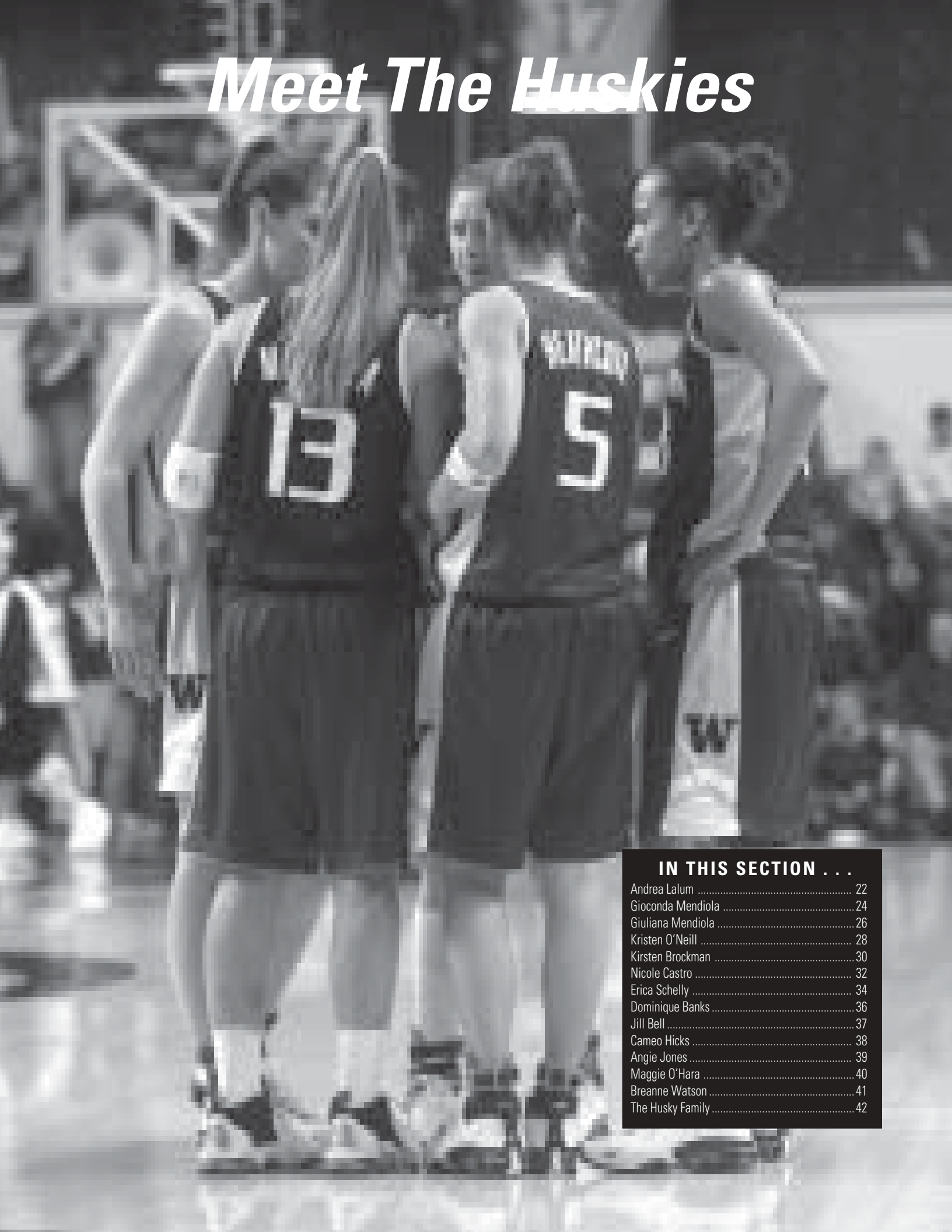

AT WASHINGTON

JUNIOR YEAR (2002-03) — All-Pac-10 honorable mention selection and Pac-10 All-Academic second-team honoree for the second-straight year...Started all 30 games...team's second-leading rebounder with 4.5 boards...third-leading scorer with 10.8 points per game...recorded 19 double-figure scoring games including six of the last nine of the season...two 20+ point games...notched ninth career double-double with 20 points and season-high 10 rebounds vs. Houston...scored season-high 23 points vs. Iowa State, including game-winning basket with 10.8 seconds remaining on the clock...equaled career-high with four assists vs. Oregon (2/22)...drained career-high five three-pointers vs. USC (1/30)...career-high seven three-pointers attempted vs. USC in Pac-10 Tournament (3/8)...team's leading scorer vs. Arizona in the Pac-10 Tournament with 14 points, including shooting 80 percent from three-point range (4-5)...nailed four three-pointers in back-to-back Pac-10 Tournament games...named to Seattle Times Husky Classic All-Tournament team.

SOPHOMORE YEAR (2001-02) — Earned honorable mention All-Pac-10 honors and All-Pac-10 second team academic honors...among Pac-10 leaders with four double-doubles...played and started in 30-of-31 games...missed final regular season game versus Oregon with an ankle injury...third leading scorer with 11.4 points per game and top rebounder with 5.8 per game...had a career-high 13 rebounds, a UW season-high, versus Arizona...had 12 boards at St. Mary's...scored a career-best 25 points on 9-of-18 from the field at WSU...made 22 three point baskets...scored 20 points at Wisconsin and 22 versus WSU in Seattle...selected to attend NCAA Leadership Conference with peers from around the country, May, 2002 in Florida.

FRESHMAN YEAR (2000-2001) — Had a tremendous impact in her first collegiate season...named to NCAA West Regional All-Tournament Team...Pac-10 freshman honorable mention...named Most Improved Player at year-end team banquet...in the NCAA Tournament had a clutch performance in the second half of Huskies' 86-75 second-round win over Florida, hitting shots from everywhere on the court—including 2-for-3 from the three-point line—to hold off a furious Lady Gator rally...hit six of seven shots in the game to finish with 14 points and three rebounds...had six points