WASHINGTON vs. FRESNO STATE

Huskies Open 2004 Slate With Sunday Game vs. Bulldogs

THE GAME: The Washington football team kicks off the 2004 season Sunday, September 5, when the Huskies play host to Fresno State in a 2:30 p.m. (PDT) game at Husky Stadium. Last season, the Bulldogs posted a 9-5 overall record and a 6-2 Western Athletic Conference mark. Their season included wins over both Oregon State and UCLA from the Pac-10. The meeting will mark only the second time in history that these two West Coast teams have met and will be the first Sunday game in Husky football history. After the Fresno State game, the Huskies (6-6 overall, 4-4 in the Pac-10 in 2003) have a week off before hosting UCLA in the Pac-10 opener Sept. 18 at Husky Stadium. Trips to Notre Dame (Sept. 25) and Stanford (Oct. 2) follow the game against the Bruins.

HUSKIES vs. BULLDOGS HISTORY: Surprisingly enough for two teams from the West Coast, Washington and Fresno State have met only one time in their history. Sept. 29, 1979, at Husky Stadium, the No. 9-ranked Huskies beat Fresno State, 49-14, in what many in the press (as well as Coach Don James) regarded as a lackluster UW performance, final score notwithstanding. Washington, fresh from a come-from-behind 21-17 win the previous week vs. Oregon in Eugene (the UW scored on a 53-yard punt return with 1:59 left to win 21-17) had moved into the top 10 for the first time in the Don James era when the unranked Bulldogs came to Husky Stadium. After quarterback Tom Porras got the UW on the board with a nine-yard TD run 2:48 into the first quarter, Fresno State replied with a 73-yard touchdown drive that was helped along by a converted fourth down and a 40-yard pass interference penalty. Ken Lovely scored on a one-yard run to cap the drive. On the ensuing kickoff, UW return man Anthony Allen was tackled in the endzone for a safety and Fresno (which had missed its PAT) led 8-7. Late in the opening quarter, the Bulldogs made it 14-7 when Gary Kaiser hit James Terry on a 20-yard pass. However, Washington would go on to score 42 unanswered points, including 21 in the second quarter, to roll to the win. Mike Lansford hit two field goals, the UW got scoring runs from Toussaint Tyler (3 yards), Joe Steele (69 yards) and Willis Ray Mackay (1 yard) and two TD passes (Tom Porras to Paul Skansi, 23 yards; Tom Flick to Steele, 5 yards) to account for their total. Steele finished with 133 rushing yards on 14 carries while Porras passed 11-for-16 for 158 yards and one TD. For the Bulldogs, Lovely ran for 83 yards on 24 tries while Kaiser was 10-for-27 for 197 yards and a TD to go with five interceptions. Incidentally, future Fresno star Henry Ellard, only a freshman in 1979, had two punt returns for 51 yards.

ORANGE BOWL TEAM REMEMBERED: Washington's 1984 team, which won the 1985 Orange Bowl vs. Oklahoma, will be honored as part of Saturday's game as the "Husky Legend". The day will also include special recognition for that team's defensive coordinator, Jim Lambright. Lambright, a former Husky player and longtime assistant coach, went on to serve as the UW head coach from 1993 to 1998.

SUNDAY OPENER: In an unusual turn, the Huskies will open the 2004 season on a Sunday, having moved their opener back by one day so that their matchup vs. Fresno State can air live to a nationwide audience on Fox Sports Net. The fact that the NFL doesn't get its season underway until the following weekend allowed for the move. The obvious question — has Washington ever played a game on a Sunday? The answer is no. At some point in their history, the Huskies have played a game on every day of the week other than Sunday, many of those non-Saturday contests coming in bowl-game action. In the early years of UW football, games on Thursday and Friday were not at all uncommon. On two occasions, 1961 and 1978, the Huskies played in the Rose Bowl on January 2, as those two years, New Year's Day fell on Sunday. Incidentally, the last time the UW opened a season on a day other than Saturday was in 1999, when the Huskies traveled to Brigham Young for a Thursday night ESPN game and fell to the Cougars, 35-28.

TELEVISION: The Washington-Fresno State game will air live on Fox Sports Net to a national audience with Barry Tompkins and Petros Papadakis calling the action. The game will also re-air Monday, Sept. 6 at noon on Fox Sports Northwest. During the season, all Husky games will air on tape delay Sundays at 3:00 p.m. The lone exception is the Stanford game, which will be shown at 5:00 p.m. on Oct. 3. Additionally, "Husky Football Experience" airs each Thursday at 7:00 p.m. during the season on Fox Sports. The third-year, two-time Emmy-winning program is an up-close look at each Husky game, with one-on-one interviews and sideline video.

RADIO: The Husky Sports Network, with its flagship station KJR 950-AM, will carry the live broadcast of every football game to four different states on 25 different radio stations. Longtime play-by-play man Bob Rondeau and color analyst Chuck Nelson are joined by sideline reporter Elise Woodward.

