2003 Husky Spring Outlook

The goals Washington football coach Rick Neuheisel has established for the team's annual spring practice period are pretty well known. He wants to see the Huskies establish a better running game on offense and to improve its overall play on defense.

Neuheisel, who enters his fifth year as the Huskies head coach in 2003, feels the team has the talent to compete for a Pac-10 championship next season. Washington returns 52 lettermen from last year's squad that posted a 7-6 record and went 4-4 in conference play. That list includes eight starters on offense and eight starters on defense. The Huskies will look to fill both kicking positions next fall when a pair of scholarship freshmen report for fall camp.

"I think our guys are anxious to improve," Neuheisel says. "The attitude and the commitment in the offseason have been good and what you want to see from a team that does not want to go 7-6 again. As coaches, we have to make sure that the only guys who run down that tunnel on gameday are the ones who have paid the price to do so. I think that will provide some spirited competition this spring.

"Ultimately, those of us who are left in charge of this program, players and coaches alike, have to understand that we have a tremendous responsibility and a tremendous opportunity to what we all set out to do, which was to get ourselves back to the top. Now we just have to go about doing it, day by day. Implementing it is the next step and we have 15 practices to do that. So it is exciting.

"We have enough talent to win," Neuheisel says. "It is a matter of putting the pieces together and making sure that everyone is committed as the next guy to getting it achieved."

Offense

Neuheisel would like to see the Huskies strike a better balance between running and passing the ball during the 2003 season. Last year the Huskies broke various school passing standards when they threw the ball 621 times during the season. Only Texas Tech (770) and Hawaii (731) threw the ball more, both playing 14-game seasons.

The Huskies return four starters on the offensive line, record-setting quarterback Cody Pickett, first-team All-American Reggie Williams at wide receiver and senior tailback Rich Alexis as the foundation of the offense. The Huskies have the veteran experience to once again be one of the most impressive offenses in the country. But this season, they would like to do it with more success running the ball.

"We need to run the ball more and for more yardage," Neuheisel says. "We played to our strength last year, but in so doing we exposed a weakness and we need to make sure we don't have a weakness as we go forward."

Quarterback

The old adage in the Pac-10 is that it takes a senior quarterback to lead a team to the Rose Bowl. That has been the case for nine of the last 11 teams to win the conference championship. Washington is fortunate to have veteran signalcaller Cody Pickett in that role.

The fifth-year senior will be a top preseason candidate for both the Davey O'Brien Award and the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award which are presented to the nation's top quarterback. While Washington's more balanced approach may mean that Pickett will not duplicate the record number of passing feats he accomplished last season, his ability to lead the Huskies to victories could mean much more in terms of individual awards.

Pickett took full advantage of Washington's game plan to throw the ball in 2002. He passed for more yards than any player in Pac-10 history, including USC quarterback Carson Palmer, the Heisman Trophy winner. In the expanded 12-game season, Pickett threw for 4,458 yards, becoming

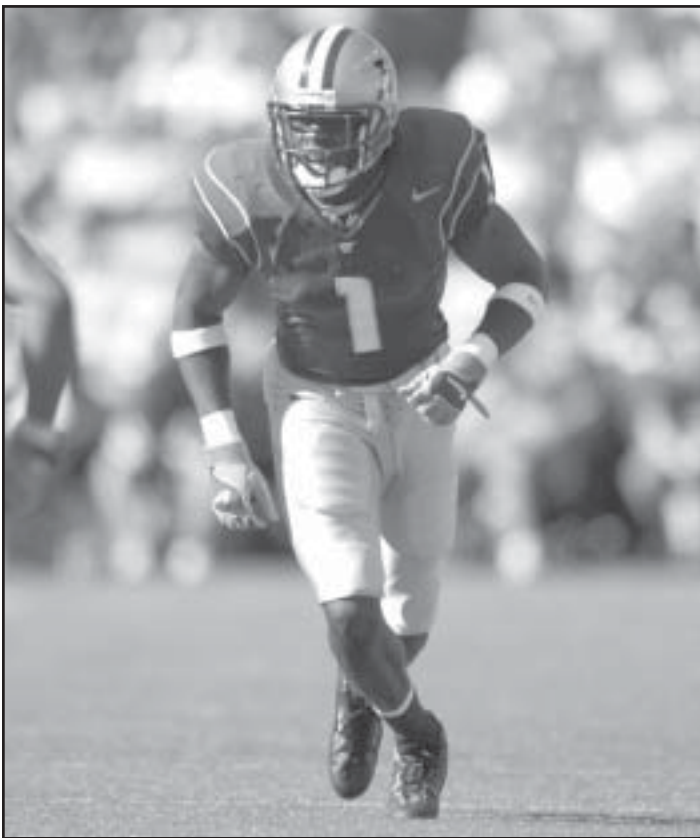
the first Pac-10 signalcaller to pass for more than 4,000 yards in a season. He also benefited by the NCAA's decision to count postseason results in season statistics for the first time.

As it turned out, Pickett did not need the extra games to eclipse the existing Pac-10 passing record set by Washington State's Ryan Leaf in 1997. He blew by Leaf's mark of 3,637 yards during the 11th game of the season.

Pickett finished the year ranked second nationally with 28.08 completions per game and was third in total offense at 328.7 yards per game. He is the leading returning player for the 2003 campaign in both categories. Only Hawaii's Timmy Chang returns with more total passing yards (4,474) than Pickett (4,458), but he racked up his impressive total in 14 games, one more than his Husky counterpart.

Already a four-time letterwinner, after being granted a medical redshirt for the 1999 season after playing in just one game, Pickett enters his final season at UW with 6,783 career passing yards. He needs to average 261 yards per game as a senior to join the exclusive 10,000-yard passing club.

An extremely competitive athlete, Pickett has demonstrated he has a vast array of passes in his repertoire. He can throw the deep ball – he has six pass completions of more than 70 yards in his career – and has the touch to lead running backs as they run screen patterns. Pickett's size and speed gives him great mobility in the pocket and he has been called on to run the option in the past. With 26 game appearances and 23 career starts, he has the game savvy and leadership to guide a veteran offense that includes 26 letterwinners.

Pickett really impressed Husky fans during his sophomore campaign when he suffered a painful shoulder separation at midseason. He only allowed the injury to keep him out of one game before returning to his starting role where he promptly set the school single-game passing record with 455 yards against Arizona.

While the numbers were impressive, Neuheisel knows the ultimate gauge for measuring the success of a quarterback is the final score.

"He needs to win and he knows that," Neuheisel says. "That's what quarterbacks are judged on. Cody has a lot of great attributes. One is that he is very competitive. When he says he would trade the stats for wins, he is very serious and sincere."

"We want Cody to become more consistent in his understanding of what we are trying to accomplish on offense," Neuheisel says. "What we want to do is average a certain amount of yards per attempt and not worry about how many throws we are getting. That shows more consistency and productivity than simply running up yards. We set all kinds of records for yardage and first downs, but they didn't necessarily generate points. That's the key."

If the Huskies can generate a more productive running game, after averaging an all-time low average of 74.5 rushing yards per game last season, Neuheisel says that will benefit the passing game.

"If we can get a running game going, I think we'll have more big plays," Neuheisel says. "You can take advantage of people ganging up on your run. Big plays are hard to come by when everyone is backed up and just trying to play pass defense."

One area of emphasis during the spring will be to find a reliable backup to Pickett. Taylor Barton, who was the reserve signalcaller for the past two years, was a senior in 2002. There are no other quarterbacks on the roster that have played in a game. The two players who will get the repetitions in the backup spot will be sophomore Casey Paus and redshirt freshman Isiah Stanback. The duo gives the Husky coaches some variety at the position.

The 6-5 Paus is more of a classic dropback thrower while Stanback could be used as a conventional passer or an option quarterback. Stanback is considered such an outstanding athlete that he will divide his time during spring drills also working with the Husky wide receiving corps.

"This is a big year for Casey," says Neuheisel, a former college quarterback. "He will get the opportunity to prove he can play. He will have the chance to prove he is a guy who can take us to a championship. That's what we are looking for in the position here."

Neuheisel cautions that Stanback's role as a two-position player does not indicate a permanent move to wide receiver.

"With Cody returning as our senior quarterback, it does not make sense to have one of the best athletes on the team standing on the sidelines," Neuheisel says. "This is not a wholesale change, but we do want him to have some opportunities at wide receiver. I still want him to be a quarterback. He has some work ahead of him. He has to learn and dedicate himself to understanding how we are trying to play offense."

"We also have to come a little towards him in terms of highlighting his athletic ability. He has some unique abilities. It doesn't mean that he cannot drop back and throw and do all of the things that our offense currently calls for. He also has some unique features that we would like to highlight, like we did with Marques (Tuiasosopo). He gives you a lot of options."

Running Back

The need to improve the Husky running game will draw the most attention this spring. The Huskies return two veterans and will look to a pair of redshirt freshmen to improve the productivity of the tailback position. Senior Rich Alexis, the most veteran player at the position, will miss spring drills while recuperating from off-season shoulder surgery.

The lone loss from last year's running back stable is Braxton Cleman. While battling a serious hamstring injury during the first half of the season, Cleman was second on the team with 228 yards on 74 carries. He completed his career with 936 rushing yards on 219 carries. Cleman was also an outstanding pass catcher, snaring 27 receptions for 138 yards last year. As a senior, he set a UW receiving record with 15 catches in a game with USC.

Alexis has appeared in 35 games, including eight starts last season. He has rushed for 1805 yards and 24 touchdowns during his career. Alexis has also proven to be an effective pass receiver. He had 27 of his career 44 receptions last year, including seven catches in a game against Wyoming.

Junior Chris Singleton was third on the team in rushing in 2002 with 224 yards on 64 carries. His top outing came against UCLA when he rushed 20 times for 92 yards. Singleton started against the Bruins and Oregon State and has carried the ball a total of 78 times during his career.

Two highly touted redshirt freshmen, Kenny James and Shelton Sampson, will get plenty of carries during the spring. James was regarded as one of the top prep running backs coming out of the high school ranks in 2001. He rushed for 2,900 yards and 49 touchdowns during his senior year.

Shelton Sampson brings impressive speed to the position. He won three consecutive state 110-meter high hurdle titles as a standout prep athlete. During the winter he competed for the Husky track team and ran an NCAA indoor qualifying time in the 200 meters.

