2009-10 SEAS



The Huskies are jumping at the opportunity to defend their 2008-09 Pac-10 title.

Despite the loss of Jon Brockman, Justin Dentmon, Artem Wallace and Joe Wolfinger, the 2009-2010 version of Washington is still expecting big things. The defending Pac-10 champs -- the UW's first outright title since 1953 -- return 61 percent of their scoring and 64 percent of their rebounding. What they lose in experience, scoring and brute rebounding force, they replace with emerging young talent, several eagle-eyed shooters, off-the-charts athleticism and a group that will rebound by committee.

The trick for Husky head coach Lorenzo Romar is to not let his highly-touted team get complacent with their status as reigning top dog in the Pac-10.

"This is an entirely new year," said Romar, who enters his eighth season as the Huskies' head coach. "As far as we're concerned, we're not going out there approaching anything as if something is going to be handed to us. We are going to have to start from scratch."

While the latest group of Huskies will forge their own identity over time, it will be hard for them to avoid early comparisons to the 2005 and 2006 squads, which relied on speedy guard play and stellar role players. Head coach Lorenzo Romar took those teams on repeat NCAA trips to the Sweet 16. He's hoping he can lead this year's squad to a repeat Pac-10 Championship and to unprecedented heights in the NCAA Tournament.

If the Huskies are to accomplish lofty goals in 2009-10, here is the cast of characters who will lead them there:

GUARDS

In 2008-09, the guard play of Dentmon surprised many -- enough so to earn him the Pac-10 Most Improved Player award. This year, don't expect Washington's talented backcourt to sneak up on anyone. The Huskies are deep in speed, athleticism, toughness and shooting from the guard group.

Isaiah Thomas, the 2009 Pac-10 Freshman of the year and the Huskies' all-time leading freshman scorer (541 pts, 15.5 ppg), is back for his sophomore campaign. The 5-foot-8 dynamo stormed onto the scene and not only led all UW scorers, but also accumulated a team-high 91 assists and was second with 39 three-point field goals. Thomas will still handle the role of taking the ball up court, but he will also assume a larger role of playing off the ball.

The return of junior Venoy Overton and the addition of ubër-talented freshman Abdul Gaddy will allow Romar to spell Thomas of point guard duties at times. Overton has made 27 career starts at the point, but only made one last season as a sophomore. He proved to be a valuable commodity off the bench and earned a reputation as one of the toughest lock-down defenders in not only the Pac-10, but the nation.

Gaddy, who like Thomas hails from Tacoma, Wash., arrived on the UW campus as perhaps the most highly-touted guard recruit in team history. He was a McDonald's All-American after his senior year at Bellarmine Prep and was rated by Scout.com as the No. 2 point guard prospect in the nation -- setting the bar pretty lofty for a 17-year-old. Gaddy's age belies him though, and his court smarts and ability to lead a team will make him fit right into the backcourt.

With Thomas, Overton and Gaddy quarterbacking the offense, Romar is hoping another trio of guards will be the beneficiaries of all the attention the little guys will receive from sagging defenses. Sophomores Scott Suggs and Elston Turner and freshman C.J. Wilcox are all competing to fill the role of shooting specialist. Turner, who was fourth in scoring during the Huskies two NCAA Tournament games, and Wilcox have been duking it out during the summer and fall camp to see who the best shooter is. Either way, Romar will be able to plug a capable sharpshooter into the lineup.

Suggs can also jack it up from outside, but also has the ability to slash to the bucket and hit the pull-up jumper. The former Mr. Basketball from the state of Missouri played a limited role as a freshman, but should be able to use his 6-foot-6 frame to carve a role out for himself as a sophomore.

FORWARDS

The Husky frontcourt will definitely miss Brockman – you can't simply snap your fingers and replace his rebounding, toughness and leadership. Add in the loss of Wallace and Wolfinger, and that is a huge chunk of the team's size exiting out the door.

But, Romar is not in complete mourning. In fact, he is pretty confident the talent and strength down low shouldn't drop off as drastically as it may seem.

"You don't replace Jon Brockman," said Romar of the UW's all-time leading rebounder and second all-time leading scorer. "We'll do it a little differently. We have a quick front line. The thing we'll miss the most is Jon's intensity everyday and the way he raised everyone else's level of intensity. I think guys are willing to go in, bust their tails and replace Jon in a different type of way."

Senior Quincy Pondexter is all that remains left from a four-man 2006 freshman class. He will be asked to put the team on his experienced shoulders and lead them in his final campaign. Towards the end of last season, he already showed signs that he was ready for a larger role.