THE COACH: Husky head coach Keith Gilbertson hit the ground running, as his first official day as the Washington coach was only a month and a day before opening the 2003 season against defending national champion Ohio State. However, Gilbertson had the advantage of having served as an assistant coach at the UW for the previous four seasons, his third stint as a Dawg assistant. In his first season, the Husky head man managed a 6-6 overall record and a 4-4 Pac-10 mark in a season that was highlighted by the UW's sixth straight Apple Cup win over Washington State as well as wins over Northwest rivals Oregon and Oregon State. Gilbertson, a native of Snohomish, Wash., north of Seattle, served as a graduate assistant at the UW under Don James in 1976, James' second season. In 1989, Gilbertson left his head coaching job at Idaho to join the Washington staff, first as offensive line coach before taking over as offensive coordinator in 1991, when the Huskies won the national championship and led the Pac-10 in rushing offense, total offense and scoring offense. In 1992, Gilbertson took his second head coaching position, traveling down to the coast to California. His four-year stint at Berkeley was highlighted by the 1993 team that posted a 9-4 record and defeated Iowa, 37-3, in the Alamo Bowl. That win stood as California's last bowl victory until 2003. Until 2002, Gilbertson was the last Cal coach to notch a win over rival Stanford. Gilbertson, a 1966 graduate of Snohomish High School, played football at the University of Hawaii and graduated from Central Washington in 1971. His coaching career includes two professional stints, first as an assistant for the L.A. Express in the USFL (1983-85) and then for the Seattle Seahawks (1996-98). In his eight seasons as a head coach, Gilbertson has posted a career record of 54-43 while going 34-29 in conference games.

PAC-10 DOUBLE DIP: Keith Gilbertson is the first coach in Husky history to come to Washington after having been head man at another Pac-10 school. In fact, it's relatively rare for a coach to have served in that capacity at more than one Pac-10 institution. Recently, Bruce Snyder (California and Arizona State), Dennis Erickson (Washington State at Oregon State) and Larry Smith (Arizona and USC) have done it. Earlier examples include Tommy Prothro (Oregon State at UCLA) and Washington's own Leonard "Stub" Allison, who coached one season at the UW (1920) before eventually spending 10 seasons as Cal head coach (1935-44).

CONTINUITY OF COACHING: Despite having three different head coaches over the last seven seasons, it's still fair to say that Washington has had more continuity in its head coaches than any Pac-10 school over the past five decades or so. Going back to 1957, Washington has had only five head football coaches: Jim Owens (1957-75), Don James (1976-92), Jim Lambright (1993-99), Rick Neuheisel (1999-2002) and Keith Gilbertson (2003-). In that time, the nine other Pac-10 schools have had an average of about eight coaches each, a total of 77 (counting some of them – Bill Walsh, John Robinson, Mike Riley etc. – more than once). Oregon has had the next fewest with only six head coaches over that span. Arizona State, California, USC and WSU have had eight each. Oregon State and UCLA have had nine head coaches each since '57, while Arizona and Stanford have had 11 each.

COACHING STAFF: The Washington coaching staff includes four new faces in 2004, but two of those new assistants are making a return to Montlake. In the offseason, head coach Keith Gilbertson brought former UW defensive coordinator Chris Tormey and former quarterbacks coach and assistant head coach Steve Axman back into the Husky fold. Tormey, who left the UW in 1995 to become head coach at Idaho, was the head man at Nevada the last four seasons. Under Gilbertson, he'll serve as assistant head coach and linebackers coach. Axman, an assistant for the Huskies from 1999 to 2002, will coach receivers this season. Axman has also served as a head coach in the college ranks, overseeing the Northern Arizona program for eight seasons (1990-97). The two entirely new additions to the 2004 staff are offensive line coach Charlie Dickey and cornerbacks coach Jimmy Lake. Dickey spent the last 12 seasons as an assistant at Arizona and was also a member of Axman's staff at Northern Arizona for two years (1990-91). Lake, the youngest

member of the coaching staff, was the defensive backs coach at Eastern Washington the last five seasons. The other five Husky coaches make their return in 2004. Defensive line coach Randy Hart is the veteran of the group. He's worked at Washington since the 1988 season. John Pettas, who coached Husky wide receivers for a year in 2001 before going to Louisville, returns for his season season as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach while Phil Snow, co-defensive coordinator and secondary coach in 2003, moves into sole possession of the coordinator job while also concentrating on safeties, leaving cornerbacks to Lake. Cornell Jackson, who coaches linebackers in 1992 and safeties a year ago, has moved to running backs coach and also takes on the duties of recruiting coordinator. Finally, Scott Pelluer, who was an assistant at the UW from 1996-98, will see his job title unchanged in 2004 as he returns for a second season as tight ends coach and special teams coordinator.

THE GAs: The Huskies added two new graduate assistant coaches to the staff this year, and both have names that should be familiar to UW fans. Kyle Benn will serve as offensive graduate assistant while Patrick Reddick will play that role on defense. Benn and Reddick were both members of UW's 1997 recruiting class. Benn earned four letters as a center and was a captain on the 2001 team. That season, he was one of only two players named to the All-Pac-10 and Academic All-Pac-10 first teams. Reddick spent six seasons on the team after having been granted an extra year of eligibility due to injury. Over his career, he played in 41 games as a receiver. As a senior in 2002, he caught 54 passes for 583 yards and four TDs.