"Rich has had lots of carries here, so we know what he brings to the position," Neuheisel says. "We probably don't need to see him in spring ball like we do Kenny James, Shelton Sampson and Chris Singleton. Those three guys will get a whole lot of work."

"They are certainly different athletes, but in terms of who gives us what in respect to our offense, we'll have to wait and see. We have to find out which one, or what combination, will make us successful. It will be a spirited competition."

Neuheisel does not plan on bringing the two young running backs along slowly.

"We need to develop an attitude in addition to a proficiency," he says. "In developing attitude you cannot be cautious. You have to go."

The Huskies return all of their fullbacks from last season. Heading that group is junior Zach Tuiasosopo, who moved to offense last spring after starting his career at outside linebacker. He carried the ball 15 times last season, the only player at the position to run the ball.

Also returning to the position are sophomore Ty Eriks and senior Adam Seery. Like Tuiasosopo, Eriks started at UW as an outside linebacker. Seery moved into the position last year after playing quarterback and safety earlier in his career.

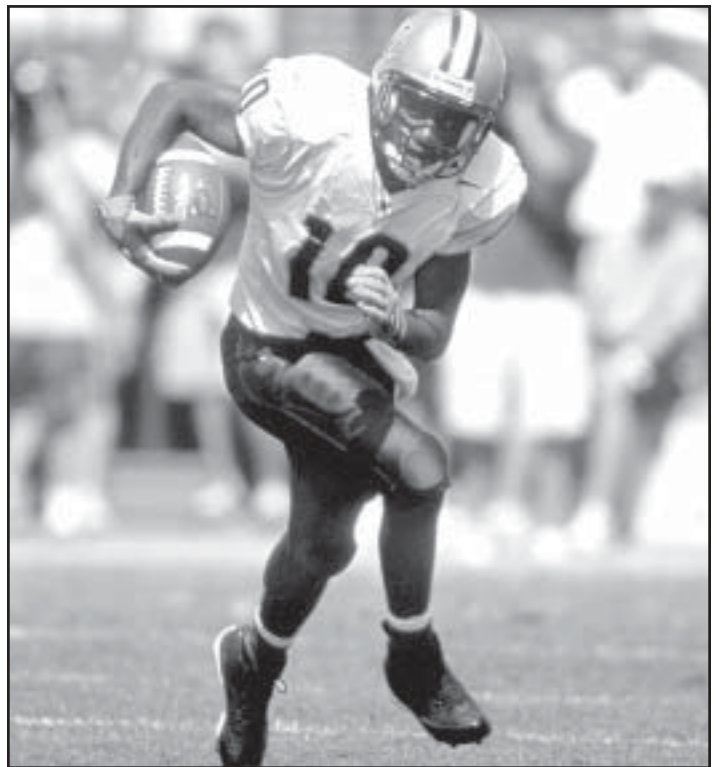
"Zach and Ty will get the bulk of the work and we'll look to develop a third person at the position," Neuheisel says. "Developing this position will go a long way in helping us to run the ball better. We would also like to make sure the position is a good pass receiver because that helps the play-action game."

Wide Receiver

While the ranks are lacking the large number of returning veteran players from a year ago, the Husky wide receivers could be one of the top groups in the country thanks to returning first-team All-American Reggie Williams and rapidly developing junior Charles Frederick.

Washington lost four receivers who totaled 121 receptions last year. Add departed tight end Kevin Ware and that total grows to 163 catches. Williams and Frederick combined for 139 receptions.

Williams, who in two years has established himself as the top wideout in Washington history, will be a leading candidate for the 2003 Biletnikoff Award, presented to the nation's top receiver. He caught 94 passes for 1,454 yards as a sophomore and enters his junior season with 149 career catches good for 2,427 yards. His two-year total is the best ever among Pac-10 receivers. USC standout Keyshawn Johnson totaled 148 catches

and 2,358 yards in the 1994 and 1995 seasons, his junior and senior seasons.

Last season Williams ranked eighth nationally with an average of 7.23 receptions per game and was ninth in reception yards per game at 111.85. His highlights included a school-record 89-yard touchdown catch against San Jose State, a last-minute 70-yard game-winning TD reception against Arizona and a 14-catch, 198-yard, three-touchdown performance on the road at Oregon.

Williams was at his best down the stretch as the Huskies played themselves back into the bowl picture. Dubbed "Mr. November," he caught 35 passes during Washington's final three regular season games. That included a 12-reception, 169-yard performance at Washington State while being defended by Cougar All-America cornerback Marcus Trufant.

A strong, physical player, Williams has drawn raves by the Husky coaches for his often overlooked blocking skills. He joined the ranks of the Husky track team during the winter quarter to work on his speed and will participate in the outdoor season this spring.

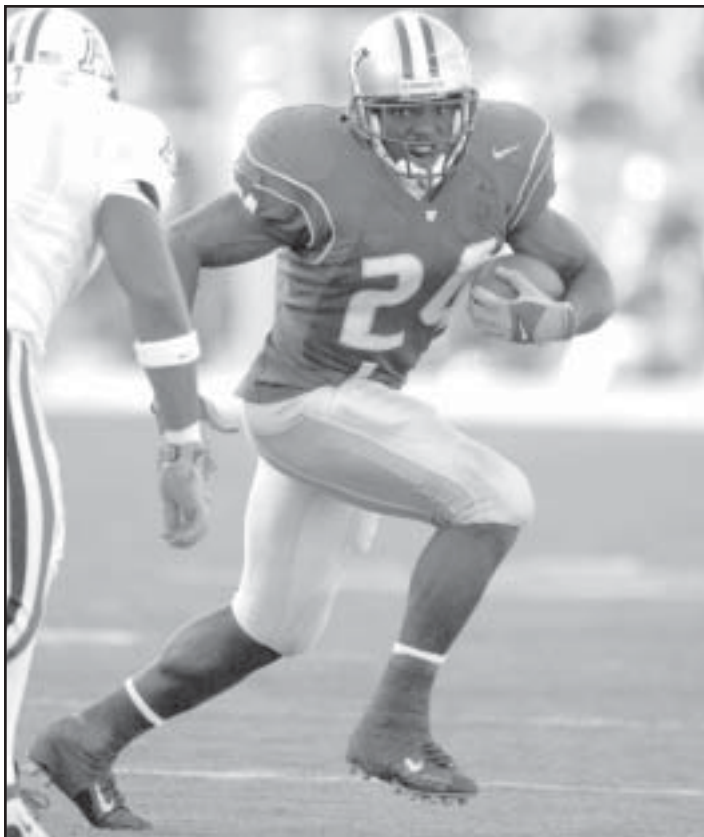
"Reggie can break a game open in a single play," Neuheisel says. "He has tremendous abilities and that is a credit to his work ethic. He is naturally gifted as a receiver, but it's the effort he makes to improve himself in all areas of the game that has made him an All-American."

"I think Reggie can become a much cleaner route runner and not rely on his physical dominance to get the ball. That's something we would like to see him improve upon."

Neuheisel wants to see his standout receiver take on the added role as a team leader this year.

"He is going to be a leader whether he wants to or not," Neuheisel says. "Reggie is a someone the other players will look to. There's no question he has a huge role on this team as a leader. If the younger players take note of his work ethic, that will be a real positive for us."

While Williams was grabbing most of the headlines last season, the development of Frederick as another reliable receiver is equally important to the Huskies' offensive plans. While he only started twice, Frederick

caught 45 passes for 651 yards. He also acted as UW's top punt and kickoff returner last year.

Frederick's speed and elusiveness makes him a dangerous player in the open field. He had at least two catches in every game after spending his freshman year concentrating on special teams duties.

"I think he made some significant steps and I hope he can continue on that path," Neuheisel says of Frederick. "There is no question that he has raw ability. We would like to harness it and see how good he can be."

That maturation began during the Huskies' off-season workout program when Frederick elected not to return to the UW basketball team and instead concentrate on football conditioning.

To help fill the void at receiver, Neuheisel plans on giving redshirt freshman quarterback Isaiah Stanback some opportunities at the position.

"I still want him to be a quarterback," says Neuheisel who was pleased with Stanback's development last year while helping to guide the Husky scout squads. "With Cody returning as our senior quarterback, it does not make sense to have one of the best athletes on your team standing on the sidelines."

Neuheisel says another possibility is to try sophomore cornerback Nate Robinson at a slot receiver spot. He briefly played the position when he first reported to the Huskies last fall, but moved to defense when it became apparent there was an abundance of receivers on last year's team.

"Those two guys are good solutions for this team," Neuheisel says. "We put an emphasis on the position in our recruiting and we fill we have some freshmen coming he who we are optimistic about."

Justin Robbins, who caught 22 catches as a freshman in 2000, will rejoin the team this spring after missing most of the last two years due to injury. Also fitting into the position lineup are walkons Doug Clarke and Matt Griffith. Both players have appeared in games but never recorded a reception.

"Justin is a wonderful person and we hope he will be able to come back and be a factor," Neuheisel says. "I know he's a good football player. We just have to see what level he is able to perform."

Tight End

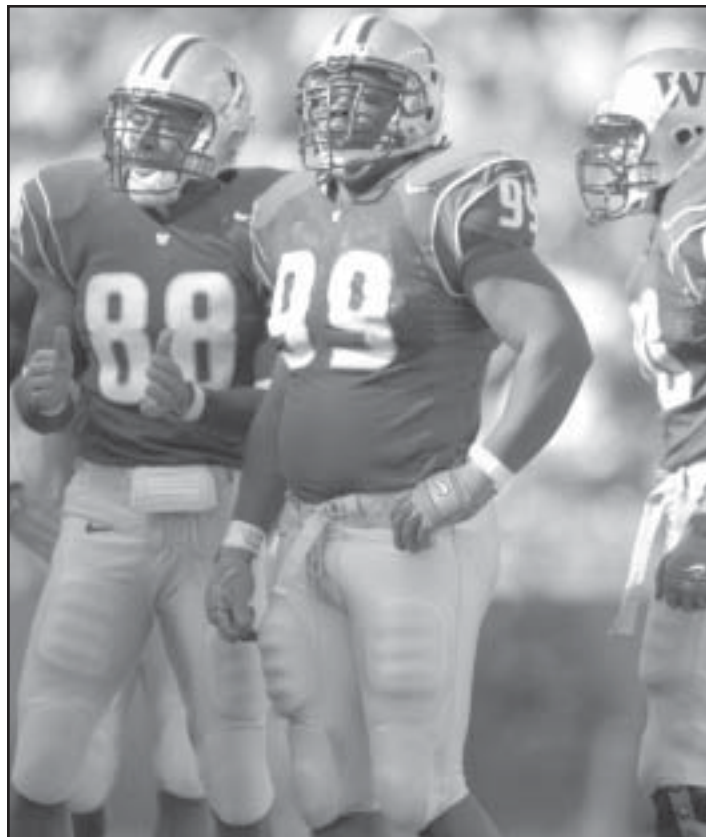
Washington has developed a reputation as the best school in the country for tight ends since the early '90s. Who will be the next player to step into that spotlight is not clear. While sophomore Joe Toledo received a generous amount of playing time last year, primarily in two tight end sets, he will sit out the spring due to shoulder surgery.

