ANOTHER SUCCESSFUL SEASON FOR LORENZO ROMAR'S HUSKIES

Washington (24-11) won Pac-10 tournament championship and made third-straight NCAA tourney appearance

HUSKIES MAKE 16TH NCAA APPEARANCE

To legitimize the impact Husky head coach Lorenzo Romar has had on the Washington program, all one has to do is look at the number of NCAA tournament appearances the team has made under his watch. UW earned its sixth NCAA post-season berth under Romar -- more than any Husky coach has ever attained during their career. He has led Washington to three-straight post-season NCAA tournaments, a feat that he has now done twice and was also accomplished from 1984 through 1986 under the watchful eye of Marv Harshman and Andy Russo.

Once the Huskies get to the tournament, they have proven to be a hard out. For the fifth-straight appearance, Washington won at least one game. The No. 7 seed Huskies beat No. 10 Georgia, 68-65, in the second round of the NCAA East Regional played in Charlotte, N.C. Washington's attempt to make its fourth Sweet 16 appearance under Romar was cut short by No. 2 seed North Carolina, 86-83.

The Huskies are now 18-17 overall in the NCAA tournament.

UW WINS THE PAC-10 TOURNAMENT

Washington won its second-consecutive Pac-10 tournament championship and third overall in team history. UW beat Arizona 77-75 in the first-ever overtime championship game on a buzzer-beating shot by **Isaiah Thomas**. UW has won three conference tournaments overall, trailing only Arizona's four for the most among teams.

Thomas played all but 90 seconds of Washington's three games and earned his second-straight Most Outstanding Player award. He joins Sean Elliott (1988 & 89) as the only two-time winner. Thomas averaged 19.7 points and set a tourney record for most assists (30). He also had 8 steals, which were the second most all-time.

Terrence Ross joined Thomas on the All-Tournament team after averaging 15.3 points. He made his first career starts in the tourney, all the more remarkable after not playing a minute in the season finale vs. USC. **C.J. Wilcox** also flexed his muscles averaging 13.0 ppg and hitting a key three-pointer in the waning seconds that sent the championship into overtime.

THOMAS MOST OUTSTANDING PLAYER

The Huskies unquestioned leader this year is **Isaiah Thomas** and he showed the world why during the Pac-10 Tournament. He turned in perhaps the most remarkable three-game stretch that Husky fans have ever witnessed -- perhaps all Pac-10 fans have ever seen. In the quarterfinals against Washington State, Thomas trumped Klay Thompson's 43 point performance by accounting for at least 43 of his own, scoring 21 and dishing out 11 assists. Against Oregon, he scored only 10 points, but dished out a Pac-10 tourney record 12 assists to lead UW to the finals. In the final vs. Arizona, he poured in 28 points, dished out 7 assists and hit a buzzer-beater in overtime to carry UW to its second consecutive crown. He left the Staples Center with his second Most Outstanding Player award and a tournament record 30 assists. Sean Elliott (1988 and 1989) is the only other player to win the MOP award twice.

FRESHMEN FIREMEN

For the Pac-10 Tournament, Lorenzo Romar unveiled a new starting lineup that included freshman **Terrence Ross** and redshirt frosh **C.J. Wilcox**. Obviously, with the end result, the move worked wonders. Ross earned a spot on the all-tournament team after averaging 15.3 over the three games and shot 52.8% from the field -- pretty remarkable considering he did not play a minute in the UW's regular-season finale vs. USC. Wilcox celebrated his selection to the Pac-10 All-Freshman team by averaging 13.0 points during the tournament and hit a team-best 9 three-point FG's -- including a UW tournament record five 3's vs. Washington State.

COACH ROMAR AMONG ALL-TIME BEST IN PAC-10 TOURNEY HISTORY

Lorenzo Romar is 13-5 (.722) all-time as a coach in the Pac-10 Tournament. His win total trails only former Arizona coach Lute Olson (16) and his percentage trails former UCLA coach Walt Hazzard (.750) and Olson (.727). Hazzard only coached in the tournament twice, compiling a 3-1 record. Olson is 16-6 all-time. Romar has won the tournament three times, which once again only trails Olson (4).

HUSKIES TRADITIONALLY TOUGH IN THE TOURNAMENT

The Huskies have the second best record in Pac-10 Tournament history. Washington is 16-10 (.615) in 14 tournament appearances. The 16 wins trails only Arizona (19) and the three tournament titles is tied for second with UCLA and trails only Arizona's 4.

2010-11 UW MEN'S BASKETBALL – COACH LORENZO ROMAR

COACH LORENZO ROMAR (9TH YR. AT WASHINGTON, 15TH YR. OVERALL)

The 2009 & 2005 Pac-10 Coach of the Year, **Lorenzo Romar** is in his ninth season as the 18th head men's basketball coach at Washington. Romar is the dean of coaching in the Pac-10 having spent more seasons at Washington than any other current Pac-10 coach at their school. Romar owns a **195-102 (.658) record at Washington** and is **288-190 (.603) in 15 seasons** as a head coach. The first African-American head basketball coach at UW, he moved to **third all-time in victories at UW** after passing Tippy Dye on Jan. 16, 2010. That win was also the 250th overall during his coaching career. Romar has led Washington to six NCAA tournament Appearances -- all in spurts of three-consecutive seasons (2004-05-06 & 2009-10-11) -- and the school's first back-to-back Sweet 16 appearances (2005 & 06). Overall, he has led Washington to three Sweet 16 appearances. He was the 2005 Pac-10 and Black Coaches Association Coach of the Year. Romar played point guard for Marv Harshman's 1979 and 1980 teams and spent five years in the NBA after college. Prior to UW, Romar served as the head coach at Saint Louis (1999-02) and Pepperdine (1996-99) and was an assistant coach at UCLA (1992-96) - He helped lead the Bruins to the 1995 national title. A native of Compton, Calif., he graduated from Pius X High School. Romar and his wife, Leona, have three daughters: Terra, Tavia and Taylor - a current UW cheerleader.

