

WASHINGTON HEADS TO SIXTH STRAIGHT NCAA TOURNEY: The Huskies earned their sixth consecutive NCAA Tournament berth on the heels of their 27-4 season and second-place Pac-10 finish. Washington hosted the first and second rounds, matching up against Missouri in the first round and Brigham Young in the second. The Huskies eked out a win over Missou, 3-2, to advance, but were upset by BYU, 3-2, to end their 12-0 home NCAA streak and their national title hopes.

HOME SWEET HOME: Despite having their school-record 39-match home winning streak snapped by Stanford on Nov. 8, the Huskies remain nearly unbeatable at home over the past three plus seasons, amassing an amazing 49-2 record from 2004 through this season at Bank of America Arena. Since the start of the 2003 season, the UW is 59-5 at home.

UW IN THE NATIONAL RANKINGS: The Huskies remained at No. 6 in the CSTV/AVCA Coaches Top 25 Poll (Nov. 26) for the second straight week. In the Molten/*Volleyball Magazine* Women's College Top 20 Poll, Washington moved up one spot to No. 6 this week.

MORRISON NAMED PAC-10 PLAYER OF THE WEEK: Christal Morrison earned her third Pac-10 Player of the Week award (Nov. 26) this season and seventh of her career. She becomes just the third person in Pac-10 history to win Player of the Week honors at least seven times in a career. Logan Tom of Stanford won nine awards from 1999-2002 while Natalie Williams of UCLA won eight between 1989-1992. Morrison helped the Huskies to two victories over Oregon State and No. 13 Oregon to close out their regular season schedule. Against the Beavers, Morrison became the Huskies all-time leader in kills with 13 that night. She hit .163, added eight digs and an ace as Washington went on to sweep Oregon State. In the 3-1 win against ranked Oregon, Morrison had a match-high 21 kills for her 14th straight match in double-figures, hit .320, and finished with eight total blocks, including a season-high three solos. For the weekend, Morrison averaged 4.67 kpg, 1.29 bpg, and 5.86 ppg.

FOUR HUSKIES NAMED FIRST TEAM ALL-PAC-10: Christal Morrison headlined a group of four UW players named to the All-Pac-10 First Team this week. Joining Morrison were Tamari Miyashiro, Stevie Mussie and Jessica Swarbrick. It was Morrison's fourth straight first team selection, making her the only player in UW history to earn four first team awards. Swarbrick was named to the first team for the second straight season while Miyashiro was an honorable mention pick last year. It was Mussie's first All-Pac-10 award. A trio of players earned All-Pac-10 Honorable Mention, including Alesha Deesing, Jenna Hagglund and Becky Perry. Deesing was a first team pick the past two seasons while Hagglund and Perry both were also named to the Pac-10 All-Freshman Team.

PACK THE HOUSE: This season, the UW ranks ninth in the country in attendance, averaging 2,445 fans in its 12 home matches. The Huskies have drawn more than 1,000 fans in 10 of their 12 home matches this year and have drawn more than 3,000 fans on seven occasions. A season-high 4,117 fans were in attendance against Stanford on Nov. 8.

SWEEPING BY THE OPPOSITION: The Huskies have swept 21 of their 29 matches so far this season. The UW, which opened the season with six straight sweeps, had lost just three games all season before losing a combined five games against Cal (Oct. 11) and Stanford (Oct. 12) on back-to-back nights. The Huskies have lost just 16 games all season, and have been taken to five games just five times this year.

20 MARKS THE SPOT: With their 20th win of the season against Washington State on Oct. 26, the Huskies now have six straight seasons of 20 or more wins. Washington has at least 20 wins in six of their seven seasons under **Jim McLaughlin**, and has 16 seasons of 20 more wins in its history.

2007 REVIEW

RECORDS WATCH – CHRISTAL MORRISON: Christal Morrison became the Huskies all-time leader in kills against Oregon State on Nov. 21, passing former teammate Sonja Tomasevic. Morrison has accumulated 1,818 kills in her three plus years in the purple and gold, which surpasses the 1,795 that Tomasevic totaled from 2002-05. Earlier this year against California on Nov. 9, Morrison also passed Tomasevic for the career lead in attacks. Morrison has tallied 4,611 attacks in her career. Morrison can also pass Tomasevic in career points, as she trails her 2,159.5 to 2,136.0. Morrison also ranks in the Top 10 of the following categories: second in points per game (5.05), third in kills per game (4.30), fourth in service aces (137), fifth in games played (423), seventh in digs (1,130), tied for eighth in block assists (286), tied for ninth in digs per game (2.67), and tied for 10th in total blocks (324).

RECORDS WATCH – ALESHA DEESING: Alesha Deesing started the season tied for 10th in block assists, but is now in fifth place with 348. She has also moved into the Top 10 in total blocks (5th/377) and has moved up this season in career points to fifth with 961. She also ranks second in career hitting percentage (.377) and fifth in blocks per game (1.16).