Washington took the step of recruiting Jon Lyon, a top junior college tight end, to stabilize the position. Lyon enrolled at the University in January, went through the off-season conditioning program, and will likely work with the first-team offense during the spring.

"Because there is not a lot of returning experience at the position, we decided to go to the junior college ranks to bring in Jon," Neuheisel says. "We think he will give us something. He is a very bright kid. How well he handles the line of scrimmage play and how soon he becomes a bonafide receiver is what we want to know."

Sophomore Andy Heater also returns after playing in three games last season. Redshirt freshmen Ben Bandel is another player the coaches are eager to see in action in addition to classmate Jason Benn and walkon Jens Jellen.

"Joe has that natural pass catching ability and is a real presence on the line," Neuheisel says. "It is unfortunate he will miss the spring."

Offensive Line

The Huskies return 11 lettermen and four starters on its offensive line. Considering that junior Dan Dicks started six times last year when senior Elliot Zajac was out due to an injury, Washington can claim to return the entire starting quintet.

The list of starters includes weakside tackle Khalif Barnes, weakside guard Aaron Butler, center Todd Bachert and strongside tackle Nick Newton. Dicks returns at the weakside guard position. Bachert and Newton are seniors while the other three players are juniors. Barnes, Newton and Bachert will all be third-year starters.

Last year the group provided great security while Pickett was attempting a record 612 pass attempts. The Huskies surrendered 37 sacks during the season, or just once every 17.5 times the team tried to throw the ball. Run blocking was more problematic. The Huskies averaged just 74.5 yards per game, ranking ninth in the Pac-10.

"I would love to say that we are a great offensive line because we have experience," Neuheisel says. "The reality is we can play better in our front and we are going to play better in our front. I thought they did a very good job of pass protection. It is not as if we are coming back without any positive experiences. We have had those. Now we just need to put the whole package together."

With Bachert, a Rimington Trophy candidate in 2003, out of spring drills, the coaching staff will give redshirt freshman Clay Walker the opportunity to play center. Classmate Robin Kezirian and senior walkon Mike Thompson will also play the position.

Dicks and sophomore Rob Meadow will compete for the strongside guard position. Meadow started twice last season at strongside tackle. Senior Francisco Tipoti and junior Ryan Brooks are the returning backups

at the tackle positions. Sophomore Brad Vanneman, a center, will also miss the spring due to a foot injury.

Neuheisel says the goal this spring will find the best combination of players. Even if that means shifting some positions on the line

"Whether it is with the four returning starters or some other group, we want to get the best players on the field," Neuheisel says. "

Neuheisel feels developing the backups and increased competition will help the unit to develop.

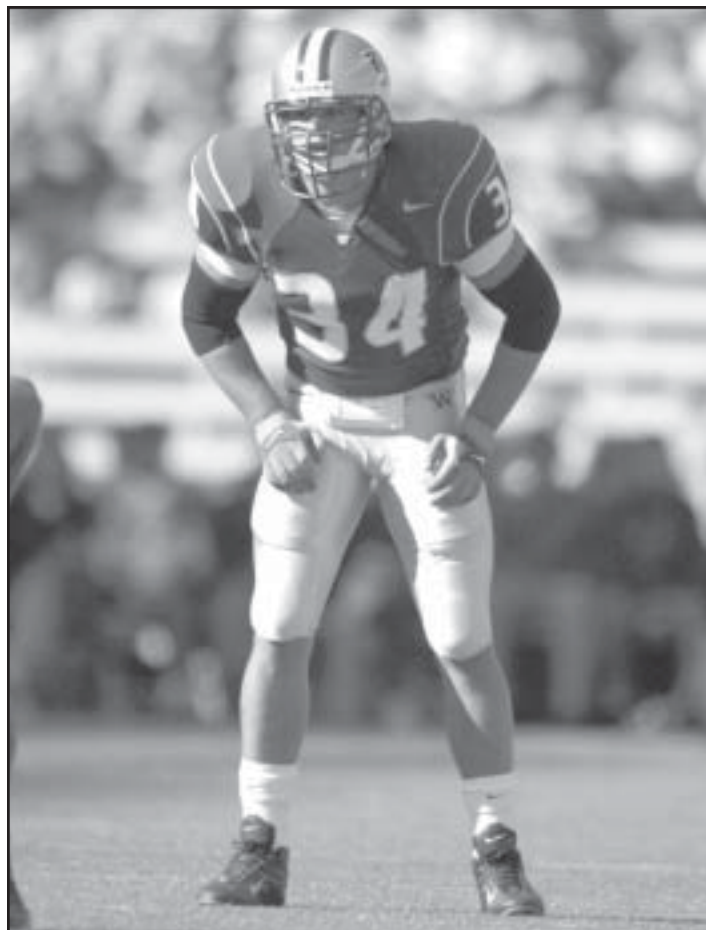
"That really is the cornerstone for all great football teams," he says. "You have to have great competition. The guys who are returning starters are certainly going to have the opportunity to maintain their starting status, but they are also going to get pressed. That is how we are going to get better as a football team. When they backups say, 'No, that's not good enough. I want to be a starter.'"

Defense

Washington will build its defense around eight returning starters and 26 returning lettermen. The Huskies will look to replace departed starters Jafar Williams at outside linebacker, Kai Ellis at defensive end and Ben Mahdavi and inside linebacker. Those three players all ranked among the top six tacklers on last year's team. Mahdavi tied for the team lead with 100 tackles.

Like the other Pac-10 schools, the Huskies could benefit by the fact so many talented senior quarterbacks graduated from conference schools last year. Washington's secondary, which has been riddled by injuries the past two seasons, returns 11 players who have earned at least one letter.

"We need to get better on the defensive side of the ball," Neuheisel says. "We played much better pass defense at the end of the regular season last year and I thought our front did a nice job against the run. If

we can carry those things over, and add more pressure to the quarterback, we'll be on the right track."

The Husky defense ranked 11th nationally against the run, allowing just 97.7 yards per game. That was the best total since the 1991 National Championship season and the fifth-best total since the 1964 season. During the final five games of the regular season the Husky secondary allowed 210 passing yards per game and totaled nine interceptions while allowing only six touchdowns.

Defensive Line

Three key starters on the Husky defensive line return in 2003. That group includes senior defensive tackle Terry Johnson, junior defensive tackle Josh Miller and junior defensive end Manase Hopoi. Senior tackle Jerome Stevens, a key reserve, is also back as well as a cast of reserve players who have all seen valuable playing time. Miller is not expected to practice during the spring due to a back injury.

"What we need are for those guys to improve," Neuheisel says. "We need to be a little stronger up there. Then we need our younger players to come along and be able to effectively get on the field for some plays so those starters can play one less play in a row and help to keep some fresh guys on the field."

In his first season of collegiate play, Hopoi made a solid debut by totaling 38 tackles, including 17 for lost yardage and seven sacks. He started all 13 games and managed to rack up four tackles for loss against both Arizona and Purdue in the Sun Bowl.

"Manase has great instincts to play the game and he has great hands," Neuheisel says. "He just has to get stronger and he will. He has not been blessed with blazing speed, so he needs to develop his technique to continue to improve."

Johnson, also a first-time starter last year, was not far behind Hopoi, sacking opponent quarterbacks five times and totaling 25 tackles. Miller, who started every game in 2002, had 33 total tackles, including seven for lost yards.

"Terry is an astonishing athlete," Neuheisel says. "You have to remember he was also recruited out of high school to play college volleyball. He has done some impressive things in the weightroom this year and he's run a 4.8 40, so we know he has the physical tools to get the job done. Josh has been very steady for us and I think we will continue to see him improve."

Juniors Tui Alailefaleula and Junior Coffin both return as backups at tackle with two years of playing experience behind them.

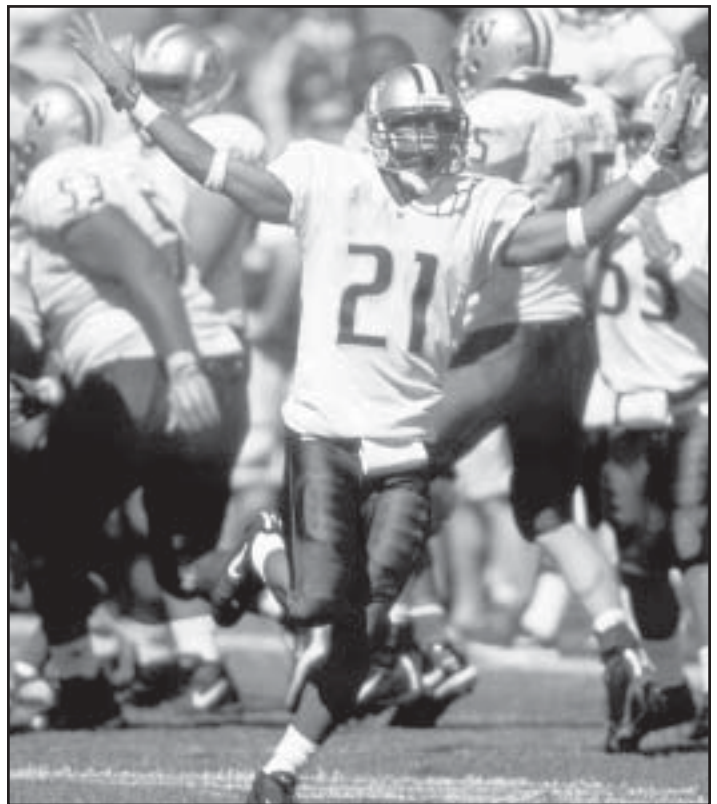
Several younger players will join one junior college transfer in competing for their first playing time.

