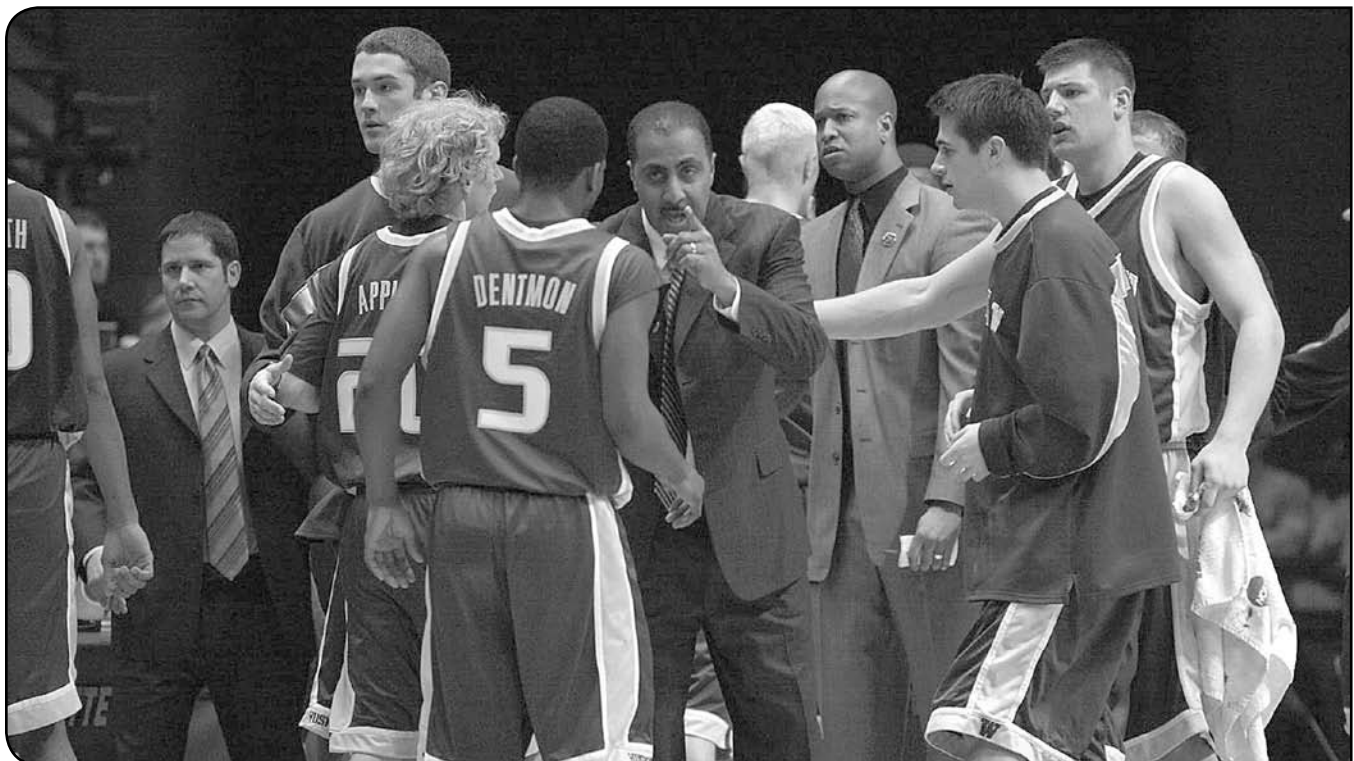

The players might need directions to Bank of America Arena for the home opener.

Their inexperience isn't that extreme, but a youth movement has definitely swept through the Washington men's basketball program. After relying on a core of veteran players to lead his Huskies to consecutive Sweet 16 appearances for the first time in school history, Coach **Lorenzo Romar** now counts on a bevy of underclassmen to sustain that success.

"This is the youngest team I've ever coached," exclaimed Romar. "We're going to have to get real old, real quick."

Despite their unfamiliarity with college basketball, all of the young pups possess pure prep pedigrees.

Heading the pack of returning youngsters is a pair of sophomore starters. Both of them were named to the Pac-10 All-Freshman Team in 2006.

