The Story of Husky Football is Built on Dominant Teams, a Winning Tradition and Passion

The Washington football program is one of the most successful in the nation. Need some proof? Consider one of the most impressive streaks in college football: Washington has won a conference title and made a trip to the Rose Bowl in each of the last nine decades. No other Pac-10 school can claim a streak as long as the Huskies'.

Washington made Rose Bowl trips in 1923 and 1925, and won the 1936 title to cover those decades. In the 40's, Washington earned the trip in 1943 and then barely made it in the 50's when it won the 1959 title. The Huskies earned two Rose Bowl berths in the 1960s – 1960 and 1963 – and one in the 1970s (1977). Titles in 1980 and 1981 did it for that decade and three straight trips to begin the 1990s covered that 10-year span. Washington extended the streak in 2000 by winning the Pac-10 and defeating Purdue in the Rose Bowl.

The latest Rose Bowl appearance was the 14th by a Washington team. The Huskies have now made 29 all-time bowl appearances.

After dominant performances in the decades of the 80's and 90's, the Huskies show no signs of slowing in the new millennium.

Washington's 2000 team went 11-1, finishing third in both major college football polls. The Huskies defeated the Big Ten champion (Purdue) in the Rose Bowl, beat the Big East and Sugar Bowl champion (Miami) and handed the Fiesta Bowl champion (Oregon State), its only loss. Washington played its1,000th game in 2000, only the 39th Division I program to hit that mark.

Last season saw the Huskies post their 26th-consecutive winning season and appear in their eighth-consecutive bowl game. After the season the Washington program was recognized by the America Football Coaches Assocation for its graduation rate of higher than 70 percent. The Huskies were the only Pac-10 team honored by the AFCA.

The 2002 season also marked the 13th time in the past 14 years that Washingtonled the Pac-10 in attendance, despite having just the sixth-largest stadium capacity in the conference.

With four Pac-10 titles, three Rose Bowl appearances and a national championship, Washington established itself as the pre-eminent college football program in the west during the decade of the '90s. The Huskies won Pac-10 championships outright in 1990 and 1991 and shared the crown in 1992 and 1995. Twice the team turned in second-place finishes.

Washington's 82-35-1 record (.700) in the 1990's ranked 15th among Division I-A programs and led all Pac-10 schools. Washington's 58-21-1 league record between 1990 and 1999 was the best in the Pac-10.

The Huskies made eight bowl appearances in the 1990s, the most among Pac-10 schools.

Husky players received numerous awards in the '90s. Steve Emtman was named the Lombardi and Outland Trophy winner in 1991 and went on to be the top pick in the NFL draft. Four Huskies — Emtman, Mario Bailey, Lincoln Kennedy and Lawyer Milloy — were unanimous All-America selections. A total of 12 Washington players were named to at least one first-team All-America squad. Washington's 44 first-team All-Pac-10 selections was the most among any league school.

This decade figures to produce a whole new crop of Husky stars. Already 16 players have earned first- or second-team all-conference honors.

Quarterback Marques Tuiasosopo joined the list of Husky greats in 2000 when he led UW to its Rose Bowl win. He was named the Pac-10 Offensive Player of the Year and the Pop Warner Award winner as the West Coast's top player.

Over the past two seasons, five UW players have earned freshman All-America honors, including wide receiver Reggie Williams, who was the conference freshman of the year in 2001.



Gil Dobie, Jim Owens and Don James combined for a 310-136-11 record during their UW coaching careers.

During the 1990s Greg Lewis, Steve Emtman (twice), Mario Bailey, Dave Hoffmann, Napoleon Kaufman and Jason Chorak all earned Pac-10 Player of the Year honors. Offensive guard Chad Ward won the Morris Trophy as the league's top offensive lineman in 2000. He became the eighth Husky since 1990 to be honored with the award.

Teams from the NFL have drafted 63 Huskies since 1990, including seven first-round picks. In 1998 the Huskies led all college teams with 10 draft selections. In 1995, Washington had six former quarterbacks on NFL rosters, the most of any college team.