PAC-10 PRESEASON POLL: Expectations for the Huskies' 2004 season weren't set particularly high in this year's Pac-10 preseason poll, a vote of West Coast media that regularly cover the league. The UW placed only seventh in the ranking after finishing in a tie for fifth in last season's final standings. Defending co-national champion USC took all 24 first-place votes. Here's the entire poll:

WASHINGTON-FRESNO STATE TIES: Members of the UW and Fresno State coaches staffs have run into one another a few times over their various careers. Husky offensive line coach Charlie Dickey was a graduate assistant at Arizona in 1988, the same season that Bulldogs' associate head coach John Baxter worked on the Wildcats staff. Fresno defensive coordinator Dan Brown coached at Boise State along with Husky assistants Phil Snow and Scott Pelluer while Bulldogs secondary coach Randy Stewart played at Boise when Snow coached there and then coached with Snow and Pelluer. Fresno State offensive line coach Mark Weber coached at UCLA the last seven seasons, spending time on the same staff as Snow and Husky receivers coach Steve Axman at one time or another. Fresno linebackers coach Tom Mason crew up in Walla Walla, played and coached at Walla Walla CC and also coached at Eastern Washington While Fresno State has no Washingtonians on its roster, there are some ties between the Bulldog and Husky players. Most notably, FSU sophomore receiver Paul Williams is a younger brother of former Husky Curtis Williams. Husky sophomore tailback Kenny James prepped at Dos Palos High near Fresno, the alma mater of Bulldogs defensive lineman Cole Powers. Fresno State defensive tackle Amitoelau Faalevao and UW defensive end Mike Mapuolesega are both from Pago Pago, American Samoa. Former Husky Robin Kezirian is a backup center for the Bulldogs after having transferred from the UW. Husky freshman Dan Howell and Bulldog newcomers Sean Norton and Kevin Ciccone were classmates at Hart High in Newhall, Calif., and also played with offensive guard Chris Piligian, who is a year old than the other three. UW tailback Louis Rankin and FSU receiver Justin Belcher and linebacker Anthony

Robinson all attended Lincoln High in Stockton, Calif., at the same time. Finally, Husky lineman Robin Meadow and FSU cornerback Damon Jenkins both graduated from Bay Area football powerhouse De La Salle High School.

HOME OPENERS: The Huskies are 83-24-5 in home openers (whether the first game of the season or not), a percentage of .763. That mark includes a 28-game streak of home opener wins that ran from 1908 to 1935. Before falling to Air Force in the 1999 home opener, Washington had won 13 straight since falling to Oklahoma State on Sept. 7, 1985. Last year, Washington opened the home slate with a 38-13 win over Indiana after having beaten San Jose State in 2002. In 2001, the Huskies opened vs. No. 10 Michigan, beating the Wolverines, 23-18, in a mild upset. Husky coach Keith Gilbertson is 6-2 as a head coach in home openers. Gilbertson was 3-0 in home openers at Idaho, 2-2 at California and is 1-0 at the UW. He had won his first five in a row before losing to Hawaii, 21-7, in the Bears' 1994 home opener.

SEASON OPENERS: Washington is 79-29-6 all-time in season openers, good for a mark of .719. Since 1989, Washington has posted a 9-5 record in season openers -- 5-0 at home and 4-5 on the road. In that 14-season span, the Huskies have opened vs. a ranked team eight times: vs. No. 15 Stanford in 1993 (W, 31-14), at No. 17 USC in 1994 (L, 24-17), at No. 20 Arizona State in 1996 (L, 45-42), vs. No. 19 BYU in 1997 (W, 42-20) at No. 8 Arizona State in 1998 (W, 42-38), vs. No. 11 Michigan in 2001 (W, 23-18), at No. 12 Michigan in 2002 (L, 31-29) and at No. 2 Ohio State last year (L, 28-9).

HOME vs. NON CONFERENCE: Washington has been very tough to beat in home, non-conference games over the last couple of decades or so. Going back to (and including) the 1981 season, the Huskies have posted a 45-6 record against non-Pac-10 foes in Husky Stadium. Those five losses have come to Nevada (2003), Air Force (1999), Nebraska (1997), Notre Dame (1995), Colorado (1989) and Oklahoma State (1985). The wins during that stretch include victories over No. 11 Michigan in 2001, No. 4 Miami in 2000, and No. 12 Nebraska in 1992, to name just three. Prior to last year's loss to Nevada, Washington hadn't lost a home game to a non-league opponent since falling to Air Force, 31-21, on September 18, 1999. The Huskies had won 10 such games before last season's loss.

KEEPING THE STREAK ALIVE: The Huskies enter the 2004 season hoping to extend one of the most impressive active streaks in college football. Washington's 6-6 record in 2003 marked the program's 27th consecutive winning (.500 or better) season. The last time that Washington finished below .500 was 1976, when the Dawgs went 5-6. Since then, the Huskies are 220-93-3 (.709) overall. The Huskies' 27-season streak of non-losing seasons is the 11th longest in NCAA history (tied with Florida State's current streak) and the third longest current streak. BYU's 27-season streak was broken in 2002 with the Cougars finishing the year 5-7. Here are the longest streaks currently running:

STREAKING IN THE PAC-10: While Washington's string of 27 straight non-losing seasons is easily the best in the Pac-10, their stretch of .500-or-better marks in Pac-10 play is even more dominant compared to the rest of the league. The Huskies last finished under .500 in Pac-10 play in 1988 (3-5), a streak of 15 straight non-losing league seasons. By contrast, every other team in the Pac-10 has had a losing league season at least once in the last four seasons (2000-2003). Only WSU, USC and UCLA have three-year streaks.