Forward **Jon Brockman** and point guard **Justin Dentmon** each started all but one game last season. The dynamic duo gained a wealth of big-game experience during last season's NCAA Tournament run.

Those returning starters are among 10 underclassmen on the 13-player active roster.

Romar begins his fifth year with the Washington men's basketball team. The former UW player produced impressive results in his first four seasons, elevating Washington from a program that endured four consecutive losing seasons to national rankings in 2005 and 2006.

In 2005, the team tied a 68-year-old UW record with 29 wins, won its first Pac-10 Tournament championship and received the only No. 1 seed in school history. Last year, the Huskies posted a 26-7 record and made their first-ever consecutive appearances in the Sweet 16.

Despite the departure of a talented cadre of players that compiled those accolades, it's not like Romar is starting over. This year's turnover in personnel certainly can't be compared to his arrival for the 2002-03 season even though both teams had few veterans.

"It will be different because last time guys were learning us and we were learning them. We were all learning the system," Romar remarked of his first, inexperienced Husky squad. "Now these guys, even the young guys coming in, know how things work around here. They understand there is a certain culture that has been established."

That culture was initiated by reigning NBA Slam Dunk champion Nate Robinson (Knicks), who was selected in the first round of the 2005 NBA Draft. Last year's stellar senior class continued the tradition, led by 2006 Draft picks Brandon Roy (Trailblazers) and Bobby Jones (76ers).

"We have been very fortunate to have participated in three consecutive NCAA tournaments and two Sweet 16s. When that happens, the result is usually that players are going to get drafted and go to the NBA, because if you didn't have players of that caliber you probably wouldn't be winning those types of games," Romar said. "If we are able to sustain the level that we are at, then those types of things will continue to happen. So I think that is a good thing."

• Newcomers •

The talent pool has been replenished with back-to-back recruiting classes that were ranked among the nation's best. Each class featured a McDonald's All-American who also topped the annual Best in the West poll.

The Scout.com website touted Washington's as the third-best recruiting class in the country with all four signees rated among the top-100 prep seniors. UW is projected with the best signing class among Pac-10 schools for the second straight season.

Heading the list of impact freshman is 7-foot center **Spencer Hawes**, a McDonald's All-American from Seattle Prep (Wash.) High School. He was the top vote-getter in the annual Best in the West poll compiled by the Long Beach Press-Telegram. All-Star Sports labeled Hawes as the No. 2 high school player in the class of 2006, the top signee by any Pac-10 school.

"We are very fortunate to have who we feel is arguably the best big man in America at this level," Romar said. "He is not only talented, but he has a lot of toughness. We think he embodies everything that Husky basketball is all about."

Hawes is the son of former Husky basketball player Jeff Hawes. His uncle, Steve Hawes, was a two-time All-American and Husky Hall of Fame inductee who played 10 seasons in the NBA.

The Huskies signed another relative of a former NBA player in **Quincy Pondexter** whose uncle, Cliff, played three seasons with the Chicago Bulls. Pondexter was listed fifth in the Best in the West ratings. The 6-foot-6 forward ranked No. 27 in the Scout.com national rankings.

"The timing is great to add Quincy to our program. He already is one of the top 30 or so players in the country, but yet has a tremendous upside," Romar remarked. "We feel he is tailor-made to play in our system."

Completing the recruiting class were 6-3 guard **Adrian Oliver** and 6-7 forward **Phil Nelson**. Oliver was listed No. 64 nationally in the All-Star Sports rankings. Nelson was labeled the nation's No. 25 prospect by FoxSports.com.

2006-07 Outlook

"Phil Nelson, Quincy Pondexter and Adrian Oliver; those guys are all players that can come in and contribute," Romar projected. "They all really understand how to play the game. We feel that we got a great mixture of a winning mentality, high level of talent and high level of character with this group."

• Style of Play •

Despite the departure of some marquee players, Romar doesn't expect to change the Huskies' style of play. He believes the newcomers will enhance rather than detract from his up-tempo offense that ranked among the NCAA's top-six highest scoring outfits for the third straight season.

"We'll play the same way, running the floor and defending. It will stay the same. We had size down in San Antonio with the USA Team. We played the same way and it was successful."