UNPRECEDENTED SUCCESS UNDER ROMAR

The Huskies are enjoying their greatest stretch of success in team history under the direction of Lorenzo Romar. Besides three Sweet 16 appearances, three Pac-10 tournament championships and one regular-season Pac-10 title, the numbers show Romar has entered uncharted territory. From 2004-2005 -- Romar's third season at UW -- to now, the Huskies have won 166 games, the most ever in a seven-year span of UW basketball history. He has averaged 21.7 wins per season during his nine year UW career and has amassed four of the seven largest single-season win totals in UW history. Romar has five 20-win season under his tenure -- a mark that only trails Hec Edmundson's 11 seasons with 20+ wins.

IN GENERAL

HUSKIES IN A NUTSHELL

The Huskies were picked to win the Pac-10 Conference in a vote among media members during the preseason. They looked strong out of the gate, blowing away all takers before back-to-back losses to No. 8 Kentucky and No. 2 Michigan State at the Maui Invitational. UW entered the Pac-10 season 8-3 -- a loss at Texas A&M the only other blemish on the preseason slate. UW jumped out of the gate 7-1 in the Pac-10, their best conference start in 25 years. A three-game skid left the Dawgs reeling and eventually led to six losses in the final 11 conference games. UW was able to circle the wagon at the Pac-10 Tourney and left as the Pac-10's automatic bid to the NCAA's for a second-consecutive season, thanks to a buzzer-beater by Isaiah Thomas that lifted UW over regular-season champion Arizona. Washington was rewarded with a No. 7 seed and shipped off to Charlotte, N.C. for the NCAA Tournament. They traveled further than any other team in the field, but were undaunted beating No. 10 seed Georgia in the East Regionals' second-round. They played North Carolina with an opportunity to go to the Sweet Sixteen, but lost 86-83 to the Tar Heels who improved to 29-1 all-time in NCAA tourney games in their home state.

SENIOR NOTORIETY

Matthew Bryan-Amaning, Justin Holiday and Venoy Overton left their mark on the Husky program by being members of the 2009 Pac-10 championship team, 2010 & 2011 Pac-10 tournament championship and 2010 NCAA Sweet 16 team. Overton and Bryan-Amaning ended their careers with over 130 games played -- just the fourth and fifth Huskies to play in that many games. MBA left school as the No. 2 shot blocker in history while Overton finished third in steals and fifth in assists. The Huskies were 92-47 over their four year careers, which is the second-best four-year span of any senior class (93-38 for 2004-07 seniors).

AMONG THE LEADERS

GENERAL

- UW finished third in the Pac-10 for the second-consecutive season. The Huskies have finished third or better for the 6th time in Romar's nine seasons.
- UW swept UCLA for just the third time ever (2006 and 1987)
- A home loss to WSU snapped a streak of 7 home conference wins with the closest margin of victory being 11 points vs. Stanford.
- The Huskies 109 points vs. Cal were the most ever against a conference foe. The 201 combined points in the regular season series were the most ever by UW.
- UW started 7-1 in the Pac-10 for the first time since 1986.
- Washington went 3-1 at Cal, Stanford, UCLA & USC for the first time since 1987.
- The Huskies started 4-0 in Pac-10 play for the first time since 1984 when they jumped out of the gate 6-0.

For the first time in school history, Washington was selected by media that covers the Pacific-10 Conference as the preseason favorites. Washington garnered 348 votes including 33 of 35 first place nods in becoming the first non-California or Arizona school to be anointed as conference favorites.

BIG MAC INTO PAC-10 HALL OF HONOR

Todd MacCulloch was this year's UW selection for the 2011 Pac-10 Conference Hall of Honor. It's the 10th year that the Pac-10 inducted one member from each institution into the Hall of Honor. Standing at 7-foot-0 and 280 pounds, MacCulloch was the Huskies main cog from 1996-1999 and led the team to NCAA Tournament appearances his junior and senior seasons. He averaged 18.6 points and 9.7 rebounds

Pac-12 Starts In 2011-12

Colorado and Utah will join the Pac-10 to form the Pac-12 starting in 2011-12. It marks the first additions to the conference since Arizona and Arizona State joined the conference in 1978-79. As in previous years, the conference schedule is comprised of 18 games for each institution and will maintain the travel partner in a non-divisional format. The annual schedule will include games against an institution's traditional rival both home and away. In addition, each institution will play six other opponents both home and away (for two consecutive years), and four opponents on a single game basis - two at home and two away. The single-play opponents will rotate every two years.

UW HAS LONGEST-LASTING

PAC-10 MEMBERSHIP

A founding member of the Pacific Coast Conference in 1915, Washington enjoys a long-lasting association with the nation's most successful intercollegiate athletic league. The PCC competed until 1958. In 1959, the Athletic Association of Western Universities was formed and, in 1968, became the Pacific-8 Conference. In 1978 two more schools were added and the current Pacific-10 Conference became reality. And, in 2011, Utah and Colorado will join the conference to form the Pac-12. in 1998 when Washington advanced to the Sweet 16 before falling to Connecticut on a last-second shot. As a senior, MacCulloch averaged 18.7 points and 11.9 rebounds - the seventh highest rebound average in single season. MacCulloch ended his UW career as the school's all-time field goal percentage (.664) leader, second all-time in blocked shots (142) and fifth in total points (1,743) and rebounds (985). MacCulloch was honored during the Pac-10 Tournament.