TEAM NOTES

RANKED-WINS STREAK: Through last season, the Huskies have beaten at least one team ranked in the Associated Press poll in each of the last 16 seasons. In fact, Washington has defeated an AP-ranked team in 26 of its last 27 seasons. The only break in the streak came in 1988 when the Huskies played only two games against nationally-ranked foes — UCLA (No. 2) and USC (No. 3), losing both of those contests.

THE SHUTOUT STREAK: Washington's Apple Cup win last season marked the 265th consecutive game in which Washington has not been shut out. That's the best streak among Pac-10 schools. BYU had its NCAA-record streak snapped at 361 games in 2003, meaning that Texas has the longest current streak with 277 games. The last opponent to hold the Huskies scoreless was UCLA (31-0) on Nov. 7, 1981. Washington has played 176 Pac-10 Conference games since then without a shutout — the second best current streak among Pac-10 schools.

DECADE AFTER DECADE: Washington has won a conference title and a trip to the Rose Bowl in each of the last nine decades, dating back to the 1920s when Washington won the berth in 1923 and 1925. In the 1930s, the Dawgs won the '36 title. In the '40s, Washington earned the trip in 1943 and then barely slipped in under the wire in the 1950s, winning the 1959 crown. The Huskies won two Rose Bowl berths in the 1960s -- 1960 and 1963 -- and one in the 1970s (1977). Titles in 1980 and 1982 did it for that decade and three straight trips to Pasadena to begin the 1990s covered that 10-year span. Now in the 2000s, UW has become the first team to earn Rose Bowl berths in nine straight decades. USC joined the Dawgs in that distinction last year after their New Year's Day appearance in Pasadena.

WINNING THE CLOSE ONES: In 62 Husky games dating back to the start of the 1999 season, the winning margin (for either side) has been seven points or fewer 24 times. In those 24 games decided by a touchdown or less, Washington is 16-8 and had won 10 straight before falling to Texas, 47-43 in the 2001 Holiday Bowl. Washington had lost three straight such games (Texas, Michigan, Cal) before last season's four-point win over Arizona on Oct. 12, 2002.

FINISHING FIRST OR SECOND: Despite a fifth place finish in the Pac-10 in 2003, Washington has finished either first or second in the conference (including ties) in 18 of the last 27 seasons, dating back to a fourth-place finish in 1976. Over that span, Washington has won the championship (outright or shared) eight times -- 1977, 1980, 1981, 1990, 1991, 1992, 1995 and 2000 -- while finishing second 10 other times.

AGAINST THE RANKED TEAMS: Washington is 11-13 against top-10 teams since 1990. Also since 1990, the Huskies have gone 31-30-1 against top 25 teams. Here's a look at the Huskies' record against top-10 foes over the last 14 seasons:

THE 100-YARD FACTOR: Since the 1947 season, Washington is 158-36-3 (.810) when a Husky player rushes for 100 yards in a game. The Huskies are 3-1 thusfar in 2003 in such games as Rich Alexis has topped the century mark three times -- wins over Idaho and Stanford and a loss to Nevada -- and both Kenny James (104) and Shelton Sampson (131) went over 100 in the win over Oregon. The Nevada game broke a streak of eight straight Husky wins in games in which Alexis ran for 100 or more.

HISTORY LESSON: Successfully rushing the football and winning go hand-in-hand for the Huskies. Since 1990, Washington has rushed for 200 yards in a game 58 times. The Huskies' record stands at 53-4-1 (.922) in those contests. Since the 1995 season, Washington is 28-1-1 (.950) when rushing for 200 yards.

PLAYING AT HOME: Washington has gone unbeaten at home 13 times in its history, including six times in the last 12 seasons. Washington has won 72 of its last 88 (.824) games at Husky Stadium with one tie (72-15-1). Since 1980, the Huskies stand 120-26-2 (.818) at home. Since 1990, the Huskies are 46-10-1 (.816) at Husky Stadium vs. Pac-10 opponents.

HISTORIC HUSKY STADIUM: The 2004 season marks the 85th season of play in Husky Stadium. Original construction on the facility was completed in 1920 when Washington played one game in the new campus facility. Thanks to several major renovations, Husky Stadium's seating capacity has increased to its current total of 72,500. That makes Husky Stadium the 24th-largest college football venue in the nation. It is the 20th-largest on-campus facility in the country. UW's all-time record in Husky Stadium currently stands at 337-137-21 (.702).

OFFENSIVE POSITION-BY-POSITION NOTES

* QUARTERBACKS *

Casey Paus, Jr., 6-5, 220 – Finished the spring as the Huskies' No. 1, and retained his starting spot after a battle in fall camp ... the most experienced of the three contenders, Paus was the No. 2 man at QB in 2003, when he appeared in six games, completing 10-of-23 passes for 151 yards, one interception and two TDs ... most of his action came in the win over Oregon, when he played the entire second half in place of injured starter Cody Pickett ... led the Dawgs to 35 unanswered points in the second half in a 42-10 win over the Ducks ... completed 5-of-8 for 117 yards, including a 63-yard TD to Reggie Williams in that game ... also threw a 10-yard TD to Charles Frederick that game ... older brother, Cory, was a starting QB at UCLA.