Romar served as the head coach for the U.S. under-18 team that won the gold medal at the FIBA Tournament of the Americas during July in San Antonio, Texas. The team included Hawes who tallied 24 points and 10 rebounds in the championship game victory over Argentina.

Romar had a golden opportunity to watch his future UW protégé in action. The U.S. squad played the same high-octane system that Romar implements with the Huskies.

"For the first time since we have been at Washington we have size. We will have size without sacrificing quickness," said Romar. "This team has really good chemistry even though they are young. I think that this team will really play well together."

• Frontcourt •

The Huskies' frontline features two McDonald's All-Americans in Brockman and Hawes. Brockman led the team with 6.5 rebounds per game and was the No. 2 shooter in the Pac-10 with a 51.8-percent field goal accuracy. His scoring average of 8.4 points will increase as he helps fill the offensive void left by the departure of the league's No. 2 scorer Roy (20.2).

"I think that Jon Brockman will be one of the more improved players in our league this year," projected Romar. "Jon was somewhat like Brandon Roy in that Brandon deferred to his teammates because he is so unselfish and then when those guys moved on you saw what Brandon did. This year he will step up."

Brockman will be paired up front with his good friend Hawes, who gives the Huskies a dominant inside post presence they haven't had since the departure of Todd MacCulloch in 1999.

"We expect him to make an immediate impact," Romar said. "We have not had someone who can step in and do the things that he does with his size. As a 7-footer, he is able to score on the low block and able to pass the basketball with a good feel."

Athletic newcomer Pondexter should thrive in the Huskies frenetic system, taking minutes that Jones filled last year. Pondexter was tabbed as the nation's seventh-best small forward after starring at San Joaquin Memorial High School in Fresno, Calif.

One of only two seniors on the team is 6-9 forward **Hans Gasser** who was a solid contributor in 2006. His role will increase based on his excellent perimeter shooting and knowledge of the system.

Sophomore **Artem Wallace** should see increased playing time after averaging nine minutes in 16 games last season. He is a supremely athletic 6-8 banger who is deft around the basket.

One of the nation's finest long-range shooters, Nelson is a product of McNary High School. The 6-7 forward was a first-team All-Oregon state selection last year.

"We have recruited one of the best shooters in the country in Phil Nelson," said Romar. "He is not just limited to being a shooter. He is an excellent passer and has a great feel for the game."

The front court took a hit when red-shirt freshman center **Joe Wolfinger** went down before the season with a stress fracture in his foot. The 7-foot center worked hard to prepare for the upcoming season, but his UW debut will be delayed until late in the season. When healthy, he is a fantastic long-range shooter.

• Backcourt •

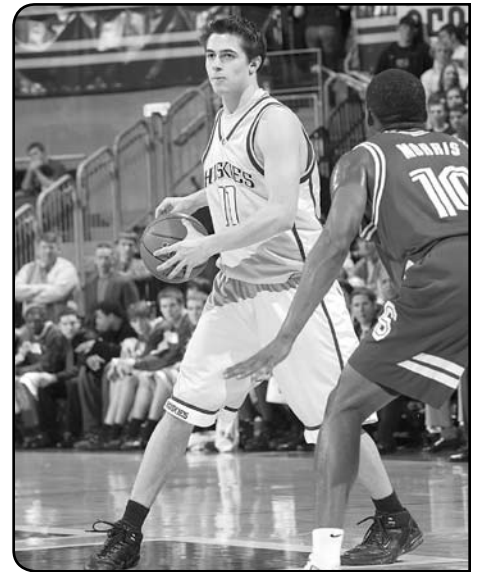
The guard corps is in good hands with Dentmon returning at the point and long-range marksman **Ryan Appleby** back to again stretch defenses.

Romar emphasizes the importance of having a returning point guard with such a young team.