Washington players have continued another trend this decade by reaping several academic honors. Tuiasosopo was awarded a NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship – one of just four Division I players to receive the grant – and, in 2001, center Kyle Benn was named a regional Academic All-American, the 17th Husky so honored since 1990.

In 1999 the Huskies became the 16th team to record 600 all-time victories. Washington's all-time winning percentage of .640 is the 13th-best mark among active programs. The Huskies' success, however, is certainly not limited to the decade of the '90s.

The Washington program has a rich history that can be traced back to a strong founding father – a trait common to many of today's top college programs.

What would Michigan have been without Fielding Yost? Imagine Notre Dame if Knute Rockne had actually decided to pursue chemistry instead of the backfield shift. Where would USC be without Howard Jones? The list goes on.

It takes more than a legendary coach to foster success. Outstanding players, dramatic victories, a pinch of luck and the ability to overcome adversity all fit into the formula

The success of Washington's football program can be traced back to one man — Gil Dobie. In the history of sports, Dobie accomplished something at Washington that is truly astonishing. During his nine-year stint as the head coach, Dobie never lost a game. Three times opponents managed to tie the Sun Dodgers (as the Huskies were known at the time), but no team ever pinned a loss on one of Dobie's squads. Washington's teams of that era ran off a streak of 63 games without tasting defeat, a record that still stands in the NCAA record books as the longest all-time unbeaten streak. It is hard to imagine it will ever be surpassed.

Dobie established a tradition that kept rolling for the next three decades. Between the time he headed up the program in 1908, until 1941, the Huskies produced a 194-68-18 record — a winning percentage of .725.







It took a World War to slow down Washington's success on the football field. From 1942 to 1956 the Huskies could only manage a 65-68-7 (.489) record and never won the Pacific Coast Conference Championship.

However, winning is only one part of Washington's football tradition. There have been many colorful characters and eventful games played since the first contest on Nov. 28, 1889, at 2:30 in the afternoon before 400 spectators at the old Jackson Street Park.


By 1903 Washington had won its first Pacific Coast Championship and, the following season, the team began to draw the attention of the traditional football powers.

In a showdown with California, the best West Coast team at the time, the Golden Bears made the suggestion to shorten the periods to make it easier on Washington. That thought only served to motivate the Huskies to a 6-6 tie. While not a victory, it served notice another school was ready to join the elite programs of the time.

Prior to the 1920s, college football's top teams were principally located along the Eastern Seaboard. But it was during the roaring '20s that stars began to emerge in the nation's heartland and on the West Coast. Knute Rockne built Notre Dame into a national juggernaut. Red Grange was a sensation at Illinois, and Stanford had a standout running back named Ernie Nevers. Washington was also producing its first superstar - George Wilson.

Without an outpouring of national attention, Wilson was selected to the same All-America backfield as Grange and Nevers in 1925. It was a sportswriter named Grantland Rice who took notice of Wilson and selected him to the same Collier's Magazine squad as the "more-heralded" players.

Trojans. He also guided the Huskies to Washington's first Rose Bowl appearance, and led the UW to a 13-0 win against Nevers and Stanford in 1925 before a record crowd of 35,000.

Wilson was the first in a long line of outstanding Washington players. Take a look at today's NFL rosters and you'll find only a handful of schools that have produced more professional players. Through the years, Washington's rosters have been littered with All-Americans, All-Coast performers and All-Pac-10 picks.



Hugh Millen, Chris Chandler, Cary Conklin and Mark Brunell have in common? They are all former Husky signal callers who went on to excel in the NFL.

Then there's the legends like Don Heinrich and Sonny Sixkiller — players who captivated an entire region of the country with their Saturday afternoon exploits.

Great games? Washington has played in plenty. There have been 29 bowl game appearances over the years, including 14 in Don James' 18-year tenure at Washington. The Huskies have made 14 showings in the "Grand Daddy of Them All" — the Rose Bowl.