and four rebounds in first-round win over Old Dominion...team-high 18 points in Sweet 16 win over Oklahoma and 12 points in Elite Eight game versus SW Missouri...shot a team-best 62 percent (18-29) in the NCAA Tournament and led the Huskies in field goal percentage for the year at 47 percent (109-232)...earned first start at Oklahoma State (12/3)...moved into the starting lineup for good against Oregon (1/18)...four blocked shots against St. Mary's was best by a Husky since Amber Hall in '96...had four double-doubles...fourth-leading scorer on the team with 9.4 points per game...double figure rebounding in four games...had a season-best 19 points at Stanford and matched that at USC...hit 3-of-3 treys at Stanford...18 points at home against Stanford.

AT BOZEMAN HIGH SCHOOL

Montana's Gatorade Player of the Year and Montana High School Girls Player of the Year for 1999-2000...played her junior and senior seasons at Bozeman High and led the Hawks to back-to-back state championship titles...two-time Montana State Tournament Most Valuable Player...played for coach Rick Jordan...as a senior, led the state in scoring, averaging 19.1 points per game...also led the state in three point field goal percentage...second in the state in rebounding...team captain as a senior...four-year all-conference, all-state and all-state tournament honoree...led team in rebounding...as a junior, averaged 10.2 points and 8.0 rebounds per game while shooting 45 percent from the field...hit 73 percent from the free throw line and averaged four blocks per game...scored 20 points in the state championship game...named Most Improved Player and was team rebounding champion...transferred from class C Joplin-Inverness to Bozeman High after her sophomore season...as a sophomore, averaged 19.2 points and 10.0 rebounds per game...hit 59 percent from the field and 79 percent from the free throw line...had a season-high 31 points in one game...as a freshman, averaged 17.2 points and 10.5 rebounds per game...scored a season-high 27 points during the year...team MVP...played with the All-Northwest Select Team that traveled to Australia in 1997...earned several area "athlete of the week" awards...played volleyball during her freshman and sophomore seasons...earned honorable mention all-state honors as a sophomore...earned all-conference and academic honors both years.