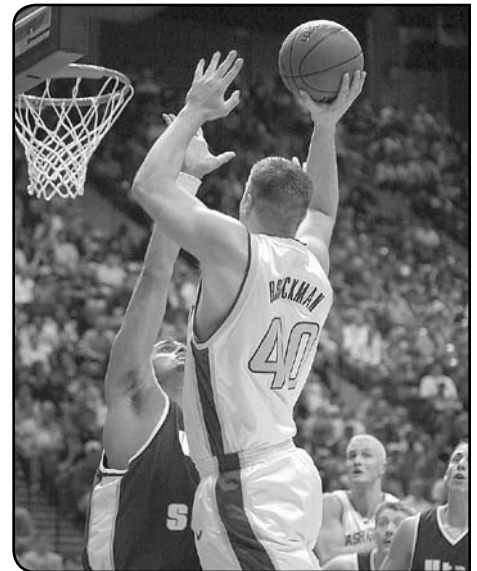
"It's huge, really huge. Not only was he a starter, but he played quality minutes and played in NCAA tournament games. Justin has had the ball in his hands down the stretch of important games. He has been in every perceivable situation in terms of experience so it helps out a great deal."

Appleby received the 2006 Pac-10 Newcomer of the Year award after hitting 70 treys, nearly one-third of the teams total.

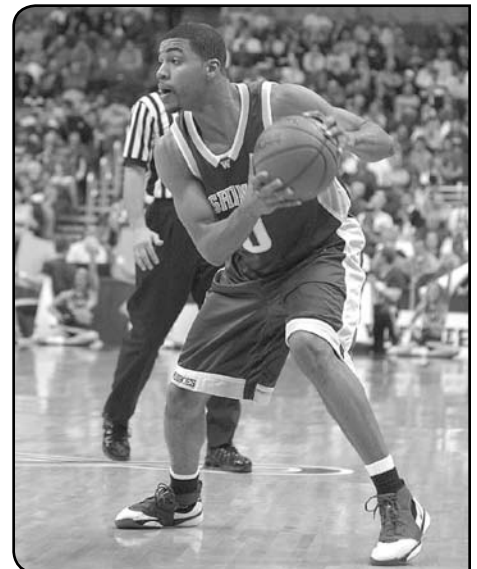
"Ryan is as dangerous a shooter as there is in the country. He also worked quite a bit this summer on getting to the basket and he's better at that. We're going to be counting on Ryan as a big part of what we are doing."

Fast Facts

- Washington is pursuing an unprecedented fourth straight NCAA Tournament berth. The Huskies earned three consecutive NCAA Tournament invitations (2004, 2005, 2006) for just the second time in school history, matching their 1984-86 postseason run.
- The Huskies advanced to the third round of the NCAA Tournament in both 2005 and 2006, the school's first back-to-back Sweet 16 berths.
- The Huskies will be young in 2007 with six freshman (two of them red-shirts) and four sophomores on the 14-player active roster. The four active upperclassmen (two seniors, two juniors) have a combined two games of starting experience at UW.
- The Huskies' incoming class of freshmen was ranked among the top-five nationally, including McDonald's All-America center Spencer Hawes, the top voter getter in the Long Beach Press-Telegram's annual Best in the West poll of coaches. UW also had the top Best in the West vote getter last year, forward Jon Brockman.
- Head coach Lorenzo Romar directed the USA under-18 team to a gold medal at the FIBA Americas championships in July. Spencer Hawes played on that team.
- UW ranked among the nation's top-six highest scoring teams in each of the last three seasons under Coach Lorenzo Romar's up-tempo offense. The Huskies finished fourth among NCAA Division I teams with 82.0 points per game last season after ranking No. 2 in 2005 (86.5 ppg) and No. 6 in 2004 (82.0).
- Washington compiled 74 wins during the last three years, the second-highest three-season total in school history. UW posted records of 19-12 in 2004, 29-6 in 2005 and 26-7 in 2006. The Huskies amassed 77 victories between 1951 and 1953.
- The Huskies have 808 home wins at their current arena. UW has won more games in Bank of America Arena at Hec Edmundson Pavilion than any other NCAA team in a single arena.
- Freshman Quincy Pondexter's father, Roscoe, played college basketball at Long Beach State for Lute Olson as did his uncle, Cliff Pondexter, a three-year NBA player with the Chicago Bulls.
- Freshman Spencer Hawes is the son of former Husky Jeff Hawes (1972-74) and the nephew of UW All-Century Team member Steve Hawes (1970-72).
- The last three seasons featured three of the four highest-scoring teams in Husky history: No. 1 in 2005 (86.5 ppg), No. 3 in 2004 (82.0 ppg) and No. 4 in 2006 (82.0 ppg).
- Four of UW's 31 all-time 1,000-point scorers reached that standard during the last two seasons. All four have departed (Will Conroy, Bobby Jones, Nate Robinson, Brandon Roy). Joel Smith and Jon Brockman are the Huskies' leading returning scorers with 278 career points each.

