WASHINGTON vs. WASHINGTON STATE UW Closes Out 2004 Season With Apple Cup In Pullman

THE GAME: The Washington football team (1-9 overall, 0-6 in the Pac-10 Conference) closes out the 2004 season with its traditional rivalry game – the Apple Cup vs. Washington State. Saturday's game, Nov. 20 at 4:00 p.m. PST, will take place at Martin Stadium in Pullman and will air live on ABC-TV to a regional audience (see page two for more on TV coverage). Neither the Huskies or the Cougars (4-5 overall, 2-5 Pac-10) can earn a bowl-game berth this season. In fact, this is the first Apple Cup since 1976 in which both teams entered the game with losing records. That year, a 4-6 (going into the game) Husky team beat a 3-7 Cougar club, 51-32, in a game played in Spokane. Saturday's game is also the Huskies' final contest under head coach Keith Gilbertson, who will step down from his post following the season. The Huskies have won six consecutive Apple Cups, dating back to a loss in 1997, and eight of the last nine.

HUSKIES vs. COUGARS HISTORY: The Washington-Washington State series dates back to 1900, when the teams played to a 5-5 tie in Seattle, but only since 1962 has the winner been awarded the Apple Cup trophy. Prior to the institution of the Apple Cup trophy, the winner of the Washington-WSU game was awarded the Governor's Trophy from 1934 to 1961. Washington holds a commanding 63-27-6 edge in the 96-game series, including a 31-10 record in Apple Cup games. The UW is 14-11-1 in games played in Pullman and 7-4-0 in games at Martin Stadium. Washington also holds a 13-3-0 mark in Spokane, where the Cougars hosted many of their home Apple Cups in the 1950s, 60s and 70s. The Huskies have won the last six Apple Cup games overall and have emerged victorious in Martin Stadium in each of their last four visits. Last year, Washington pulled a third-straight upset (by AP ranking) in the series when an unranked Husky team notched a 27-19 win over No. 8 Washington State. In the last Apple Cup played in Pullman, in a game that surely ranks as one of the most memorable ever in the series, Washington shocked the No. 3 Cougars with a triple-overtime, 29-26 win, despite trailing by 10 with only 4:30 to play. Three seasons ago, when the two teams met at Husky Stadium, the 16th-ranked Huskies upset the No. 9 Cougars with a 26-14 win. Washington has won 12 of the last 15 vs. WSU and 23 of the last 30. Despite being only seven miles or so down the road from Pullman during his three-year tenure as head coach at Idaho, Husky coach Keith Gilbertson never faced the Cougars as a Vandal. However, Gilbertson did square off vs. WSU three times during his four seasons in charge at California. The Bears went 1-2 in those three games: a 34-7 loss at Pullman in 1993, a 26-23 loss at Berkeley in 1994, and a 27-11 win at Berkeley in 1995. With UW's win last year, Gilbertson holds a 2-2 record against the Cougars as a head coach. Washington State's Bill Doba, in his second season as a college head coach, had obviously never faced Washington in that capacity before last season, making him 0-1 as a head man against his cross-state rival. However, as an assistant, he has been on the winning sideline vs. the UW four times in 15 tries (1-0 as an assistant at Indiana in 1978 and 3-11 as a WSU assistant from 1989 to 2002).

DAWGS AND THE NORTHWEST: Washington's oldest and longest rivalries are against the other three other northwest Pac-10 schools. The Huskies have faced Washington State 96 times, Oregon in 96 games and Oregon State on 89 occasions. Washington owns the advantage in all three series. The Huskies lead the Ducks 58-34-5, Washington State 63-27-6 and Oregon State 57-28-4. Combined, Washington has a 178-89-15 (.658) record against its northwest rivals, including a sweep of all three in both 2002 and 2003.

TELEVISION: The Washington-Washington State game will air live to a regional audience on ABC-TV with Keith Jackson, Dan Fouts and Todd Harris on the call. KOMO-TV in Seattle will carry a one-hour pregame and one-hour postgame show while Fox Sports will also have a post-game show. The game will also air on tape delay, Sunday, Nov. 21, at 4:00 p.m., on Fox Sports Net with Jim Watson, Sonny Sixkiller and Mark Rypien calling the action. Additionally, "Husky Football Experience" will air the following Thursday, Nov. 25, at 10:30 p.m. and Friday, Nov. 26, at 4:00 p.m. on Fox Sports Net.

