**Washington:** Handled the placekicking duties for the Huskies from 1999-2002 ... ended his career as one of the top three kickers in UW history ... established himself as Washington's best long-distance kicker ... a two-time second-team All-Pac-10 selection ... ended his career with 61 field goals, the second most by a Husky, trailing only Jeff Jaeger's (1983-86) NCAA record total of 80 ... is fourth in Pac-10 history in scoring, with 363 career points (includes bowl games prior to 2003) ... among the top-25 in NCAA history in both career points and field goals made ... finished his career holding seven Husky kicking records ... his six career 50-plus yard field goals are a school record and his three during the 2002 season tied his own record ... kicked six of the 12 longest FGs in school history ... ranks second on UW's all-time scoring list with 331 points ... booted eight field goals in bowl games during his career ... signed a free agent contract with the Chicago Bears following the 2003 NFL draft ... a four-time letterwinner. **2002:** Served as the Huskies' kicker (on PAT/field goal and kick-offs) in every game ... named second-team All-Pac-10 ... connected on 22 of 34 field goals for the season ... 22 field goals tied for Pac-10 lead ... ranked seventh in the nation with 1.69 field goals per game ... finished 27th in the nation in scoring at 8.31 points per game ... tied Pac-10 records for field goals made in a conference game with five against Washington State and for field goals attempted in a game with eight against the Cougars ... three 50-plus yard field goal tied his own single-season UW record ... had 52-yarders vs. Arizona and Oregon State and a 51-yarder vs. Cal ... the 52-yard FG was third-longest in the Pac-10 in 2002 ... named the Pac-10 player of the week after the triple-overtime Apple Cup win over Washington State, when he hit a career-high five field goals in eight tries ... missed his first three, then made one in the third quarter, one with 15 seconds left in regulation to tie it and one in each of the three overtime periods ... also had a four field goal game vs. California ... named a coaches' special teams player of the game after wins over San Jose State and Washington State ... had one field goal in the Sun Bowl to extend his streak to four consecutive postseason games with a field goal ... named a KJR 950-AM Special Teams MVP at the postseason awards banquet ... named to the Groza Award watch list ... scheduled to play in the Gridiron Classic, but leg injury during practice sidelined him for the game. **2001:** A second-team All-Pac-10 selection at kicker ... was third in the conference in field goals per game with 1.27 ... was the Pac-10's fifth-leading scorer at 6.9 points per game ... made 14 of 22 field goal attempts in 2001, improving to 39-for-57 (.684) for his career ... career field-goal percentage ranks fifth on the Huskies' all-time list ... was 3-for-5 on field goals longer than 40 yards, including a season-best 47-yarder at Oregon State ... set Huskies' and Holiday Bowl records with three field goals in 47-43 loss to Texas ... booted Washington's first walk-off field goal in 21 years in Huskies' victory over USC ... 32-yarder was first game-ender since Chuck Nelson nailed a game-winner with no time left on Oct. 18, 1980 to beat Stanford, 27-24 ... earned UW and Pac-10 Special Teams Player of the Week honors for his effort ... won second Pac-10 Special Teams Player of the Week honor when he repeated the feat three weeks later, hitting a 30-yarder on the game's final play to beat Arizona State 33-31 ... tied Pac-10 season-highs for field goal attempts and conversions with a 3-for-4 day in Huskies' 23-18 win over Michigan ... a preseason candidate for the Lou Groza Award, given to the nation's top collegiate kicker ... chosen as the "Most Feared Leg in the Pac-10" by The Sporting News. **2000:** Made 12 of 17 field goals, improving to 25 of 35 (.714) in his career ... finished third in the Pac-10 in total scoring with 74 points, trailing only OSU tailback Ken Simonton (110) and Beavers kicker Ryan Cesca (85) ... career field-goal total of 25 is sixth-highest all-time at UW ... 42 PAT attempts were fourth-most in a single-season by a Husky kicker all-time ... became the first Husky to lead the team in scoring in consecutive seasons since kicker John McCallum in 1988-89 ... after missing first two attempts of the season, made 14 of his last 17 (.824) and nine of his last 10, including the Rose Bowl ... was perfect on two field goal attempts in Huskies' 34-24 Rose Bowl win, nailing kicks from 47 and 42 yards ... 47-yarder was a season-long, and equaled the UW bowl record, set by Anderson in the 1999 Holiday Bowl ... earned weekly special teams MVP honor for performance against Colorado, in which he kicked a 22-yard field goal and was a perfect 2-for-2 in PATs ... against Arizona, was perfect in two field goals and three extra points, and booted four kickoffs into the end zone