Junior **Joel Smith** is another experienced guard who has thrived two years in a reserve role.

"Joel is a phenomenal athlete, one of the best on the team. He had really good freshman and sophomore years and we don't see any reason why he doesn't progress this year. We are counting on him to really help us this year. He saw the model of what needs to be done with last year's team and he just needs to fill in where those guys left off."

Combination guard Oliver will challenge for the two guard position vacated by Roy, but is also capable of backing up Dentmon at the point.

"Adrian could be the best all-around guard that we've recruited here," Romar declared. "He is an extremely complete guard who can shoot the three and play any position on the perimeter."

Fourth-year walk-on **Brandon Burmeister** should also see increased playing time. He is an outstanding long-range shooter who played significant minutes in 2006.

The backcourt depth is improved by the addition of red-shirt freshman **Harvey Perry** who sat out last season with a back injury. The 6-4 guard appears healthy and ready to work his way into the rotation.

• Departures •

The departure of four significant players, including three standouts that were invited to NBA preseason camps, make this a transition year. First-team All-American Brandon Roy was the 2006 Pac-10 Player of the Year. He was the sixth player picked in the draft, joining Bobby Jones who was a second-round selection. Jones received honorable mention All-Pac-10 Team accolades as did departed forward Jamaal Williams.

Also gone is four-year starting forward Mike Jensen and crowd favorite Zane Potter. The Huskies sustained an additional loss when red-shirt sophomore center Zach Johnson decided to end his playing career due to knee injuries that made his return unlikely.

"I think as good as those players were when they were young, I think that this group now is probably a little more talented than the first group when they were young," Romar explained. "So we just have to grow together again, but it is not like we are starting from scratch like before. We will experience some tough times early I think, because we are so young."

• The Schedule •

Home games against two Final Four teams and a season-opening, four-team tournament, highlight the challenging 2006-07 schedule. The Huskies play 10 games against 2006 NCAA Tournament competitors. Nineteen of 30 regular-season games will be played at Bank of America Arena where UW posted a 17-2 record in 2006.

The regular season begins on the earliest date ever with the opening round of the three-day Basketball Travelers Classic that runs Nov. 12-14 at Bank of America Arena. The UW-hosted tournament features a four-team field in a round-robin format. The Huskies have a first-round matchup with Pepperdine, the school at which Romar began his head coaching career in 1996. Northern Iowa, a 2006 NCAA Tournament competitor, and Nicholls State square off in the other half of the first-day doubleheader.

Those three tournament dates begin a stretch of seven straight home games for Washington, matching last year's start as the school's longest season-opening homestand since 1945.

Highlighting the non-conference home slate is a Dec. 20 meeting with Final Four qualifier LSU.

The Huskies venture away from Seattle twice for non-conference encounters. Both times they meet formidable foes. Washington continues its series with Gonzaga, visiting the McCarthy Center in Spokane on Dec. 9. UW takes a break during the middle of Pac-10 on Feb. 17, making a cross-country trek to play at Big East power Pittsburgh. The Panthers made five consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances.

"The schedule is very well put together. It will be a very tough schedule that includes a couple Final Four teams in UCLA and LSU," Romar remarked. "The road trip to Pittsburgh will be difficult."

"It's not the ideal schedule to throw at a young team, but our kids like to play big games against tough opponents."

• Outlook •

"The goal is to maximize our ability for the year and our expectation is that we are playing our best basketball by the end of the season," said Romar.

Another goal the Huskies strive to achieve is a fourth consecutive NCAA Tournament appearance. They would be the first UW team to accomplish that feat. The current streak of three straight NCAA berths equals the school record established between 1984-86.