UW's PAC-10 POW WINNERS

The Huskies won Pac-10 Player of the Week honors four times. Matthew Bryan-Amaning was the first to earn the honor after UW swept USC and UCLA in Los Angeles. Isaiah Thomas won for his efforts vs. Oregon and OSU the following week. MBA and Thomas were the first different Huskies to win the award in back-to-back weeks. It marks the first time since the Pac-10 started handing out weekly honors that two different Huskies have won in consecutive weeks. Thomas earned the award a second time after UW swept the Arizona schools. His most recent win came after UW swept Cal and Stanford. Overall, Huskies have earned the weekly honor 42 times, 23 times during Lorenzo Romar's coaching tenure.

THOMAS TIDBITS

THOMAS EARNED RECOGNITION

Isaiah Thomas earned numerous national accolades during the season including Associated Press Honorable Mention All-America, John R. Wooden Award Midseason Top 30, one of 10 finalists for the Cousy Award, handed out to the nation's top point guard and one of 30 mid-season candidates for the Naismith Award. He was also a Wooden Award and Naismith nominee in 2009-10.

I.T. OFF THE CHARTS WITH ASSISTS

Isaiah Thomas averaged 6.1 assists per game -- the second-highest UW single-season average (Will Conroy, 6.4, 2005). He upped his average to 6.7 in conference-only action. He is third all-time on UW's all-time career assists list (page 11 of release). His season high was 13 at Cal on Jan. 16. His total that day was the most since Will Conroy recorded 14 on 3/3/05 at Cal. He is just the 8th Husky to ever record 13 or more assists in a game. He followed that night up with 10 against Arizona to become just the second Husky with back-to-back games with 10+ assists. He duplicated that feat in the Pac-10 tournament with 11 vs. WSU and 12 against Oregon. He was the first player since Northeastern's Jose Juan Barea in Feb. 2006 to go back-to-back with 20 points/10 assists. Overall, he had 5 games with 10+ assists this season.

THOMAS AMONG ALL-TIME SCORERS

Isaiah Thomas moved up to **6th all-time** among UW scorers after notching 19 points vs. Georgia. He totaled 1,721 (16.4 ppg) in 105 career games. Thomas began the season 26th on the all-time scoring list. His career scoring average of 16.4 ppg is the **9th best all-time in UW history** and is the highest average by a Husky since Clarence Ramsey averaged 16.5 from 1974-76.

HOME SWEET HOME

MORE CAREER WINS AT THEIR HOME ARENA THAN ANY NCAA TEAM

Washington has 861 wins inside of Hec Edmundson Pavilion, the most by any Division I team at its current home arena. Minnesota has the next most at its arena -- Williams Arena -- more than 50 behind UW.

FRIENDLY CONFINES OF HOME

Losing at Alaska Airlines Arena at Hec Edmundson Pavilion is rare under coach Lorenzo Romar's watch. They are especially tough during the non-conference slate. The Huskies have won 23 straight non-conference games at Alaska Airlines Arena, dating back to a 72-71 home loss on March 14, 2008 in the College Basketball Invitational to Valparaiso. **In nine years with Romar at the helm, UW is 129-25 (.838) overall at home**, 66-5 (.930) in non-Pac-10 games. This season Washington won by an average of +20.8 points at home and dating back to last season had won a team-record 14-straight games by 10 or more points before losing to WSU on Feb. 27.

ALASKA AIRLINES ARENA

Alaska Airlines and the University of Washington announced on Jan. 20 a partnership to rename UW's on-campus basketball arena "Alaska Airlines Arena at Hec Edmundson Pavilion." The arena sponsorship is part of a five-year agreement to support University of Washington Athletics approved by the university's Board of Regents. Alaska Airlines has committed \$525,000 annually in cash and trade for the arena naming rights in addition to the airline's \$175,000 on-going athletics' sponsorship. Court signage, including the Alaska Airlines logo, were unveiled at the Arizona game and exterior signage will be installed within the next eight weeks.

HUSKY NOTES

LATE SEASON TRENDS

- Washington's win over Georgia was the team's first victory in the state of North Carolina in 9 tries.
- 3 of UW's last 4 victories were by 3 or less points after previously going 0-6 in games decided by 5 or less.
- UW has won their 1st game of the NCAA tourney 3 consecutive years and the last five times overall.
- UW's bench outscored Georgia's 28-0.
- Washington has won 76 games over the last 3 seasons, the second most in a 3-year span trailing only 77 from 1951-53 under Tippy Dye.
- Isaiah Thomas** has two of the three games in UW history (both this season) where a player has gone back-to-back games with 10 or more assists (also Raphael Stone, 1970).
- UW is 19-2 in games decided by 11+ points, 2-2 in games decided by 6-10 points and 3-7 in games decided by 5 or less.
- In Washington's 24 wins, they averaged 89.2 points, while in its 11 losses they averaged 69.6 points, a discrepancy of 19.6 points.