RADIO: The Husky Sports Network, with its flagship station KJR 950-AM, will carry the live broadcast of every football game to four different states on 25 different radio stations. Longtime play-by-play man Bob Rondeau and color analyst Chuck Nelson are joined by sideline reporter Elise Woodward. Furthermore, the Apple Cup will air on XM Satellite Radio on Pac-10 Channel 185.

THE COACH: Husky head coach Keith Gilbertson hit the ground running, as his first official day as the Washington coach was only a month and a day before opening the 2003 season against defending national champion Ohio State. However, Gilbertson had the advantage of having served as an assistant coach at the UW for the previous four seasons, his third stint as a Dawg assistant. Nov. 1, it was announced that Gilbertson will step down as coach at the end of the 2004 season. In his first season, the Husky head man managed a 6-6 overall record and a 4-4 Pac-10 mark in a season that was highlighted by the UW's sixth straight Apple Cup win over Washington State as well as wins over Northwest rivals Oregon and Oregon State. Gilbertson, a native of Snohomish, Wash., north of Seattle, served as a graduate assistant at the UW under Don James in 1976, James' second season. In 1989, Gilbertson left his head coaching job at Idaho to join the Washington staff, first as offensive line coach before taking over as offensive coordinator in 1991, when the Huskies won the national championship and led the Pac-10 in rushing offense, total offense and scoring offense. In 1992, Gilbertson took his second head coaching position, traveling down to the coast to California. His four-year stint at Berkeley was highlighted by the 1993 team that posted a 9-4 record and defeated Iowa, 37-3, in the Alamo Bowl. That win stood as Cal's last bowl victory until 2003. Until 2002, Gilbertson was the last Cal coach to notch a win over rival Stanford. Gilbertson, a 1966 graduate of Snohomish High, played football at the University of Hawaii and graduated from Central Washington in 1971. His coaching career includes two professional stints, first as an assistant for the L.A. Express in the USFL and then for the Seahawks. In nine seasons as a head coach, Gilbertson has a career record of 55-50 while going 34-36 in conference games.

PAC-10 DOUBLE DIP: Keith Gilbertson is the first coach in Husky history to come to Washington after having been head man at another Pac-10 school. In fact, it's relatively rare for a coach to have served in that capacity at more than one Pac-10 institution. Recently, Bruce Snyder (California and Arizona State), Dennis Erickson (Washington State at Oregon State) and Larry Smith (Arizona and USC) have done it. Earlier examples include Tommy Prothro (Oregon State at UCLA) and Washington's own Leonard "Stub" Allison, who coached one season at the UW (1920) before eventually spending 10 seasons as Cal head coach (1935-44).

CONTINUITY OF COACHING: Despite having three different head coaches over the last seven seasons, it's still fair to say that Washington has had more continuity in its head coaches than any Pac-10 school over the past five decades or so. Going back to 1957, Washington has had only five head football coaches: Jim Owens (1957-75), Don James (1976-92), Jim Lambright (1993-99), Rick Neuheisel (1999-2002) and Keith Gilbertson (2003-). In that time, the nine other Pac-10 schools have had an average of about eight coaches each, a total of 77 (counting some of them — Bill Walsh, John Robinson, Mike Riley etc. — more than once). Oregon has had the next fewest with only six head coaches over that span. Arizona State, California, USC and WSU have had eight each. Oregon State and UCLA have had nine head coaches each since '57, while Arizona and Stanford have had 11 each.