Redshirt freshman Donny Mateaki, sophomore Mike Savicky and junior college transfer Mike Mapu will play behind Hopoi at defensive end. Redshirt freshmen Stanley Daniels and Dan Milsten will join true freshman Jordan Reffert as backups at tackle. Sophomores Graham Lasee and Will Conwell join redshirt freshmen Brandon Ala and Dash Crutchley at the end position that Ellis held down.

"There are a variety of young guys who have not had any experience who are going to be thrust into those situations," Neuheisel says. "We hope to get something out of them."

Linebacker

To help compensate for the loss of two key linebackers, Neuheisel has integrated a little bit of new and old in to the position. The new is Notre Dame transfer Cory Jones, who will compete for one the inside positions. The old is senior Greg Carothers, who moves into the SAM outside linebacker role after starting at safety the past two years. The move is not completely new territory for Carothers. He played the role during the Huskies' nickel package in the past.

"We feel that moving Greg Carothers into a linebacker role will help us to get our best players on the field," Neuheisel says. "He's been a very good player and gives us a great field leader. I think we are very athletic at linebacker and there will be some less experienced players getting a lot of opportunities this spring. We need to see some people step up so I'm eagerly anticipating the results."

Heading up the returning linebacking corps is senior Marquis Cooper. He tied Mahdavi last year for the team lead in total tackles with 100 after moving from an outside to inside position. Two veteran reserves expected to join him at the other inside linebacker position are juniors Tim Galloway and Joe Lobendahn. Galloway, who will miss spring drills due to shoulder surgery, had 26 tackles playing in all 13 games last year. Lobendahn started twice last year while playing in all 13 games and totaling 23 tackles. Junior Matt Lingley also returns and redshirt freshman Scott White will join the group of veterans.

Senior Tyler Krambrink is back at the outside linebacker spot after playing in nine games last season. Classmate Domynic Shaw, who has rotated among positions in the defensive backfield, is expected to move into the position this year.

Defensive Backfield

Washington has 12 letterwinners returning to its four positions in the defensive backfield. Included in that group are nine players who started at some point last season. The only player not to return from last year's unit is Carothers, who will switch to outside linebacker. Sophomore Nate Robinson's possible move to wide receiver should not be missed with the return of senior Roc Alexander, who missed seven games last season due to a shoulder injury.

Sophomores Evan Benjamin and James Sims will compete for the strong safety spot. Benjamin started three times last year at safety while playing in all 13 games. He accounted for 46 tackles, and is the fourth leading returning tackler from last year's squad. Sims started a free safety

five times to relieve Jimmy Newell when he was slowed by injuries. He accounted for 35 tackles before a sprained ankle kept him out of the final two regular-season contests. Senior Owen Biddle, who started the last three games of 2003 at free safety, could also play the position. He has appeared in 33 games during his Husky career.

Newell heads into spring practice as the starter at free safety. He battled several injuries the past two years that has limited him to appearances in 11 games during that period. Walkon B.J. Newberry and redshirt freshman Jordan Slye should also factor into the mix at the position.

"We have a lot of good athletes with a lot of experience at safety," Neuheisel says. "We would really like to see someone step up and make it a dominant position on the field. When the Huskies have had a Tony Parrish, Lawyer Milloy, Hakim Akbar, Curtis Williams type of player there in the past, it has been a good history. Sims and Benjamin really benefited by getting as much time as they did during their redshirt freshman seasons. That will help down the line."

Junior cornerback Derrick Johnson make a successful return to the defensive backfield last year after missing the entire 2001 campaign with a significant foot injury. Johnson started all 13 contests and came on strong late in the year, earning back-to-back Pac-10 defensive player of the week honors for his play against Oregon State and Oregon. He led the cornerbacks with 56 tackles and was first on the team with five interceptions and 10 pass breakups. Redshirt freshmen Eric Shyne and Matt Fontaine figure as his backups this spring.

The speedy Alexander gives the Huskies another solid veteran at cornerback. He had broken up 15 passes during his career and accounted for four interceptions. Robinson, who started the final six games in 2002 proved to be as sticky as flypaper in his coverage. He had 34 tackles in 13 games, broke up six passes and accounted for a pair of interceptions. Redshirt freshman Kim Taylor will also be developed at the position. Junior Sam Cunningham, who appeared in every game last year, also provides depth at cornerback, but will sit out spring drills while recovering from shoulder surgery.

"Roc and D.J. gives us a lot of experience at cornerback," Neuheisel says. "It will be important to keep them healthy to allow our younger players to work their way into the lineup. Nate really provided a boost to the position last year. He has a lot of swagger and it takes that kind of attitude to play the position. We are just not sure how much time he will be there depending on his ability to play wide receiver. He could do both for us."

Special Teams

Washington loses both kickers and deep snappers from last season's team, but returns all of its top kick return specialists. Another player the Huskies will be pressed to replace is Wilbur Hooks, who was an excellent punt coverage specialist.

Gone from last year's team is four-year placekicker John Anderson and Derek McLaughlin, who handled the punting duties the past two seasons. McLaughlin left for a two-year church sponsored mission following the Huskies' appearance in the Sun Bowl.

Anderson finished his career as one of the most successful kickers in UW history. He booted 61 field goals during his tenure, the second most by a Husky. His 331 career points also ranks second all-time among UW players. McLaughlin averaged 38.5 yards per punt as a sophomore after posting a 41.2 yard average as a freshman.

To fill those positions, the Huskies recruited a pair of scholarship kickers. Michael Braunstein, a place kicker from Gilbert, Ariz. and Sean Douglas, a punter from Bellevue, Neb., will compete for the starting kicking openings during fall camp. The Husky roster includes a number of walkons kickers who will have the opportunity to display their abilities during the spring practice session. None of those returning players have ever kicked in a game.

While the kicking game side of Washington's special teams will feature some new faces, the return side has a solid inventory of veteran players.

Frederick returns as Washington's principal kick returner from last season. He was the only player to return a punt for the Huskies last season, averaging 8.1 yards per return on 18 attempts last season. Frederick had 13 punt returns as a freshman, averaging 14.6 yards per runback. Frederick accounted for 30 of Washington's 39 kickoff returns in 2002. He averaged an even 20 yards per return; up from his 16.5 average he had on 13 runbacks as a freshman.

Robinson, Washington's other deep returner on special teams, fielded six kickoffs and averaged 17.2 yards per return as a freshman. Alexander and Derrick Johnson are other players who have returned kicks for the Huskies. Johnson had a combined 36 kicks from his freshman season in 2000. He ranked 21st nationally with a 24.2 kickoff return average that season.

The speedy Alexander led the Pac-10 in kickoff returns and finished sixth nationally in 2001 with a 29.2 average. He recorded three of the top 10 kickoff returns in UW history that season, highlighted by a 95-yard runback for a touchdown against Idaho.

Both of Washington's deep snappers, Ben Mahdavi (long) and Elliot Zajac (short) graduated. An injury prevented Zajac from snapping for half of the schedule allowing Galloway to gain some valuable experience. Jason Benn, a redshirt freshman, is considered another skilled candidate to fill the deep snapping void.

Coaching Staff Changes

In addition to preparing the players for the upcoming season this spring, Neuheisel also welcomes three new highly regarded assistant coaches to the team. Following the conclusion of the 2002 season, Washington saw assistant head coach Steve Axman, the Huskies quarterbacks coach, accept a position at UCLA as offensive coordinator for first-year coach Karl Dorrell, a former Neuheisel assistant. Bobby Hauck, the Huskies' secondary coach, took over the head coaching position at Montana, his alma mater. Brent Myers, the UW offensive line coach, joined Urban Meyer's new staff at Utah as the assistant head coach and offensive line coach.

Three veterans of the Pac-10 coaching fraternity will fill those positions. Neuheisel named Phil Snow as Washington's co-defensive coordinator and the team's secondary coach. He was the defensive coordinator at UCLA the past two seasons. John Pettas, the offensive coordinator at Louisville in 2002, returns to Washington as the quarterbacks coach. Don Cozzetto takes over as the Huskies' offensive line coach after holding the same post at Oregon State the past three years. All three coached together at one time for Arizona State when Bruce Snyder headed up the Sun Devils' program.

"I think all three are really good coaches," Neuheisel says. "They have familiarity not only with us but with each other and I think that really helps smooth the transition. I think everybody understands the mission and it is really clear what we are trying to get done. I'm excited about watching it take place and being involved in our improvement."

The Schedule

Washington kicks off its 2003 schedule by playing defending national champion Ohio State in Columbus on August 30. The game will be televised nationally by ABC Sports.

In addition to its eight-game Pac-10 schedule, the Huskies will host Indiana, Idaho and Nevada in non-conference games at Husky Stadium. The Pac-10 schedule includes home dates with Stanford, USC, Oregon and Washington State. The Huskies will go on the road to face Oregon State, UCLA, Arizona and California. Under the Pac-10 scheduling formula, the Huskies will not face Arizona State this season.

"That Ohio State game will be a tremendous opportunity for us," Neuheisel says. "We will certainly have a good understanding of what type of football team we can be after that game. It is a great game to point toward as our team prepares for next season."

Head Coach Rick Neuheisel

When Rick Neuheisel attended the 1998 Rose Bowl, to be inducted into its Hall of Fame, he took the time to enjoy the moment and bask in the gala and pageantry of the college football game known simply as "The Granddaddy of Them All."

As he watched the shadows creep over the Arroyo Seco, and the sun disappear into the western horizon, he turned to his wife, Susan, and said, "We've got to get back here someday."

It happened sooner than he expected.

Two years later Neuheisel was back in the Rose Bowl, hoisting the championship trophy above his head to the delight of 40,000 Husky fans after Washington had dispatched Purdue's Boilermakers 34-24.

After quarterbacking UCLA to a 45-9 victory against Illinois in the 1984 Rose Bowl, being inducted into the Hall of Fame, and coaching the Huskies to their seventh Rose Bowl championship, Neuheisel will long be considered one of the Rose Bowl's favorite sons.