2010-11 WASHINGTON MEN'S BASKETBALL - HUSKY HAPPENINGS

20 WINS

The Huskies won 20 games in a season for the fifth time under **Lorenzo Romar** and for the 26th time overall in team history. The only other Husky coach with more 20-win seasons is **Hec Edmundson**, who accomplished the feat 11 times from 1928-1945. Washington has won 76 games over the last 3 seasons (26 in 2009, 26 in 2010, 24 in 2011), the second most in a 3-year span trailing only 77 from 1951-53 under Tippy Dye.

UW vs. TOP-10 TEAMS

The Huskies played three teams that were ranked in the top-10 at the time -- No. 8 Kentucky, No. 2 Michigan State & No. 7 North Carolina -- all losses. **The Huskies are 33-120 all-time against teams ranked in the top-10**, including 2-18 on a neutral court. The Huskies last win over a top-10 team was in 2010's second round of the NCAA Tournament when they soundly beat No. 8 New Mexico.

Vs. RANKED FOES

The Huskies were 1-4 against teams ranked in the AP top-25 during the season. Their lone win came over No. 16 Arizona in the championship of the Pac-10 tournament. Overall, the UW is 28-57 against AP ranked opponents since Jan. 1, 2000. UW has won its last four against ranked foes in the confines of Alaska Airlines Arena and are 16-5 over the last 21 contests against ranked foes at home. Overall, Washington is 19-14 all-time at home during the decade. UW had lost its previous 8 decisions against ranked non-conference opponents before ending a three-year drought by beating Texas A&M on Dec. 22.

HUSKY BLOCK PARTY

Washington amassed 179 blocks -- the most in UW single-season history surpassing the previous record of 151 set in 2010. Individually, **Matthew Bryan-Amaning's** 54 blocks were tied for the 4th most in single-season history. He also tied the UW single-game record of 7 blocks at Arizona (done twice by David Dixon). **Aziz N'Diaye** had 39 blocks to tie for the eighth most in UW single-season history.

3-POINT SHOOTING RECORDS

Washington set new highs with 305 three-point field goal makes and 821 attempts. The previous records were set in 2005 when they hit 257 out of 670 attempts. UW shot more three-pointers than free throws, the first time they have done so in Romar's tenure at UW.

HITTING 100

UW scored 100 or more points six times during the season, eclipsing the previous single-season record set in 2004-05. That year the Huskies were a No. 1 seed in the NCAA tournament and scored 100 or more points five times and amassed a single-season 3,026 points. Washington scored over 100 against McNeese State (118-64), Virginia (106-63), Long Beach State (102-75), Texas Tech (108-79), Oregon State (103-72) and California (109-77).

HUSKIES IN THE RANKINGS

Washington began the season as the only Pac-10 team ranked in the national polls. The Huskies were in-and-out of the polls since and ended up 23rd in the final regular season AP rankings and No. 23 in the final ESPN/USA Today Coaches poll. Several publications and websites had the Huskies ranked in the pre-season, including: FoxSports.com's Jeff Goodman (7th), Slam Magazine (8th), Bleacherreport.com (9th), ESPN's Dick Vitale (14th), Sports Illustrated (15th), ESPN's Andy Katz (18th), CBSSports.com's Gary Parrish (18th), Rivals.com (21st), Athlon Sports (22nd), The Sporting News (23rd) and Blue Ribbon Yearbook (23rd).

UW SINGLE GAME RECORDS FALL

The Huskies set several records during the season including:

- Most FT's made while shooting a perfect 100%, making all 16 of their tries vs. Texas A&M. Their previous bests were a couple of 13-for-13 efforts.
- UW has hit a team-record 17 3-pointers vs. Virginia in the Maui Invitational and vs. Cal.
- UW's 109 points against Cal were the most vs. a Pac-10 opponent.

WINS vs. LOSSES STATS

- Washington was 19-2 in games decided by 11+ points, 2-2 in games decided by 6-10 points and 3-7 in games decided by 5 or less.
- UW was 21-2 when they outshot their opponent and 3-9 when they were outshot. UW was 11-2 when they shot 50% or better.
- In Washington's 24 wins, the team averaged 89.2 points, while in their 11 losses they averaged 69.6 points, a discrepancy of 19.6 points.

RECORD SCORING OUTPUT

Washington shattered the record for its best offensive output over a three-game span in team history with 322 points (107.3 per game) to start the season. After opening the season with 118 points vs. McNeese State, the Huskies scored 98 against Eastern Washington and 106 against Virginia. In a three-game span in 2004-05, the Huskies totaled 305 against Sacred Heart, Houston and California.

BOB RONDEAU HONORED

Bob Rondeau, the voice of the Huskies, has been named the state of Washington's Sportscaster of the Year for the eighth time, the National Sports-casters and Sportswriters Association announced on Jan. 9. Rondeau, who handles the play-by-play for Husky football and men's basketball on KJR 950-AM, along with a variety of other duties related to UW athletics, was honored along with Seattle Times baseball writer Larry Stone, who was named the state's Sportswriter of the Year.

GADDY TEARS ACL

Sophomore Abdul Gaddy will miss the remainder of the 2011 season after tearing the anterior cruciate ligament (ACL) in his left knee during practice on Jan. 4. Gaddy sustained the injury when he planted his left leg while driving to the basket. He underwent successful surgery on Jan. 14 at UW Medical Center. Typical recovery time from ACL surgery is six-to-nine months. Gaddy was leading the Pac-10 in assist to turnover ratio at 3.1 (49 assists/16 turnovers). His 3.8 assists per game was the seventh best average in the Pac-10 Conference and he also ranked ninth in three-point shooting percentage (40.6%). A starter in all 13 games, Gaddy raised his scoring average to 8.5 points per game, up from 3.9 ppg as a freshman. Overall, Gaddy has played in 49 games, 42 starts - 41 of which have come consecutively.