AT WASHINGTON

JUNIOR YEAR (2002-03) — Pac-10 Academic honorable mention selection...came off the bench in all 30 games...dished out 74 assists, second-highest on team behind sister Giuliana...scored season-high eight points vs. USC (1/5)...pulled down career-high six rebounds vs. Washington State (3/1)...recorded career-high seven assists vs. Kentucky and career-high five steals vs. Cal (1/6)...team's assists leader in five games.

SOPHOMORE YEAR (2001-02) — Played in 21 games and started seven...scored a season-high seven points on 3-of-5 from the field versus Boise State...also passed out three assists in that game...pulled down four rebounds, with six points, both from three point range, in 62-55 win at St. Mary's...sank five three pointers during the season...missed nine games with a stress fracture in lower leg...had four assists, one block and one steal in win versus Northeastern in Husky Classic...played in all three WNIT games.

FRESHMAN YEAR (2000-2001) — Played in 25 games averaging seven minutes a game in first season...speedy guard who was a spark off the bench, both offensively and defensively...played in all four NCAA Tournament games and had her best game in the final outing of the year, against Southwest Missouri, when she hit 4-of-6 from the field, including 2-of-3 three pointers, for 10 points...added two rebounds and two steals in the game...nailed a three-pointer in Huskies' first-round win over Old Dominion...against Loyola Marymount, followed a three pointer by her sister Giuliana with one of her own, for her first points of the season...team and career-high 10 points vs. UCLA, when she led the team in scoring...had surgery Feb. 1 for right thumb sprain and missed three games.

AT EL TORO HIGH SCHOOL

Completed her four year prep career with 1,327 points and a career scoring average of 11.6 points per game...also totaled 597 assists for a 5.4 career average and had 448 steals, averaging 4.0 per game...helped lead the turnaround from a 7-19 freshman season where she was the only freshman on the varsity team to a 27-3 record as a junior and a 23-6 mark her senior year...as a senior, averaged 17.7 points, 7.7 assists, 4.0 steals and 3.5 rebounds per game...earned all-county honors and was named Sea View League co-MVP...led Orange County in assists...advanced to the state tournament after undefeated regular season which included a victory over top

seeded Crescenta Valley at the buzzer...surpassed the 1,000-point mark as a junior...earned first team all-league honors and was named co-MVP and most valuable defensive player...averaged 12.5 points, 5.9 assists and 5.1 steals per game...as a sophomore, earned second team all-league honors and was most valuable defensive player...helped team advance to the CIF playoffs for the first time in 10 years...team was undefeated in league action.

AT WASHINGTON

JUNIOR YEAR (2002-03)—First Husky ever to be named Pac-10 Player of the Year...Kodak/WBCA and Associated Press All-America honorable mention selection...named to All-Pac-10 First-Team for second-straight season...also first Husky to earn three Pac-10 Player of the Week nods in a single season...team co-captain...earned Pac-10 All-Academic honorable mention honors...became 18th player in school history to score 1,000 points...currently ranks 11th with 1,267 points...set UW single-season assists record with 162...enters senior season ranked second all-time with 440 career assists...team's leader in scoring (17.5), rebounding (6.5) and assists (5.4)...Pac-10 leader in assists and three-point FG percentage (.457)...also finished second in the league in FT percentage (.845), third in scoring, FG percentage (.543), and assists-turnover ratio (1.6), and eighth in rebounding...recorded eight double-doubles...scored in double-figures in all but three games...scored at least 20 points in nine of the last 12 games of the season...became first Husky to score 40 points, setting a UW single-game record with 43 vs. UCLA (2/1)...shot 15-20 from the field, 6-9 from three-point range and 7-8 from the line, while matching a career high with 12 boards and dishing out seven assists vs. the Bruins...tallied 22 points, 10 rebounds and eight assists vs. USC (1/30)...equaled UW single-game assists record with 13 vs. Oregon State (1/25)...hit game-winning shot with 17 seconds left in early season overtime win over USC (1/3)...first two-time Seattle Times Husky Classic MVP recipient...also named to Husky Classic and GlazoSmithKline All-Tournament Teams...team's Big Dawg honoree and Lion's Assists Leader for third straight year...invited to USA Basketball Team Trials.