To accomplish those goals, Romar must become a youth worker again.

"We'll throw them out there and let guys make mistakes early and let them learn from their mistakes. About the time you get to conference play, your young players are a little more seasoned."

By the Numbers

2 Chris Welp (1986) and Brandon Roy (2006) are the two Huskies to receive the Pac-10 Player of the Year award.

2 All-time victories for Washington against teams ranked No. 1 at the time of the game. UW has a 2-26 record in encounters with top-ranked foes, including a 75-62 upset over previously undefeated Stanford on Mar. 6, 2004 in Seattle. The only other time the Huskies knocked off the nation's top-ranked team was a 69-68 upset of UCLA on Feb. 22, 1979 in Seattle.

2 Number of individuals who played and coached at Washington. Fourth-year coach Lorenzo Romar lettered at UW from 1978-80. Lynn Nance was a standout Husky player in 1964 and 1965 and was the UW head coach from 1990 to 1993.

3 Current streak of NCAA Tournament appearances, tying the school record set from 1984-86. No UW team has ever earned four consecutive NCAA berths.

3 The number of 1,000-point career scorers on the 1999 team, the first such trio in Husky history. Todd MacCulloch (1,743), Deon Lutton (1,254) and Donald Watts (1,158) all were at the 1,000-point plateau in 1999.

3 NBA Championship rings owned by former Husky James Edwards (1974-77) who helped the Detroit Pistons to titles in 1989 and 1990 and the Chicago Bulls in 1996.

4 Number of players on the 2004 UW roster who played at Seattle's Garfield High School (Will Conroy, Brandon Roy, Tre Simmons and Anthony Washington).

4 Number of former Huskies who own NBA championship rings. They are: Jack Nichols (Boston, 1957), Charles Dudley (Golden State, 1975), Lars Hansen (Seattle, 1979) and James Edwards (Detroit, 1989-90, Chicago, 1996).

4 Number of former NBA players from the Seattle Sonics who had sons on the 1998-99 Washington roster. The list of former Sonics (and sons) included: Fred Brown (Bryan), Lonnie Shelton (Marlon), Slick Watts (Donald) and Paul Westphal (Michael).

5 The number of overtime games played by the 1961 Washington team in a 26-game season. UW had a 2-3 record in those games.

6 Draft position of the most recent first-round NBA Draft selection Brandon Roy, a 2006 first-team All-American.

7 Overall draft position for UW defensive lineman Reggie Rogers in the 1987 NFL Draft by the Detroit Lions. Rogers also played a pivotal role on the Husky basketball team. He lettered from 1983 to 1985, scoring 465 points with 312 rebounds.

7 That's how many 3-pointers Senque Carey shot and made at Old Dominion on Dec. 4, 1999 to set the school record for percentage and total treys in a game. It was the finest single-game 3-point performance by any NCAA player in 1999-2000.

8 The number of former Huskies selected in the first round of the NBA Draft.

8 The eighth pick in the first round of the 1985 NBA Draft was Detlef Schrempf, making him the highest drafted Husky ever. Schrempf was selected by the Dallas Mavericks.

9 Steals by Jason Hamilton on Nov. 28, 1995 at Eastern Washington to establish the single-game school record.

10 The number of 7-footers who have played at Washington, beginning with Gary Nelson in 1955 and continuing this year with Joe Wolfinger and Spencer Hawes.

10 The number of shots then-freshman Todd MacCulloch attempted and made against Arizona State on Feb. 29, 1996 to set a UW single-game field goal percentage record.