Isaiah Stanback, So., 6-3, 205 – Expected to see gametime as No. 2 quarterback after splitting time between QB and receiver in 2003 ... appeared in 11 games last year, including three starts at receiver ... only threw two passes in 2003, going 2-for-2 for 18 yards ... also caught 10 passes for 143 yards ... best game was a 4-catch, 82-yard outing at Arizona ... also returned kickoffs (8 returns for 133 yards) last season ... seven of those eight KO returns came at Cal, most in a game by a Pac-10 player in 2003 ... considered by many publications as the state's top prep player in 2001.

Carl Bonnell, RS-Fr., 6-3, 200 – Along with Paus and Stanback, entered fall camp with a shot at the starting job ... originally signed with Washington State, but never enrolled full-time and then decided to come to Washington last season, when he redshirted ... like Stanback, better known as an option quarterback ... led Kentwood High to the AAAA (highest level) state title in 2001 ... the Associated Press state player of the year in 2001 ... led Kentwood to a 37-4 record in three seasons.

FIRST-TIME QB STARTERS: No matter who starts the season opener vs. Fresno State at quarterback, the Husky signalcaller will be making his first career start under center. While Isaiah Stanback started three games at wide receiver last year, he's never started at QB. Neither have the UW's two other contenders, Casey Paus (who finished fall camp as the front-runner) and Carl Bonnell. In 2001, Cody Pickett became the first opening-day starting quarterback without a previous career start since 1996. Here's a look at the Huskies' new opening day starters and their performance in that first game, as well as other notable UW quarterbacks' first career starts (that didn't come in season openers):

SHORT ON EXPERIENCE: UW's returning quarterbacks have combined to throw only 25 career passes during their college careers entering the 2004 season. Casey Paus has thrown 23 passes in his career (all last season) while Isaiah Stanback has attempted just two. According to research completed during the off-season, the Husky QBs' total of only 25 career attempts are the eighth-fewest (tied) in the nation among Division I-A schools. * RUNNING BACKS *

TB - Kenny James, So., 5-10, 215 – Enters the season as the starter at tailback ... played in all 12 and started the final five games in 2003 ... ran for 104 yards, including a 56-yard TD in win over Oregon ... rushed for 530 yards last year, second on the team and only 36 behind Rich Alexis' total ... tied for third on the team with 17 receptions last year.

TB - Shelton Sampson, So., 5-11, 205 – Played in all 12 games last season, compiling 274 yards on 60 carries ... shared the team lead (alongside Reggie Williams) with eight touchdowns ... scored three TDs and rushed for 131 yards in win over Oregon ... scored a six-yard TD on first career carry last year vs. Indiana ... 2002 state high school champ in 110m hurdles.

TB - Chris Singleton, Jr., 6-0, 210 – Missed all of last season with a broken foot ... started two games in 2002 when he ran for 224 yards on 64 carries ... top game was in 2002 vs. UCLA: 20 carries for 92 yards, play 3-37 receiving.

TB - Louis Rankin, RS-Fr., 6-0, 195 – Redshirted last year but has a good chance to play in 2004 ... rushed for 2,245 yards and scored 41 touchdowns (34 by rush, 5 by reception, 2 by return) as a senior in high school.

FB - Zach Tuiaosopo, Sr., 6-2, 245 – A team captain that was named the No. 1 fullback in the nation by The Sporting News ... originally an outside linebacker at the UW, starting four games there in 2001 ... starter at fullback the last two seasons ... scored TDs vs. Idaho and California last year ... honorable mention All-Pac-10 in 2003 ... older brother, Marques, was a UW quarterback (1998-2000) and now plays for the Raiders ... cousin of Husky freshman linebacker Trenton Tuiaosopo.

FB - James Sims, Jr., 6-2, 205 – Has made the switch from safety to fullback in 2004 and seems sure to see plenty of action ... started five games in 2002 and one last year as a safety ... earned the Curtis Williams Endowed Scholarship in 2003, recognizing his academic, athletic and community achievements ... second-team Academic All-Region VIII in 2003.

* WIDE RECEIVERS *

Charles Frederick, Sr., 6-0, 185 – Returns as a starter at flanker and named a team captain in 2004 ... enters the year having made a catch in 25 straight games ... on numerous UW single-season and career top-10 lists (see the note on next page) ... first-team All-Pac-10 special teams player in 2003 ... named a team offensive co-MVP last season ... top highlight was his game at Oregon State, when he broke the school's all-purpose yards record with 371, snapping UW legend Hugh McElhenny's 53-yard old mark (more follows) ... 59 catches last year were good for eighth in school history ... led the Pac-10 in punt returns last season ... fourth in the Pac-10 last year in all-purpose yards per game (115.0 yards) ... called by some recruiting publications the top receiver in the country as a senior at Pope John Paul II High in Florida.