The 1960 affair in Pasadena is considered a major turning point in Washington's history. Resurrected under Jim Owens' supervision, Washington's "Purple Gang" won the league title and the unenviable task of facing sixth-ranked Wisconsin in the Rose Bowl. Considered underdogs, the Huskies pinned a 44-8 thrashing on the Badgers. That victory also signaled a switch from the Big Ten's dominance at the annual event.

A decade later an untested sophomore named Sixkiller guided Washington to a surprisingly easy 42-16 victory against Michigan State and went on to etch his name in the Huskies' record books and into the hearts of the fans.

Warren Moon was on hand when the Huskies did the impossible, rallying from a 27-14 deficit with 3:01 to play and Washington State on the doorstep of Washington's endzone to steal a victory in the alwaysexciting Apple Cup series.

Then, as a senior, Moon led Washington to its first Rose Bowl win in 14 years, again beating the Wolverines.

And who could forget Steve Pelluer hitting eight consecutive passes to rally Washington from 14 points down in the fourth quarter to defeat Michigan 25-24 in 1983 at Husky Stadium? One game Husky fans will never forget is the memorable 1985 Orange Bowl, when Washington benefited from a penalty as a result of Oklahoma's Sooner Schooner Conestoga wagon

appearing on the field prematurely. The Huskies turned the game around with 14 straight points and a 28-17 victory.

Fans on hand to see Washington's fired-up defense blank USC 31-0 in 1990 will always remember the fever pitch of Husky football that fateful Saturday afternoon in Seattle, the warmest day the Huskies have had for a home game since World War II.

Then there is the entire 1991 season. That year Washington fielded one of the greatest teams in the history of West Coast football. The Huskies went 12-0 and were named national champions.

In 1992, the Huskies ran a winning streak to 22 games and established a school-record 17-game Husky Stadium winning streak in the process.

Speaking of streaks, consider this: Washington has not had a losing season in 26 years. That type of consistent effort on the field has been a trademark of Husky football teams.

Washington football has another unique element — Husky Stadium. Where else in the country can you boat to a game and have your tailgate party near the shores of Union Bay. Fans can sit in a stadium seat and view Seattle's skyline, Lake Washington or Mt. Rainier.

With a capacity of 72,500, Husky Stadium is also one of the loudest arenas in the nation. Nearly 70 percent of the seats in the dual-deck structure are located between the endzones. Just how intimidating can it be for an opponent? An ESPN sideline crew registered crowd noise readings of 135 decibels during the 1992 Nebraska game.

Washington's football program has come a long way since its early playing days on the rocky confines of Denny Field. The Husky program is steeped in tradition and history, colorful figures and courageous exploits. None of it has come easy, but thanks to the dedication of the young men who have donned a Washington uniform, Husky football has become a special part of America's favorite fall pastime.

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

Media Information and Policies

Fall Practice

Fall practice begins Wednesday, Aug. 6 when freshmen and newcomers report. The team will workout at Husky Stadium Aug. 6-9 before moving to Evergreen State College Aug. 10-16. The team's annual Picture Day will take place at 1 p.m. on Aug. 9 at Husky Stadium. Practices will tentatively be held twice a day for the first two weeks at 8:45 a.m. and 4:15 p.m. Regular-season practice time is 3:00 p.m. Monday through Friday (Sunday off). Media should contact the UW Media Relations Office for specific practice attendance policies. Video is restricted to the first 30 minutes of practice. Out-of-town media should contact media relations director Jim Daves about access. Media practice passes must be obtained from the Media Relations Office, Room 229, Graves Building.

Interview Policy

Contact the Media Relations Office for **ALL** interview requests. It is very helpful to have 24 hours notice so that the media relations staff will have ample time to make arrangements with players and coaches. Student-athletes are typically available before or after practice Sunday through Wednesday on a first-come, first-served basis. Student-athletes will be available on a limited, by-appointment basis on Thursdays. Athletes are not available for interviews on Friday or on Saturday prior to a game. The Washington head coach will conduct interviews with electronic media during the prepractice period and speak with beat reporters immediately following practice.