13 The number of NCAA Tournament appearances by Washington which has registered a 14-14 record overall.

13.5 Career rebound average by Doug Smart (1957-59), the Washington record-holder.

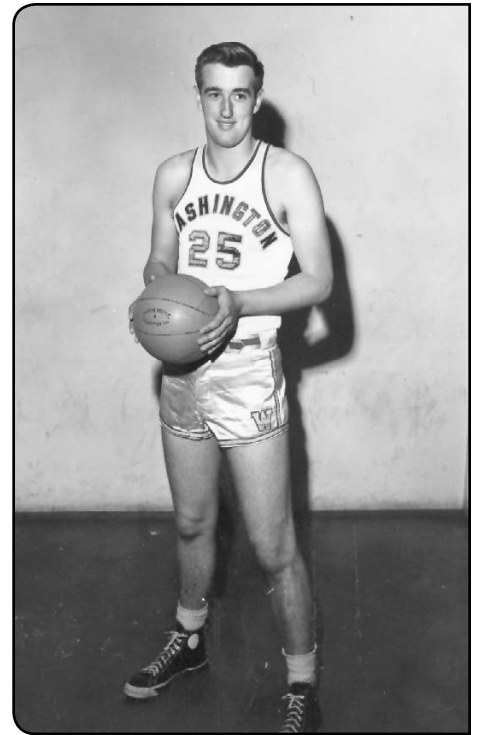
14.8 That's how many rebounds Steve Hawes averaged per game in 1971 which is a UW record and ranks No. 10 all-time in the Pac-10.

16 Washington earned back-to-back Sweet 16 appearances in 2005 and 2006 for the second time in school history. UW advanced to the Sweet 16 in 1984 and 1985. The Huskies earned the 1984 Sweet 16 trip by beating Duke (80-78) and then-assistant coach Bob Bender who coached the Huskies from 1994-2002.

16 Assists by Rafael Stone at California on Feb. 20, 1970 to set a UW single-game record.

18 The number of all-time postseason appearances by Washington. The Huskies earned their 13th NCAA Tournament berth in 2006 and made their fifth National Invitation Tournament appearance in 1997.

18 Lorenzo Romar is the 18th head coach in the 105-year history of Washington basketball.



#25 The only jersey number retired by Washington. It was worn by Bob Houbregs, the national player of the year in 1953 who led the Huskies to a third-place NCAA finish.

23 That is how many 20-win seasons Washington has registered in its history, including last year's 26-7 mark.

23 Points scored by Erroll Knight on Nov. 15, 2001 at Alaska Fairbanks in his collegiate debut. That was the highest scoring performance for a UW freshman in his first game.

26 The longest winning streak in Husky history was a 26-game stretch from Feb. 14, 1938 until Jan. 21, 1939.

31 The number of 1,000-point career scorers in Husky history. Brandon Roy and Bobby Jones were the most recent additions, reaching the 1,000-point plateau in 2006.

29 The school record for single-season victories was turned in by Hec Edmundson's 1938 squad that posted a 29-7 record. The 2005 squad tied that record with a 29-6 mark.

30 Rebounds by Ed Correll against Oregon on Feb. 24, 1962 to set a UW record.

32 The longest home winning streak in Husky history was a 32-game stretch at Bank of America Arena at Edmundson Pavilion from Jan. 29, 2004 through Dec. 29, 2005.

36.2 The annual number of rain in inches that Seattle absorbs. This dispels the myth of Seattle as the rain capital of the nation as other prominent cities are targets of even more precipitation. New York City averages 40.3 inches of rainfall and Washington, D.C. 39 inches. Chicago is not far behind Seattle with 34.5 inches per year.

49 Points scored by Bob Houbregs against Idaho on Jan. 10, 1953 to set a UW single-game record. That is the seventh-highest scoring output in conference history.

52.6 The points-per-game accumulated in 1972 by Steve Hawes (21.0), Charles Dudley (16.5) and Louie Nelson (15.1). They are the highest scoring trio in UW history. Ranking second is the 1998 trio of Todd MacCulloch (18.6), Donald Watts (16.9) and Deon Lutton (15.4) who combined for 50.9 points per game.

55 The Huskies' largest margin of defeat, a 116-61 loss at Arizona on Dec. 20, 1988.

55 The number of minutes played in the longest Washington games ever. The Huskies have twice played triple overtime contests, both during the 1984 season. UW won both 55-minute affairs, defeating Idaho 83-69 and UCLA 89-81.

61 The largest margin of victory for the Huskies in a conference game. UW routed Oregon 76-15 on Jan. 13, 1922.

65.0 Todd MacCulloch's NCAA-leading field goal shooting percentage in 1998.

66.2 Todd MacCulloch's NCAA-leading field goal shooting percentage in 1999.

67.6 Todd MacCulloch's NCAA-leading field goal shooting percentage in 1997.

80 The number of 3-pointers made by Tre Simmons in 2005 to establish a new school single-season record.

83 All-time first-team all-conference selections by Washington, the second-most among Pac-10 schools behind only UCLA's 105.