OFFENSIVE POSITION-BY-POSITION NOTES

Corey Williams, So., 6-2, 195 – Played in nine games as a true freshman in 2003 ... caught five passes for 57 yards, and provided what was probably the season's top UW highlight ... caught a 21-yard, game-winning touchdown pass against Washington State with 1:10 to play ... also scored at Arizona.

Quintin Daniels, So., 6-0, 195 – Played in nine games as a true freshman in 2003 ... four catches for 35 yards as a freshman ... caught first pass in the season opener at defending national champion Ohio State ... started vs. Idaho.

Bobby Whithorne, RS-Fr., 6-1, 185 – Appeared in the the first three games of 2003, but ended up redshirting the season ... currently No. 2 at split end.

Anthony Russo, RS-Fr., 5-11, 180 – Redshirted the 2003 season ... the Huskies' top choice in the slot and at kickoff returner entering the new season ... played running back and returned kicks in high school.

Sonny Shackelford, So., 6-2, 180 – Appeared in all 12 games and started vs. Nevada in 2003 ... caught seven passes for 92 yards ... both of those totals were tops among the freshman receiver corps ... also returns kicks.

Craig Chambers, RS-Fr., 6-3, 205 – Redshirted the 2003 season ... younger brother of former Husky linebacker Richie Chambers ... one of the state's top recruits in 2002.

E.T. HEADED UP THE CHARTS: Senior wide receiver Charles "E.T." Frederick has already placed his name on several pages of the UW record book. Most notably, he broke the UW's single-game all-purpose yards record last year at Oregon State, when he compiled 371 to break Hugh McElhenny's 53-year old record. But, he certainly won't stop there. Frederick, who has led the UW in punt returns for three straight season and led the Pac-10 in that category last year, already appears on a number of the UW's single-game, single-season and career top-10 lists and is within striking distance of others. Here's a look at the season and career top-10 lists on which E.T. already appears and others he's likely to crack in 2004:

PRINCE CHARLES PASSES THE KING: Receiver/returner Charles Frederick turned in a game for the ages last October 18 in the Huskies' 38-17 win at then-No. 22 Oregon State. Frederick, long known by the nickname "E.T.", set new career highs with nine receptions for 216 yards, good for two touchdowns. One of those two scores went for 87 yards, the second-longest receiving play in Husky history. Frederick also dazzled the national TV audience with an 86-yard punt return for a touchdown in the first quarter, sixth-longest in Husky lore. He finished with 216 receiving yards, 101 punt return yards and 54 kickoff return yards, good for a grand total of 371 all-purpose yards and was, as far as the records indicate, the first Pac-10 player ever to score twice in a game on plays of longer than 85 yards (USC's media guide doesn't have sufficient records to know for sure). Those 371 all-purpose yards broke a 53-year old school record held by "The King," Hugh McElhenny, who compiled 362 in a game vs. Washington State in 1950. McElhenny, considered by many the greatest offensive player in school history, went on to an NFL Hall of Fame career. Frederick's 371 yards were only eight short of the Pac-10 record of 379, set by Stanford's Glyn Milburn in 1990.

* TIGHT ENDS *

Joe Toledo, Jr., 6-6, 285 – The most experienced tight end on the team, Toledo has appeared in 16 games and started seven ... played in only three games (two starts) last season due to injury ... in 2002, started five of the UW's 13 games ... had three catches in opener at Ohio State in 2003.

Jon Lyon, Sr., 6-6, 265 – Played in all 12 games and started two last season after transferring from Saddleback CC in southern California ... tied for third on the team with 17 catches in 2003 ... four catches at Cal marked his highest total last year ... started vs. Oregon and California.

Ben Bandel, So., 6-7, 255 – Played in 10 games, starting seven, last season as a RS-freshman ... injury in fall camp could limit early-season action ... scored lone TD of 2003 at Oregon State ... caught four passes for 37 yards at UCLA in top game of 2003 season.

Dash Crutchley, So., 6-6, 255 – Originally a linebacker, but moved to TE to 2002 ... didn't see any game action, but should contribute on the field in 2004.

LYON ON MACKKEY LIST: Washington senior tight end Jon Lyon is one of 26 players on the watch list for the 2004 John Mackey Award, presented to the nation's top college tight end by the Nassau County (N.Y.) Sports Commission. Last year, Miami's Kellen Winslow won the honor in its fourth year of existence. Lyon, who and caught 17 passes for 231 yards last season after transferring to the UW from Saddleback Community College, played in all 12 games last year, starting twice. He is one of six Pac-10 tight ends on the watch list.

* OFFENSIVE LINEMEN *

T - Khalif Barnes, Sr., 6-5, 310 – Easily the most experienced lineman (and possibly player) on the UW team ... enters the year having started all 37 games since his redshirt year of 2000 ... voted one of five team captains ... once a defensive tackle, has been starter at left tackle since the start of the 2001 season ... an All-Pac-10 pick in the 2004 preseason publications.

T - Ryan Brooks, Sr., 6-6, 305 – Has earned three letters as a reserve lineman and special teams performer, but looking to make first career start in 2004 ... slated at co-No. 1 with Meadow on the depth chart at strong tackle.

T/G - Robin Meadow, Jr., 6-6, 300 – After playing in six games and starting two in 2003, began last year as a starter at right guard efore an injury.