TEAM NOTES

COACHING STAFF: The Washington coaching staff includes four new faces in 2004, but two of those new assistants are making a return to Montlake. In the offseason, head coach Keith Gilbertson brought former UW defensive coordinator Chris Tormey and former quarterbacks coach and assistant head coach Steve Axman back into the Husky fold. Tormey, who left the UW in 1995 to become head coach at Idaho, was the head man at Nevada the last four seasons. Under Gilbertson, he'll serve as assistant head coach and linebackers coach. Axman, an assistant for the Huskies from 1999 to 2002, will coach receivers this season. Axman has also served as a head coach in the college ranks, overseeing the Northern Arizona program for eight seasons (1990-97). The two entirely new additions to the 2004 staff are offensive line coach Charlie Dickey and cornerbacks coach Jimmy Lake. Dickey spent the last 12 seasons as an assistant at Arizona and was also a member of Axman's staff at Northern Arizona for two years (1990-91). Lake, the youngest member of the coaching staff, was the defensive backs coach at Eastern Washington the last five seasons. The other five Husky coaches make their return in 2004. Defensive line coach Randy Hart is the veteran of the group. He's worked at Washington since the 1988 season. John Pettas, who coached Husky wide receivers for a year in 2001 before going to Louisville, returns for his second season as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach while Phil Snow, co-defensive coordinator and secondary coach in 2003, moves into sole possession of the coordinator job while also concentrating on safeties, leaving cornerbacks to Lake. Cornell Jackson, who coaches linebackers in 1992 and safeties a year ago, has moved to running backs coach and also takes on the duties of recruiting coordinator. Scott Pelluer, who was an assistant at the UW from 1996-98, will see his job title unchanged in 2004 as he returns for a second season as tight ends coach and special teams coordinator.

THE GAs: The Huskies added two new graduate assistant coaches to the staff this year, and both have names that should be familiar to UW fans. Kyle Benn will serve as offensive graduate assistant while Patrick Reddick will play that role on defense. Benn and Reddick were both members of UW's 1997 recruiting class. Benn earned four letters as a center and was a captain on the 2001 team. That season, he was one of only two players named to the All-Pac-10 and Academic All-Pac-10 first teams. Reddick spent six seasons on the team after having been granted an extra year of eligibility due to injury. Over his career, he played in 41 games as a receiver. As a senior in 2002, he caught 54 passes for 583 yards and four TDs.

WASHINGTON-WSU TIES: While there's not much history between the coaching staffs at Washington and Washington State, there's plenty between the players. On the coaching side, very few Husky coaches have ever worked with members of WSU's staff. UW co-defensive coordinator Phil Snow and offensive coordinator John Pettas both spent some time on Bruce Snyder's staff at Arizona, where they worked with WSU assistant head coach Robin Pflugrad and offensive line coach George Yarno. Snow also worked at UCLA on Bob Toledo's coaching staff with WSU running backs coach Kelly Skipper. While there aren't that many Huskies from the eastern side of the state, there are plenty of Cougar players from this side of the Cascades. And of course, a number of Huskies and Cougars played with or against one another in their high school days. UW OT Ryan Brooks, PK Ricardo DoValle and WSU SS Jeremy Bohannon (all seniors) were teammates at Richland High. Husky receiver Bobby Whithorne and Cougar offensive lineman Spencer Hollison attended Santa Margarita Catholic High in southern California. WSU junior defensive end Adam West is a graduate of Venice (Calif.) High, same as Husky freshmen Erick Lobos and Mesphin Forrester. Shelton Sampson, a freshman TB at Washington, went to Clover Park with two current Cougs: LB Paul Stevens and DL Ropati Pitoitua. WSU d-lineman Sean O'Connor and UW safety Evan Benjamin are Redmond High grads while WSU has four Puyallup High alums — Loren Langley, Jonathan Larson, Marty Martin and Jacob McKinney — where Husky WR/CB Cody Ellis and S Steve Horan played. Husky freshman offensive lineman Tyler

Ashby and Cougar freshman RB J.T. Diederichs were classmates at Ballard High in Seattle last year. UW LB Tim Galloway and WSU TE Bryant Claudon both went to Auburn High while Husky senior WR Lukas Michener and Cougar Will Bennett are both Spanaway Lake grads. Finally, Husky RS-freshman guard Juan Garcia and WSU's John Rasmussen both went to Yakima's Eisenhower High. There are two other Huskies from Eastern Washington: RS-freshman defensive tackle Jordan Reffett (Moses Lake/Moses Lake) and senior defensive end Will Murphy (Spokane/Central Valley).

