Jill Hultquist begins her second season at the helm of the Washington women's tennis program in 2006-07.

Hultquist, a former standout on the pro tour and in the collegiate ranks, returned to Washington after serving as an assistant coach with the Huskies from

Director Marie Tuite said. "Her previous experience at Washington as an assistant head coach under Patty McCain, clearly prepared Jill for this new challenge. She was an exceptional collegiate and professional tennis player and her competitiveness and spirit will serve her well as head coach of the Huskies. We are convinced that under Jill's leadership and guidance, our women's tennis program will continue to excel at the national level."

"It's a great honor to come back to the University of Washington," Hultquist said. "When I left the program it was a very hard decision for me because I loved the job so much and to come back now as the head coach, I'm looking forward to the opportunity to build a great team. My initial goal is to bring the Huskies back into the Top-10. They slipped out a bit and I'd like to bring them back in."

Among the players Hultquist mentored in her previous tenure at Washington were all four All-Americans in school history: Claire Carter, Kristina Kraszweski, Dea Sumantri and Darija Klaic. Carter, Washington's only four-time All-American, was a member of

Before joining the coaching ranks at Washington, Hultquist played professionally on the WTA Tour from 1987-1997, winning more than 20 doubles titles. She ranked as high as sixth in the world in doubles and 64th in the world in singles. Hultquist teamed with McCain on the doubles circuit, and among their victories was a win over Steffi Graf and Gabriela Sabatini in the semifinals of the 1988 U.S. Open. They also advanced to the finals of the 1989 Australian Open.

A native of Toronto, Canada, Hultquist and her husband Rich have two children, Jack (4 1/2) and Maggie (3). The family resides in Renton, Wash.

Fernando Sanchez officially joined Jill Hultquist's staff July 24, 2006.

Sanchez was a standout men's tennis player for Virginia Commonwealth University from 2000-2002. Sanchez's best year was 2000 when he compiled a 26-3 singles record and 18-5 doubles record. He was ranked as high as No. 64 in the nation that year and helped the Rams to the NCAA Championship Finals where they fell to Stanford. Sanchez earned Rookie of the Year for VCU that season and earned First Team All-Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) Singles and Doubles honors.

Sanchez has been serving as Junior Academy Director in Texas, responsible for training the top players in the Lone Star State since February of 2005. Prior to

that, Sanchez was an assistant coach at VCU for both the men and women's tennis teams from 2002-2003. While assisting at his alma mater, the Rams won the CAA Championship on both the men and women's side.

Sanchez has also dabbled in the professional ranks, most recently playing for the Houston Wranglers in the World Team Cup, teaming with Jan-Michael Gambill, Stefi Graf and Mardy Fish. Sanchez has also sparred with some of the best tennis players in the world, helping train Boris Becker, Anke Huber and Marc Kevin Goelner for Grand Slam tournaments.

"He was an outstanding college tennis player," said Hultquist. "He is very excited about getting back into college coaching after working with the women's tennis team at VCU when they were ranked in the Top-20 nationally."

Sanchez graduated from VCU in December of 2003, majoring in biomedical engineering and minoring in mathematics and physics.