T - Chad Macklin, RS-Fr., 6-8, 295 – Tallest and youngest member of the UW's offensive line two-deep ... redshirted his true freshman season in 2003.

G - Clay Walker, So., 6-4, 300 – Only a sophomore, Walker is one of the UW's most experienced linemen ... played in all 12 games last year, starting six, all at left guard ... can also play center.

G - Stanley Daniels, So., 6-4, 305 – Originally a defensive lineman, moved to the offensive line prior to last season ... played in five games last season.

G - Tusi Sa'au, Jr., 6-2, 320 – Earned first letter last season, when he played in seven games and started six ... born in American Samoa.

G - Tui Alailefaleula, Sr., 6-4, 330 – Moved to offensive line in the spring after having been a defensive lineman the last three seasons ... has played in 30 career games, starting once at UCLA as a freshman in 2001.

C - Brad Vanneman, Jr., 6-3, 300 – Enters the season as starting center ... played in seven games last year, starting at Cal and vs. Washington State.

C - Brandon Leyritz, Jr., 6-3, 310 – A walkon who earned his first letter in 2003 and enters 2004 as the No. 2 center ... played in six games in 2003.

KHALIF'S STARTS: Senior offensive tackle has a chance to perform the rare feat of serving as a true four-year starter if he makes a start in each game this season. Barnes, who originally came to the UW as a defensive lineman and only switched sides at the end of his true-freshman season, has started every game for the Huskies over the last three seasons, 37 in all (counting bowls). If he were to start every game this season, he'd become the first lineman in UW history to start every game of four straight seasons. The closest any Husky offensive lineman has ever come was when Chad Ward started all but three games between 1997 and 2000 (including his last 45 in a row).

- Manase Hopoi, Sr., 6-4, 290** – After sitting out the 2001 season due to partial qualifier status, has started all 25 games in his career ... can play both tackle and end ... expects to graduate early and re-gain another year of eligibility for 2005 ... 11 career sacks are most on the team and four sacks in 2004 are most among returners ... currently slated to start at one tackle spot.
- Dan Milsten, So., 6-5, 290** – Enters the fall No. 1 on the depth chart at one tackle spot, next to Hopoi ... started career on offensive line but played in 10 games last year on defense ... a PrepStar All-American in high school.
- Mike Mapuolesega, Jr., 6-3, 265** – Has decided to go with the longer version of his last name (Mapuolesega) after having been listed as "Mapu" previously ... a JC transfer that redshirted last season, but has emerged as a starter at defensive end in 2004 ... grew up in Pago Pago, American Samoa.
- Brandon Ala, So., 6-3, 245** – Enters the fall as a starter at defensive end ... played in nine of 12 games last year, starting vs. Arizona ... made four tackles vs. Washington State last year in top game, statistically.
- Donny Mateaki, So., 6-5, 285** – Could be a starter at defensive tackle, but injuries during fall camp may relegate him to second team ... played in all 12 games last year, starting four of the year's last six games ... a 2003 second-team freshman All-America pick by The Sporting News.
- Ty Eriks, Jr., 6-2, 245** – After playing a number of different positions, enters his second season as a defensive end in 2004 ... has played tailback, fullback, safety and outside linebacker at the UW ... played 12 games last year at DE, starting three ... second-team Academic All-Pac-10 in 2003.
- Greyson Gunheim, Fr., 6-4, 240** – One of two true freshman defensive linemen expected to get a shot at playing ... backs up Ala at DE ... expected to serve as pass rusher ... also played running back at Anahulu High School.
- Jordan White-Frisbee, Fr., 6-5, 330** – One of two true freshman defensive linemen expected to get a shot at playing ... backs up Hopoi at DT ... only a freshman, is nonetheless one of the biggest players on the team.

* LINEBACKERS *

- Joe Lobendahn, Jr., 5-10, 230** – Has re-emerged as a starter after missingly all but three games last year due to a knee injury ... voted a captain ... got a medical redshirt for last year after having played the two previous ... seven tackles last year vs. Ohio State in opener ... played in all 25 games during freshman and sophomore seasons.
- Scott White, So., 6-1, 230** – Has bounced back and fourth from OLB to ILB, but begins the year as a starter inside ... played in all 12 last year and made Sporting News Pac-10 All-Freshman team ... six tackles at Ohio State in 2003.
- Evan Benjamin, Jr., 6-0, 210** – Has moved to outside linebacker from safety and will start to begin the season ... played in all 25 games the last two years, making 12 starts total at safety ... 71 tackles in 2003 are third most among 2004 returners ... three interceptions last season ... sister, Paige, was an All-America volleyball player at UW and father, Tony, played in the NFL.
- Tim Galloway, Sr., 6-2, 230** – Will continue to compete for a starting ILB spot ... 84 tackles last year tied with S Jimmy Newell for most among 2004 returners ... started 10 of 12 games last year and has played in all 37 games of his career ... 132 career tackles entering 2004 are most on the team.
- Tahj Bomar, So., 6-2, 210** – Enters the year as Benjamin's backup at OLB ... played in seven games as true freshman last year, totaling three tackles.
- Dan Howell, Fr., 6-2, 215** – One of only three true freshmen to crack two-deep entering the opening game ... won two CIF Southern Section championships at Hart High School (Newhall, Calif.) ... also an RB in HS.