ROMAR SIGNED FOUR FOR 2012

Lorenzo Romar signed four high school seniors to NCAA Letters of Intent on Nov. 10 for the 2011-12 season. Perhaps the biggest name and highest-rated of the bunch is 6-4 guard **Tony Wroten** from Seattle's Garfield HS. Wroten was a member of the gold medal winning 2010 USA Basketball Men's Developmental National Team and was named to the Long Beach Press Telegram's Best in the West poll. At an October Clash of the Classes all-star game featuring the top Washington and Oregon prospects, Wroten scored 42 points, grabbed nine rebounds and dished out seven assists to earn MVP honors. **Hikeem Stewart** is a 6-3 guard that was a second-team All-Seattle Metro member as a junior and helped lead Rainier Beach to the Class 3A State Tournament. **Jernard Jarreau** is a 6-10 forward from New Orleans that has grown seven inches since starting high school but still possesses guard skills. **Andrew Andrews** is a point guard from Portland's Benson HS and will either go to a prep school after graduating or redshirt his first season at UW.

HUSKIES CAP THE BIG-12/PAC-10 HARDWOOD SERIES

The Huskies finished 3-3 all-time in the Big-12/Pac-10 Hardwood Series. They were 0-3 on the road, losing at Oklahoma State, Texas Tech and Texas A&M. Conversely, the UW was 3-0 at home in the series with wins over Oklahoma State, Texas A&M and Tech Tech.

MAUI INVITATIONAL RECAP

Washington went 1-2 in the EA Sports Maui Invitational and took home fourth out of the eight-team field. The Huskies began the tourney in record-setting fashion handing Virginia coach Tony Bennett the worst loss of his career, 106-63, behind a UW record-tying 17 three-point buckets. In the semifinals, No. 8 Kentucky handed the Huskies their first loss of the season, 67-74, overcoming a one-point halftime deficit. In the third/fourth place game, No. 2 Michigan State rallied from a 10-point halftime deficit and pulled away down the stretch for a 76-71 victory.

MAUI NOTABLES

- Washington tied a school record with 17 three-point buckets in its 106-63 win over Virginia.
- The 106 points allowed by Virginia and 43 point defeat were the most/worst defeat by a Tony Bennett-led squad.
- UW has more assists (44 to 27 total) and fewer turnovers (38 to 52) than their opponent in each of the three games.
- **Isaiah Thomas** (14.7) and **Justin Holiday** (11.3) were the only Huskies to score in double figures in all three games.
- **C.J. Wilcox** and **Terrence Ross** each notched career-highs (Wilcox since broken) vs. Virginia with 17 and 12 points, respectively, combining to go 8x11 from three-point range.
- **Darnell Gant** had two of the best games of his career against Kentucky and Michigan St., scoring a career-high 10 points (all in the first half) vs. the Wildcats and nine points vs. the Spartans.
- **Justin Holiday** notched a career-high 6 steals vs. Virginia.
- **Aziz N'Diaye** blocked 8 shots during the tournament, including a career-best 5 vs. Kentucky.

HUSKIES IN THE NBA

Six former Huskies that played or were recruited by Lorenzo Romar are currently playing in the NBA. **Nate Robinson** is the veteran of the bunch in his sixth NBA season. **Brandon Roy** is in his fifth season with the Portland Trail Blazers, while **Spencer Hawes** begins his fourth season in the NBA - his first with Philadelphia. **Jon Brockman** is in his second NBA season, his first with Milwaukee. **Quincy Pondexter** was a 2010 first round pick and is playing for New Orleans. **Martell Webster**, who never played at UW but signed, is in his sixth season - his first with Minnesota.

BRESHERS RETIRED FROM HOOPS

Sophomore Tyreese Breshears, who the Huskies were counting on to help in the post this season, was forced to retire from playing basketball because of an undisclosed medical condition. The team will miss Breshears', a 6-7, 255-pound forward, inside presence. He played in 36 games as a redshirt freshman and averaged 3.0 points, 2.6 rebounds and blocked 26 shots.

CONNECT(ICUT) THE DOTS

Second-year assistant coach Raphael Chilliou was head coach at high school basketball powerhouse South Kent in Connecticut before joining the Husky staff (he worked for Nike previously). While at South Kent, he coached Huskies Isaiah Thomas and Matthew Bryan-Amaning. Chilliou coached nearly 40 players that advanced their careers and NCAA Division I schools and even coached three that are currently playing in the NBA - Josh Boone (New Jersey Nets), Dorrell Wright (Miami Heat) and Andray Blatche (Washington Wizards).

EXCELLENCE IN ACADEMICS

According to a 2010 finding, under the direction of Lorenzo Romar, UW is graduating its players. **Through 2010, of the 23 players recruited by Romar that did not transfer to another school, 19 of them have graduated.** US News and World Report originally ranked all schools participating in the NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament and the UW is the highest academically ranked public university (42nd) still standing. Here are some more facts about UW:

- It is one of the nation's top 50 universities and the premiere academic institution of the Northwest.
- Academic Ranking of World Universities ranked the university 16th best in the world.
- U.S. News and World Report ranks 20 of the university's graduate programs in the top 20.
- The university leads the nation in federal research funding, a position it has held since 1974. (\$1.15 billion in 2009)
- Kiplinger ranks the university seventh best in Best Public Colleges for Your Money.