LAST YEAR vs. WASHINGTON STATE: Washington continued its string of dramatic upset victories over Washington State with a 27-19 win over the eighth-ranked Cougars last season (Nov. 22) at Husky Stadium. Cody Pickett threw a 21-yard strike to true freshman Corey Williams with 1:10 to play to give Washington its first lead in the game at 20-19 and, with 14 seconds remaining linebacker Marquis Cooper returned an interception 38 yards for a score to squelch the Cougars' final drive. The Cougars took a 10-0 lead in the second quarter after Devard Darling hauled in a 17-yard pass from Matt Kegel with 4:46 left in the first. The Huskies got on the board late in the second period when Pickett connected with Charles Frederick from four yards out. Washington State kicker Drew Dunning added a field goal for the Cougars, giving the visitors a 13-7 lead at hte half. Dunning then added another three-pointer in the third period to lift his team's edge to 16-7. Shelton Sampson's six-yard score pulled the Huskies within two with 12:01 left in the fourth, but Dunning hit his fourth field goal, this time from 26 yards, with 4:43 left to increase the Cougar lead to 19-14. Pickett found Charles Frederick for a 15-yard gain to Washington State's 39 on fourth-and-four with two minutes to play. Then, he fired a shot to Williams in the right corner of the endzone. Cooper sealed the win for Washington when he picked off a Swogger pass and returned it 38 yards, touching off pandemonium among most of the 74,549 spectators at Husky Stadium. Pickett finished the day (and his Husky career) with 183 yards on 23-of-45 passing, with two interceptions and two touchdowns. Reggie Williams was the Huskies' top receiver with 59 yards on seven catches while Kenny James led the rushers with 70 yards on 19 tries. WSU's Jonathan Smith had a solid game with 128 rushing yards on 20 attempts. Kegel, WSU's starting quarterback, benched himself after taking a few hits on his sore throwing shoulder. He finished the game 6-for-12 for 50 yards, two interceptions and one touchdown. Swogger came off the bench to complete 10-of-23 for 107 yards, three interceptions and no touchdowns.

LAST TIME vs. WSU AT MARTIN STADIUM: Down 20-10 with 4:30 to go, Washington emerged with a three-overtime, 29-26 upset win over No. 3 Washington State in one of the most memorable Apple Cups ever in the Huskies' last visit to Pullman, Nov. 3, 2002. Trailing by 10 points late in the fourth quarter, the UW drove 92 yards in only six plays and 1:28. Paul Arnold scored on a seven-yard pass from Cody Pickett to draw the UW to within a field goal. On the ensuing drive, Husky freshman CB Nate Robinson intercepted a pass from backup QB Matt Kegel on the second play of the Cougars' drive and John Anderson hit a 25-yard field goal with 15 seconds left in regulation to send the game into overtime. Kegel was in the game after WSU starter Jason Gesser suffered a leg injury on a third-quarter sack by Husky DT Terry Johnson, one of six sacks on the day. Neither team's offense was able to do much in overtime as Anderson and WSU kicker Drew Dunning exchanged field goals in the first two extra frames. After Anderson hit a 49-yarder to open the third OT, the Huskies won the game when, on WSU's second play, defensive end Kai Ellis batted down and recovered what was ruled a backwards pass from Kegel. Pickett completed 35-of-57 passes for 368 yards, one touchdown and no interceptions. Husky sophomore Reggie Williams notched 169 yards on 12 receptions to break his own Apple Cup record of 11, set the previous year. Anderson tied a school record with five field goals.

TEAM NOTES

"COUSKIES": A number of players throughout history have played football for both Washington and Washington State. Most such players were put in that circumstance by World War II. The first example, however, came more than 100 years ago in Frank Field. Field captained Washington State in 1897 before going on to play at the UW in 1899 and 1900. The World War II-era "Couskies" all played first at WSU before the Navy and Marines transferred them to the UW for officer training in time for the 1943 football season. Their names: Tag Christensen, Wally Kramer, Vern Oliver, Jay Stoves, Bill Ward, Hjalmer "Jelly" Andersen and Jim Thompson. Also Al Akins had played basketball at WSU before appearing on the gridiron for the UW. Additionally, in more recent vintage, placekicker Nick Lentz, who lettered at Washington in 1997, transferred to WSU after that season, but never lettered for the Cougars.

RECENTLY vs. NORTHWEST FOES: Prior to this season's losses to Oregon State and Oregon, the Huskies had won seven consecutive games against its three Northwest rivals -- Oregon, Oregon State and Washington State. The Huskies had beaten each team at least twice in a row despite the fact that the Huskies were unranked in all but one of those games and their opponent was ranked in five of them (No. 9 WSU in 2001, No. 23 Oregon and No. 3 WSU in 2002 and No. 22 Oregon State and No. 8 Washington State in 2003).