RECORDS WATCH – **JESSICA SWARBRICK: Jessica Swarbrick** remains in ninth place in career points with 829. This season, Swarbrick has moved into the UW Top 10 in block assists and total blocks. She has 322 career block assists and 348 total blocks, both of which rank seventh-best all-time. She figures to move up a few more spots in both categories this year. She is the Huskies career leader in hitting percentage at .395 and also ranks third in blocks per game (1.38) and ninth in points per game (3.28).

RECORDS WATCH – STEVIE MUSSIE: So far this season, **Stevie Mussie** has moved from 10th to eighth in career points with 882.5. At her current pace (4.46 ppg), she has a good chance of moving up a few spots, as seventh place is held by Paige Benjamin (1999-2002) with 904 points and sixth place is held by Darla Myhre (2002-05) with 950 points. Mussie also ranks fifth in kills per game (3.88) and points per game (4.39).

RECORDS WATCH – TAMARI MIYASHIRO: This season, **Tamari Miyashiro** has moved into the Top 10 in digs at No. 4 with 1,227. Since she is only a sophomore, Miyashiro has a legitimate chance to set the UW career digs record, currently held by Candace Lee (2002-05) with 2,038. She holds a commanding lead in the career category of digs per game, with an average of 5.63.

AMONG THE NATION'S BEST: The Huskies rank among the top-50 in the nation in four different statistical categories, including seventh in hitting percentage at .294. Washington also ranks among the top-50 in winning percentage (9th/.897), blocks per game (12th/3.24) and assists per game (36th/14.97). The Huskies sit just outside the top-50 in kills per game at No. 51 (16.12).

HITTING HUSKIES: Washington has consistently had one of the nation's best offenses under head coach Jim McLaughlin and this year is no exception. Five UW players are hitting .250 or better (minimum 75 kills), and three of them are hitting better than .300. Three Huskies are currently among the best in the nation in hitting percentage, including Jessica Swarbrick(11th/.407), Alesha Deesing (30th/.368) and Becky Perry (32nd/.366), . Not only are the Huskies second in the Pac-10 in hitting percentage with a .294 mark, they are also seventh nationally. The UW has finished among the top-11 teams in the country in hitting percentage in every year under McLaughlin except one, and that was back in 2001, which was his first season at the helm of the Husky volleyball program. In 2005, UW led the nation in hitting percentage at .338.

DEFENSE, DEFENSE: Opponents this season have found it tough to get their offense going against Washington, evidenced by the fact that the Huskies are second in the Pac-10 in opponent hitting percentage at .151. The opposing team has hit better than .200 only six times against the Huskies this year and they have limited eight of their opponents to under a .100 mark, including holding New Orleans to a negative percentage (-.017) back on Sept. 15.

THE "CONFERENCE OF CHAMPIONS": The Huskies play in arguably the toughest conference in the nation, the Pac-10, which is commonly referred to as the "Conference of Champions." Before Nebraska won the national title last year, a Pac-10 school had won the previous five NCAA Championships, including the 2005 season when Washington claimed the crown. Since the first NCAA sanctioned volleyball championship in 1981, a Pac-10 team has won 13 National Titles. Six Pac-10 teams are currently ranked in the CSTV/AVCA Top 25 Coaches Poll, which is the most of any conference, and four of those school's are in the top-10. The six ranked teams are: No. 4 Stanford, No. 5 USC, **No. 6 Washington**, No. 7 California, No. 12 UCLA and No. 13 Oregon. All six teams were selected for for the NCAA Championships, making the Pac-10 and the Big 12 the only two conferences with six teams selected.

INSIDE THE RPI: In the latest edition of the 2007 Women's Volleyball RPI released on Nov. 16, the Huskies remained at No. 9. In the first edition released on Oct. 7, the UW was No. 24 despite being 16-0 at the time. Critics this year have said that Washington played an easy non-conference schedule, which helped them remain unbeaten. Yet, the Huskies are 7-3 against ranked teams, including a win over previously unbeaten Stanford, which was ranked No. 2 at the time, and have wins against six teams that are in the top-50 of the RPI standings (Stanford/No. 1, USC/No. 5, UCLA/No.7, California/No. 18, Long Beach St./No. 31, and Oregon/No. 37). They also have wins against Arizona State (No. 51) and Oregon State (No. 56).

ROSTER BREAKDOWN: The 16-player Washington roster includes 10 returning letterwinners and five returning starters. The 2007 team includes five seniors, three juniors, two sophomores and six freshmen. The team represents eight states, including Washington (5), California (2), Hawaii (2), Oregon (2), Utah (2), Colorado (1), Ohio (1) and Texas (1).