Tremayne Johnson added 13 points for the Eagles, who simply couldn't keep up with the Huskies in the second half. Washington trailed 13-10 early before Overton entered and sparked a 10-0 burst, started by his 3-pointer.

Forcing turnovers and getting out on the break, Washington went on 21-4 run filled with one crowd-raising play after another, including consecutive 3-pointers by Wilcox and a no-look pass by Justin Holiday that led to a dunk for Darnell Gant. Thomas stepped in to cap it, knocking down a 3-pointer from the wing, then shaking his head at the crowd as ran back with the Huskies up 37-17. Dribbling into trouble and throwing wobbly passes on offense, the Cavaliers had eight turnovers in the first nine minutes and 12 in the first half. They were even worse on defense, allowing the Huskies to seemingly shoot wherever and whenever they wanted on defense. Washington shot 22-for-34, including 8-of-9 from 3-point range, getting 14 points from Thomas and 10 from Abdul Gaddy to lead 55-31. The Huskies didn't let up, pushing the lead over 40 points even after emptying the bench to rest up for the next day's showdown with the high-flying Wildcats.

A 4.7 earthquake centered on the Big Island shook courtside tables and chairs with about 6 minutes left, but play continued and few people in the gym seemed to notice. They were too busy watching the back-and-forth action. Kentucky (4-0) had an abysmal night from 3-point range - 3-for-17 - but smothered Washington on the perimeter defensively and came up with all the big plays down the stretch. Jones overcame a rough shooting night (4 for 13) with hard work, scrapping for rebounds and blocking four shots. Isaiah Thomas had 13 points on 3-of-11 shooting and Justin Holiday added 11 for Washington (3-1), which shot 38 percent and was 3 for 13 on 3-pointers after hitting 17 the night before. Thomas cut the lead to 69-67 with about a minute left, but Kentucky's Doron Lamb hit two free throws with 36 seconds left, while Jones and Darius Miller combined to hit 3 of 4 after that to seal the hard-fought win. Another of Kentucky's fabulous freshman stole the show early on. Wilcox shot an airball 3-pointer at the other end.

AP Recap: Matthew Bryan-Amaning and Terrence Ross scored 18 points each, and UW rallied to beat USC 73-67 in overtime in the Pac-10 opener for both teams. Ross, whose points were a career high, hit four 3-pointers before fouling out with 2:37 left in overtime. Bryan-Amaning added eight rebounds, and Justin Holiday scored 12 points for the Huskies (9-3). They outscored USC 18-12 in overtime, with Holiday accounting for their first five points. USC's Donte Smith tied it at 58 with a 3-pointer, but the Trojans trailed the rest of the way. UW extended its Pac-10 winning streak to eight games and won its school-record fifth straight road league game, both streaks dating to last season. The Huskies were backed by a large contingent of vocal fans who drove up from San Diego, where Washington plays in the Holiday Bowl on Thursday. Nikola Vucevic had a career-high 28 points - making all 14 of his free throws - and 14 rebounds for the Trojans (8-6), who had won two in a row. USC shot 34 percent from the floor and kept itself in the game from the free-throw line, hitting 24 of 32 attempts. Vucevic hit a 3-pointer that drew the Trojans to 54-53 with 1:27 to play. Bryan-Amaning made the first of two free throws to keep the Huskies ahead 55-53 before Vucevic got fouled and made both to tie the game at 55. Venoy Overton missed a 3-pointer with 44 seconds to go. Washington retained possession, but Isaiah Thomas missed a 3 with 7 seconds left to force overtime. Neither team led by more than five points in the second half. USC opened with a 12-5 run that extended its lead to 38-33. The Huskies took their first lead of the second half with a 13-8 spurt, capped by two free throws from Overton that made it 46-45.

Oregon used a variety of traps and zones in an attempt to confuse and slow down the Huskies on the offensive end. And for a while it worked. But Ross was simply too good. Known as a shooter, Ross was 3 of 7 on 3-pointers but was just as effective around the basket. Thomas came alive late, finishing with 20 points, including a breakaway dunk in the final two minutes, the first college dunk from the 5-foot-8 guard. He closed the night with a deep 3-pointer that gave the Huskies a 21-point lead. Thomas also added nine assists and six rebounds. Scott Suggs, who went scoreless last week in two games in Los Angeles, added 13 points, as did reigning Pac-10 player of the week Matthew Bryan-Amaning, who also grabbed eight rebounds.

Holiday finished with 15 points, including eight straight early in the second half after going 0 for 5 in the opening 20 minutes. Isaiah Thomas added 14 points and seven assists for the Huskies, who couldn't hold an 11-point lead with 8:55 left and had their six-game winning streak snapped. Stanford had lost the last six to the Huskies and seven of 10. All three Washington wins last season were by double digits. The cold-shooting Huskies had their Pac-10 winning streak snapped at 11 games, held to their lowest scoring total of the season and 36.2 percent shooting from the field.

The Huskies looked inspired and ready against the defending Pac-10 regular-season champions. Richard Solomon added 14 points for Cal, making all five of his shots. But the Bears were outrebounded 43-27 and gave up 17 fast break points. After Cal pulled to 23-22 on Emerson Murray's basket with 8:10 left in the first half, Washington responded with a 13-2 burst to build a 36-24 lead. Bryan-Amaning scored five straight during the run and the Huskies led 48-33 at halftime after shooting 53.1 percent and making 7 of 14 from 3-point range in the first half. Washington made eight of its first 12 shots to build a 19-11 lead.