to again earn special teams MVP honors ... made three of four field goals against California, including a season-best 42-yarder ... three field goals made at Cal tied for second-highest single-game total in the conference ... for his career, is 8-for-10 (.800) from inside 30 yards, 8-for-11 (.727) from 30-39 yards, 9-for-14 (.643) from 40 yards or more, and 3-for-4 from 50 or more ... along with Pope John Paul II High School teammate Rich Alexis (Boynton Beach, Fla.), became the highest-scoring HS tandem in school history, with 128 points scored. **1999:** Handled the placekicking duties all season ... named a first-team pick to The Sporting News' Freshman All-America squad ... named to All-Pac-10 teams selected by The Seattle Post-Intelligencer, the Tacoma News-Tribune and The Football News ... took over the kickoff duties starting with the California game ... selected as the Pac-10's Special Teams Player of the Week for his performances vs. Stanford and UCLA ... was one of only two kickers to receive the honor during the season ... kicked field goals of 49, 40 and 40 yards vs. Stanford ... had 50 and 56-yard field goals against UCLA to become the first Husky kicker to boot two 50-yarders in a single game ... tied the Washington record with his 56-yarder at UCLA ... was the longest kick in school history without the aid of a kicking tee ... earned Chevrolet Player of the Game honors for kicking effort vs. UCLA ... had his first 50-yarder earlier in the season against Oregon, UW's first since 1983 ... was first Husky kicker in history to boot three 50-yard field goals in a single season ... including Anderson's three 50-yarders in 1999, just nine have been kicked in school history ... finished the season with 13 field goals in 18 tries ... set a UW bowl record for longest kick with a 47-yard field goal vs. Kansas State in the Holiday Bowl ... tied school mark with two FGs in first bowl appearance ... honored as the recipient of the Travis Spring Outstanding Freshman Award at the annual team banquet ... ranked second in the Pac-10 among kickers for points scored with 73 ... only Stanford's Mike Biselli had more points (91) ... his 13 field goals tied as the second highest total in the Pac-10 ... also tied for second in the Pac-10 with 18 field goal attempts ... his 56-yard field goal vs. UCLA was the longest by a Pac-10 kicker in 1999 ... attempted at least one field goal in every game except the BYU game ... ended the season by making nine of his 11 field goal attempts ... had two FG attempts blocked.

Parade All-American ... named the winner of the Lou Groza High School Kicker of the Year Award ... PrepStar All-American ... rated the No. 6 kicker in the nation by The Sporting News ... a 3A All-State selection as a senior ... named to the Orlando Sentinel's All-Florida Team ... named to Student Sports All-America team ... rated No. 1 kicker in Florida by Florida Times-Union ... named to Times-Union "Super 75" Team ... only kicker included on the list ... rated No. 3 kicker in Southeast Region by PrepStar ... was a first-team all-conference selection his last two years ... first-team All-District selection each of his last two years ... first-team all-state selection junior and senior seasons ... four-year letterwinner ... made 9-of-11 field goal attempts and averaged 42 yards per punt as a junior ... converted 12-of-16 field goal attempts in 1998, including a 51-yarder ... averaged 46.5 yards per punt as a senior to lead the state in that category ... 81 percent of kickoffs were touchbacks ... selected to play as punter and kicker in Florida vs. Georgia All-Star Game ... tabbed as punter/kicker in Outback Steakhouse All-Star Game ... lettered on high school golf team as a freshman and sophomore ... a marketing and management major.