STARTERS GALORE: When redshirt-freshman tight end Robert Lewis earned his first career start in the Arizona game, he became the 23rd different Husky player to start on offense this season. Washington has started three different quarterbacks, three different tight ends, seven different wide receivers and offensive linemen, two fullbacks and one tailback. On the other side of the ball, things have been a bit more settled as 16 players have started at least one game on defense. Add in the fact that a total of three players have "started" at kicker and punter, and you could say that 42 different Huskies have started this year in a total of 24 positions. Only six players (plus punter Sean Douglas) have started every game this season.

INJURY BUG: Washington has had a nearly unprecedented number of players miss games this year due to injury. In fact, all four of the Huskies' senior captains (the fifth captain is junior Joe Lobendahn, who broke a wrist last week vs. Cal and will likely miss the Apple Cup) have missed at least one game due to injury. Two of those -- fullback Zach Tuasosopo (broken leg) and tackle Khalif Barnes (broken wrist) -- have missed most the season. The two other senior captains have both missed time as well. Receiver Charles Frederick has sat out five games while cornerback Derrick Johnson has missed one. Furthermore, five players that have started on offense have missed action due to injury (receivers Corey Williams and Quintin Daniels are out for the year while tight end Joe Toledo and quarterbacks Carl Bonnell and Isaiah Stanback have missed games due to less severe injuries). Most recently, senior tight end Jon Lyon broke a bone in his hand during practice on Nov. 2, meaning he'll miss the last three games of the season. Also on offense, tight end Ben Bandel, who started seven games last year, has seen his career come to an end due to injury. On the other side of the ball, two defensive linemen are out for the year after having started this season: tackles Donny Mateaki and Dan Milsten. Additionally, end Mike Mapuolesega missed four games because of a knee problem.

TOUGH ON FOURTH DOWN: Somewhat remarkably, the Huskies have yet to allow an opponent to convert a fourth-down attempt all year. Washington's defense has seen its opponents go for it on fourth down on 11 occasions this season and have yet to allow a foe to get a first down in that situation. A fourth down attempt has been tried in five of 10 games with no success. By contrast, the Huskies have converted on fourth down on nine of 23 tries this season, a percentage of .391. That's an even better mark than the Huskies' success on

third-down conversion attempts (.315). The next best opponents' fourth-down conversion percentage in the conference .182 (2-for-11), by Arizona State.

PASS DEFENSE TOPS PAC-10: Washington enters the final week of its season rated No. 1 in the Pac-10 Conference in pass defense with 180.40 yards per game allowed. That number also ranks the Huskies No. 13 in NCAA Division I-A (Alabama leads at 105.80 per game). The UW is one of only two teams in the Pac-10 allowing less than 200 passing yards per game. USC is the other at 197.2. The Huskies have yet to allow an opposing receiver to gain 100 yards in a game this year and have held teams under 200 yards in six of 10 games this season. The last time that Washington held opponents to 200 or fewer yards per game in a season was 1993 (192.6).

TIGHT END AND QUARTERBACK U.: According to report from the NFL, based on opening week rosters, no college team has placed more current tight ends or more current quarterbacks in the NFL than Washington. The Huskies have four former players playing tight end in "the league" while five former Dawgs are playing quarterback at the next level. Only Michigan and Penn State can boast as many tight ends while only Michigan has produced that many quarterbacks. The four tight ends are: Mark Bruener (Houston), Cameron Cleeland (St. Louis), Ernie Conwell (New Orleans) and Jerramy Stevens (Seattle). The five quarterbacks are Mark Brunell (Washington), Chris Chandler (St. Louis), Damon Huard (Kansas City ... since released), Cody Pickett (San Francisco) and Marques Tuiasosopo (Oakland). That list does not include Brock Huard, who is on injured reserve for the Seahawks.

PLAYING THE FRESHMEN: Washington's true freshmen have been called in to action a fair amount in 2004. Two true freshmen have seen action in all 10 games -- defensive end Greyson Gunheim (started five) and defensive tackle Jordan White-Frisbee (started six), while inside linebacker Dan Howell has played in nine of 10, mostly on special teams. Safety Darin Harris has played in all but one game (all on special teams). More recently, two more first-year defensive linemen were called into action as tackle Erick Lobos as seen extensive playing time in the last eight games. Defensive end Caesar Rayford was the latest youngster to see action, playing for the first time vs. Oregon State. True freshman outside linebacker Trenton Tuiasosopo played in two games earlier this season (vs. UCLA and at Notre Dame), but injured a knee and will redshirt the season. Additionally, numerous redshirt freshmen have seen significant playing time: DT Wilson Afoa, QB Carl Bonnell, PK Michael Braunstein, WR Craig Chambers, CB/WR Cody Ellis, S Chris Hemphill, TE Robert Lewis, TB/KR Louis Rankin, WR Anthony Russo, OLB Kyle Trew and WR Bobby Whitthorne.