Thomas finished with 19 points, eight assists and six rebounds for the Huskies (15-4, 7-1 Pac-10). Trent Lockett and Abbott both finished with 20 points for the Sun Devils (9-10, 1-6). Arizona State has dropped five straight conference games. Scott Suggs added 10 for Washington, including a key 3-pointer with 1:08 left that matched the Huskies' largest lead of eight. Abbott missed a deep 3-pointer on the Sun Devils' next possession and Justin Holiday made one of two free throws to put the Huskies up by nine. Thomas finished off another impressive all-around effort with a driving three-point play with 30 seconds to go. The Huskies are off to their best conference start since the 1986-87 season and will close out the first half of Pac-10 play next Sunday night at rival Washington State.

Reggie Moore added 18 points and five assists for WSU, which held UW to 37 percent shooting, and broke a four-game losing streak to its rival. Isaiah Thomas scored 19 points for Washington, which fell into a tie with Arizona for first in the Pac-10. Justin Holiday added 16 points for the Huskies. Matthew Bryan-Amaning, who came in averaging 16 points per game, was held to six points. Thompson, the leading scorer in the Pac-10, made 9 of 18 shots and added four assists and five steals for the Cougars. Faisal Aden scored 15, and the Cougars shot 48 percent. Leading by two at halftime, Washington State opened the second half with a 10-1 run, including a 3-pointer and spectacular alley-oop dunk by Moore, for a 55-44 lead. Washington missed its first five shots of the second half and did not make a field goal until Holiday's 3-pointer with 14:33 left. But the Huskies did make seven of eight free throws to close to 57-53 with 13 minutes left. Thompson hit a lay-up and 3-pointer as WSU built a 63-55 lead. Washington did not make its second field goal of the second half until Scott Suggs scored with 9:39 left, cutting WSU's lead to 66-60. The Huskies were 2 of 11 from the field in the second half at that point, but had made 12 of 13 free throws to stay close. Thomas, the third-leading scorer in the Pac-10, did not make his first field goal until just 6:13 was left in the game, a 3-pointer that cut WSU's lead to 75-69. Thompson replied with a basket and a 3-pointer for an 80-69 lead. But Thomas made another 3-pointer and a jumper to pull the Huskies within 80-74 with less than five minutes left. But they were scoreless for nearly four minutes.

Williams had 11 points by halftime. That helped open up the perimeter and the Wildcats knocked down 8 of 10 from 3-point range to lead 49-40. Then Arizona got careless. The Wildcats had seven turnovers the first 5 minutes as Washington chipped the lead down to 54-50. Thomas, after a relatively quiet first half, started to assert himself in the second, hitting a couple of shots and setting up three straight dunks with sweet passes in the lane. C.J. Wilcox also kept stroking in jumpers after scoring 11 in the first half and Bryan-Amaning got inside for hardworking baskets, his dunk on a pick-and-roll with Venoy Overton putting the Huskies up 72-68 with 7 1/2 minutes left.

The Redhawks responded with a pressure defense that forced Washington into nine first-half turnovers. Burrell and Carter powered the Seattle offense as the Redhawks managed to keep within reach. Carter's 3-pointer closed the lead to 28-23.

AP Recap: Klay Thompson overcame a sloppy first half to score 26 points, DeAngelo Casto added 20 on the inside and Washington State completed the season sweep of Washington with an 80-69 victory Sunday night. Thompson came up big against the Huskies for the second time after scoring 25 in an 87-80 win last month in Pullman that started Washington on a costly three-game skid. Now it was the Cougars (18-10, 8-8 Pac-10) ending Washington's hopes -- however slim -- of a Pac-10 regular-season title. It was equally impressive and stunning for the guys in crimson, who heard their pockets of fans chanting "Let's go, Cougars!" in the final minutes while those in purple quietly filed out. The same Washington State team that had stumbled at last-place Arizona State just eight days earlier became the first road team to win on Washington's home floor in more than a year, snapping the Huskies' 14-game home winning streak. The Cougars made this one ugly from the start, frustrating the Huskies at the defensive end and holding Washington to 17 points in the first half, the fewest in coach Lorenzo Romar's tenure at his alma mater. Washington State led by as many as 21 in the second half, then held off a furious Washington charge in the closing minutes. The Cougars were helped by hitting 32 of 36 free throws for the night, including 25 straight at one point. That performance at the free throw line came from a team shooting 69 percent for the season. Isaiah Thomas led the Huskies (19-9, 10-6) with 21 points but got little help otherwise. The Cougars nearly routed the Huskies, starting the second half on a 14-6 run capped by a five-point possession when Romar was given a technical foul after coming on the floor and stomping his foot in anger. Casto appeared to be fouled before turning to shoot but was given continuation. Thompson hit the two technical free throws and Casto finished the possession with his free throw to push the Cougars' lead to 15. After Thompson hit a 3-pointer on the next possession, Washington State led by 17.