**Washington:** Multi-purpose player who started his career as a tailback and then switched to wide receiver ... also used as a kick returner ... owns school record with 100-yard kickoff return he had as a freshman vs.

Air Force in 1999 ... finished his career with 2,210 all-purpose yards ... a four-time letterwinner ... signed a free agent contract with Indianapolis following the 2003 NFL Draft. **2002:** Served as a team captain during the 2002 season ... started 11 of the Huskies' 13 games at wide receiver ... an honorable mention All-Pac-10 selection ... finished the year with 517 yards and five touchdowns on 37 receptions ... 37 catches were fifth on the team and 517 yards were fourth ... helped the Husky passing game rank fourth in the NCAA at 346.2 yards per game ... top day was vs. UCLA, when he made five receptions for 148 yards, including a 66-yard TD reception in the fourth quarter that drew the Huskies within three points ... caught six passes for 92 yards and a score in the Wyoming win ... made five receptions for 83 yards vs. Cal ... scored TDs vs. USC and Arizona State and had a big fourth-quarter TD vs. Washington State that narrowed the WSU lead to 20-17 (UW tied the game and won in overtime) ... earned a Coaches' Award at the team's postseason banquet. **2001:** Emerged as one of the conference's top receivers after moving from tailback in the spring of 2001 ... earned All-Pac-10 honorable mention ... helped Washington's passing attack rank second in the Pac-10 at 279.5 yards per game, nearly 100 yards per game more than in 2000 ... averaged 3.9 receptions and 59 receiving yards per game ... one of just two Husky receivers, along with freshman

Reggie Williams, to have at least one catch in every game ... started eight games at wide receiver ... one of three Husky receivers to finish the season with more than 30 receptions, the first time that has happened at Washington since 1989 ... caught the Huskies' first three passing TDs of the season ... against Cal, managed five catches for 116 yards and two touchdowns ... earned coaches' award as offensive MVP for his efforts ... grabbed a 78-yard touchdown reception in Huskies' win over Arizona, the eighth-longest catch in school history ... finished with a career-high 138 receiving yards against the Wildcats, the most by a Husky since Andre DeSautters' 167-yard day against Oregon State in 1998 ... in his career, has scored touchdowns running, receiving, and returning kickoffs. **2000:** Played in first 19 games of UW career before missing last four games, and the Rose Bowl, with a back problem ... averaged over 5.0 yards-per-carry for the second-consecutive season ... started first six games for Husky offense that ranked first in the conference and 16th in the nation with 211.7 rush yards per game ... made first-career start in season-opener against Idaho, carrying eight times for 46 yards and a score ... earned both Huskies' and Pac-10 Offensive Player of the Week honors after racking up 167 total yards (102 rushing, 65 receiving) in Huskies' 33-30 win over Oregon State ... one of four Husky tailbacks to earn the Pac-10 honor during the 2000 season ... also named the Columbia Bank/KOMO Radio Player of the Game for that game ... seven receptions and 65 yards receiving vs. Oregon State were both career-highs. **1999:** Did not start but appeared in all 11 games plus the Holiday Bowl ... selected as the Pac-10 Special Teams Player of the Week for his play against Air Force ... finished the season strong with 126 yards on 14 carries vs. Washington State ... turned in UW's longest rush of the season when he ran 80 yards for a score vs. Washington State ... that was the longest rush by a Husky since Rashaan Shehee cut loose for an 85-yard TD run vs. Washington State in 1995 ... finished 19th in the nation with a kickoff return average of 24.86 yards per runback ... figured fourth in the Pac-10 in kickoff return average ... set a UW record with a 100-yard kickoff return for a score against Air Force ... he was one of two Pac-10 players to run a kickoff back 100 yards for a score during the season ... Cal's Delta O'Neal also accomplished the feat vs. Stanford ... finished as one of four Pac-10 players to run a kickoff back for a touchdown during the season ... had 14 kickoff returns to top the team in that statistic ... his 80-yard run vs. WSU tied for the second longest in the Pac-10 in 1999 ... carried the ball at least once in every game except against California ... had a 27-yard TD run at Arizona ... rushed five times for 27 yards vs. Kansas State in the Holiday Bowl.