SOPHOMORE YEAR (2001-02)—Team co-captain...selected to All-Pac-10 First Team...earned All-Pac-10 academic honorable mention recognition...at team banquet earned Big Dawg award for second year and was named Most Inspirational by teammates...also named Lion's Club assist leader with 152, a mark that was fourth-highest in the Pac-10 and third-highest ever by a UW player in one season...led team in field goal percentage (47%), was second leading scorer and rebounder, with 12.5 points and 5.5 rebounds per game...started all but one of 31 games...scored season-high 31 points in final regular season game, an 88-80 victory over Oregon...Pac-10 Player of the Week for her efforts in road sweep at USC and UCLA...scored 22 points at USC and 12, with eight boards at UCLA...maintained a sterling assist-to-turnover ratio, at 2.08, that was second-best in the conference...career-high 15 free throws made in 31-point game versus Oregon...mark was a UW season-high...scored in double figures 20 times and had four games of 20 or more points.

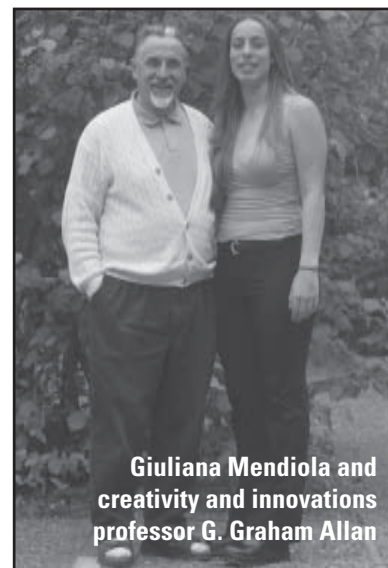
FRESHMAN YEAR (2000-2001)—Pac-10 All-Freshman Team...All-Pac-10 Honorable Mention...played in all 32 games and started 30...third-leading scorer on the team...led UW in rebounding through the entire regular season and finished the year with an average of 6.3 boards per game, eighth in the Pac-10...assist to turnover ratio of 1.46 was fourth in the Pac-10...moved into the starting lineup in the third game of the year versus No. 1 Connecticut...averaged 13.3 points in four NCAA Tournament games...scored a team-high 18 points, including 10-of-12 from the free throw line, in UW's 86-75 second-round win over 14th-ranked Florida...tallied 12 points and seven rebounds in NCAA first-round win over Old Dominion...15 points on 5-of-7 from the field against Oklahoma in the Sweet 16...in season-opener at Indiana, hit a three-pointer to send game to OT...MVP of Seattle Times Classic...posted a season-best 22 points versus California at home...made four three-pointers in a game on two occasions, versus Loyola Marymount and Arizona...led team in scoring seven times...had five double-doubles...throughout the season, was listed among Pac-10 leaders in seven different categories.

AT EL TORO HIGH SCHOOL

Selected as an honorable mention all-American by USA Today and Street & Smith...Orange County Register Player of the Year and Los Angeles Times Orange County Player of the Year for the 1999-2000 season...led Orange County in scoring all four years...finished her prep career at No. 4 on the California state all-time scoring list with 3,069 points over four years...one of only three California players ever to crack the 3,000-point mark...career scoring average was 26.7 points over 115 games...also had career marks of 5.8 assists, 4.5 steals per game...her No. 13 jersey was retired by El Toro High following her career...as a senior, broke the Orange County scoring record when she scored 42 points in a tournament game...had a career-high 55 points in a 71-62 El Toro victory against the seventh ranked team in the county...averaged 34.4 points, 6.3 assists and 10.2 rebounds per game as the team finished with a record of 23-7 in her final season...South Coast League Most Valuable Player...second-team All-America Student Sports honoree...was named El Toro MVP all four years and was team captain as a sophomore, junior and senior...earned first team all-county honors three straight years...team finished 23-6 her junior year and played for the Southern Section Division I-AA championship...four-time El Toro Athlete of the Year...three-time all-CIF First Team selection...as a freshman, team finished 17-9 and advanced to the CIF playoffs for the first time in 10 years...played four years for coach Vincent Avitabile...averaged 24.2 points per game as a freshman and 22.8 as a sophomore.