85 Rebounds the Huskies amassed against Idaho on Dec. 2, 1969 to set a school record.

86.7 School-record career free throw percentage registered by Curtis Allen (2001-2004). Allen hit 202-of-233 career free throws to rank No. 6 among all-time Pac-10 players.

86.5 School-record scoring average registered by the 2005 UW team, a figure that ranked No. 2 nationally.

90 The number of years the Pacific-10 Conference has operated. Formed in 1915 as the Pacific Coast Conference, the league has also been called the Athletic Association of Western Universities and the Pacific-8 Conference. Washington and Cal are the only continuous members for all 88 years.

93 The largest victory margin for UW was a 100-7 rout of Puget Sound on Jan. 14, 1921.

96 The number of overtime games in Husky history. Washington has a 44-52 all-time record in overtime contests.

105 The number of seasons the University of Washington has fielded a men's basketball team. The Huskies began playing in 1896, but did not have a team during five seasons.

130 The point total amassed in a 130-67 rout of Chico State on Dec. 1, 1992. That was the highest scoring output in Washington history.

147 Career losses by legendary UCLA coach John Wooden whose last defeat came at Washington on Feb. 22, 1975. UW won 103-81 after which UCLA won Wooden's final eight games and the 1975 NCAA title.

161 The number of consecutive games Washington held opponents under 100 points prior to a 103-82 loss at Arizona on Mar. 2, 1997. The previous team to reach the 100-point plateau against UW was Texas, a 104-83 winner on Nov. 20, 1991 in Austin.



66.4 *Todd MacCulloch's school-record career field goal percentage that ranks fifth among NCAA players.*

212 School-record career 3-pointers by Deon Lutton (1997-2000). The previous record of 119 was established by Eldridge Recasner.

266 Career conference wins by Clarence "Hec" Edmundson from 1921 to 1947. He ranks third among all-time Pac-10 coaches.

279 The number of times Washington and Oregon State have met in the Huskies' oldest rivalry, dating back to 1904. Washington owns a 144-135 series advantage.

461 The number of names appearing on Washington's all-time letterman list. The names range from Pete Adams to George Ziegenfuss. The list includes three Staats brothers (Karl, Stan & VP.) along with seven Browns and five Smiths. All-name team candidates include Bruno Boin, Perry Hack, Grant Leep, Marty Matilla, Loyal Shoudy and Flosi Sigurdsson.

488 Clarence "Hec" Edmundson racked up the most wins by a Washington coach, nearly doubling the win-total of his nearest competitor. Edmundson's 488-195 record (.714) between 1921 and 1947 was 242 more wins than the 246 of No. 2 Marv Harshman.

808 All-time Washington wins at Edmundson Pavilion, currently the most by any college in a single arena. That total remained unchanged during the 1999-2000 season while the arena underwent a renovation and the Huskies played their home games at KeyArena.

1927 The year Edmundson Pavilion construction was completed and the Huskies began playing in what was then known as the University of Washington Pavilion. The arena was re-named Edmundson Pavilion in 1948 after long-time basketball and track coach Clarence S. "Hec" Edmundson. After a 19-month renovation was completed in Nov. 2000, the building was again re-named to its current title, Bank of America Arena at Edmundson Pavilion.

1936 The year the Huskies nearly made it to the Olympic Games in Berlin. The U.S. Olympic team was the winning team from a tournament of AAU and collegiate teams. Washington advanced to the Olympic Trials in New York City with wins over USC and Oregon State. The Huskies were the top collegiate finisher, defeating DePaul, but lost to the McPherson AAU squad that represented the U.S. in Germany. Washington team member Ralph Bishop played with McPherson in the Olympic Games.

1,503 All-time wins by Washington basketball teams to rank 15th nationally. UW has a 1,529-1008 (.603) record entering 2005-06.

9,880 School-record average attendance at Bank of America Arena during the 2004-05 season.