**Beaverton High School/City College of San Francisco**



**Washington:** Transferred to Washington for his junior and senior seasons from City College of San Francisco ... originally enrolled at Colorado in 1998 ... earned two letters as a Husky ... was the backup to Cody Pickett during his UW career. **2002:** Played in five games (but threw a pass in only three) as the Huskies' No. 2 quarterback ... went 3-for-3 for 32 yards in backup duty vs. Wyoming ... 4-for-4 for 11 yards late in the USC game ... also appeared in the Idaho, San Jose State and Oregon games. **2001:** Spent the majority of the season as the backup to sophomore Cody Pickett at quarterback ... transferred to Washington from City College of San Francisco in the spring of 2001 with outside linebacker Kai Ellis ... contributed to Washington's dangerous passing attack, which ranked second in the conference with 279.5 yards per game ... threw Huskies' first touchdown pass of the season, a 14-yard toss to Paul Arnold, in win over Idaho ... saw first significant action against USC, after Pickett left in the second quarter with a separated shoulder ... overcame early jitters to lead Huskies to a come-from-behind victory, completing 11-of-20 passes for 197 yards and two touchdowns ... was Huskies' offensive MVP against the Trojans ... made first-career start the following week in 31-13 loss at UCLA ... despite constant pressure from the Bruins defense, completed 22-of-44 passes 316 yards, one touchdown and just one interception against the Bruins' third-ranked pass defense ... yardage total was the single-game best by a Husky since Brock Huard threw for 318 in the 1998 season-opener ... suffered a sprained foot and concussion in the game that kept him out of action the following week vs. Arizona, in which Pickett returned from his shoulder injury ... saw only remaining action in Huskies' loss at No. 1 Miami, completing three of seven passes for 37 yards and an interception.

**City College of San Francisco: 2000:** The nation's top-ranked junior college player in SuperPrep, just ahead of City College of San Francisco teammates and fellow Husky newcomers Francisco Tipoti and Kai Ellis ... named Offensive MVP of the 2000 JC Grid-Wire National Championship game, completing 22-of-37 passes for 281 yards and three TDs in CCSF's 31-13 win over Bakersfield ... led the Rams to an unprecedented second-consecutive national championship ... started six games in 2000, completing 62.5 percent of his passes for 2,059 yards and 24 touchdowns, an average of 343 yards and four TDs per game ... held a passer rating of 208.6 in 2000 ... merited four of a possible five stars from Rivals.com.

**University of Colorado: 1999:** Appeared in two games for the Buffaloes as a redshirt freshman, completing three passes ... transferred to City College of San Francisco in the spring of 2000. **1998:** Redshirted the season.

**High School and Personal:** Born Oct. 3, 1979 in Portland, Ore. ... parents are Heather and Greg ... father played football at Tulsa University and with the NFL's Detroit Lions ... has four siblings, Larrie, Tiffany, Brittany and Janelle ... led the nation with 4,046 passing yards and 56 touchdowns as a senior at Beaverton High School in 1997 ... touchdown total was an Oregon state record ... was the 1997 Gatorade State Player of the Year ... an honorable mention selection to USA Today's high school All-America team ... led Beavers to a 23-3 record in his final two prep seasons ... as a junior, tallied 2,600 yards and 26 touchdowns passing ... coached in high school by Faustin Riley ... also excelled in basketball, earning first-team all-league and honorable mention all-state accolades for Beaverton's 1998 state championship hoops squad ... majored in sociology.

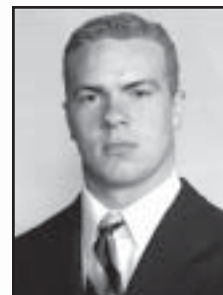