SHORT ON SACKS: Washington's offensive line has surrendered only 19 quarterback sacks this season. Two came in the opener vs. Fresno State and then the Huskies didn't allow any vs. UCLA or at Notre Dame. At Stanford, the Cardinal notched three sacks, but one of those came on an intentional grounding penalty, which by rule counts as a sack. San Jose State managed two and Oregon State and Oregon also had two while USC notched only one. Arizona had the easiest time of any opponent this season as Wildcats defenders recorded five sacks and California followed with two. The Huskies are second in the Pac-10 in quarterback sacks allowed, with 19 in 10 games. Only UCLA (with 14 sacks allowed in 10 games) has surrendered fewer. Perhaps only coincidentally, the Huskies and Bruins also rank No. 7 and 10 in the conference, respectively in sacks made. The Huskies are seventh with 24 sacks on the season while the Bruins have managed only 13, placing them 10th. And, lest you think that the Huskies don't give up sacks because they don't throw many passes, it's worth noting that the UW has attempted 81 more passes than its opponents this year (367 to 286) and that the Huskies rank fourth in the Pac-10 in pass attempts this year.

TEAM NOTES

RANKED-WINS STREAK: Through last season, the Huskies have beaten at least one team ranked in the Associated Press poll in each of the last 16 seasons. With no such wins this season and with WSU unranked, that streak will end this year. Still, however, Washington has defeated an AP-ranked team in 26 of its last 28 seasons. The only previous break in the streak came in 1988 when the Huskies played only two games against nationally-ranked foes — UCLA (No. 2) and USC (No. 3), losing both of those contests.

THE RED ZONE: While Washington's offense has struggled in the red zone this season (the Huskies rank 10th with a scoring percentage of 60.0 when they penetrate their opponents' 20-yard line), the defense has been rather impressive. Washington's red zone defense (73.5 percent) ranks No. 4 in the league. What's most impressive, however, is that Washington has allowed a touchdown on only 17 of 34 (50 percent) of its opponents trips inside the 20. Beside the UW, only Stanford (17-for-35) and California (10-for-24) have held opponents to 50 percent or less in that category. Here's a breakdown of the season:

DECADE AFTER DECADE: Washington has won a conference title and a trip to the Rose Bowl in each of the last nine decades, dating back to the 1920s when Washington won the berth in 1923 and 1925. In the 1930s, the Dawgs won the '36 title. In the '40s, Washington earned the trip in 1943 and then barely slipped in under the wire in the 1950s, winning the 1959 crown. The Huskies won two Rose Bowl berths in the 1960s -- 1960 and 1963 -- and one in the 1970s (1977). Titles in 1980 and 1982 did it for that decade and three straight trips to Pasadena to begin the 1990s covered that 10-year span. Now in the 2000s, UW has become the first team to earn Rose Bowl berths in nine straight decades. USC joined the Dawgs in that distinction last year after their New Year's Day appearance in Pasadena.

WINNING THE CLOSE ONES: In 71 Husky games dating back to the start of the 1999 season, the winning margin (for either side) has been seven points or fewer 25 times. In those 25 games decided by a touchdown or less, Washington is 16-9 and had won 10 straight before falling to Texas, 47-43 in the 2001 Holiday Bowl. Washington had lost three straight such games (Texas, Michigan, Cal) before a four-point win over Arizona on Oct. 12, 2002.

FINISHING FIRST OR SECOND: Despite a fifth-place finish in the Pac-10 in 2003, Washington has finished either first or second in the conference (including ties) in 18 of the last 27 seasons, dating back to a fourth-place finish in 1976. Over that span, Washington has won the championship (outright or shared) eight times — 1977, 1980, 1981, 1990, 1991, 1992, 1995 and 2000 — while finishing second 10 other times.