Press Credentials

All credentials should be requested from Media Relations Director Jim Daves in writing. Requests should be made at least one week prior to the game. Credentials will be mailed if time permits. Credentials are generally mailed to the opponent SID the week before the game to distribute to visiting media covering the game. Credentials not mailed will be available on gameday from 9 a.m. until noon (for a 12:30 game) in the lobby of the Graves Building. After noon they will be left at Will Call at the west side of the stadium. Visiting media should make requests through the visiting Sports Information Director.



Parking

Limited press parking is located in areas designated N-24, E-11, S-1 and C-21. The E-11 lot is located on the northwest perimeter of the stadium. The C-21 lot is an underground garage located due west from Husky Stadium, directly across Montlake Boulevard. Parking passes should be requested through the Media Relations Office. Visiting media should make parking requests through the visiting Sports Information Director.

Photographers

Photo passes are available for accredited news media. They should be ordered in the same manner as press credentials. Visiting media should make requests through the visiting Sports Information Director. Photographers may work from the

sidelines in accordance with NCAA rules. In no case may a photographer shoot from in front of either team's bench. No tripods are allowed on the field. Passes should be worn in plain sight. Armbands must be picked up prior to kickoff by showing a photo credential at the table located in the west end zone. Failure to adhere to these regulations, or any interference with play, is reason for expulsion. A work area will be available at Husky Stadium for digital photographers. A box lunch will be served to photographers during halftime at the credential table in the west end zone. Freelance photographers will be subject to University licensing regulations for any images portraying Washington student-athletes and registered trademarks.

Press Box Elevator

The press box elevator is located on the lower level of the south side of Husky Stadium. The elevator is used by members of both teams' coaching staffs, media representatives and a limited amount of fans who require an elevator pass. Only accredited media will be allowed access to the elevator and press box. Please arrive at least 90 minutes before kickoff to assure your arrival at the press area well before game time. Media members **do not** have priority elevator use, so be sure to arrive early.

Services

Quarterly play-by-play accounts, computerized halftime and final statistics, scoring summaries and coaches' quotes will be distributed in the press box, in the postgame interview area and in the Don James Center media workroom following the end of the game. Play-by-play information, statistics, injury updates, etc., will be reported over the internal press box public address system. A food service will be provided prior to kickoff and at halftime.

Telephones

The Media Relations Department has two telephone lines installed in the press box (543-2230 and 543-2231). These lines are intended for Media Relations use only. If media members require telephones, please call Pat Jones of the University of Washington Telecommunications Department at (206) 543-0133. The Telecommunications Department will arrange to install phone lines at your expense.

Husky Stadium

Husky Stadium is located five miles north of downtown Seattle and approximately 30 minutes north of Sea-Tac Airport. To get to the stadium from downtown Seattle, take I-5 North and take the 520 East (Bellevue/Kirkland) Exit. Take the Montlake Exit and turn left at the stoplight. Husky Stadium is located off Montlake Boulevard, on the right side of the street. Traffic conditions can become congested prior to gametime and media are advised to arrive at Husky Stadium early.

Professional Football Scout Tickets

Professional football scouts should contact the Husky Media Relations Office (543-2230) to purchase tickets for scouting purposes. Press passes will be issued if space is available in the press box.

Postgame Interviews

The elevator will leave the press box level at both the eight and four-minute marks in the fourth quarter for all members of the media wishing to go to the interview area. The elevator will leave again immediately following the end of the game. Media Relations personnel will escort the media to the interview room (assembly room, stadium tunnel) and will bring athletes to the interview room by request. The visiting Sports Information Director determines postgame interview procedure for the visiting locker room. The Media Workroom in Bank of America Arena at Hec Edmundson Pavilion will be used for visiting team interviews.

Event Management Assistance

Television crews who visit Husky Stadium will be assisted by the **Event Management** staff for parking locations, power and other logistical needs. Scott Baebler or Larry White can be reached in the Event Management office by calling (206) 543-2246.