Neuheisel prefers to deflect the attention for Washington's successes. He will be the first one to credit his players and coaching staff for making the commitment to return the Huskies to dominance.

When he first arrived in Seattle in January of 1999, Neuheisel challenged the Huskies to forego any feeling-out process with a new staff and simply make a commitment to winning.

The results speak for themselves.

During his first four years as a Husky, Neuheisel's teams have placed second, first, second and fourth in the Pac-10 race. The Huskies have appeared in a bowl game each season, including the 2001 Rose Bowl.

Last year's team rallied to win its final three regular season games and go on to appear in the Sun Bowl. The 7-6 Huskies broke numerous school and Pac-10 records as one of the nation's best passing teams and extended a home win streak to 17 games.

In 2001 Washington posted an 8-4 overall record, finished second in the Pac-10 with a 6-2 league mark and faced Texas in the Holiday Bowl. Washington picked up three wins vs. teams ranked in the top 10, beating Michigan, Stanford and Washington State.

The 2000 Huskies were a remarkable team. Washington trailed in eight of its 11 wins, showing incredible resilience and heart, not to mention strategy, in pulling off five consecutive fourth-quarter comebacks in a row.

For his efforts, Neuheisel was listed as a finalist for coach of the year by several different media outlets.

In 1999, his first season as the head football coach at Washington, Neuheisel accomplished something that none of his predecessors achieved. He guided the Huskies to a 7-5 record, including an invitation to the 1999 Culligan Holiday Bowl, becoming the first UW coach to take the team to a bowl game during his inaugural season.

Husky football fans and casual sports followers alike have quickly embraced Neuheisel for the spark he has added to Washington's storied football tradition. As a public speaker, he is in high demand. Neuheisel has spo-

ken at numerous fundraising events and generated lofty contributions with his charismatic speeches and penchant for innovative fundraising ideas.

Neuheisel took over the Washington program in January of 1999 after serving as the head football coach at Colorado from 1995 to 1998. His eight-year coaching record now stands at 66-30 (.688).

Washington is the second head coaching position for the 42-year old Neuheisel, who spent seven seasons as an assistant coach prior to securing the Colorado job. He worked six years at his alma mater, UCLA, under his college coach Terry Donahue, and was an assistant coach for one season on Bill McCartney's staff in Boulder. He was named the head coach at Colorado on Nov. 29, 1994.

At Colorado, Neuheisel compiled a 33-14 (.702) record and was 3-0 in postseason bowl games. All three of his bowl games were against Pac-10 Conference opponents. He had 20 wins in his first two seasons as a college coach, which tied for the fourth-most by a first-time college coach in the Division I-A modern era. Both of those Colorado teams finished in the top-10 of the national polls.

The road that led Neuheisel into coaching was an interesting, if not a unique one. After finishing his college career with a spectacular performance in the 1984 Rose Bowl in which he was named the game's Most Valuable Player, he graduated from UCLA in May, 1984, with a bachelor's degree in political science. Neuheisel had a solid 3.4 grade point average, the highest of all graduating football seniors, and was named Academic All-Pac 10. He won the Jack R. Robinson and Paul I. Wellman awards from the school to honor his academic excellence, and also earned an NCAA postgraduate scholarship as he aspired to attend law school. Neuheisel was inducted into the Rose Bowl's Hall of Fame in 1998.

He played two seasons (1984, 1985), with the San Antonio Gunslingers of the United States Football League. Following the 1985 USFL season (which was over by the end of summer), he decided to use his NCAA scholarship award and enrolled in law school at Southern California. The following summer, he joined the UCLA staff as a volunteer coach, specifically to tutor Troy Aikman on the UCLA offense. Aikman matured under Neuheisel's tutelage, and the two remain close friends to this day.

In 1987, Neuheisel played in the National Football League. He suited up for three games for the San Diego Chargers (starting two), and still holds a team record for completion percentage in a game (81.8, going 18-of-22 for 217 yards and a touchdown at Tampa Bay). He completed 40-of-59 passes in those three games for 367 yards and one touchdown, and added another touchdown rushing. Another claim to his short-lived NFL fame is that he is the last player to rush for a one-point conversion, running in a muffed PAT attempt at Cincinnati. This is forever a trivia answer, with the NFL now sporting the two-point conversion.

He closed out the season with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, dressing out for two games, but never getting the chance to play. He wore the same number at Tampa Bay (No. 7) that he wore for San Diego.

Neuheisel would again return to his alma mater, but this time in the capacity of a full-time assistant coach in charge of the quarterbacks, which he would coach for the next two seasons before switching to receivers coach in 1990.

While an assistant at UCLA, Neuheisel continued his studies in his pursuit of a law degree. He graduated from the University of Southern California School of Law in 1990 with his juris doctor degree. He would be sworn into the Arizona State Bar Association in May of 1991, and the Washington, D.C. Bar in March, 1993.

Neuheisel began his collegiate playing career as a walkon at UCLA, holding for kicker John Lee, and eventually battled Steve Bono for the starting quarterback job by his senior year. He secured the starting job four games into the regular season and quarterbacked the Bruins to the Pac-10 championship in 1983, earning honorable mention All-Pac 10 honors in the process. He was named the Most Valuable Player in the 1984 Rose

Bowl when UCLA beat Illinois, 45-9. In that game, Neuheisel completed 22-of-31 passes for 298 yards and four TDs, including a pair to Karl Dorrell, who later became Washington's offensive coordinator and was named the Bruins' head coach this year.

Neuheisel completed 198 of 290 passes for 2,480 yards and 15 touchdowns in his UCLA career, which at the time placed him sixth on the Bruins' all-time passing yards list. He still holds school records in completion percentage for both a single season (69.3 as a senior) and career (68.3). Another school record he still holds, completion percentage in a single game, set an NCAA record at the time; Neuheisel completed 25 of 27 passes (including 18 straight at one point) for 287 yards against Washington in 1983, a remarkable 92.6 percent.

He graduated from McClintock High School in Tempe, Ariz., in 1979, and was the school's most outstanding athlete his senior year as he lettered in football (quarterback), basketball (guard) and baseball (shortstop, outfield, pitcher). He is a member of McClintock's Hall of Fame.

Richard Gerald Neuheisel, Jr., was born on Feb. 7, 1961, in Madison, Wis., where he made his debut as a head coach when Colorado beat Wisconsin 43-7. He is married to the former Susan Wilkinson, and they have three children, Jerry (10), Jack (8) and Joe (5).

Neuheisel's father, Dick, was one of the original Tempe Diablos, a group which helped found the Fiesta Bowl, and is a former president of Sister Cities International, a worldwide goodwill organization. The son of Dick and Jane, Rick has three sisters, Nancy, Katie and Deborah. From his home on Lake Washington, he occasionally drives his boat to work. He has been a semi-regular participant on the Celebrity Golf Association Tour. In 1999, a month before the U.S. Open at Pebble Beach, he shot a 74 on the course.

Final 2002 Husky Football Notes

The Coach: Husky head coach Rick Neuheisel completed his fourth year at the helm of the Washington program in 2002. In four seasons, Neuheisel has led the Huskies to a 33-16 (.673) overall mark and an 23-9 record in Pac-10 play and finished either first or second in the league three of the four years. In 2002, the Huskies turned around a potential losing year by closing out the regular season with three straight wins, beating Northwest rivals Oregon State, Oregon and Washington State in succession, earning a fourth-place finish trip to the Sun Bowl. The Dawgs finished the year with a 7-6 overall mark and a 4-4 league record. In 2001, the Huskies made their second runner-up finish under Neuheisel, going 8-3 in the regular season (6-2 in the conference) before falling short in a barn-burner vs. Texas in the Holiday Bowl. In 2000, Washington posted an 11-1 overall record, a 7-1 conference mark and shared the Pac-10 Championship. After beating Purdue, 34-24, in the Rose Bowl, the Huskies finished with a No. 3 ranking in the final national polls. In his first season at Washington (1999), Neuheisel led the Huskies to a 7-5 overall mark, a second-place tie (6-2) in the Pac-10 and a trip to the Holiday Bowl. Neuheisel became the first Husky coach in history to lead the UW to a bowl game in his first season as head coach. Prior to coming to Washington, Neuheisel served four seasons as the head coach at Colorado, posting a 33-14 (.702) overall mark with the Buffaloes. His career record, in eight seasons, is 66-30 (.688). Neuheisel worked for six seasons as an assistant coach at his alma mater, UCLA, before joining Bill McCartney's Colorado staff in 1994 as the quarterbacks coach. Originally a walk-on at UCLA, Neuheisel won the starting quarterback position as a senior and led the Bruins to the 1983 Pac-10 championship. He was named the MVP of the 1984 Rose Bowl that saw UCLA defeat Illinois, 45-9. Washington fans remember Neuheisel's tremendous performance when he completed 25 of 27 passes to set an NCAA completions percentage record that was only recently broken. Neuheisel, a member of the Rose Bowl Hall of Fame, still holds the Bruins' single-season (69.3) and career (68.3) completion percentage records.

Continuity of Coaching: Going back to 1957, Washington has had only four head football coaches: Jim Owens (1957-75), Don James (1976-92), Jim Lambright (1993-99) and Rick Neuheisel (1999-present). In that time, the nine other Pac-10 schools have had an average of more than eight coaches each, a total of 77 (counting some of them - Bill Walsh, John Robinson, etc. - more than once). Oregon has had the next fewest with only six head coaches over that span. ASU, California, OSU and USC have had eight each. Arizona, UCLA and WSU have had nine head coaches since '57 and Stanford has had 11.

Pickett Atop the Pac: Junior quarterback Cody Pickett had an unprecedented season in terms of his passing statistics. Washington, well-known for producing NFL quarterbacks, had never seen anything close to the prolific numbers that Pickett posted in 2002. Pickett, who threw for 4,458 yards, smashed Cary Conklin's old school record of 2,569, set in 1989, moving past Conklin in the season's seventh game. In the year's 10th game, vs. Oregon State, he took over the No. 1 spot for career passing yards and now has 6,873, well in front of Brock Huard's old mark of 5,742. Nov. 16 at Oregon, in the 11th game of the year, Pickett broke the Pac-10 single-season yardage record, surpassing Ryan Leaf's 1997 mark of 3,637, as well as Steve Stenstrom's Pac-10 record of 300 completions. Pickett finished the year with 365. Pickett's 4,458 yards were third-most in Division I in 2002. Pickett now owns the following UW passing records: game, season and career passing yards; game, season and career completions; season and career attempts; season touchdown passes; season and career passing yards per game; season and career completions per game; season and career attempts per game; season and career 50-plus yard passes; season and career 200-yard games; season and career 300-yard games; season and career 400-yard games and consecutive 300-yard games.