AGAINST THE RANKED TEAMS: Washington is 11-15 against top-10 teams since 1990. Also since 1990, the Huskies have gone 31-32-1 against top 25 teams. Here's a look at the Huskies' record against top-10 foes over the last 15 seasons:

THE 100-YARD FACTOR: Since the 1947 season, Washington is 159-37-3 (.807) when a Husky player rushes for 100 yards in a game. The Huskies went 3-1 in such games in 2003 and are 1-1 in 2004 after Kenny James rushed for 133 yards in the 37-31 loss to UCLA and then ran for 189 win a 21-6 win over San Jose State.

HISTORY LESSON: Successfully rushing the football and winning go hand-in-hand for the Huskies. Since 1990, Washington has rushed for 200 yards in a game 59 times. The Huskies' record stands at 54-5-1 (.908) in those contests. Since the 1995 season, Washington is 29-2-1 (.922) when rushing for 200 yards. Against UCLA on Sept. 18, the Dawgs compiled 219 yards on the ground, but lost the game, 37-31. Against San Jose State, the UW ran for 259 and won, 21-6.

PLAYING AT HOME: Washington has gone unbeaten at home 13 times in its history, including six times in the last 14 seasons. Washington has won 73 of its last 94 (.782) games at Husky Stadium with one tie (73-20-1). Since 1980, the Huskies stand 121-31-2 (.792) at home. Since 1990, the Huskies are 47-14-1 (.766) at Husky Stadium vs. Pac-10 opponents.

HISTORIC HUSKY STADIUM: The 2004 season marks the 85th season of play in Husky Stadium. Original construction on the facility was completed in 1920 when Washington played one game in the new campus facility. Thanks to several major renovations, Husky Stadium's seating capacity has increased to its current total of 72,500. That makes Husky Stadium the 24th-largest college football venue in the nation. It is the 20th-largest on-campus facility in the country. UW's all-time record in Husky Stadium currently stands at 338-142-21 (.696).

FIRST-TIME QB STARTERS: Prior to the season opener, no quarterback on the UW roster had ever started a game at Washington. Junior Casey Paus got the starting nod Sept. 4 vs. Fresno State, adding his name to the list below. In 2001, Cody Pickett became the first opening-day starting quarterback without a previous career start since 1996. Here's a look at the Huskies' new opening day starters and their performance in that first game, as well as other notable UW quarterbacks' first career starts (that didn't come in season openers):

E.T. HEADED UP THE CHARTS: Senior wide receiver Charles "E.T." Frederick has already placed his name on several pages of the UW record book. Most notably, he broke the UW's single-game all-purpose yards record last year at Oregon State, when he compiled 371 to break Hugh McElhenny's 53-year old record. But, he certainly won't stop there. Frederick, who has led the UW in punt returns for three straight seasons and led the Pac-10 in that category in 2003, already appears on a number of the UW's single-game, single-season and career top-10 lists and is within striking distance of others. Here's a look at the season and career top-10 lists on which E.T. appears:

PRINCE CHARLES PASSES THE KING: Charles Frederick turned in a game for the ages last October 18 in the Huskies' 38-17 win at then-No. 22 Oregon State. Frederick, long known by the nickname "E.T.", set new career highs with nine receptions for 216 yards, good for two TDs. One of those two scores went for 87 yards, the second-longest receiving play in Husky history. Frederick also dazzled the national TV audience with an 86-yard punt return for a TD, sixth-longest in Husky lore. He finished with 216 receiving yards, 101 punt return yards and 54 kickoff return yards, good for a grand total of 371 all-purpose yards and was, as far as the records indicate, the first Pac-10 player ever to score twice in a game on plays of longer than 85 yards (USC's media guide doesn't have sufficient records to know for sure). Those 371 all-purpose yards broke a 53-year old school record held by "The King," Hugh McElhenny, who compiled 362 vs. Washington State in 1950. McElhenny, considered by many the greatest offensive player in school history, went on to an NFL Hall of Fame career. Frederick's 371 yards were only eight short of the Pac-10 record of 379, set by Stanford's Glyn Milburn in 1990.

KHALIF'S STARTS: Until an unfortunate injury suffered in practice on Oct. 13, senior offensive tackle had a chance to perform the rare feat of serving as a true four-year starter. Prior to breaking his wrist that day, an injury that may or may not end his senior season, Barnes, who originally came to the UW as a defensive lineman and only switched sides at the end of his true-freshman season, had started every game for the Huskies going back to the start of 2001, 42 in all (counting bowls). If he were to have started every game in 2004, he would have become the first lineman in UW history to start every game of four straight seasons. The closest any Husky o-lineman has ever come was when Chad Ward started all but three games between 1997 and 2000 (including his last 45 in a row).

