Setting the Scene: NCAA Championships

The Huskies control their own destiny. That's the best position the team can put themselves in heading to the 2010 NCAA Championships, which will take place at the Sacramento State Aquatic Center on Lake Natoma from May 28-30. Washington State University will serve as the championship host. Once again the Huskies - who are in search of their fourth NCAA team title - continue their streak of reaching the 16-team NCAA field each year since its inception in 1997, one of just three teams to accomplish such a feat. Washington, which is ranked seventh in the latest CRCA-US Rowing poll, will send three boats to Lake Natoma: a varsity eight, a second varsity eight and an open four.

In Search Of Hardware

Washington has won three National Championships since the NCAA began organizing the competition in 1997. The last Huskies title came in 2001, featuring a lineup that included three eventual Olympians: Rika Geyser, Anna (Mickelson) Cummins and Mary Whipple, along with current novice coach Nicole (Borges) Minett. The varsity eight has won a national title four times (1997, 1998, 2001 & 2002), the second varsity eight once (2002), while the varsity four has captured four championships (1997, 1998, 2001 & 2008).

The Huskies finished seventh out of 16 teams at Cooper River, N.J., in 2009. The second varsity eight was the lone Washington boat to make the Grand Finals in its respective category, finishing five seconds behind the winning Yale boat.

The NCAA Women's Field

Sixteen teams are invited annually to participate in the NCAA Championships. Brown, Princeton and Washington are the only teams who have been invited to the NCAA Championships each year since 1997.

The 2010 field includes a slew of elite crews, including five additional teams from the Pac-10 Conference (UCLA, USC, Cal, Stanford and Washington State). The remaining crews include Michigan, Michigan State, Clemson, Ohio State, Tennessee, Virginia, Wisconsin and Yale. The Cardinal are the defending National Champions, unseating the previous two-time champ in Brown at the 2009 NAAs on the Cooper River in New Jersey. Once again, the Ivies present a strong challenge as always for the Pac-10 schools. Princeton's varsity eight was undefeated all season, only to be edged by Yale by less than one second at the EAWRC final. No other crew was within 10 seconds of those boats, including NCAA invitee Brown.

The Big Ten sent four teams to the NAAs: conference team champions Wisconsin, followed by Michigan State, Ohio State and Michigan. The ACC added a strong pair of teams in No. 3 Virginia, along with Clemson.

About The Husky Coaching Staff

The women's team is coached by the legendary Bob Ernst, who made the switch after a 20-year stint coaching the men's program. Ernst is no stranger to women's rowing, having shepherded the program to six National Championships from 1981-87. Ernst also has significant Olympics and International experience and has been involved with some facet of the UW program since 1974. In 1984, he coached the Gold Medal winning eight in the Los Angeles Olympic Games. Nicole Minett manages all coaching duties for the novice women. Colin Sykes is an assistant coach that handles the varsity four.

Captains

Each year after the Class Day Regatta, the Huskies select two captains to lead their program into the brunt of the spring season. This year, Ty Otto and Adrienne Martelli will represent their boats and sport the green star on Washington's traditional white oars.

Last Time Out

The women's crew team came out to a blistering start at the Pac-10 Championships, taking Gold Medals in the novice eight and the varsity four races in a conference that sent six of its teams to the NCAA Championship. The second varsity eight captured a silver medal while the varsity eight was able to edge Washington State in the final sprint to finish in fifth place.

About The Huskies

The Huskies enter the NCAA Championships battle-tested from a ferocious regular-season schedule. Washington began the spring sprinting season with a trip to Stanford - the defending National Champions. After losing the varsity eight race to the Cardinal, the Huskies responded with a pair of wins with their second varsity and the novice eight. UW moved on to take all but one race against Washington State before heading back down to California and splitting their dual race with the No. 1 Golden Bears on the Redwood Shores. Then the Huskies returned home to make an impressive sweep of the Windermere Cup, winning both of the marquee races the women raced in.

About The Course

Lake Natoma is a 2,000-meter course and the home venue of the Pac-10 Championship. Situated 15 miles northeast of Sacramento, Calif., Lake Natoma was created by Nimbus Dam across American River and is a regulating reservoir for releases from Folsom Lake. Lake Natoma is widely considered one of the best venues in the United States for intercollegiate rowing.

Summer Camp Selections

In March, four Husky women were invited to the U23 National Team camp. Senior Jennifer Park, junior Kerry Simmonds and sophomore Ariana Tanimoto were all tapped to attend the camp. Senior Adrienne Martelli was selected to join the elite camp. The rowers are competing for spots in the women's 8+ and 4x boats that will race at the FISA U23 World Championships in Belarus on June 22-25.

RACE HISTORY • Women's National Championships

The first women's collegiate championship was held in Oak Ridge, Tenn. in 1980. Washington is one of only three teams to be invited to all 11 NCAA Championships. The Huskies won their first varsity eight title in 1981, the first of an unprecedented five-straight varsity championships. Washington won back-to-back NCAA team titles in 1997 and 1998, including the program's first 1997. UW captured the 1980 lightweight eight and lightweight four titles. The race length for women was doubled in 1985 from 1,000 to 2,000 meters.