AP Recap: C.J. Wilcox awakened Washington's slumbering offense, scoring all of his career-high 24 points in the second half, and Washington overcame an off night from leading scorer Isaiah Thomas to beat UCLA 70-63. Wilcox went to halftime scoreless, then carried the Huskies in the final 20 minutes. He hit his first two shots to start the second half and made 7 of 8 total in the second half, including four 3-pointers. Wilcox's 3-pointer with 4:55 left pulled Washington within 53-52 and was the start of a deciding seven-point blitz. Scott Suggs added a jumper in the lane, and Thomas tipped in his own miss with 3:35 left for a 56-53 lead. He missed his first nine shots. UCLA's Jerime Anderson tried to match Wilcox, hitting four 3-pointers and finished with 16 points, all in the second half. UCLA had won eight of nine, its only loss an overtime setback at California. As if Wilcox needed a caper to his night, he added a fall-away 19-footer while being fouled and with one second on the shot clock. The three-point play with 2:38 left gave the Huskies a six-point lead, and Thomas' breakaway layup moments later pushed the lead to 61-53. Thomas finished with nine points on 3-of-12 shooting, and Venoy Overton had 10 points off the bench. Washington won its seventh straight over UCLA in Seattle and swept the Bruins for just the third time in school history. Malcolm Lee added 13 points for the Bruins and freshman bruiser Joshua Smith had 12 points and 16 rebounds off the bench in his return to the Seattle area. Howland used UCLA's final timeout with 12:57 left after Wilcox scored five straight points and Washington moved in front 36-31. The redshirt freshman took only two shots in the first half but scored 15 of Washington's first 18 points to start the second half. UCLA led 53-49 after Anderson's fourth 3-pointer with 5:50 left, but Washington closed the game on a 21-10 run.

USC put Washington behind from the start, making its first six shots and leading by as many as 15 in the first half on Maurice Jones' flip shot in the lane. The Trojans led 36-26 at the break.

Wilcox had 16 points with five 3-pointers. Four of those came in the second half. Thompson had an extraordinary night in the losing effort. It was a performance worthy of the conference's leading scorer. Thompson set the Pac-10 single-game tournament scoring record with 43 points, including eight 3-pointers (also a tournament record). He also tied the Pac-10 record with 15 made field-goals.

AP Recap: Isaiah Thomas' step-back jumper at the buzzer in overtime ended the final men's basketball game in Pac-10 history at Staples Center in thrilling fashion, sending Washington to a 77-75 win over Arizona in the title game of the Pacific Life Pac-10 Tournament. Thomas, who also set the tournament record for assists in a three-game effort, scored nine of his points in the final seven minutes of the game. He finished with seven assists and played all 45 minutes. Terrence Ross, making just the third start of his career, finished with 16 points. Arizona led 36-31 at the half, but Washington stayed close thanks to Thomas, who had 19 at the half, the single-best half from a Huskies player this season.

AP Recap: Isaiah Thomas scored 19 points and helped break up a long pass in the final seconds that could have led to a tying 3-pointer. That helped the seventh-seeded Huskies hold off Georgia's late rally and beat the 10th-seeded Bulldogs 68-65 in the second round of the East regional. Scott Suggs added 10 points for the Huskies (24-10), who shot 43 percent and withstood a frantic final-minute push to win their fifth straight NCAA tournament opener and earn a spot opposite No. 2 seed North Carolina (27-7) in the third round. Trey Thompkins had 26 points and 11 rebounds for the Bulldogs (21-12), who trailed by 10 with 2 minutes left but made things interesting in the closing seconds. Thompkins hit a 3-pointer with 5.4 seconds remaining to make it 67-65 and Georgia fouled Wilcox with 3.7 seconds left. Wilcox made the first free throw but missed the second. Jeremy Price grabbed the rebound for the Bulldogs and flung the ball downcourt, and Thomas got a hand on the pass. Travis Leslie snatched it and hoisted an awkward 3 that bounced high off the glass after the buzzer. Leslie and Gerald Robinson each scored 12 points and Price added 11 for Georgia, which got no points from its bench. Neither team led by more than seven until early in the second half, when the Huskies finally managed to turn up the tempo against a Georgia team determined to slow things down. The Huskies appeared to pull away with a 17-5 run early in the second half and went up by double figures for the first time on Venoy Overton's drive through the lane that made it 45-35 with 12½ minutes left.

AP Recap: Tyler Zeller scored 23 points, Harrison Barnes added 22 and North Carolina survived a closing minute that included numerous questionable calls to beat Washington 86-83 in the East region. Rallying from deficits of 11 points in the first half and five in the second, the second-seeded Tar Heels (28-7) went ahead for good on Barnes' 3-pointer with 4:06 left. But they needed two free throws from Dexter Strickland and two defensive stops in the final second to advance to 11-seed Marquette in Newark, N.J. Terrence Ross scored 19 points and Matthew Bryan-Amaning added 14 for the seventh-seeded Huskies, who couldn't overcome a subpar game from star guard Isaiah Thomas and a hostile crowd to pull the upset. UW, nearly pulled off a dramatic comeback in a virtual road game. Washington got within 84-83 on Scott Suggs' 3-pointer with 17.3 seconds left before UNC's Kendall Marshall missed the front end of a 1-and-1 at the foul line. Venoy Overton then missed a runner in the lane, but the ball bounced off UNC and out of bounds with 7.4 seconds left. On the inbound play, John Henson knocked away Justin Holiday's pass under the basket and the ball landed in Strickland's hands, and he hit two free throws with 5.4 seconds left. Moments later, Overton launched a premature halfcourt shot with about 3 seconds remaining that fell well short. Instead of letting the errant shot go harmlessly out of bounds, Henson touched the ball on the way down to give the Huskies yet another chance. The Huskies inbounded the ball to Thomas, who unloaded a shot from the corner. Henson touched the ball just before it would have hit the rim and the Washington bench erupted for a goaltending call -- not that it would have mattered. It turned out Thomas had his foot on the 3-point line.