Washington's weekly football press luncheons are held in the Don James Center at Husky Stadium. Access is available by stairs or the elevator on stadium's north side. The Don James Center is located on the second floor. Head coach Rick Neuheisel addresses the media first. Husky players are available for interviews during lunch.

Postgame Media Work Area

Media members may work in the press box following games, but are encouraged to use the Don James Center (2nd level, north stands) for filing purposes. The Don James Center is enclosed with plenty of work space, phones to use for filing, restroom facilities and soft drinks. Final statistics and coach and player quotes will be available in the work area.

Mondays with the Head Coach

Washington's head coach holds a press conference each Monday at noon during the season in the Don James Center, beginning Monday, Aug. 25. Every attempt will be made to have the opposing coach available via teleconference hookup prior to the UW head coaches' comments. All members of the media are invited to attend these weekly conferences. The press conference can also be accessed by teleconference. Call the media relations office to acquire the phone number for the teleconference.

NCAA Guidelines and the Media

Media members should be aware of several NCAA rules that apply to studentathletes. If there is ever a question if any media-related activity or event including a Washington student-athlete could be a possible NCAA violation, contact sports information director Jim Daves for an interpretation. Areas of concern include:

- Coaches and University officials cannot make comments on prospective student-athletes until they sign a national letter of intent. A coach cannot comment on a prospective student-athlete who verbally commits to an institution.
- Coaches and athletic staff are not permitted to write guest columns for publications.
- Do not ask student-athletes to list or endorse products.
- Photographers cannot provide student-athletes with photographs or slides. The media relations office offers a similar service for student-athletes to purchase photographs.
- Student-athletes may not be used in advertisements or endorsements of products, including media-related publications.
- Student-athletes are not permitted to conduct interviews for 1-900 services.
- Establishing an Internet site in and of itself does not categorize an individual as a media entity. Therefore, individuals who establish Internet sites independent of the institution continue to be subject to all applicable restrictions related to contacting prospects for a recruiting purpose.


- 1. Follow the signs to Seattle.

- 3. Travel 1/4 mile and take the Montlake Boulevard exit.
- 4. At the end of the off ramp there is a stop light at Montlake Boulevard. Turn left.
- 5. Travel across the Montlake Bridge. You will see Husky Stadium on the right.
- Husky Stadium on the right.
 6. To access E-10 or E-11 parking lots, turn right into main stadium lot.
- 7. To access C-21 Parking (underground garage), turn left onto Pacific and make your first right. The garage is on your right.
- 8. To access the N-24 parking lot, continue on Montlake past Husky Stadium. Go 1/2 mile to the visitors entrance on your left. Follow the directional signs.

From Hwy. 405 going North or South

- 1. From Hwy. 405 take the Freeway 520 exit toward Seattle. This leads you onto the Evergreen Point Floating Bridge heading west.
- 2. Once across the bridge, take the Montlake Boulevard exit. Turn right.
- 3. Travel across the Montlake Bridge. You will see Husky Stadium on the right.
- 4. To access E-10 or E-11 parking lots, turn right into main stadium lot.
- 5. To access C-21 Parking (underground garage), turn left onto Pacific and make your first right. The garage is on your right.
- 6. To access the N-24 parking lot, continue on Montlake past Husky Stadium. Go 1/2 mile to the visitors entrance on your left. Follow the directional signs.



Husky Radio Network

The 2003 season marks the second year of the Husky Sports Network. Action Sports Media along with its partner, The Sporting News Radio Network, aquired the radio broadcast rights to Husky athletics in 2002. The five-year agreement provides the Huskies with wider coverage across the west coast. Washington becomes the first college athletic program to assign its radio rights to ASM.

Seattle all-sports radio station KJR 950-AM serves as the flagship station for the Husky Radio Network. Gameday coverage for UW football features 11 hours of preand post-game coverage. Also, a weekly show featuring Washington's head coach will air on Mondays at 5 p.m. on network stations.

While the Huskies' broadcasting relationship with ASM is just in its second year, there will be an