Like a Broken Record: Washington put its mark on the school record book in 2002, particularly in the offense categories and, even more specifically, in the passing department. Here's a list of some team single-season school records that the Huskies have broken this year:

Postseason Quickies: Sixth-year senior receiver Patrick Reddick grabbed 54 receptions to tie for sixth on the Huskies single-season list ... Washington coach Rick Neuheisel is now 9-2 against the other three Pac-10 schools from the Northwest during his tenure on Montlake ... the last time the Huskies defeated two ranked teams on the road in the same regular season (as they did in 2002 with wins over No. 23 Oregon and No. 3 Washington State) was 1991, when Washington downed No. 9 Nebraska (36-21) and No. 7 California (24-17) ... UW's 16 interceptions were the most by a Husky team since 1996 (also 16).

Pickett Shatters Marks: In the season's seventh game, junior quarterback Cody Pickett broke the UW single-season passing yards record. Three weeks later vs. Oregon State, Pickett, with 14 games left in his UW career at the time, broke the Huskies' career passing yards record. Another week later at Oregon, he broke the Pac-10's single-season yards record and in the regular season's final game at WSU, he became the first 4,000-yard passer in Pac-10 history. He also ranks on nearly every other Washington career top-10 list, including No. 1 on many. In the loss at USC, Pickett threw for 350 yards to extend his school record of seven consecutive 300-yard games, a streak that was broken at ASU. He had his third 400-yard game of the year vs. UCLA. Pickett, who has since raised his career passing total to 6,873 yards, passed both Huards to the No. 1 spot vs. OSU. Pickett, who set a UW single-game record with 34 completions vs. Wyoming then broke it with 35 vs. Cal and tied that with 35 at WSU, now has 535 career completions, putting him first on that list. His career mark of 12.85 yards per completion ranks No. 10 and his 264.3 yards per game are currently a school record. His 20.6 completions per game are No. 1 and his career completion percentage of .582 is No. 3. Pickett boasts a slew of firsts: he is the first UW QB to post more than one career 400-yard game (he has four); the first to post 12 300-yard games; and the first to throw for 300 yards in more than two consecutive games (he had seven straight to start the 2002 season). In just 26 career games Pickett already boasts seven of the top 10 and 10 of Washington's top-17 single-game totals in passing yards. His 19 career 200-yard passing days are most in UW history and his 10 50-plus-yard passes are also a school record. Finally, his 38 career TDs are second while his 28 touchdowns in 2002 were most in UW history, five better than Brock Huard's old 1997 record of 23. Pickett in the Pac: With 4,458 yards in 2002, Cody Pickett was the first 4,000-yard passer in Pac-10 history. November 16 at Oregon, he passed Stanford's Steve Stenstrom (1993) and WSU's Ryan Leaf (1997) to take over the top spot. He also surpassed Stenstrom's single-season completions record (300 in 1993) and finished with 365 on the year. With 7,177 career passing yards (the Pac-10 counts all bowls in career stats, not just starting in 2002), Pickett ranks No. 22 all-time in Pac-10 history, with more than one full season to play, 4,444 yards behind record-holder Carson Palmer (11,621). Pickett Among Nation's Elite: With his outstanding junior season, junior quarterback Cody Pickett placed himself among the nation's top signalcallers. Pickett ranked No. 31 in the nation in passing efficiency, but his raw totals were even more outstanding. His 328.7 yards per game of total offense ranked No. 3 in the nation (trailing leader Byron Leftwich Marshall at 355.6) and his 28.8 pass completions per game ranked No. 2, trailing Texas Tech's Kliff Kingsbury (34.2). His 4,458 yards were second in the nation (Kingsbury, 5,017) and his 28 TD passes were tied for sixth in the country. As a team, the Huskies ranked No. 4 in passing offense and No. 17 in total offense in Division I-A.

Pickett's 2001 Charge: In 2001, in only his first season at the helm of the Husky offense, Cody Pickett began his assault on the Husky record books. In 2001, Pickett broke four UW records, most significantly the single-game passing yardage mark. In a 31-28 win over Arizona (in which Pickett also ran in the winning touchdown with 13 seconds left), he broke Cary Conklin's 1989 record of 428 passing yards in a game with 455, despite a separated right (throwing) shoulder suffered two weeks earlier vs. USC. Pickett also broke the UW single-season record for passing yards per game (240.3), passing yards by a sophomore (2,403) and 50-plus yard passes in a season (five). Cody's Bombs: With three passes of over 70 yards in 2001 (78 to Paul Arnold, 75 to Patrick Reddick, 74 to Reggie Williams), and three more in 2002 (89 and 80 to Williams, and 74 to Charles Frederick), Cody Pickett is the only Husky QB ever to throw six 70-plus-yard passes in a career. Only Damon Huard, Tom Porras and Billy Joe Hobert had ever thrown as many as two 70-yard passes.

Williams Breaks All Marks: Sophomore wide receiver Reggie Williams was only one game into his sophomore season when he passed the 1,000-yard mark for career receiving. In the loss at USC, he had his third straight 100-yard receiving game (tying a school record) and his eighth career 100-yard day (breaking the school record). Williams, who ranked No. 5 in the NCAA in yards per game and No. 9 in receptions per game, made it to the top of the UW career receiving yards with his 198-yard performance at Oregon in week 11. With 2,427 career yards, he has beaten Mario Bailey's old record by 334 yards. With 14 catches in the Oregon game (most ever by a UW receiver), Williams broke Jerome Pathon's single-season record of 69. Williams ended 2002 with 94, the third-highest total in Pac-10 history. His 1,454 receiving yards in 2002 were also a school record, beating Jerome Pathon's 1,245 in 1997. Williams' 1,454 yards were only two short of the Pac-10 record (1,456 by Stanford's Troy Walters). At WSU (where he had 12 catches), he passed Paul Skansi on the UW career receptions chart and now tops the list with 149. Williams now ranks No. 1 on the UW career yards-per-game list by a large margin. With his average of 101.1 yards per game during his career thus far, he's more than 35 yards per game better than Brian Slater's former mark of 65.9. Reggie's Record Season: In the season's 10th game vs. Oregon State, sophomore receiver Reggie Williams became only the fourth wideout in UW history to post a 1,000-yard season in receiving yards. With his 169-yard game at Washington State, Williams passed Jerome Pathon to take over the No. 1 single-season spot in UW history and the No. 3 spot in Pac-10 history. With is 973 yards as a freshman in 2001, Williams is the only Husky with two of the top-10 receiving yardage seasons in school history. Here are the top-10 single-season receivers (yards) ever at the UW and the top five in Pac-10 history (by yards):

Mr. November: During Washington's season-ending, three-game winning streak (Oregon State, Oregon, Washington), Reggie Williams caught 35 passes for 461 yards (153.7 yards per game) and four touchdowns. In the WSU win, Williams set an Apple Cup record with 12 receptions bettering his own mark of 11 he set as a freshman last year. In two career games vs. Washington State, Williams has 23 receptions for 372 yards.

How Good Is Reggie?: Sophomore receiver Reggie Williams, a first-team All-Pac-10 selection and a consensus first-team All-America, had, statistically, the best two-year run in Pac-10 receiving history. In 2002, Williams' 94 receptions were the third-most in Pac-10 history and his 1,454 yards were second on the all-time conference list. In two years, Williams has caught 149 balls for 2,427 yards and 14 touchdowns. No receiver in Pac-10 history has ever posted that many receiving yards over a two-year span, and the only two players with than many receptions over two seasons - Arizona's Dennis Northcutt and Arizona's Bobby Wade - all did it during their junior and senior seasons, as did USC's Keyshawn Johnson, who had one fewer reception than Williams. Incidentally, Williams would need 94 receptions and 1,556 more receiving yards to reach the Pac-10 records of 248 and 4,047 yards, both held by Stanford's Troy Walters (1996-99). Here are the top-four, two-year receiving performances in Pac-10 history:

Brax Is Back: Fifth-year senior tailback Braxton Cleman returned to the starting lineup at USC and made a major impact - not so much in the running game, but as a pass receiver. Cleman, who entered the game with 28 career receptions, shattered the UW single-game receptions record by catching 15 balls. His 15 catches smashed the Husky record of 12, set by receiver Dane Looker in a 1998 game at USC. Prior to Cleman's big day, the Husky record for receptions by a running back in a game was seven (a record shared by Cleman thanks to his seven catches vs. Cal earlier this season). His 15 catches, obviously, more than doubled that mark and tie for the second most in Pac-10 history (by backs or receivers). ASU's Ron Fair caught 19 passes in a 1989 game vs. Washington State and holds the Pac-10 record. Cleman's 15 receptions tied Daneane Douglas (Cal, 1998) and Johnnie Morton (USC, 1993) for second most in conference history. Incidentally, the NCAA record for most receptions in a game by a running back is 18, by Long Beach State's Mark Templeton vs. Utah State in 1986.

The A-Train: After a sensational freshman year in which he broke the school's freshman rushing record (726 yards) and posted four 100-yard games, junior Rich Alexis suffered through an admittedly rough season in 2001, gaining only 391 yards on the ground. In 2002, he returned to closer to the form that earned him freshman All-America honors in 2000. Despite missing almost all of the California game with a sprained ankle and not playing at USC, Alexis gained 688 yards on 202 carries, a 3.4-yard average. He's also scored 10 touchdowns in 11 games. In the season opener at Michigan, Alexis fell only two yards short of the century mark, finishing with 98 yards. After posting 125 yards vs. San Jose State, he came back with 94 against Wyoming a week later. His 122 yards and two TDs at Oregon made for his best day of the year. He also shattered his old career receiving highs vs. Wyoming with a team-high seven catches for 55 yards (old highs: 3 catches for 31 yards). Against Idaho, he rushed for 64 yards on 19 carries and caught six passes for another career high of 87 yards. Alexis ranked seventh in the Pac-10 in rushing with 62.5 yards per game.