CAPTAINS: In a vote of their teammates, five Husky players were named captains during last spring's practice season. The three UW players honored by their teammates were senior offensive tackle Khalif Barnes, senior wide receiver Charles Frederick, senior cornerback Derrick Johnson, junior linebacker Joe Lobendahn and senior fullback Zach Tuasosopo. All five are serving as captain for the first time in their career. For the first time on record, the Huskies have voted to have five captains. In years past, the team has mostly had three or four.

ON THE TUBE: Several of Washington's games have been selected for television during the upcoming 2004 season. The Huskies' home and season opener vs. Fresno State on Sunday, Sept. 5, was telecast to a national audience by Fox Sports Net. The Sept. 18 game vs. UCLA (4 p.m.) aired on ABC and a national audience watched the Huskies' trip to Notre Dame (Sept. 25) on NBC. the Huskies' game at USC was also picked up and aired to a live national audience on Fox Sports Net while the Oregon game was shown in the Northwest on Fox Sports. Additionally, the Apple Cup Nov. 25 at Washington State was selected by ABC.

MISCELLANEOUS NOTES

NEW HUSKY STADIUM BOOK: Few football venues in America rival the rich history and gameday pageantry of the University of Washington's Husky Stadium. From its establishment in 1920, the Stadium has hosted UW's hard-nosed brand of exciting football as well as other major spectacles including the International Goodwill Games. Now, as never before, the remarkable history and gameday pageantry of a sports palace are brought to exhilarating life in Husky Stadium: Great Games and Golden Moments. Published by Parker Hood Press, the 160-page coffee-table sized book features 160 pages and retails for \$45. Proceeds from the sale of the book will benefit the Washington athletic department's scholarship endowment fund. W. Thomas Porter and Jim Daves, co-authors of the previous best-seller, *The Glory of Washington*, chronicle the clashes of great football teams and players that are part of Husky Stadium lore and that heighten the aura of gameday. FAMILY TIES: As is the case with most seasons of Husky football, there are a number of players on the Washington football team related to either current or former Huskies. Zach Tuiasosopo, Trenton Tuiasosopo and Kim Taylor are all cousins. Zach's older brother, Marques, was a UW quarterback (1997-2000) and his older sister, Leslie, was a standout Husky volleyball player and now an assistant coach for the UW volleyball team. Redshirt freshman Craig Chambers' older brother, Richie, was a starting linebacker for the Dawgs in the 1990s. Sophomore cornerback Matt Fountaine's older brother, Jamal, was a four-year letterman defensive lineman in the early 1990s at the UW. Kicker Evan Knudson is a half-brother of former Husky punter Channing Wyles. Outside linebacker Evan Benjamin's older sister, Paige, was an All-America volleyball player for the Huskies while sophomore guard Jason Benn's older brother Kyle, a center for the Dawgs from 1998-2001, is now a graduate assistant coach. Finally, redshirt freshman Chris Rohrbach is the son of former UW linebacker Mike Rohrbach, who was a captain on the Huskies' 1977 Pac-10 champion team.

CURTIS WILLIAMS TRIBUTE: When the Washington football team kicked off its 2004 season opener against Fresno State last Sunday at Husky Stadium, the Huskies displayed a new tribute to former player Curtis Williams. Before the team's final workout of the preseason, a purple circle and Williams' number 25 was painted on the white boundary adjacent to the 25-yard line closest to the stadium's tunnel where the team's enter and exit the stadium. Husky senior fullback James Sims will be the recipient of the Curtis Williams Endowed Scholarship for the second year in a row. This season, Sims will not wear 25, Williams number. Instead, he has switched to number 22 for the season. "We wanted to do something to honor Curtis and last year it was having James wear his jersey," said Husky coach Keith Gilbertson. "This year I wanted to include his number on the field and so we had it painted near our bench. Curtis always loved playing in Husky Stadium and this is a fitting tribute." During the 2000 season, Williams, a senior strong safety, suffered a spinal cord injury during the Huskies' October 28 football game at Stanford that left him paralyzed below the neck. Williams died in May, 2002. More than \$400,000 has been raised for the Curtis Williams Fund.