* DEFENSIVE SECONDARY *

- CB - Derrick Johnson, Sr., 6-0, 190** – Probably the Huskies' most experienced defensive player with 27 career starts and 37 career games ... started every game the last two years ... voted a team captain in 2004 ... set a UW record in 2003 with interceptions in four straight games ... 11 career picks ranks seventh in UW history (more info follows) ... has 10 interceptions in his last 15 games ... second-team All-Pac-10 last year ... after playing in every game as a true freshman in 2000 (starting three), sat out all of 2001 due to injury ... freshman All-America as CB and KR in 2000.
- CB - Sam Cunningham, Sr., 6-0, 180** – Has played in all 36 games of his UW career, starting six ... started five games last year at CB ... lone career interception came off of Heisman winner Carson Palmer in 2002.
- CB - Matt Fountaine, So., 5-11, 185** – Enters the season as a backup at one CB spot ... played in 10 of 12 games last year ... older brother, Jamal, was a standout defensive lineman at the UW (1990-93).
- CB - Cody Ellis, RS-Fr., 6-0, 180** – Has emerged as a backup at CB and will see action in nickel package ... redshirted 2003 ... all-league CB/WR in HS.
- S - Jimmy Newell, Sr., 6-1, 195** – Another of the UW's most experienced defenders ... has played in 35 games over four seasons (played in three games in 2001 before injury redshirt) and started 16 ... started all 12 last season at free safety, but now the starter at strong ... 84 tackles last year are most (tied) among 2004 returners ... first-team Academic All-Pac-10 in 2003.
- S - Dashon Goldson, Jr., 6-2, 195** – A JC transfer that has moved into the starting free safety spot ... enrolled at the UW last Jan., but was injured during spring drills ... originally signed with the UW in 2002, but went to Coffeyville (Kan.) CC ... JC first-team All-American last year.
- S - C.J. Wallace, So., 6-0, 205** – Played in 11 of 12 games as a true freshman last season, mostly on special teams ... also outstanding RB in high school.
- S - Chris Hemphill, RS-Fr., 6-6, 215** – After redshirting 2003, has worked his way onto the two-deep ... easily the tallest member of the defense outside of the front four ... led HS to three league championships.

D.J.'S PICKS: Senior cornerback Derrick Johnson has been an everyday starter each of the last two seasons. Along with the three starts he made as a true freshman in 2000 (he redshirted the 2001 season with an injury), Johnson has made 27 career starts and has 11 interceptions to show for it. Two years ago, he had five picks. Last year, he upped that total to six. If that progression continues, he has a shot at the UW's long-standing career interceptions record as he is seven shy of Al Worley's school record of 18, set between 1966 and 1968. Johnson's 11 career picks (he didn't have any in 2000), currently rank as seventh-most in school history. One more will tie him for sixth on the UW season list and only two more will bump him up to a tie for third. His six interceptions last year were eighth-most in Husky history and most since Walter Bailey made eight picks in 1991. Last year, Johnson broke one of Worley's less well-known records by intercepting a pass in four straight games. Worley had streaks of three straight on two occasions in 1968 when he intercepted an NCAA record 14 passes, a mark that still stands.

PK - Evan Knudson, Jr., 6-0, 175 – A walkon looking to retain his starting position at placekicker ... responsible for every Husky field goal attempt and all but one PAT try last season ... led the team with 63 points in 2003, 10th in the Pac-10 ... hit 10 of his 17 field goal attempts and 33 of 36 PATs ... three of seven missed FGs were blocked ... made five of his eight FG attempts from 40 to 49 yards ... honorable mention Academic All-Pac-10.

P/PK - Sean Douglas, So., 6-1, 210 – After serving as backup punter last year, has taken the starting reins in 2004 ... also kicks off, as he nearly all of last season ... appeared in every game last year, but only punted once – for 43 yards at Arizona ... helped Bellevue (Neb.) East HS to state title in 2002.

PK - Michael Braunstein, RS-Fr., 5-6, 180 – Enters the season in a fight for the field goal/PAT job ... saw action last year vs. Indiana and Idaho (and converted his one PAT attempt) before redshirting his true freshman season.

KICKING IT DEEP: While Sean Douglas originally came from his home near Omaha, Neb., to the UW to be the Husky punter, it turns out he's become the Huskies' kickoff specialist. While senior Garth Erickson handled the punting duties in 2003, Douglas bided his time kicking off, and he performed very well. Douglas, expected to serve as the team's starting punter and kickoff specialist in 2004, kicked off a total of 56 times last season. Of those 56, only eight were returned beyond the 28-yard line and one other was placed at the 35 after being kicked out of bounds. Of the 56, 22 resulted in touchbacks while an additional 10 were returned inside the 20 (not counting penalties on either the kickoff or return team). The longest return of the year by a Husky opponent was by Nevada's Maurice Mann, who returned a kick 43 yards to the 44 (starting at the one-yard line).

Both of the UW's next two games will also be shown live on television. Outside linebacker Evan Benjamin's older sister, Paige, was an All-America volleyball player for the Huskies while sophomore guard Jason Benn's older brother Kyle, a center for the Dawgs from 1998-2001, is now a graduate assistant coach.