Pondexter led the Huskies in the NCAA Tournament with 21.5 points per game and scored in double-figures in 13 of the final 14 contests, including six games with 20 or more points. He also was a beast on the boards, getting almost six rebounds per game throughout the season. This past summer he represented Team USA at the World University Games and averaged 7.9 ppg and 18 minutes.

Darnell Gant also returns up front. He started 34 games as a redshirt freshman and averaged 3.4 ppg and 3.1 rpg. Expect those numbers to increase in his second year as he has not only gained more muscle in the off-season, but more confidence. The 6-foot-8, 225-pound Gant has the ability to beat his opponent both facing up from the outside and down low on the blocks.

Another frontcourt player that is expected to increase his production is junior Matthew Bryan-Amaning. He is the tallest Husky on the roster at 6-foot-9, yet MBA (as he is known by others) has shown the ability to push the ball up the court on the dribble. He can also use his 7-foot-4 wingspan to clog the middle and swat away shots. In his lone start where he replaced an injured Brockman against eventual NCAA Tournament team Portland State, MBA scored 23 points and had 12 rebounds.

Junior Justin Holiday is the other forward on the roster that has valuable playing experience. Holiday is a very athletic and active player that is deceptively long. He does not light up the stat sheet night in and night out, but when he is on the floor good things seem to happen – whether he is causing a turnover, grabbing a big rebound or hitting the timely shot. He has been slowed in the fall while recovering from hernia surgery.

A pair of freshmen round out the frontcourt roster: redshirt Tyreese Breshers and Tacoma's Clarence Trent. Breshers is returning from knee and shin injuries that forced him to watch last season from the sidelines. He brings a Brockman-like physique down low but is more impressive in his ability to raise up off the floor. It may take Breshers awhile to get into playing shape, but once he gets accustomed to the college game, the coaching staff has high expectations for him.

Trent is an intriguing freshman prospect for the Huskies. He is another high-energy type player that displays phenomenal athleticism. He can knock down the short jumper and will be a force in the up-and-down tempo, but is still working on his offensive range. Trent should become a fan favorite with his array of dunks and boundless energy.

Yes. Washington has to replace two All-Pac-10 players. But, what is quickly being learned is that this year's squad may be the deepest and most talented from top to bottom in team history. The fight for playing time could be one of the toughest battles in Romar's eight years at Washington. Once all that sorts out, the one sure thing is that Husky fans are in for an exciting ride in 2009-10.

SCHEDULE

Eight home games against teams that participated in the 2009 NCAA Tournament highlight the 2009-10 Washington men's basketball schedule. Twelve of the opponents that appear on the schedule participated in postseason championship action last spring, including two that appeared in the National Invitation Tournament (NIT) and two in the College Basketball Invitational (CBI).

A total of 27 of the Washington's 30 regular season games have been pre-selected to appear on television, while two of the remaining three are still being considered.

Washington's exclusive television partner, FSN Northwest, will televise a minimum of 24 games, including eight that are part of the league's partnership with FSN. FSN Northwest will produce 16 Husky games as part of its agreement with the UW athletics program. In addition, the Huskies will appear on ESPN or ESPN2 three times.

Washington open the season playing host to the Athletes in Action Classic. Wright State will be the Huskies first opponent on Nov. 13, followed by Belmont and Portland State in the subsequent days. The Huskies will then welcome San Jose State, led by former Husky Adrian Oliver, on Nov. 20. Washington will wrap up its string of five-straight home games by hosting Montana on Nov. 29.

The Huskies will then hit the road for the first of two Big-12 / Pac-10 Hardwood Series games. Washington will face Texas Tech in Lubbock, Texas on Dec. 3 in a game that will be televised by ESPN2. Later in the season, Texas A&M will visit Bank of America Arena on Dec. 22 in a game that FSN will nationally televise.

On Sunday, Dec. 6, the Huskies will play host to NCAA Tournament team Cal St. Northridge. That game is followed by a neutral site game in Anaheim, Calif., against Georgetown in the John Wooden Classic. It will mark the first time in history that Washington and Georgetown have ever faced each other.

The Huskies return home on Dec. 19 to face I-5 rival Portland, followed by Texas A&M and San Francisco (Dec. 27).

Washington opens the Pac-10 schedule on New Year's Eve against Oregon State and closes its Pac-10 schedule on March 6, also against the Beavers. Eight Pac-10 teams played in postseason tournaments, including five in the NCAA. In addition, Oregon State won the CBI Tournament.

In the middle of the Pac-10 schedule, Washington will also host cross-town Seattle University on Jan. 26. The Seattle U game will mark the return of longtime Husky assistant Cameron Dollar, who now leads the Redhawks program. Also making a return to Seattle is former assistant coach and current Washington State head coach Ken Bone.