Alexis Rising: With 1,805 rushing yards and 24 rushing TDs on 444 career carries, junior tailback Rich Alexis is climbing some UW top-10 career lists. Despite a sprained ankle that limited him to just one carry against Cal - a serious hit to his per-game numbers - Alexis still ranks No. 10 on the Huskies' career rushing yards-per-game list with 54.7. He has captured ninth place on the career rushing attempts list, and with 93 more yards, he'll catch Toussaint Tyler (1,898 yards) for 10th place in career rushing yards. Finally, with two TDs at Oregon, he moved into fifth place on the career rushing TDs chart. Here are some top-10 lists on which Alexis currently ranks:

Ware Latest In Tight End Tradition: Several years ago, when Sports Illustrated ranked the top college programs all-time by position, Washington's tradition of outstanding tight ends was picked No. 1 at that spot. And for good reason - the Huskies' last six regular starters (and one backup) at the tight end position have all gone on to NFL success, dating all the way back to Aaron Pierce. Pierce started the majority of the 1990 and '91 seasons before being drafted by the New York Giants in 1992. Since Pierce, Mark Bruener (Pittsburgh, '95), Ernie Conwell (St. Louis, '96), Cam Cleeland (New Orleans, '98), Jeremy Bringham (Oakland, '98), Reggie Davis (San Diego, '99) and Jerramy Stevens (Seattle, '02) all appeared in the NFL. Five of those seven remain in the NFL today, including four (Stevens, Bringham, Conwell and Bruener) with their original team. Of the group, four were selected in the first or second round, and two (Conwell, Bruener) have started in Super Bowls. In the 2003 draft, senior Kevin Ware will try and keep the streak alive.

Ware Moving Up: Despite entering the year with only eight career receptions, senior tight end Kevin Ware put his name on the list of the top tight ends ever at the UW, a school that has earned the reputation as "Tight End U". Ware's 42 receptions in 2002 were second-most in Husky history by a tight end. His five touchdowns (he had none prior to this year) were tied for fifth in UW career history. His 463 receiving yards in 2002 were fourth in single-season history while his 587 career yards ended up eighth on the career chart. His 50 career catches ranked 10th all-time. Here are some lists:

E.T.'s Returns: After spending his freshman year primarily as a return man, Charles "E.T." Frederick excelled as both a returner and receiver in 2002. His 45 catches were third on the team while his 651 receiving yards ranked No. 2 on the club. He's also set a school record for kickoff returns with 30 (breaking Steve Jones' 1988 record of 24). Furthermore, his 601 kickoff return yards were second-most in Husky history, 25 yards back of record-holder Toure Butler (626 in 1998). Frederick's 810 career kick return yards are ninth in Husky history, well short of Steve Bramwell's mark of 1,443 (set from 1963-65).

Experienced O-Line: In 2001, the primary preseason concern for the Washington football team was inexperience on the offensive line. In 2002, that seemed to be one of the least of the coaches' concerns. In 2001, only senior center Kyle Benn entered the year with any significant game experience. The following season, he was the only regular not returning. Four starters - senior Elliott Zajac, juniors Todd Bachert and Nick Newton and sophomore Khalif Barnes - all returned to the line. All but Newton started all 12 games in 2001 (Newton started 11). Aside from the four returning starters, the Huskies also had four other offensive linemen returning after having earned a letter the previous season: junior Jason Simonson and sophomores Aaron Butler (who started once in Newton's place), Ryan Brooks and Dan Dicks. So, in other words, the UW line returned four starters and a startling nine lettermen in 2002.

Tank's TDs: Junior defensive tackle Terry Johnson, who entered the UW in 2000 as a tight end, has put those pass-catching skills to good use as a defensive player. Over a three-game stretch, (the 2001 Holiday Bowl to the second game of 2002), Johnson scored two touchdowns on interception returns. In the Holiday Bowl, he picked off a Major Applewhite pass and ran it back 38 yards for a score. Against San Jose State, he intercepted a pass in the endzone for seven points.

Mahdavi Proves Worthy: Once a walkon, senior linebacker Ben Mahdavi emerged his junior year as one of the Huskies' top defensive players. The Mercer Island High product led the 2001 Washington team with 85 total tackles and with five sacks. He finished his 2002 season tied for the team-lead with fellow inside backer Marquis Cooper. Both had exactly 100 stops. At the first team meeting of the 2000 season, Husky coach Rick Neuheisel announced that Mahdavi had been awarded a scholarship. Mahdavi made his head coach look good in the season opener against Idaho when he came up with two of the Huskies' biggest plays. Midway through the second quarter he scooped up a fumble and raced 35 yards for a touchdown. Early in the fourth quarter he blocked a Vandal punt that UW recovered on the one-yard line and converted into a touchdown. A backup inside linebacker, Mahdavi also recorded seven tackles, then a career high, in that game. Mahdavi also has the distinction of having scored the first touchdown of the 1999 season as well when he fell on a fumbled punt in the endzone for a TD at Brigham Young in Neuheisel's UW coaching debut. Early in 2000, Mahdavi moved into a starting spot, compiling eight starts in 2000. He started all 11 games plus the Holiday Bowl in 2001 and entered the 2002 season as the Huskies' top defensive player in terms of career starts with 19 (not counting bowls). Mahdavi had originally signed a letter of intent at Utah, but transferred before the 1998 season.

Anderson's Kicking Records: After missing his first three field goals in the 2002 Apple Cup victory, senior kicker John Anderson did more than redeem himself, hitting his last five attempts to lift the Huskies to a 29-26, three-overtime win over third-ranked Washington State. Anderson missed from 50, 51 and 34 yards before making a 35-yarder in the third. His 27-yard FG with 15 seconds left in regulation tied the game and he made one field goal in each overtime period (34, 46 and 49 yards) to win the game. His five field goals made tied a school record (Jeff Jaeger vs. Houston, 1985) and were tied for second-most in Pac-10 history (UCLA's John Lee made six vs. San Diego State in 1984). His eight attempts set a UW record and tied the Pac-10 mark (Luis Zendejas, Arizona State vs. Stanford, 1983).

Anderson's Leg: Washington senior placekicker John Anderson entered his final collegiate season as one of the top candidates for the Lou Groza Award, which he also won as a high school senior. He finished the year ranked seventh in the nation (tied) with 1.69 field goals per game. Against Cal on Oct. 5, Anderson tied a UW single-game record with five field goal attempts, the most by any Husky kicker since Jeff Jaeger was a perfect 5-for-5 against Houston in 1985. Anderson converted four of the five kicks - the second-most field goals made in a game at Washington - including one from 51 yards. Against Arizona, Anderson booted a 52-yarder, the third-longest (tied) in UW history, and the fifth 50+-yard field goal of the senior's career. He bagged his sixth with a 52-yarder vs. Oregon State. In the Apple Cup win over WSU, he set school records with five FGs made and eight attempted. Anderson went 61-for-91 (.670) on field goals in his career, the fifth-best percentage in school history. His 22 (out of 34) field goals in 2002 were tied for second in single-season history. As a freshman in 1999, Anderson converted 13 of 18 field goals and 34 of 35 PATs that year and led Washington in scoring with 73 points. Anderson's 50-yard field goal against Oregon State that season was the longest by a UW kicker since Jeff Jaeger converted a 52-yard field goal in 1983 vs. Oregon. Since Jaeger's kick, the Huskies had made 224 field goals over the previous 17 seasons without making one from at least 50 yards. Anderson ended that season with three 50-yard field goals to his credit, including a 56-yarder at UCLA to tie the UW school record. That field goal tied as the 14th longest in Pac-10 history, and was the longest by a true freshman in conference history. His kick was the seventh longest in Pac-10 history since 1989, when use of a kicking tee was eliminated. When Anderson booted three 40-plus yard FGs vs. Stanford in 1999, it marked the first time a Husky kicker had converted three 40-yard field goals since Brandy Brownlee made four vs. Texas A&M in 1987. Additionally, as a freshman in 1999, Anderson became only the second true freshman in NCAA history (joining Texas A&M's Tony Franklin) to boot three 50-yard field goals in a single season.

Kelley's Travels: A week after the 2001 Rose Bowl victory over Purdue, senior linebacker Anthony Kelley embarked on a trip to South Africa. Kelley, a regular on the defense the last three years and expected to start again in 2002, earned a fellowship to study in South Africa during the winter, 2001 quarter. A former partial academic qualifier, Kelley earned the team's Inspirational Academic Award at the 2000 postseason banquet and graduated last spring. By graduating, Kelley was granted an additional year of eligibility for the 2002 season. Kelley went to South Africa for a second time in early 2002, and upon returning to the United States, raised \$25,000 to bring a troupe of grade-school-aged South African dancers to Seattle for six weeks over the summer. He was honored with the Carlson Leadership Award and also spoke at a ceremony at the UW in which Archbishop Desmond Tutu was rewarded with an honorary doctorate. Near the end of his senior season, Kelley was named to the American Football Coaches Association's All-Good Works Team.

Ellis' Exploits: If only Kai Ellis were allowed to play all of his games against Michigan. The senior linebacker's two career matchups with the Wolverines have yielded the best performances of his Husky career. In the 2002 opener, Ellis contributed to the UW's defensive effort in just about every way possible, notching a sack, a fumble recovery, an interception, a rush tackle-for-loss, and batting down a pass in Michigan's final series. The sack, fumble recovery and interception were each the first of Ellis' career, while his two pass defenses doubled his career total. In the 2001 home opener, Ellis tormented the Wolverines to the tune of 13 tackles, including one tackle-for-loss. In between the two games, Ellis appeared in seven contests for Washington, totaling as many as five tackles just twice, and just once notching a tackle-for-loss.

Parade of Wideouts: Washington's wide receivers comprised one of the more unique gatherings of prep talent at a single position in recent years. Three Husky wideouts - senior Paul Arnold and sophomores Reggie Williams and Charles Frederick - were former Parade All-Americans, one of the nation's highest prep accolades. Arnold and Williams, meanwhile, were also named to USA Today's first-team All-America squad, while Frederick was a first-team selection by USAToday.com. Arnold earned the honors in 1998 as a tailback at Seattle's Kennedy High School, while Williams and Frederick were each honored as wide receivers following the 2000 season. Williams and Frederick were also touted by at least one publication in 2000 as the top prep wide receiver in the nation. Williams was No. 1 according to Prep Football Report and USAToday.com, while Frederick was the top selection of Student Sports magazine. Incidentally, Frederick also earned honorable mention All-American honors for basketball from USA Today in 1999.

D.J. Picking Up the Pace: Sophomore cornerback Derrick Johnson entered the Oregon State game (the 10th of the year), making his 13th career start and his 21st appearance. In that time, he had one interception. Two weeks later, he had five, thanks to back-to-back two-pick games vs. OSU and Oregon. Johnson's five interceptions in 13 games this year (0.38 per game) ranked in a tie for 35th in the NCAA. Johnson, who started three games plus the Rose Bowl as a freshman in 2000, almost had his career ended when he suffered a major foot injury during off-season training. He sat out the 2001 season recovering.

Like Father, Like Son: The only true freshman to play in the 2002 season was cornerback and return man Nate Robinson. The diminutive (5-foot-9) Seattle native brings a great legacy with him to the UW as his father, Jacque Robinson, was an outstanding tailback for the Huskies in the early 1980s. The elder Robinson still ranks No. 7 on the UW career rushing list (2,300 yards) after finishing his career ranked No. 4. He led the Huskies in rushing in 1982 and 1984 and was a freshman when he was named MVP of the UW's 28-0 win over Iowa in the 1982 Rose Bowl. He capped his career by earning MVP honors in the 1985 Orange Bowl, a 28-17 win over Oklahoma. Nate, who also intends to play basketball at Washington, is the only UW freshman to play this season, starting on kick returns. Robinson has also become a starter at cornerback, starting each of the last six games. Robinson also plays basketball and, despite not getting much practice in before the season began, has made an impact as the team's sixth man and one of its top scorers.

Apple Cup Notes: Washington's victory marked the first time the Huskies have defeated a team ranked in the top three in the AP poll since the 1984 season. That year, Washington beat third-ranked Michigan 20-11 in Ann Arbor. Washington's 29-26 victory over WSU in triple overtime marked the first multiple-overtime game in Husky history. UW is now 2-1 all-time in overtime games. The Huskies beat Washington State, 31-24, in the 1996 Apple Cup in one overtime. The Huskies lost to UCLA, 23-20, in one overtime during the 1999 season. Washington's victory gave the Huskies a five-game winning streak in the Apple Cup series. It marks the fourth time in the 95-game series the Huskies have won at least five consecutive games in the series. The Huskies own a pair of eight-game win streaks in the series (1959-1966 and 1974-1981). The Huskies now lead the series 62-27-6.

Ranked-Wins Streak: With its win over No. 23-ranked Oregon Nov. 16, the Huskies picked up their 14th straight year with a victory over a team ranked in the Associated Press poll. Washington's upset of 11th-ranked Michigan in the 2001 opener had made it 13 straight in 2001, but the Huskies had gone 0-3 in such games in 2002 before winning at UO. UW has now defeated an AP-ranked team in 25 of its last 26 seasons. The only break in the streak came in 1988 when the Huskies played only two games against nationally-ranked foes - UCLA (No. 2) and USC (No. 3) - losing both of those games.

The Sacks Are Back: Washington's eight sacks vs. Wyoming were the most by a Husky team in a single game since 1998, when the UW defense posted a school-record 13 sacks in back-to-back games against Utah State and California. Washington finished the season with a total of 36 sacks, 14 more than the Huskies' total from all of the 2001 season. Senior Kai Ellis and sophomore Manase Hopoi, both defensive ends, shared the team lead with seven sacks apiece, two better than the total of the 2001 season leader, linebacker Ben Mahdavi. Both Terry Johnson and Anthony Kelley also recorded five each in 2002.

.500 or Better Seasons: With the Apple Cup win over WSU, Washington secured its 26th consecutive non-losing season. The last time that Washington finished below .500 was 1976, when the Dawgs went 5-6. Since then, the Huskies are 214-87-3 (.709) overall. The Huskies' 26-season streak of non-losing seasons is the 14th longest in NCAA history (tied with Florida State's current streak) and the third longest current streak. BYU's 27-season streak was broken in 2002 with the Cougars finishing the year 5-7. Here are the longest streaks currently running:

.500 or Better Seasons - In Pac-10 Play: While Washington's string of 26 straight non-losing seasons is easily the best in the Pac-10, their stretch of .500-or-better marks in Pac-10 play is even more dominant compared to the rest of the league. The Huskies last finished under .500 in Pac-10 play in 1988 (3-5), a streak of 14 straight non-losing league seasons. By contrast, every other team in the Pac-10 has had a losing league season at least once in the last three seasons (2000-2002). Only WSU, USC and UCLA have two-year streaks.

Winning the Close Ones: In 49 games under coach Rick Neuheisel, the winning margin (for either side) has been seven points or fewer 24 times. In those 24 games decided by a touchdown or less, Washington is 17-7 and had won 10 straight before falling to Texas, 47-43 in the 2001 Holiday Bowl. Washington had lost three straight such games (Texas, Michigan, Cal) before the Oct. 12, 2002, four-point win over Arizona.

The Shutout Streak: Washington's Sun Bowl loss to Purdue marked the 253rd consecutive game in which Washington has not been shut out. That's the best streak among Pac-10 schools. BYU has the nation's longest streak at 350 games (NCAA record), while Texas is second with 265 games. The last opponent to hold the Huskies scoreless was UCLA (31-0) on Nov. 7, 1981. Washington has played 167 Pac-10 Conference games since then without a shutout - the second best current streak among Pac-10 schools.

Finishing First or Second: Despite a fourth-place finish in 2002, Washington has still finished either first or second in the Pacific-10 Conference (including ties) in 18 of the last 26 seasons, dating back to a fourth-place finish in 1976. Over that span, Washington has won the championship (outright or shared) eight times - 1977, 1980, 1981, 1990, 1991, 1992, 1995 and 2000 - while finishing second 10 other times.

The 100-Yard Factor: Since the 1947 season, Washington is 155-35-3 (.811) when a Husky player rushes for 100 yards in a game. In 2002, the Huskies were 2-0 in such games (San Jose State and Oregon) as Rich Alexis has topped the century mark twice.

History Lesson: Successfully rushing the football and winning go hand-in-hand for the Huskies. Since 1990, Washington has rushed for 200 yards in a game 56 times. The Huskies' record stands at 51-4-1 (.920) in those contests. Since the 1995 season, Washington is 26-1-1 (.946) when rushing for 200 yards.

Fourth-Quarter Comebacks: Under Rick Neuheisel, Washington has had to come from behind in 24 of its 33 wins. That total includes eight such wins in 2000 and six in 2001, and five games this year. Of those 24 come-from-behind wins, Washington has trailed in the fourth quarter and won 15 times, including five times last year. In the 2000 Arizona win, the Huskies took the lead in the fourth, then gave it up again before taking it back for good on their last drive. Here's a breakdown of the Huskies' fourth-quarter comebacks in the last four seasons:

The Red Zone: Washington made it into its opponents' red zone 12 more times than the opposition got inside the Husky 20-yard line in 2002. And while the Huskies posted seven more red-zone scores, their touchdown percentage was markedly lower than the opposition. Playing at Home: The Huskies finished the home slate 5-2 in 2002 after going 6-0 record in 2001, marking the 13th time ever and the sixth time in the last 12 seasons that the Dawgs had played perfect at home (1991, 1992, 1994, 1996, 2000). Washington has won 67 of its last 81 (.833) games at Husky Stadium with one tie (67-13-1). Since 1980, the Huskies stand 115-24-2 (.823) at home. Since 1990, the Huskies are 43-9-1 (.821) at Husky Stadium vs. Pac-10 opponents.

Historic Husky Stadium: The 2002 season marked the 83rd season of play in Husky Stadium. Original construction on the facility was completed in 1920 when Washington played one game in the new campus facility. Thanks to several major renovations, Husky Stadium's seating capacity has increased to its current total of 72,500. That makes Husky Stadium the 24th-largest college football venue in the nation. It is the 20th-largest on-campus facility in the country. UW's all-time record in Husky Stadium currently stands at 332-135-21 (.702).

Random Notes: After having opened the season on the road at Michigan, the UW stayed at home for five consecutive games, marking the first time since 1931 that a UW team has played five straight at Husky Stadium in a single season ... in the early part of the last century, it was relatively common for the UW to play much more than half of its games at home and five-game homestands were not rare. However, since the '31 season (the Huskies went 4-1-1 in a six-game home stretch that year), the Huskies have never played more than four in a row at home in any one season ... three times, however, the Huskies have stretched lengthy homestands over two seasons: the UW played its last three of 1969 and the first four of the 1970 season on Montlake and in 1973-74 and 1975-76, the Huskies played six straight home games over two seasons ... in 2002, Washington led the Pac-10 in attendance for the 12th time in the last 13 seasons, averaging 71,435 fans per game ... not bad, considering that Husky Stadium has a smaller capacity than five of 10 conference schools (ASU, Cal, Stanford, UCLA and USC) ... walkon freshman cornerback Simi Reynolds, who's actually at the UW on a baseball scholarship, received a community service award from the Athletes for a Better World organization in a luncheon at Seahawks Stadium on Oct. 29 ... Reynolds, whose older brother Tila is the baseball team's starting shortstop, was honored for his work mentoring young children with disabilities and for his founding role in Athletes for Kids ... prior to the California contest, Washington had intercepted at least one pass in seven consecutive games, dating back to the 2001 season (and counting the Holiday Bowl) ... the last time that the Huskies intercepted a pass in seven straight games was in 1995, when they also went seven straight with at least one pick ... sixth-year senior Patrick Reddick had a career day vs. Cal, setting new personal highs for both receptions (10) and receiving yards (105) ... his 10 catches were the sixth-most ever (tied) in UW single-game history at the time ... Washington had five players with 30 or more catches and four with 40 or more for the first time ever ... this year, Reggie Williams (94), Patrick Reddick (54), Charles Frederick (45), Kevin Ware (42) and Paul Arnold (37) all had 30 or more receptions ... Washington committed as many or more turnovers than their opponent in eight of 13 games this year ... in the five games in which the Huskies have won the turnover battle, they've won: Idaho, Arizona, Oregon State, Oregon and Washington State ... in the UW's four Pac-10 wins, it was plus-11 in turnovers; in its four Pac-10 losses, it was minus-seven.
